FEDERAL COUNCIL OF GERMANY ASKS UNITY OF ACTION

PROPOSAL FOR SPEEDY NATIONAL ASSEMBLY MEETS WITH APPROVAL

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

GIVE LOCATIONS OF 41 DIVISIONS AMERICAN ARMY

Combat divisions: First regulars, Neuhart and St. Dizier, Brigadier General Frank Parker. Second regulars, Fosse and St. Dizier, Major General John A. LeJeune. Third regulars, Tanners and St. Dizier, Brigadier General Preston Brown.

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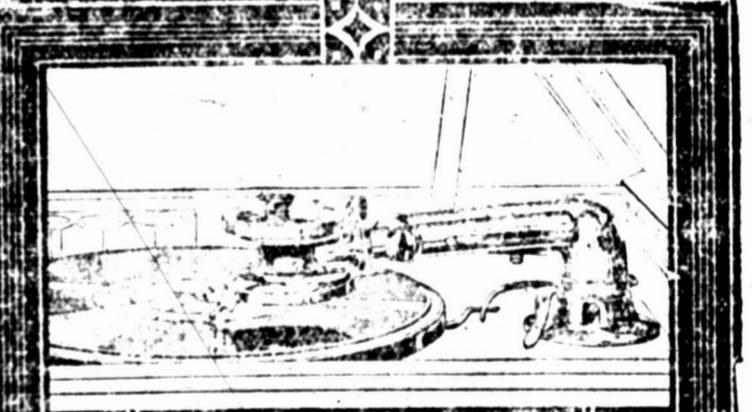

 Prices turned easier late in the morning. There was no change in the general character of the news of the spot markets and no apparent pressure of southern selling here. Demand was light, however, and prices yielded under further selling by brokers with Japanese connections and scattered liquidation. January broke from 27 3/8 to 27 1/8 and March sold off from 26 1/2 to 26 1/8 with active months generally showing net losses of about 10 to 27 points just before midday.  
 No fresh feature developed during the early afternoon. Trading was very quiet and fluctuations were narrow with prices ruling around 27 1/2 for January and 26 3/8 for March, or about 6 to 13 points net lower.  
 Cotton closed easy.
