SUMMARY OF RECENT PEACE DEVELOPMENTS: Conflicting reports come from Europe as to the fate of the former German crown prince.

ECONOMY MUST NOW BE PRAC-TICED.

In some respects the demobilization of our military forces and the restoration of commerce and industry to their normal status presents more difficult problems than those of mobilization and getting the country into the war.

Speed was one of the biggest essentials in the work of mobilization. Everything almost was sacrificed to speed. Speed was the first thought and effort.

Now the necessities have changed. We want the men in France gotten home and back to their normal work at the earliest moment possible, but the fate of civilization itself does not depend upon the speed with which they can be returned.

A SPIRITUAL VICTORY.

RESTRICTIONS ON BUILDING REMOVED TO \$10,000 LIMIT

Building restrictions are removed on projects up to \$10,000, according to telegram that have been received in Wichita Falls by various businesses and individuals from authoritative sources, and while T. R. T. Orth, the secretary of the council of defense has received no official notice, he stated this afternoon that he was sure that notice would come in a few hours.

Local office of the Alfalfa Lumber Company this morning received a telegram from the central office of the company, at Kansas City, stating that restrictions on buildings for residential or industrial purposes were removed up to a \$10,000 limit. Likewise the Wichita Ice Company receives a telegram from the W. A. Industries Board at Washington, stating that they needed no permit for improvements and extensions of their plant, within a \$10,000 limit.

Mr. Orth expects the official announcement today or tomorrow. He has wired Mr. Kell, the county council defense chairman who is now at Washington, and also the state council of defense headquarters at San Antonio for definite instruction and should receive an answer soon.

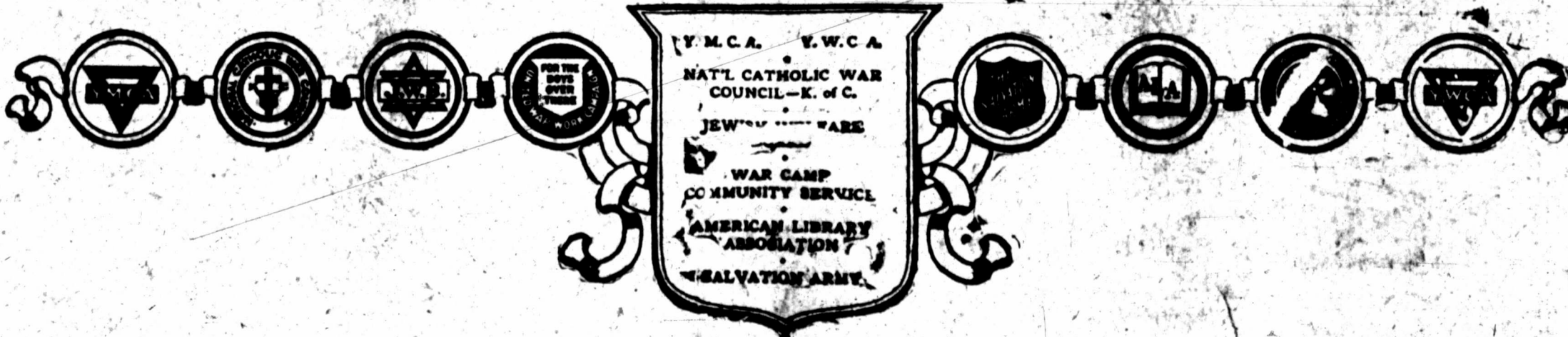

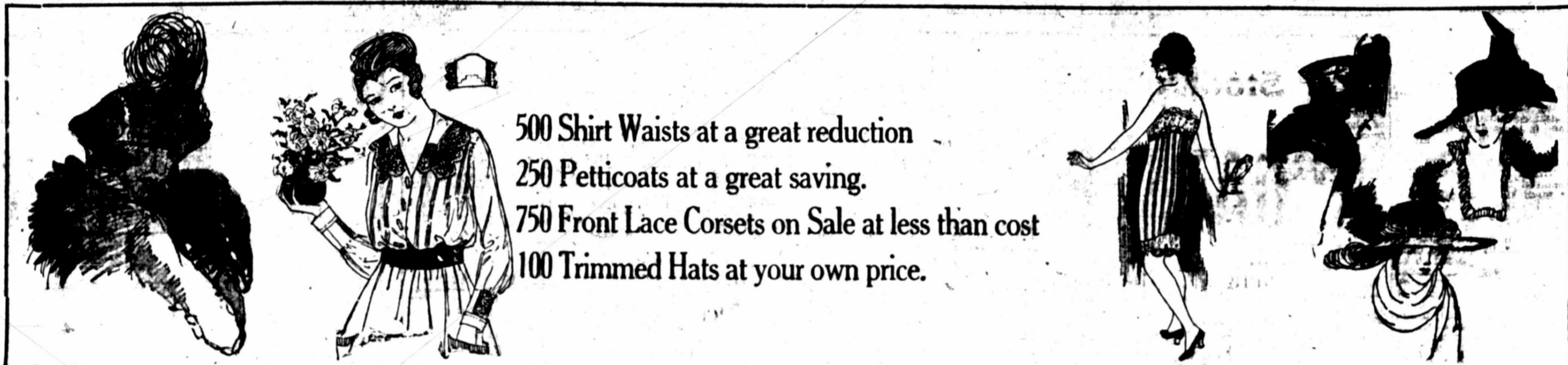
