GREAT GAINS ON WEST FRONT

LABOR DAY FEATURED BY A PARADE OF 500 UNION MEN OF CITY

Opening with a big parade of 500 laborers this morning at 10 o'clock in Labor Day in Wichita Falls was being celebrated very quietly, though the crowds on the streets were equal to any past celebration when there have been picnics and other attractions. This afternoon there were two attractions, a baseball game at Call Field between two teams from the aero squadron at the camp, and a dance at Lake Wichita. Tonight there will be a second dance at Lake Wichita and a dance in one of the hangars at the camp, for the enlisted men and their friends.

Call Field is having a full day holiday and the streets were filled with soldiers during the morning. The aviation camp and Lake Wichita were centers of attraction for the afternoon.

OVER FIVE HUNDRED UNION MEN PARADE

More than five hundred men and a number of women, representatives of Union Labor, marched through the streets of Wichita Falls this morning, carrying flags, and following a float symbolizing the work of the Red Cross with the army and navy, the civilian's representative in this struggle, and provided the only formal demonstration for Labor Day. The parade, which was headed by Mayor J. B. Marlow and Harry Aker, of the Bricklayers local, the grand marshal, was very impressive, despite the lack of elaborately decorated floats, outside the Red Cross float, this usual feature of Labor Day parades being omitted because of war time conditions this year. The idea which it was sought to convey, that of union labor standing squarely behind the government, was expressed more significantly by the long lines of men, representing the various trades, who marched behind the standard-bearer carrying the Stars and Stripes and the service flag of Wichita Falls union labor, which boasts 127 stars, that many more are being won from the locals of the city, and a large number of whom are now in uniform, than would have been possible by elaborate decorations.

When the parade had completed the line of march through the business district the band and all the marchers came to a halt at the Eighth street crossing of Ohio and formed a solid square, under the American emblem, which was suspended over the square. The band played the Star Spangled Banner, all in the parade stood with bared heads at attention, this providing an impressive and fitting finale.

The patriotic float, which was decorated by members of the various unions, was loaned by the Wichita Motor Company, and members of the Junior Red Cross occupied it, representing the Red Cross on its mission of mercy to injured soldiers. The truck was decorated with red, white and blue bunting and flags, and bore on the sides a banner with this inscription, Wilson, We Are With You!

Miss Ruth Nolan was dressed as a Red Cross nurse, with little Miss Joeline Woods as the miniature nurse. Wilson Grey was the injured soldier, who was being attended by the Red Cross nurse. In front of the float stood Miss Ruth Barnard, dressed as Columbia, while on either side stood a soldier and a sailor, representing the two branches of the country's defense. Chester Hines was the sailor and Seaton Hines, the soldier. H. H. Hayes of the Carpenters Union, was also on the float, representing union labor.

The Carpenters union was the best represented of any local in the parade, with about 150 marching. The order of march follows: Mayor Marlow and Marshal Aker, the band, the standard-bearer with the American flag and the service flag of Wichita Falls union labor, containing 127 stars; waiters union; painters; bricklayers; metal workers; ice men; printers; bricklayers; carpenters and railway caulkers.

TUESDAY TO CONFIRM
NOMINATION.

INTEREST IN PLATFORM TROOPS DETERMINED

Gathering Vastly Different From Similar Meetings of the Democratic Party.

By Associated Press. Sept. 2.—Tabulation of the votes of the kind democratic primary was not completed today when the state executive committee met to canvass them, and the meeting of the committee, which was scheduled for ten o'clock, was postponed until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The canvassing of the vote was the only business scheduled for the committee, and the only one of the thirty-one members were present. The present committee will expire when it certifies the results of the primary elections to the state convention tomorrow.

The gathering for the convention presented a vastly different appearance than previous similar meetings, owing to the presence of women delegates, a large number of whom already had arrived. Mrs. Minnie Fisher Cunningham, of Galveston, is scheduled to be temporary chairman of the convention. She was among the early arrivals but took no part in the pre-convention conferences that crowded the hotel lobby, whose name has been mentioned as a candidate for permanent chairman of the convention.

Dean, who was a member of the state senate, was also present. He was present, was presiding officer during the proceedings. His candidacy was endorsed by W. L. Crawford, of Beaumont, manager of the Hobday campaign. A. P. Barrett of San Antonio, defeated candidate for the nomination for congress from the San Antonio district, also is a candidate for permanent chairman of the convention.

R. E. Thompson of El Paso, candidate for speaker of the next house of representatives, declared today he had pledged from members of the house of George B. Terrell of Cherokee, authorized the statement that he had withdrawn from the speakership race and would support Thompson, while W. M. Fry of Caldwell, whose name has been mentioned as a candidate, declared he never had been a candidate for the office.

There will be 902 votes in the convention, according to a tabulation by Charles J. Kirk, former secretary of the committee. It is based on a proportion of one for each 300 votes cast at the 1916 election. The vote for the chief counties is:

Bell, 12; Bexar, 23; Dallas, 30; El Paso, 8; Ellis, 12; Galveston, 11; Grayson, 14; Harris, 31; Hunt, 12; McLennan, 18; Tarrant, 24; Jefferson, 10.

Only 148 counties had been tabulated when the committee met at 2 o'clock and another recess was taken until 10 tomorrow morning.

LONDON, Sept. 2.—Further advances in Flanders were made today by the British. They captured the towns of Estaires, four miles east of Merville and Steenwerck, three miles southeast of Bailleul.

PARIS, Sept. 2.—The Allied forces on the western front have taken a total of 128,302 prisoners since July 15, it was announced in an official statement today. In the same period 2,069 guns, 1,734 mine throwers and 13,783 machine guns were captured.

ON THE WESTERN FRONT Telling progress was made by the Allies today in the great battle on the western front when Canadian and English troops pierced the Drocourt-Queant switch of the Hindenburg line, otherwise known as the Wotan line.

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NORWEGIAN STEAMER TORPEDOED AND SUNK

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 1.—The Norwegian steamer Borgedal has been torpedoed and sunk. According to information received here 25 men of the crew have landed at Cape Race, on the southeastern coast of Newfoundland.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 2.—The German war correspondents take comfort in the reflection that the operations on the west front are going satisfactorily and that a "straight line" has now been gained, which they declare, simplifies the defense and saves troops, while the enemy is left in possession of an arid and completely devastated crater-field in the Somme desert.

for each \$500 or fraction thereof, stamps being also required for each transfer of such lease. Leases provided only for the development of the oil rights required no tax, Mr. Pope stated.

He also called attention to the provision of the federal law requiring all parties who sell stock on a commission to pay a tax of \$30 per year, the time being computed from July 1 to June 30 of each year, explaining that those who had made sales but later gave up the business were not excused.

Mr. Pope answered a number of questions regarding the revenue law and its application to the oil industry.

Revenue Law Explained. W. C. Pope of the U. S. Internal Revenue department, explained to those present at the meeting the requirements of the government in placing the proper revenue stamps on documents used in oil development.

Mr. Pope explained that the difference in two kinds of leases ordinarily used, those representing a conveyance of property require a 50c revenue stamp.

MONT ST. QUENTIN WAS CAPTURED IN ONE HOUR'S TIME

LONDON, Sept. 2.—The Australians who captured Mont St. Quentin with 1,500 prisoners and thereby made the fall of Peronne inevitable, accomplished the feat within an hour and with a loss to themselves of only twenty-five men, according to the Daily Mail's correspondent at British headquarters in France.

The correspondent says that the better part of three German divisions crumbled to pieces before one Australian unit. The Germans appeared to have lost some sort of nameless terror similar to that which sometimes takes possession of troops fighting against Indians in their native haunts.

The capture of Peronne, according to the correspondent, should turn the enemy's present line and hasten his retreat. He now has in this southern quarter only one good position to hold before he reaches the Hindenburg line from St. Quentin northward.

MAKE COMPLAINT THAT CAFES USE CRACKED DISHES

Cracks in dishes used in restaurants and cafes are the subject of recent anonymous complaint left on the desk of Mrs. T. B. Smock, food inspector of Wichita Falls. The complainant stated that cafes were using dishes with cracks in them and declared this to be an unsanitary and dangerous practice, as filth collected in the cracks today, asks that the inspector take some steps towards correcting this state of affairs.

Mrs. Smock states that there is no law in the state or city sanitary ordinance against the use of cracked dishes, and that the cracked dishes are soon discarded, so that they offer no real menace to the health of the community. She also asks that the suggestion be made that those who wish to make complaints of any sort make them in person or in a signed communication, if they wish them to receive attention.
