



Use of the vaccine will be widely extended, congress today having appropriated a million dollars to be used by the public health service in fighting Spanish influenza and other communicable diseases.

The serum is designed primarily to prevent pneumonia, which often follows attacks of influenza and which is the cause of practically all the deaths attributed to influenza.




