#### PURCHASING POWER OF DOLLAR SHRINKS

WASHINGTON. Aug. 29.—Comparison of food prices prevailing now with those of five years ago, shows that the purchasing power of a dollar bill has shrunk to fifty four cents in Washington and Baltimore; 57 cents in Philadelphia; 59 cents in New York and Chicago, and 63 cents in San Francisco, according to a statement today by the department of labor.

Food which could be bought for \$1 in July, 1913, now costs \$1.85 in Washington: \$1.69 in Chicago, and \$1.58 in San Francisco. In the one-year per-iod from July, 1917, to July, 1918, food prices advanced 22 per cent in San Francisco; 20 per cent in Wash-iegton and Philadelphia; 20 per cent in Haitimore, 15 per cent in New York and 11 per cent in Chicago.


