# **\$600,000 HOTEL** WILL BE ERECTED 8TH AND SCOTT

This Morning.

A six hundred thousand dollar hotel is to be built at the northwest corner of Scott avenue and Eighth streets. Three lots for a site 150x150° feet have already been purchased for \$61,000 and this morning the directors of the Chamber of Commerce voted to recommend to the people of Wichita trails the purchase of bonds for the building of the hotel after a plan submitted by Dr. John T. M. Johnson of St. Lenis

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The plan provides for the sale of \$400,000 in six per cent bonds to Wichita Falls citizens. Mr. Johnson and his associates will take \$200,000 of the bonds. Those who take the bonds will receive 20 per cent of the stock of the company, the remaining 80 per cent to be issued to Dr. Johnson and his associates.

Not Less Than Eight Stories.

The hotel is to be not less than eight stries high and is to contain not less than 250 rooms. Dr. Johnston said at one of the biggest contracting firms in the country is ready to take a contract to complete the hotel by August 1, 1919. Dr. Johnson is a well known capitalist with banking and other interests at St. Louis, Kanzas City and Muskogee. He is a large stockholder in the Van Noy-Brown Company which has a chain of eating houses over the country.

All factions approve of Premier Lloyd George's reconstruction plans as far as they go. What opposition, exists is divided into two sections. The first is the old liberal organization led by Former Premier Asquitt which opposes the election as untimely, principally because only forasquirt which opposes the election as untimely, principally because only forty percent of the soldiers, according to their estimates, will be able to vote. They say the soldiers have the greatest claim to a voice in the settlement

The other section is the labor party which has its own program, including the nationalization of railways, mines and other public works, with compen-





