AUGUST 27, PAY PRESIDENT DAY SAVINGS STAMPS

August 27 has been set by Louis Lipsitz, director of the War Savings Stamps Campaign in Texas, as the "Pay the President Day" when those who pledged the president on June 28, to buy the maximum number of war savings stamps, pay their pledges.

Wherever possible it is urged that the pledges be paid in full, or if this cannot be done, the pledge cards should be brought up to date, and as many more stamps bought as possible. Those delinquent will be notified of their delinquency and will be urged to pay up immediately.

War savings stamps may be purchased from any agent at any place and complete credit will be given the purchaser, although the agent, from whom he purchases his stamps may not have the purchaser's pledge card.

GERMANS PLACE ALSATIANS AND LORRAINERS ON WESTERN FRONT

PARIS, Aug. 21.—The German command is faced by a more or less serious difficulty as a result of the presence on the western front of divisions containing tens of thousands of soldiers from Alsace and Lorraine who up to this time have not been employed in active fighting against the French.

Americans Urged to Celebrate Anniversary Birth of LaFayette

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—For the proper celebration throughout the United States on September 6, of the 161st anniversary of the birth of LaFayette, the Great French hero and friend of the American colonies, the American Defense Society has issued a call to the people of the United States emphasizing the national debt America owes LaFayette and urging Americans to repay part of this debt by annually honoring his name and memory.

This is also the anniversary of the first battle of the Marne in 1914, and through the cooperation of the two hundred and seventy-six branches of the society, and of many civic and patriotic organizations who have already volunteered to help in making LaFayette Day a great success it is expected that it will be fittingly observed in every city in the United States.

Today as we plan to celebrate the birth of LaFayette, his country is taking part once more in a war of judgment, a war which will save, and has already saved civilization and free institutions from the menace of autocracy and militarism.





OTHER COUNTY OFFICIALS MAY BE AFFECTED BY SUIT

The suit against B. M. Bullard, county tax collector, filed yesterday in the 78th district court to recover fees alleged to have been retained in excess of his lawful compensation, is a test suit, to determine whether Wichita county is under the fee bill, putting all county officers under a straight salary, or whether county officers should retain all fees collected. Walsh, maintains that the county comes under the provisions of the fee bill, putting county officers on a salary.

Mr. Bullard's integrity is not involved in the suit, which was brought to determine a question of law.
