Over a wide section of the front in Beigiam and northern France, the Dritish, French and Belgian armies have swept forward with relentless speed, crushing rear guard detachments left behind by the Germans to retard pursuit. Immense quantities of materials have been captured by the Allies and the number of prisoners taken is steadily mounting.

DISEASE SPREAD BY DUST SAYS REPORT

Madison, Wis., May 30.—The role played by dust in spreading disease is discussed in a state board of health publication today. Dry sweeping and dusting are condemned as provacative of dangerous illness. Dry street-cleaning is placed in the same category.

Dust contains decaying animal and vegetable wastes, which in turn contain living organisms such as bacteria, molds and yeast. Breathed into the human system, they convey such diseases as tuberculosis, diphtheria, scarlet fever and measles.

"Dust is everywhere," the statement says, "but the worst kind is that which is confined within the four walls of a room. This dust is always germ-laden, because it is infected with waste matter thrown off by human bodies."

An eminent physician and surgeon of Minnesota, of wide fame, said: "More women patients three to one are sent to hospitals than men. This comes, in a large degree, from the fact that women live indoors and breathe a dust-laden, second-hand atmosphere which depletes their vitality."

All industrial occupations making is necessary for the operators to breathe in dust have now come to be regarded as hazardous.

"Do not sweep wooden floors with a broom;" says the board's advice. "Sweeping with a broom and dusting furniture with a feather duster merely stirs up the dust without removing it."

### DISEASE SPREAD BY DUST SAYS REPORT

Madison: Wis., May 30.—The role played by dust in spreading disease is discussed in a state board of health publication today. Dry sweeping and dusting are condemned as provacative of dangerous illness. Dry street-cleaning is placed in the same category.

Dust contains decaying animal and vegetable wastes, which in turn contain living organisms such as bacteria, molds and yeast. Breathed into the human system, they convey such diseases as tuberculosis, diphtheria, scarlet fever and measles.


\*Dust is everywhere," the statement says, "but the worst kind is that which is confined within the four walls of a room. This dust is always germ-laden, because it is infected with waste matter thrown off by human bodies."

# IWO SATISFACTORY RESULTS SHOWN IN REVIEW OF U-BOAT

AMERICAN NAVAL BASE IN France, Oct. 10.—The record of submarine activity for the summer months, June, July and August, the period most favorable to submarines is now practically made up and shows two highly satisfactory results; a steady fall in the Allied shipping and a steady rise in the submarines destroyed.

This summer period which has also covered the tremendous arrivals is equally satisfactory, not one of the in

covered the tremendous arrivals is sequally satisfactory, not one of the incoming troop ships being lost and every soldier being landed. Such losses as have occurred have been on outgoing ships, mainly freighters going back with little or no cargo.

As the American naval convoy service has borne the brunt of this protection, the results achieved for the first summer are a notable tribute to the American fleet.

Record of Tonnage Losses.

The record of Tonnage losses for the summer will be close around 260,000 tons or about 70,000 tons less than the monthly losses at the opening of the year and 100,000 tons less than the losses in March. In January, the losses stood at about 300,000 tons. They mounted steadily through February and March until the March total was 350,000. Then a sudden drop began and in April the losses were down to 260,000. Again they mounted slightly in May to 280,000. Then there was another fail to 240,000.
