LAFAYETTE DAY. If Lafayette were here today—a century ago it might perhaps have been foretold that we should be celebrating Lafayette Day in America today.

But the philosophic observer of a century ago could not perhaps have foreseen that now under the banners of liberty our ancient enemy Britain would be fighting by our side.

The miracle is Liberty's. A Fourth of July celebrated through the length and breadth of Britain would have been incomprehensible a century ago.

Russians may soon be faced with the alternative of fighting compulsorily with the Germans or voluntarily with the Allies.

IS IT TO BE A MATTER OF CHOICE?

German doubtless will endeavor to squeeze food and other supplies out of Southern Russia as long as it is possible to maintain any power there.

Germany is now said to be contemplating the reorganization of Russia and an immense increase of her man power by forcibly drafting Russians into her army.

On the other hand, there is good reason to hope that the Entente mission in Siberia and the allied forces defending Archangel and the White Sea ports will gather to their banners the troops of all classes, including soldiers and

their officers. They should be able easily to overcome and disperse sporadic marauding bands of Bolsheviki and Tatar prisoners of war, who can only be of profit to the Germans.

TWENTY-FIVE OF GERMAN PLANES DOWN THURSDAY

LONDON, Thursday, Sept. 5.—Twenty-five enemy airplanes and nine balloons were shot down yesterday, says an official statement on aerial operations issued tonight.

In addition 14 hostile planes were driven down out of control. Sixteen of our machines are missing. The statement continues:

"Since August 8, four hundred and sixty-five enemy machines have been brought down by our airmen, their destruction being in every case clearly established. In addition the total of enemy machines proved to have been driven down out of control, many of which must actually have crashed, is exactly 290.

The above figures are exclusive of the considerable number of enemy machines brought down by gun fire on the ground.

Sixty-one German balloons have been set on fire. Nine hand-bombs and eleven one-half ton bombs have been dropped by us.

Practically the whole of the air fighting has taken place on the enemy's side of the line. The number of our machines which have failed to return during this period is 252.

Place Berlin Under Law Relating to a State of Siege

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 5. A decree signed by General Von Linsingen, commander of the Brandenburg province, according to the Cologne Volks-Zeitung places the city of Berlin and the province of Brandenburg under a state of siege.

BRITISH ARE ADVANCING EAST OF THE SOMME

By Associated Press. LONDON, Sept. 6.—Advancing east from the river Somme to the south of Peronne the British have captured the villages of St. Christ-Briest and Le Mesnil Brunel, Field Marshal Haig reported in his official statement today.

On the Flanders front the British are established in portions of the old German front line east of Neuve-Chapelle and in the old British line in the Flanders sector.

Southeast of Peronne the British have reached Athies and Mons-en-Champagne. They have captured the village of Doling.

The British also have advanced northwest of Arras. North of Peronne British forces are in possession of the town of Busu and are in the immediate vicinity of Templeux, La Fosse, Nurlin and Equennes.

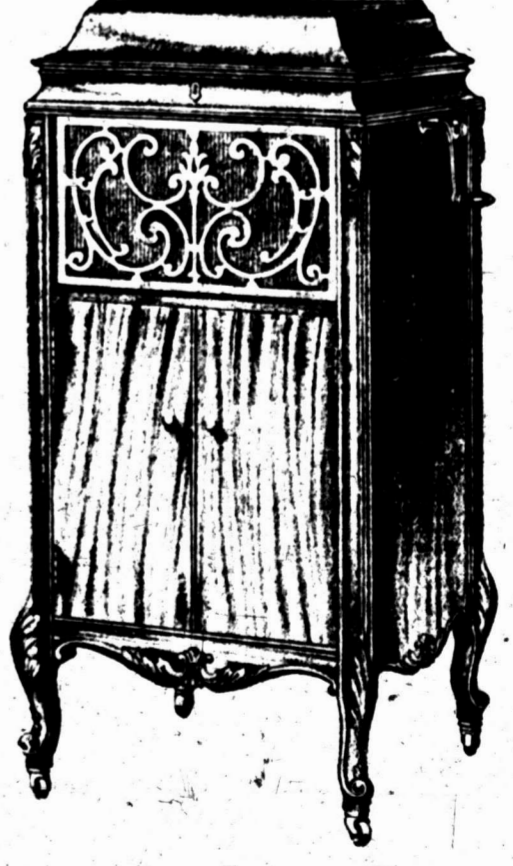

Senator Jones of New Mexico declared the matter nothing new and that they have accomplished much in identification of slackers. In Chicago, he said, 500 were counted, and in New York 1,000 besides several deserters from the army.

GERMAN LOSES OVER A MILLION SINCE MARCH 21
