

SOVIET TROOPS LEAVING MOSCOW; GOLD IS REMOVED

By Associated Press. AMSTERDAM, Aug. 15. (British Wireless Press.)—Soviet troops have begun to evacuate Moscow. The gold reserves which had been in the basement of the Kremlin already have been removed to an unknown place.

Dispatches received in London Monday reporting that Premier Lenin and War Minister Trotsky had fled to the rural hamlet of Kronstadt added that all the governments also would be removed there. The flight of Lenin and Trotsky was said to be due to threats by the soviet revolutionists on the left that they were about to bring a reign of terror there. Whether the soviet troops were forced to depart from Moscow is not clear, but the fact that they left the soviet government undoubtedly will be a serious blow to their cause.

Moscow, the ancient capital of Russia, was made the soviet capital March 10. The Lenin government fled there from Petrograd, toward which the German troops were marching. It has been reported within the last few days that the Germans had renewed their march toward Petrograd. Czecho-Slovak troops have been reported in force along the Volga, about 50 miles east of Moscow.

DISSENT WITH SOVIET SPREADS IN RUSSIA

By Associated Press. LONDON, Aug. 15.—The soviet government has issued a proclamation calling for the Russian republic. It is a danger, according to telegrams from Helsinki, that the soviet government will be removed to Kronstadt owing to insecurity of the city. Bands of armed peasants are reported marching on Petrograd and other great cities. They demand that the guards should stop all their food. Dissatisfaction with the soviets is said to prevail everywhere in Russia.

German Army Is Now In Hands of a Retreat Specialist

By Associated Press. PARIS, Aug. 15. (Havas Agency.)—General Hans Von Boehn, the German "retreat specialist," has been appointed to the supreme German command on the Somme front. Newspapers believe that this change in German command is highly significant. The German withdrawal north of Albert is looked upon as the first application of his tactics.

General Boehn and his former command the German eighth army stood the brunt of the Allied pressure on the Marne salient previous to the withdrawal to the north of the Vesle. The German troops engaged in the fighting east and southeast of Amiens have been under the command of Generals Von Der Marwitz and Von Hutler and in the army group of Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria.

12,000 REGISTRANTS CALLED INTO TRAINING

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Provost Marshal General Crowder today called upon thirty-four states to furnish a total of 12,000 white draft registrants, qualified for limited military service for entrainment August 30 and 31. The men called will be sent to three camps, 3,000 to Camp Upton, Yaphank, N. Y., 4,000 to Camp Lodge, Des Moines, Iowa, and 5,000 to Camp Green, Charlotte, N. C. The quotas of the various states include: Arkansas 100, Camp Dodge; Louisiana 200, Camp Greene; Mississippi 100, Camp Greene; Missouri 450, Camp Dodge; Oklahoma 250, Camp Dodge; Tennessee 200, Camp Greene.

ROOSEVELT REGRETS INABILITY TO FIGHT BESIDE SONS

A CHANGE THAT ONE MONTH HAS BROUGHT

By Associated Press. PARIS, Aug. 15.—Just four weeks ago today, the residents of Paris were awakened by the sounds of such a cannonade as they never had heard before. It was General Mangin's counter preparation against the great German attack which the enemy believed was to bring him to the gates of Paris.

In phrases tempered with joy the morning newspapers outlined the great change that one short month has brought. The enemy, whom the Germans had been soundly beaten and out-generaled at every point and initiative has been wrung from him by the military genius of Marshal Foch. The German command, it is said, has transferred the direction of movement to General Von Boehn, a specialist in retreats.

Allied troops, among whom the Americans have borne a creditable part, have captured 73,000 prisoners and more than 1,700 guns. This is a greater number than the Allies have taken in four weeks since the beginning of the war.

BOTH SIDES GATHERING STRENGTH FOR HARDER FIGHT

By Associated Press. PARIS, Aug. 15.—Both sides are gathering strength for a resumption of heavy fighting. That, however, does not prevent the present withdrawal of the German army from the Lassigny-Noyon line and doggedly struggling onward through gas-choked woods.

General Humbert's men have carried Ribecourt which barred the road running toward Noyon between Thiesscourt ridge and the Oise and protected the Germans in Ourscamp forest, east of the river. It is a useful success that seriously endangers both Thiesscourt ridge and the Ourscamp salient.

The enemy in the Thiesscourt position, already severely shaken by the attacks of General Humbert's left, is reported to be showing signs of giving way.

40 DUTCH SHIPS WILL CARRY SUGAR TO UNITED STATES

WASHINGTON, August 15.—Forty Dutch ships totaling approximately 100,000 tons, now idle in Dutch East Indian ports, are expected to be released to bring sugar, tin, quinine and other commodities to the United States as the result of an informal trade agreement effected by the war trade board through Charge D'Affaires De Beaufort, of the Dutch legation.

Tonnage placed at the disposal of the American government through the agreement will be sufficient, it was estimated today, to import from 50,000 to 100,000 tons of sugar and also such quantities of tin and quinine.

Return for the tonnage the United States government will undertake to license normal exports to the islands subject only to such limitations of commodities as made necessary by the war program.

Exports of tin, quinine and other commodities originating in the islands will be accepted by the United States at the normal rate and all the sugar offered will be taken, thereby providing a market for as much of the large Dutch sugar crop as the Dutch are able to move.

BEHNCKE STATE SECRETARY TO GERMAN ADMIRALTY

By Associated Press. AMSTERDAM, Aug. 15.—Vice Admiral Behncke has been appointed state secretary to the German admiralty, says the West-Eding of Bremen. He was formerly vice chief of the naval general staff.

Vice Admiral Behncke succeeds Admiral Von Capelle in the office of state secretary to the admiralty or minister of marine, as the office is customarily designated.

Admiral Von Capelle took over the ministry of marine in March, 1916, succeeding Admiral Von Tirpitz. There have been recent reports of Von Capelle's impending retirement, but his resignation might be expected soon. A few days previously Admiral Von Holtzendorff retired as head of the German admiralty staff, shortly after he had made an apology for the failure of the German submarines to sink American transports.

The aged soldier was born in Scotland and received his education at the University of Edinburgh.

GUARDIANSHIP OF PRUSSIAN PRINCE IS RE-INDICED

By Associated Press. AMSTERDAM, Aug. 15.—The guardianship under which Prince Friederich Leopold of Prussia was placed last June has been rescinded, according to the Zeitung Am Mittag of Berlin.

Prince Friederich Leopold of Prussia is the youngest son of Friederich Leopold, first cousin of the emperor of Germany. Last August he was placed under interdiction by Count Von Eulenburg, minister of the royal

house and was charged with extravagance. This action brought about a controversy in court circles which ended in June when Emperor William approved the action of Count Eulenburg.

MAN FOUND WITH PISTOL WOUND IN BREAST NEAR CITY

Attracted by a pistol shot, followed by groans, A. W. Ayres, living near the golf links, to the south of town, found a man, giving his name as Lee Ross, lying by the side of the Wichita Valley tracks, bleeding profusely from a wound just below the heart, caused by the bullet from a 28 calibre Ivers and Johnson revolver, which was lying beside the man. Ross was taken to the city hall and then to the Wichita General Hospital, where his wound was attended to by Dr. Mark Moore. This morning he was resting fitfully well, though in a serious condition from the loss of blood, and Dr. Moore was unable to state the possible outcome.

Other than to say that the shot was accidental, Ross would make no statement. At the city hall he said he had been working in the oil fields nearby and was walking to Wichita Falls. He told Dr. Moore that he had decided to go to sleep and had laid down, placing his grips on either side of him and had taken the pistol out for protection. The discharge was accidental, he said. The bullet entered just below and to the right of the heart, Dr. Moore stated, and he believes it's course was deflected by a rib. The bullet has not yet been located. Ross gave no information concerning relatives to be notified, and it is not known where his home is.

"BABBLING TONGUES" STRONG PRODUCTION

"They say" the terrible "they" of gossip is the pivot about which this drama, one of the most perfect pieces of technical modern playwriting, revolves. SCHOOL FOR SOLDIERS DISQUALIFIED FOR ACTIVE SERVICE

HOUSTON, TEX., Aug. 25.—A school will be conducted in the Red Cross building at Camp Logan for the training of convalescent soldiers and assigned to domestic service branches of the army. Courses in telegraphy, telephony, visual signaling and possibly mechanics will be taught. Camp Logan is the only military cantonment in the State where a school of this character has been opened, it is said.

BUNDY WILL RUN AT SOLICITATION OF HIS FRIENDS

Having been solicited by many of his friends, M. A. Bundy has become a candidate for alderman for the place vacated by Dr. Wade H. Walker who is out of the city and who is planning to enter military service. In becoming a candidate for the office, Mr. Bundy is not doing so through his personal inclination but is doing so because he has been urged by many to do so and because he is willing to serve the city to the best of his ability.

Mr. Bundy has been connected with the Fort Worth and Denver here for about ten years, having been agent for the Denver and Wichita Valley. He is now agent for United Railroads here for the United States government but has tendered his resignation to take effect soon and will be associated with the Sunshine State Refining Co. as traffic manager. He has been a property owner in Wichita Falls practically all the time he has been a resident of the city, and as a citizen, has always been ready to do a full share in all civic and patriotic movements.

His friends feel that his exceptional business qualifications would make him a useful member of the city council. A petition to have Mr. Bundy's name placed on the official ballot was filed several days ago.

Mr. Bundy says that he is running on no special platform, but that if elected he will give the city the best service within his ability.

INTEREST GROWS IN CONFERENCE AT ST. JOHN'S CHURCH

After the formal opening on Tuesday, the second day session of the Sunday school convention of the West Texas Baptist Association, the B. Y. P. U. and the Woman's Conference, held at the St. John's Baptist church, was marked by growing interest and enthusiasm. Several new messengers arrived during the day. The convention went on record as being strongly for the war and with the government in all war measures during Wednesday's session. The visiting delegates were welcomed in a general introduction and "got acquainted" half hour. Rev. Parley was the speaker of the day, addressing a large crowd in the evening on "Kingship of Christ."

VICE CONDITIONS DISCUSSED BY ROTARY CLUB

Rotarians discussed conditions in Wichita Falls, relating to commercialized vice which had been said to exist in the city and referred to in recent communications from the war department to various individuals and organizations, at the regular weekly luncheon held today. Dr. Percy G. Cross, pastor of the First Christian church, a guest, talked on the subject, and the club entered into an informal discussion of the matter, this occupying the entire time of meeting. T. B. Smock and J. C. Meyers were appointed a committee from the Rotary Club to confer with other committees appointed on this matter. The usual business routine was followed. M. J. Fowler, oil man, formerly of Burkburnett, who has moved to Wichita Falls, and Dr. Cross, were the only guests.

DROUTH REFUGEES CONTINUE TO PASS THROUGH CITY

The exodus of farmers from the drouth stricken regions of West Texas continues without cessation and now, almost two months after the first lit- tle caravans of canvas covered wagons, drawn by dilapidated horses, filled with men, women and children, all of whom show unmistakable signs of having felt the hand of drouth and near famine which has touched the country, came through Wichita Falls, there are still a number of such parties noticed daily, passing through the city, or camped on the outskirts. Some days as many as twenty-five parties have been counted passing through bound for any place at all, where one can make something to eat, and of- tentimes they stop here for a few days, while the man or men of the family help eke out the slender funds, if there are any at hand, with a few days work if there is any to be found. Knox, Haylor, Haskell and other western counties have contributed largely to these wanderers, the majority of them being tenant farmers, who for three years now have been unable to make any crops, and who are faced with the problem of supplying themselves with the bare necessities of life. Many of these farmers have found the Government Em- ployment Service's call for laborers a means of temporary relief, and the recent shipments of laborers to the west have contained a number of farmers, who left their families to go to relatives, or back to the little farm home to wait for a part of his wages as this offers at least a little something to eat, which the sun parched, dust-swept plains have been de- veying them for several years. Even some of the farmers who owned their own home and land have been forced to desert them and seek some sort of work.

Who, much disheartened at the crop failures of the past seasons due to the lack of rain, practically every man who has been talked with ex- pressed his intention of returning to the farm as soon as he found an op- portunity, either in some other state, where there is more rain, or in West Texas, when the drouth is over. The majority of these drouth refugees are taking the situation very philosophi- cally, or rather stoically, but their distress is so apparent that they can not but excite feelings of pity from those who come in contact with them, though powerless to control the cir- cumstances that brought this condi- tion about.

MISSOURI PLANS TRAINING CAMPS FOR FARM HANDS

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 15.—Tentative plans for the opening of two training camps in Missouri to turn out ex- perience farm hands to meet the farm labor shortage caused by the war will be laid before F. F.
