

"OUT THERE" HAS TOUCHING APPEAL WELL PRESENTED

Frederick Warde, Amelia Bingham and Thomas Ross played in Wichita Falls last night. Associated with this trio whose names mean much in the world of drama was a comparative new comer, Pauline Lord, of whom little has been heard as yet, but of whom much is to be expected. If the splendid work she does in "Out There," Hartley Manners' drama of the war, is continued during coming days.

"Out There" has been widely heralded as the event of the theatrical season and it is not too much to say that none of the immense audience that witnessed its performance at the Wichita Theatre last night was in the least disappointed. Frederick Warde never disappoints, regardless of the role he is playing, and as much can be said for the other well known stars with whom he played. Nothing was known of Miss Lord when she first stepped on the stage, but when she concluded her reciting speech in Trafalgar Square, between the famous lions, all present were of the opinion that she rightly belonged with the brilliant assemblage.

Loses None of Appeal. The close of the war has caused "Out There" to lose a little, as the appeal to enlist is gone, but none who see the play and hear the forceful words that Manners has written, spoken by the eminent actors who play the parts, can but feel impressed, and if the hearer be a young man who has not done his part, there must come a little bit of feeling, somewhat akin to shame, when the little Cockney girl, so keen to help in some way beside working in the munition factory for much more than she ever received before, queries of her brother who will not enlist, "What about the time when the fellows come 'ome again? When the flags are waving and everybody's cheering when them as won the war goes by? You'll be a staid, old lamp post wiv your 'ead bang if there's any man in you at all, blime me!"

Splendid Interpretations. Frederick Warde, last seen here in the Shakespearean roles, was perfection in his interpretation of Dr. Watson, the English surgeon who went "out there" to do his bit and was the means of getting the little Cockney Annie away from her squallid surroundings into the work for which she so longed. Amelia Bingham was in a role quite different from which she was last seen in Wichita Falls. Gone were the silks, satins and furs of the exquisite lady in "The New Henrietta" and the noted actress wore the rags and injured dignity of the gin sot of the London tenement, kind with all her gin remembers former better days. Thomas W. Ross took the role of an East End tough who makes his living precariously from the gin and the public houses. He is "Erb" who refuses to enlist because his father "got 'is" in the Boer war. "In 'is prime, five and thirty. And not did the bloomin' country do for 'is widdler and kids? H'll let the country do now wot the country let us do when fawver was took. H'll not enlist!"

All of the roles were well taken. This hospital scene furnished much rich humor and not a little pathos and here the full force of the dramatic ability of Miss Lord was seen.

The whole production is one long to be remembered by all fortunate enough to see it, both for the array of talent who presented it and for the wonderful appeal to the spirit of patriotism in every man and woman to "do their bit."

Prospective Loss From Railroads Has Been Reduced

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Prospective loss to the government through operation of railroads and guaranteeing fixed returns to the companies has been reduced to about \$200,000,000 for the nine months period ending October 1, from approximately \$700,000,000, threatened loss several months ago. This was indicated today by the interstate commerce commission's report that the net sum which the government will receive from operations of the leading railroads for the nine months is \$538,656,000.
