



STARVATION AND DESTRUCTION IN PATH OF ENEMY

HORRORS OF NAPOLEON'S RETREAT TRIFLING COMPARED WITH AUSTRIAN'S FLIGHT.

MEN DIE FROM FATIGUE

Flesh of Horses Cooked by the Roadside and Eaten by the Austrian Soldiers.

THE ITALIAN TROOPS AT Trent, Wednesday, Nov. 6—Amid the rejoicings of this redeemed city are scenes of starvation and destruction as one passes over roads which the Italian troops are trying to smash the thousands of Austrian prisoners who were cut off south of Belluno. Every road leading up to this city is crowded with men and on every road there are evidences of the collapse of one of Europe's mightiest armies.

The horrors of Napoleon's retreat from Russia in 1812, the sufferings of the Austrian troops in this region. Great masses of men wait for food to move to the rear, or a few hundred yards, to halt on a road littered with the carcasses of horses and with cannon, pieces of anti-aircraft rifles, and machine guns.

Many Die From Starvation. Many Austrians are dying from sheer fatigue and starvation. The Italians are doing all they can to hurry food supplies. This is difficult and in the meantime dead horses are eaten, the flesh being cooked by the roadside by fires kindled by the soldiers.

Strange Tales Are Told. Strange tales are told of the exploits of Italian prisoners returning home. About Trent a group of Italian prisoners broke out and ordered the chauffeur of a motor car to drive in the Italian line and the man obeyed.

Commander Abandons Troops. The correspondent saw a fugitive commander of the sixth Austrian division motoring along in his own car. He said he was going home, having been given special permission. In the meantime his troops had been abandoned.

"Above recommendation made by battalion and company commanders and concurred in by a board of officers, consisting of Lieut. Col. James W. Everington, Captain Hubert G. Peters and Captain Wm. L. McSpadden, all of 358th Infantry. (Extract of copy furnished Lieut. Bullington for his information.)

Commissioned at Leon Springs. Lieutenant Bullington received his commission as second lieutenant from the first officers training camp at Leon Springs. He was assigned to Company A, 358th Infantry at Camp Travis and was instructor in physical classes, and also bayonetry. He went across on June 19, and went to France immediately. He was appointed battalion supply officer on September 10, and it was while serving in this capacity that his conduct won his promotion as the action mentioned in the orders took place on September 12, 13, 14 and 15, and September 25 and 26.

LIGHT RAINS FALL OVER NORTHWEST PORTION OF STATE

By Associated Press. DALLAS, TEX., Nov. 7.—Light rains fell over the northwestern portion of the state last night and today. Bridgeport had 1.61 inches, Dallas 1.27 and McKinney 2.29. Light showers fell over the Panhandle. The coldest place in Texas today was Amarillo with 38 degrees temperature, or only six degrees above freezing.

Heavy Rain at Iowa Park. IOWA PARK, Tex., Nov. 7.—Another good rain fell here last night. The precipitation amounted to about an inch.

Heavy Rain at Vernon. VERNON, TEX., Nov. 7.—A heavy rain, accompanied by a high wind, built up at the Pease river in Wilbarger county Wednesday afternoon. A number of farm houses were damaged by the wind. The precipitation amounted to several inches.

ALLIED ARMY WITHIN FOUR MILES OF SEDAN. WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY ON THE Sedan Front, Wednesday, Nov. 6.—The great wedge which the French and Americans have driven into the German lines west of the Meuse is within four miles of Sedan tonight. During the afternoon American forces have taken Villemontry, Mont De Brune, Autrecourt and Congnac. To the west the French, in co-operation with the Americans have reached Omcourt.

Desperate fighting continues east of the Meuse. In the face of strong resistance the Americans gained nearly two and a half miles during the day, capturing Mervaux, Fontaines and Hill 254, which the Germans gave up only after a severe struggle.

Machine guns continue to be the chief weapon of fighting in the German effort to hold heights west of the Meuse which have been in their possession since 1914.

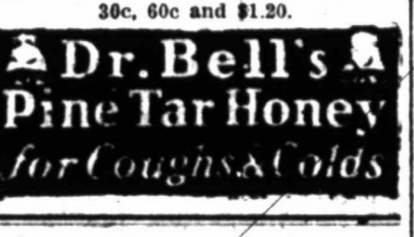

# LETTERS TELL OF BRAVE STRUGGLE OF THIRTY-SIXTH

## CAPT. PERKINS GIVES FURTHER DETAILS OF DEATH OF LIEUT. CARRIGAN.

## OTHERS ARE MENTIONED

Capt. Staniforth and Lieut. Porter Are Among Those Who Are Reported Wounded.

Frank Kell has received two letters from Capt. D. M. Perkins containing further reference to the sad and untimely death of Lieut. A. H. Carrigan, Jr., announcement of which was made in the Times Wednesday afternoon. The first letter, which was written on October 31 and concluded on the 10th, mentions the wounding of Lieut. Porter, who is a brother-in-law of J. C. Mytinger, and of Brewster Staniforth and states that "many companies in our regiment are now commanded by Sergeants and some by Corporals." Capt. Perkins states further that "we are still inflicting heavy losses on the Boche and taking ours," promising that "as soon as they are relieved from the front line that he will send a full list of the losses from his company. His letters would indicate that the Thirty-Sixth has been engaged in a fierce struggle and that many of the boys have paid the price, as did Lieut. Carrigan.

Letters Received Recently. The death of Lieut. Carrigan has cast a gloom over the entire city, where he was so well known and so universally popular, and the entire community has a feeling of sincere sympathy for the loss of so suddenly confronted with the sad message notifying them of the loss of their boy. Only recently a letter was received from him, written on September 20, in which he wrote his mother as follows: "Don't worry about me, whatever God and headquarters say I will do. In a letter of September 16th he wrote: "Have just been to church and I really enjoyed it. We held a service at Y. M. C. A. by my Captain, who was a preacher in civil life in Mississippi. He talked about our mothers those who are here enough to have one, and home and a lot of things. We sang some songs and I got a great deal out of it. I wanted to show him my little locket but did not get a chance, but I sure had not forgotten my mother nor the fact that God has been good to me."

The letters from Capt. Perkins to Frank Kell, the first of which was delayed enroute, are as follows: Letter of Oct. 8 and 10. Dear Mr. Kell: Our brave young boy, Pat Carrigan, is dead. He was killed yesterday morning gallantly leading his men over the top. Nearly all of the boys you know have been wounded. Lieut. Porter took 15 Boche prisoners before getting wounded slightly. Dear Mr. Kell: We are still on the front line but many miles to our right there I wrote you announcing poor Pat's death. Lieut. Porter is badly wounded in the jaws and mouth. He will live. Brewster is doubtful. For fear I may not come through I hand you herewith measurements of Pat's grave. While May will be able to give you the name of the town; Pat is buried in the same grave with Capt. Hansen of the medical corps, and Blue is wounded in the arm.

### Col. House Dines With President of French Republic

By Associated Press. PARIS, November 5.—Colonel E. M. House has been the recipient of numerous congratulations over agreement reached by the Inter-Allied conference on Versailles on the important questions before it, notably the armistice terms for Germany and the peace conditions. Colonel House himself has indicated his satisfaction at the results of the deliberations of the conference. He is resting today after his arduous labors in connection with the conference of the last ten days, which in addition to the formal sessions involved prolonged informal consultations both day and night. With Mrs. House he will dine tomorrow at the Elysee Palace on invitation of President and Madame Poincaré.

Complete Accord. The completeness of the accord reached on most points by the conference caused gratification and even some surprise among the participants. An official comment tended to give rise to the belief that the third and fifth points of President Wilson's peace program might lead to discussion but it developed that these were included in the agreement which an agreement was reached, leaving only the second point subject to some revision. All the nations having colonial interests, including M. Matsui, the Japanese ambassador, were represented during discussion of the fifth point, dealing with the adjustment of colonial claims, upon which an accord likewise was reached. There was a similar representation when agreement was arrived at upon the third point, declaring for the removal, so far as possible of all economic barriers.

Agree With Little Difficulty. The accord reached on all other points appears to have been attained without much difficulty, with the exception of the second, dealing with the freedom of the seas. On this there appeared to be a substantial agreement upon the general principle, although the terms are subject to further discussion and revision, with a view to avoiding misunderstanding and making them conform with the general desires of all concerned. The American note to Germany sent by Secretary Lansing yesterday showed that the Allied governments in declaring their willingness to make peace with Germany on the basis of President Wilson's terms, reserved freedom of action upon clause II of the President's program dealing with the freedom of the seas.

Cotton Market

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—An easier tendency developed in the cotton market today. The recent sensational advance of about 3 1/2 cents per pound seemed to have left futures in a weaker technical position and there was a disposition to take profits on long contracts or to sell for a reaction. The opening was steady at an advance of 1/4 to 1/2 points but prices soon eased off with December declining from 30.10 to 29.70 and January from 29.40 to 28.85 before the end of the first hour or about 10 to 35 points net lower. It was reported that a prominent southern authority estimates the crop at 11,580,000 bales, excluding linters but the figures failed to create any fresh sentiment and there action was attributed chiefly to realizing or an expectation of increased spot offerings on any further advance.

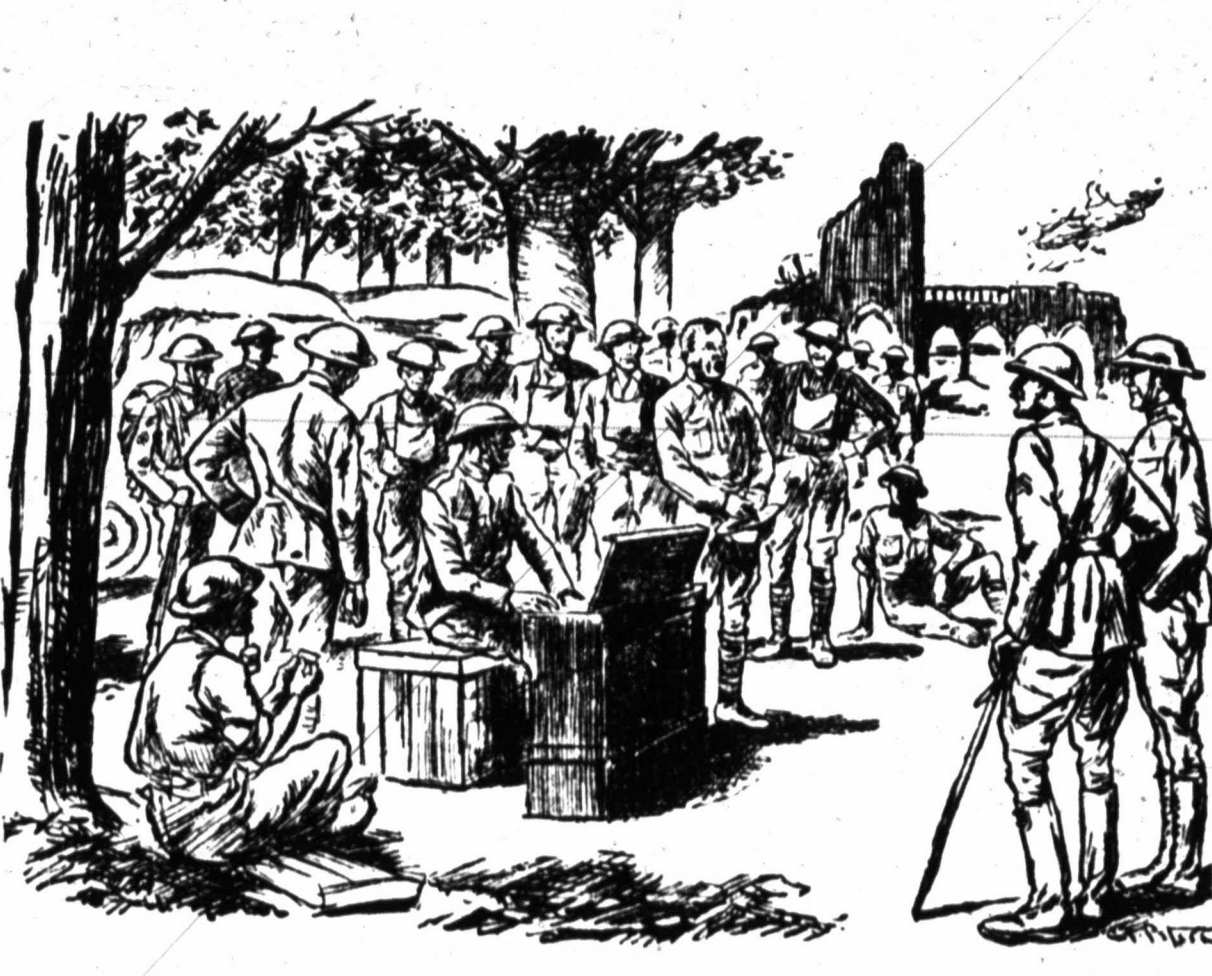
