Urge Support of War Societies

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.-Support for the United War Work campaign to uphold America's sons abroad in the important tasks of peace ahead of them, was asked today by Secretary Baker.

"I think all Americans now recognize the fine record of our army," said the war secretary, "but we must not fail also to appraise the work it has yet to do. Following the exhilaration of combat comes the tedium of peace but the tasks of peace are infinitely important and we must uphold our sons as they perform them."



The min-istry has issued a note saying that the new government will be directed in a democratic spirit and guarantee-ing that order will be maintained throughout Spain.

The foreign policy referred to in the above dispatch apparently alludes to pacific agreements with France and Great Britain by which integrity of coasts and insular and colonial possessions in the east Atlantic and Mediterranean were mutually guaranteed by the three countries. GHENT, Thursday, Nov. 14.—There is no organized authority yet in Brussels, but with comparative calm and

is no organized authority yet in Brussels, but with comparative calm and dignity the Belgian capital awaits the coming of the armies of liberation.

On Sunday three delegates from the "Republic of Hamburg" arrived at Brussels. Standing on the balcony the military commander of the city addressed a crowd of three thousand soldiers and civilians.

"Three million Germans have been killed during the war," he said. "That is sufficient. Let us have peace."

His main danger is from artillery shells, as is also mine, and the boys in his detachment have promised to let me know if anything should happen to him. Our wagon train has been bombarded pretty continuously ever since we pretty continuously ever since we came up. They are great big explos-ive shrapnel shells and I have had everal to burst very near to me. No one in our company has been injured yet, though there were many close shaves. They shelled us out of our last position but we are in a pretty good place now. Of course we are living in trenches, My sleeping place is in a sort of bomb proof, large enough for two. Clyde Smith and I live in it. Last night we made room for six marines who were shelled out of their hole and looking for shelter. Fritz threw over eighty big ones at us early but his aim was bad. The towns around here are all destroyed. us early but his aim was bad. The towns around here are all destroyed, not a piece of a house hardly left standing, and the country is a succession of shell holes, trenches and barb wire. There are many dead French and Germans lying around. I shall be glad when we get back to civilization and sanity. Will write as regular as possible. Don't guess Tom has a chance to write. Trust us to get along O. K. I believe in our luck and don't worry about us. No news is good news. I don't know when I will get to mail this since we are a good distance from any

SERGEANT KILPATRICK WRITES SISTER HERE

Miss Alina Kilpatrick, 2415 Kemp Boulevard, has received an interesting letter from her brother, Sergeant B. G. Kilpatrick, 108 U. S. Engineers in France, describing his life at the front. The letter, dated September 14, is quoted below: Dear Sis:

This is Saturday night and on account of having a sprained ankle (not bad, just a little sore) I did not go out. Yes, we are back to the front again. Hiked up here last Sunday night through several inches of mud and water and during an almost continual down pour, and it did not stop until yesterday. We have to do most of our work at might, in fact this war is carried on mostly at night, and okmy, some of the mud and slush I've been through this week!

One goed thing about working at night is that we usually come in about one o'clock, except in an emergency. And then the next morning you have some one bring breakfast

about one o'clock, except in an emergency. And then the next morning you have some one bring breakfast to you and after eating, go to bed again. Really, I feel like a king every time I do it.

God-Forsaken Looking.

This is a God-forsaken looking country around here, but we have excellent quarters and I feel like calling the war off until the winter is over so that I can stay right here during the bad weather. We live in a dugout twenty to thirty feet under ground and I have a private room all to myself. It is about 8x10 in size and has a tot, chair, table, stove and washstand in it and the walls are papered. It is more like a real home than anything I've had since enlisting. And the country was once o. k., but has been shelled until it is nothing but ruins. One village near here is so completely destroyed that it is hardly visible at a distance of 200 yards—and some of these hills! Be-

I am so glad that I was able to get here for the biggest show of the whole war. I wouldn't have missed this experience that I am going through for anything. Up here is where you meet real men. I am with officers who are entering on the fiftu year of the game. I wish I could tell you just where I am and whom I am with, but can only say that I am with a fine bunch of officers, two Irishmen. men, a major and a captain from Dublin, a Scotch major from Glasgow a captain who came from South America when the war started in 1914 and has spent the time in India and Mesopotamia until he came over and joined us here a few weeks ago. 


