VAIL BECOMES ADVISER OF POSTMASTER GENERAL

OKLAHOMA WANTS TO PRORATE GAS SUPPLY

By Associated Press. FORT WORTH, TEX., Nov. 25.—A conference is in progress in Kansas City in regard to distributing Oklahoma natural gas among southwestern cities. Oklahoma is protesting against the proposed prorating plan of the state by the Texas cities, especially Fort Worth and Dallas, and has appealed to the federal fuel administration. If the prorating plan is adopted, it will reduce the supply for North Texas. Officials of the Long Star Gas Company and Fort Worth City officials are at the conference.

By Associated Press. KANSAS CITY, MO., Nov. 25.—At a meeting here today of more than a thousand representatives of gas producing and distributing companies of Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Kansas and Missouri, with F. C. Gregory, representative of the federal fuel administration, it was decided that an interstate gas administrator was not necessary to bring about a proportionate distribution of the gas supply. After much discussion it was decided to leave the problem of distribution to be solved by the federal fuel administration which leaves the matter in the hands of the various state administrators.

FORMER EMPEROR CHARLES TELLS OF FOOD SITUATION

SAYS ASSISTANCE MUST COME FROM AMERICA AND THE ALLIED NATIONS.

BOLSHEVISM THREATENS

May Prove Serious Menace Unless Food and Fuel Situation is Improved.

VIENNA, Sunday, Nov. 24.—Declaring that there is pressing need in Austria for assistance from America and the Allies, former Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary insisted today that the danger of bolshevism is very great in his country. It was in conversation with the correspondent that the former sovereign told of the peril which is impending. The former emperor, his wife and five children, are at Eckersau Castle. With them are a few faithful men and women, including Count Alexander Esterhazy, former chief of court to the emperor and naval Captain Sedan. An interview with the former emperor was granted after the request had been transmitted through the president of the German-Austrian republic. The correspondent was then permitted to motor some 25 miles to the castle which is located in the center of a vast plain devoted to farming.

Eckersau Castle is guarded by a few soldiers, although there are scarcely any calls for a military garrison from the 12th century but its large rooms were remodeled a century ago and later handsomely furnished, so that the castle appears to be merely a luxurious country place.

As the correspondent entered the gates he was met by Captain Sedan and conducted through a lofty hall to the second story of the castle, where he was received by the former emperor. Charles wore a general's uniform and was apparently vigorous, but lines about his blue eyes gave hints of the stress of recent days. He appeared to feel keenly the great tragedy that had come through the collapse of his empire, but he cordially greeted the correspondent.

The former emperor spoke first in English and then lapsed into French. "I authorize the Associated Press to say that not a single day should be lost by America and the Allies in helping the people here, inasmuch as the situation," he said. "During the war one of my pre-occupations was the task of obtaining food for the soldiers and people, but now, in assisting all my efforts, it is most distressing to find there is none left for them. If America and the Allies do not recognize this fact, suffering here will be very great within a few weeks. Indeed, it is already so and every day we do not use in the endeavor to get food is a day lost."

"We have done our best and more can not be done. If food and coal are not brought, we shall have disorder in Vienna. Possibly that disorder from Russia which has been predicted will come. The people are fine, kind and patient, but when any one is without food, he is apt to do many unusual and violent things. Looking back, we may recall that bolshevism started in Russia because of the lack of food. I think in the interest of the Allies to aid us, as bolshevism, when started, may spread and become a danger to the Allies too."

Transportation Disorganized. "Our coal and food situation is worse because of transportation conditions. The railroads became badly disorganized lately. I am very glad to see an American who represents a country which is working for peace all ways."

"Regarding the future—I can not speak of the past—I can only repeat that I feel I did my duty. However, I do hope that peace will bring good fortune, happier days and a better understanding among all peoples."

During the interview the former monarch did not show bitterness toward the Allies or America because of their military victory, though it may be inferred that he is heart-sore over the loss of his army and also over his failure to preserve his empire intact. He feels that the breaking up of the empire into small groups of nations is bound to bring economic political disaster to all, and that some sort of a central government is necessary for their common interests.

Solicitors For People. It was pointed out to the correspondent by officers at the castle that the former emperor's whole heart and mind has been centered on the work

of securing the welfare of the people. The only pleasure he has taken during the war has been to hunt for a few hours each week. He worked for 18 hours a day for long periods. He is said to be much hurt by stories which were circulated in Allied countries about his private life, especially drunkenness. As a matter of fact he drinks but one glass of wine or beer at lunch and never drinks liquors at dinner. Before the correspondent left, after half an hour's conversation, Charles required if President Wilson was well. He expressed no surprise when told that the President's hair had grown whiter since the United States entered the war, seeing, himself, to feel the undermining strain of the great conflict.

FORRESTRY ASSOCIATION HAS SUBMITTED REPORT

DALLAS, TEX., Nov. 25.—The report of the Texas Forestry Association, made public here, don't say much about the Texas timber situation. The forestry problem is a serious one, the report states, and owing to heavy cutting of virgin timber, had the war occurred ten years later, Texas would have had no ship timber and would not have been a factor in building of ships to transport troops and supplies to France. It is highly essential that the problem be given proper consideration and action not only from the standpoint of national defense, but with reference to "our local economic and industrial life." Preventing of forest fires is stressed in the report. There are 167,934,720 acres of land in Texas. Of this 25,000,000 acres is forest area. If properly managed in forest in farm forests could be double, according to the report.

Accommodations For 4,000 Patients At N. Y. Hospital

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—The biggest military hospital of its kind in the world was formally opened here today. To the 500 wounded men who made up the first contingent of patients, there will be added 200 during the day and probably as many more tomorrow. The hospital has accommodations for 4,000 patients. It will be used as a debarkation hospital.

SUPPLY QUESTION DEMANDS ACTION BY AUTHORITIES

PARIS, Wednesday, Nov. 20.—General Pershing issued orders after the signing of armistice with Germany for the prompt reduction of the extensive system for purchasing supplies for the United States army in Europe and for the speedy transition to a peace basis. Acting on this order, military authorities have given notice of cancellation of contracts so far as possible with a view to diminishing rapidly the inflowing stock of supplies required for an army of 2,000,000 men. An officer who has much to do with this branch of the service sums up the situation as follows: "The American expeditionary force on November 11, the day the armistice was declared, was traveling at full speed ahead and was at the height of its supply activity. To reverse this tremendous business machine is the task upon which it is now engaged and the efficiency of its business organization is being manifested in its quick accommodation to an entire change of program."

"When the American forces first began coming to France there was a great scarcity of ocean tonnage. It was impossible for any months to ship more than 300,000 or 400,000 tons of supplies to the forces, notwithstanding the great necessity for everything material, engines and general construction equipment. Search for material in Europe, therefore had to be conducted with the greatest possible energy over a wide field."

"More than 10,000,000 tons of material for the expeditionary forces was secured on this side of the ocean. This was one of the prime factors in the successful result of the operations of the army. To have transported this material from America would have taken 300 ships of 5,000 tons capacity about 450 days, or sixteen months. "Apart from food supplies the army has secured the bulk of its material from Europe."

DR. LIEBKNECHT USING INFLUENCE WITH THE TROOPS

BERLIN, Sunday, Nov. 24.—Dr. Karl Liebknecht, the radical socialist leader, is devoting himself primarily at present to an effort to influence the men returning from the front. His followers comprise a small army of "red holders" who are accused of backing various meetings sufficiently to secure the majority necessary to pass other measures calculated to embarrass the present government. Dr. Liebknecht's agitation is the propaganda of the Spartacus group of extreme radicals. He chiefly directs his attacks at the proposed national assembly. The indications so far, however, are that his effort to win over the returning soldiers has failed absolutely and yesterday's meeting was marked by the violent opposition of soldiers.

Appeal to Proletariat. The radical leader's principal appeal is to the proletariat. Rosa Luxemburg is ably seconding Dr. Liebknecht. Her oratory is of the eloquent and fire eating brand. The Spartacus group meetings are invariably attended by numerous women.

Philipp Schemm in Vorwarts declared that the insecurity of the government was to be deduced from the undisturbed activity of the Spartacus faction, who in their press, their pamphlets and their meetings are endeavoring to win over the soldiers for bolshevism.

Robbery is Charged. The irony of the situation lies in the fact that the freedom of speech and of the press for which the social democrats have been clamoring now is proving the chief source of menace to the new government. An attempted robbery recently of 60,000 marks belonging to the treasury of Field Marshal Von Mackensen's army, is charged against members of the Spartacus faction. When the car containing the funds reached the railway station here a few days ago it

was taken over by a detachment of red badges soldiers claiming to represent the Berlin soldiers and workmen's government. The funds had reached Berlin under a strong guard and the unexpected demand made upon the station crew caused suspicion and led to an investigation by secret men. Notwithstanding apologies to the effect that a misunderstanding was responsible for the attempted seizure, the red guards were arrested and interned at police headquarters.

Von Mackensen's army now is on its way through Austria for Germany. Part of its treasure was sent in advance and the word of its coming apparently had leaked out.

This occasioned considerable resentment among the ultra radicals. They held a meeting which was addressed by Dr. Liebknecht and organized for the occasion. They also raided police headquarters on Thursday night and succeeded in obtaining the release of the men implicated, on the pretext that they were held as political prisoners.

FLORIDA LEGISLATURE HAS SPECIAL SESSION

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Nov. 25.—The Florida legislature convened today in special session to consider legislation prohibiting shipment of turkeys to the state after January 1 next when it becomes "dry," stabilize labor conditions, amend the automobile laws, provide farms for soldiers and provide funds for public institutions.

ENTRY OF GERMAN ARMY IN LIMBURG NOT AUTHORIZED

PARIS, Nov. 25.—The note issued by the Dutch legation explaining that German troops were permitted to cross the Dutch province of Limburg in the interest of the Belgian population after agreement with Allied representatives, the semi-official Havas Agency says, is inaccurate. The Allied representatives were asked to inform their respective governments of the conditions of the authorization for the

entry of German troops into Limburg. They expressed no opinion, the Havas Agency adds, inasmuch as they were told of the violation of neutrality only after the Germans had entered Limburg.

LOCAL BUREAU OF EMPLOYMENT PLANS TO ENLARGE WORK

Encouraged by the success of the local bureau of the U. S. Employment Service in providing men for the government and for the various plants engaged in government work, it is announced by G. W. Minton, the examiner in charge, that the opportunities of the service are to be enlarged, beginning November 26, to include the registration of those seeking employment, as well as that of firms desiring men, and in this connection the following statement is issued by Mr. Minton:

Service is Appreciated.

"The many expressions of praise which the office of the United States Employment Service at Wichita Falls has heard recently, leads us to believe that the employer and worker alike are well satisfied with the service rendered by us, and in order that the service may be made more useful in the future, we are beginning on Tuesday, November 26, to carry a list of those seeking employment as well as a list of the positions open. For this purpose we have a larger black board placed on the east side of the office at the city hall which can be placed on the street or sidewalk, and on this board will be carried each day, not only the list of opportunities for workers, but also a list of those available for work. These lists will be made up each day and the employer, by looking at the board will know whether or not the kind of worker which he desires to employ is listed with us.

"It is the desire of this service to make the office in Wichita Falls a meeting place where those who want to work and those who want to hire them may get together. When you pass by our bulletin board and you do not see listed the kind of man you want, drop in and leave an order and every effort will be made to locate such a party for you. Watch the board for it will be an index to the labor conditions in this district. Now we are paying taxes to maintain this service, make use of it in order that you may get your money back."

SIX DEATHS ARE REPORTED TODAY FROM INFLUENZA

Continued prevalence of the disease has been reported from time to time, but a majority of the cases were of a mild nature and no apprehension was felt on the part of the health authorities. It is possible that the recent severe weather has aggravated the situation and rendered the attacks more severe in their nature.

The opinion was expressed late this afternoon by one of the city's physicians that the conditions were equally as bad now as at any time since the epidemic first made its appearance.
