TRANSPORT TORPEDOED WITH 2800 SOLDIERS ON BOARD; ALL ESCAPE

BELIEVE THAT A DEPTH BOMB SINKS U-BOAT

Associated Press LONDON, Tuesday, Sept. 10.—A troop ship with 2,800 American soldiers on board has been torpedoed. All hands were saved.

To offer to save time instead of launching the boats the men clambered down to destroyers which swarmed around the stricken vessel and came close along side.

The transfer of American soldiers from the stricken vessel to escorting British and American torpedo boat destroyers was quickly made without injury to any one.

Behavior of Troops Splendid. Many of the troops came from Chicago and Cleveland and a large percentage of them were factory hands of foreign extraction.

Several soldiers told the Associated Press that they saw the German submarine lifted clear out of the water after one of the depth bombs exploded and then entirely disappeared.

Something had gone wrong with the troop ship's engine which compelled her for a time to lag behind the rest of the convoy.

The vessel at once began to sink by the bow. Many of the soldiers at the time were taking baths. They did not wait to dress but made for the deck with what little clothing they could hastily grab.

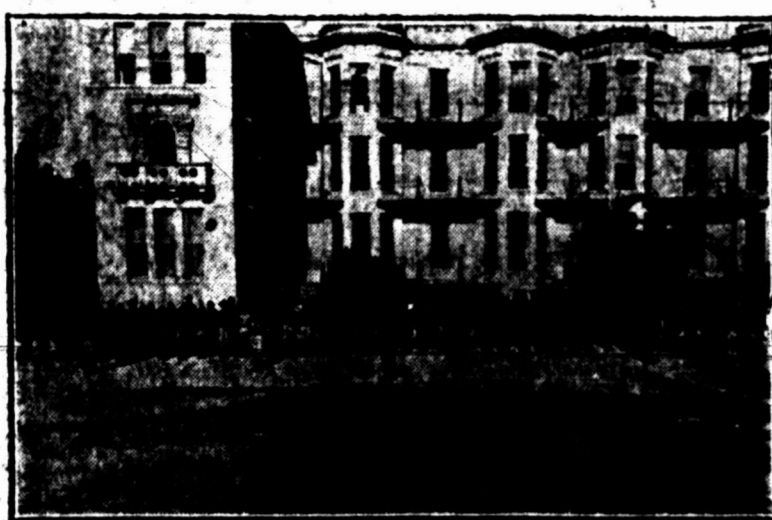

UNIVERSITY WAR ACTIVITIES GREATER THAN OTHER SCHOOLS

Special to The Times. AUSTIN, TEX., Sept. 11.—The war activities of the University of Texas have progressed until they are now far greater than those of any other educational institution in the United States. This statement is borne out by the official records of the university and colleges in the matter of training men for the army. President R. E. Vinson of the university since the declaration of war has devoted his time and energy constantly toward building up a military training establishment here. Many of his ideas along these military educational lines have been adopted by the war department over the country. It is stated by Dr. Vinson that withstanding the big scope of its military schools departments of the university will open and conduct as usual at the coming regular session. There may be modification or re-adjustment of some of the courses to meet existing war conditions. The constructive plan of Dr. Vinson which paved the way to the establishment of the different military schools at the university met with the hearty support of the board of regents of that institution. He devised the plan by which an expenditure of nearly \$1,500,000 will be made for building and equipment for these military schools. Reimbursement for this expenditure to be obtained from the Federal Government by the feeding, housing and instruction of the students by the university. The latest addition to the military vocation schools of the university will be situated just south of Austin upon a tract of 210 acres of land, where there is now being erected an administration building, six barracks buildings and a mess hall. All of these will be of brick construction of permanent type. They will be occupied by the radio school which the university is now conducting. Besides these buildings four barracks for airplanes will be approximately \$400,000. It is stated, this will be borne by the university which will be reimbursed

later by the government for the outlay. The radio school of the university was established several months ago and has been conducted in the engineering building of that institution. When the new plant is finished the attendance will be increased from 400 to about 4,000 and the course of training will be enlarged. In addition to this war work, the university recently completed the construction of a number of brick barracks buildings, administration building, mess hall, shops and lecture buildings at Camp Mabry, Austin, for the accommodation of the school of automobile mechanics which it is conducting for the government. These buildings were erected at a cost of about \$500,000, and plans have just been adopted for the enlargement of the school by additional buildings and equipment which will cost about \$130,000. The attendance at the school of automobile mechanics is now about 2,000 and it will be increased to about 6,000 when the new buildings are finished. The university is also conducting a school of military aeronautics, with an attendance of about 1200, for the government. It expended \$167,000 in buildings and equipment for that school. Advice just received from Washington are to the effect that the school of military aeronautics here is to be greatly enlarged. This may necessitate the erection of additional buildings by the university. A three-plane cost \$50,000 is to be built at that school. The university has also taken over the Theological Seminary at Austin and is converting it into a modern military hospital at a cost of about \$100,000. Besides its other war work, the university will conduct a students' army training corps, beginning with the opening of the coming regular session of that institution. More than 2,000 students and former students and about fifty members of the faculty of the university are in the army. Most of them are already in France. Several hundred of these young men went through officers' training camps and received commissions as officers.

Engineer Praises Valley District As Irrigation Field

That the Wichita Valley district is well situated for an irrigation district as any country he has ever seen, is the statement of V. L. Sullivan, expert water power engineer, after a trip with J. A. Kemp and other Wichita Falls men interested in the irrigation project along the river and surrounding country. The soil was quite as good as any he had ever seen, and would make wonderfully fertile farm land when irrigated, he said, while the general lay of the land was splendidly adapted for irrigation purposes. During his years of experience he had examined more than 150 irrigation projects and he had seen none more favorable than the district proposed for the Wichita Valley irrigation scheme, he stated. The amount of land to be included in the district and the location and size of the dam are matters that are only conjectural at present, Mr. Kemp stated this morning. These details must wait the perfecting of the organization, but immediate action is expected.

Organization Here Planning Drive for Next Liberty Loan

J. A. Overstreet, of the Federal Reserve Bank at Dallas, was in Wichita Falls Tuesday, conferring with the Liberty loan organization, which is to put over the Fourth Liberty Loan in Wichita county, regarding various details of the organization. A meeting of the county chairman and sub-chairmen from the entire district will be held in Dallas immediately preceding the opening of the campaign, Mr. Overstreet announced Tuesday. The old organization will be continued practically intact for the fourth loan campaign. 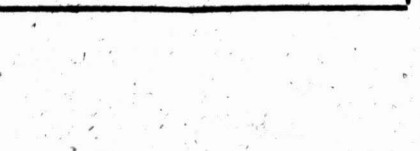

TRANSPORT IS TORPEDOED BY GERMAN SUB

(Continued from page 1.) The troop ship did not sink. Some means apparently were found to check the thrush of water and she got near enough to the shore to be beached. It is hoped that the vessel ultimately can be saved.

The troop ship torpedoed by a German submarine and beached on the English coast last Friday is the third vessel carrying American soldiers to the war zone to be attacked with any degree of success by U-boats. The two other vessels were the Anchor Steamship Tuscania, under charter to the Cunard line and the Peninsular and Oriental liner Moldavia.

The Tuscania was torpedoed and sunk off the Irish coast early in February last year. The Anchor Steamship was carrying troops to England. Of the 1,000 officers and men on board, 204 perished. The vessel was under convoy when attacked.

The Moldavia was torpedoed and sunk May 23 presumably while carrying American troops across the English channel from England to France. Fifty five Americans lost their lives.

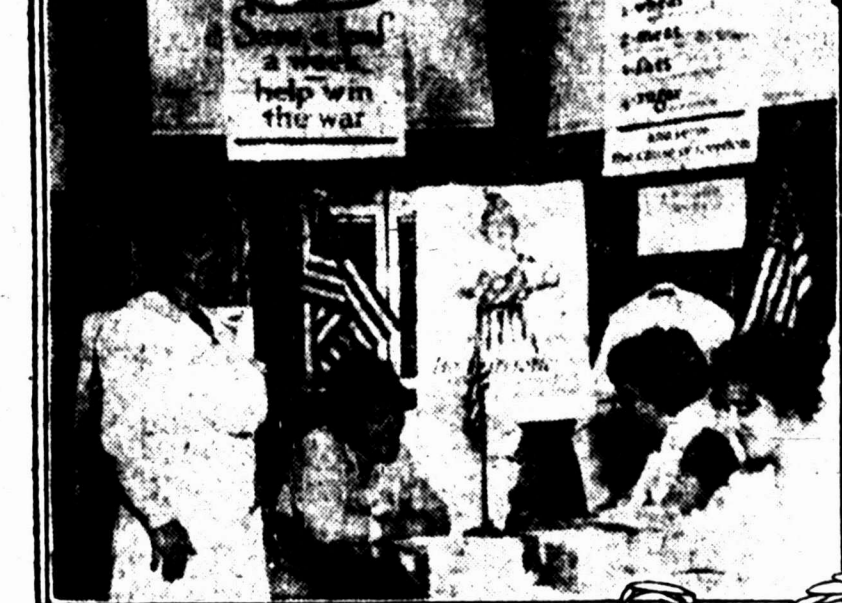

GERMAN RECORD THROUGH BELGIUM WITHOUT EQUAL

TOTAL OF \$468,000,000 EXACTED FIRST FOUR YEARS OF THE WAR.

NO MERCY IS SHOWN

Perpetrates the Greatest Burglary in Modern Times to Secure Funds.

Associated Press Mail Correspondent. PARIS, Aug. 10.—Germany has exacted war contributions from Belgium during the first four years of the war amounting to a total of \$468,000,000.

In this fifth year of war it is interesting to review the "financial activities" of the Germans in Belgium since that fateful day in Belgium's history, August 20, 1914, when the German hordes entered Brussels.

On the 20th of November, 1916, instead of abolishing the onerous tax on Belgium, von Bissing declared that owing to the duration of the war, the increase in prices—high cost of living—he would have to increase the monthly payments to 50,000,000 francs.

On the 21st of May, 1917, the contribution was further raised to 60,000,000 francs.
