





ALL CENSORSHIP NEWS DISPATCHES WILL BE RELAXED

JEROME S. STONE WRITES FRIEND PEACE EXPECTED

Letters written by American soldiers during the weeks before the signing of the armistice show that the soldiers sensed the impending surrender of the German forces. Jerome S. Stone, who was in the truck service in the 117th Supply Train, under date of October 30, wrote a friend here telling of some of his experiences. He expressed the belief that the Hun could not hold out much longer. He said: "But we are winning the war. Each day we advance further into enemy territory and it is a wonder to me that the Germans don't have, sure enough, to give up. The sooner they do, the better it will be for them. I have seen hundreds of prisoners and great quantities of supplies and nearly everything there is to be seen, as I am on the move all the time."

K. B. Kinsner and Lloyd Garmany, with the Rainbow division in France, are both in the hospital, suffering from gas burns according to letters received this morning by their wives. ## VANCLEAVE LAND PRESENTS ACTIVE DRILLING SCENE

HAVE FIFTEEN DERRICKS OR RIGGING AND TWELVE LOCATIONS ON TRACT.

## NEW LOCATIONS WEST

Much Interest Attaches to the Developments in This Section of Territory.

An immediate and thorough test of the territory lying east of the Burk Burnett townsite pool, and of the land to the northwest, where the Humble well on the Herndon tract marks the present proven extension of the oil sand, is forecast by the number of wells drilling, derricks up, or locations on the VanCleave tract, and the Red River Valley lands, on block 58 of which the Humble well is located.

Following the Helen Elizabeth well, which was the first brought in on the VanCleave, there was a rush to this section, and there are now fifteen derricks up or rigging, and twelve locations. There are also several wells drilling, which were begun some time ago. R. O. Harvey is down 1,000 feet in his VanCleave No. 1, and Butts, et al. are drilling at 1,500 feet on their No. 1. The VanCleave Oil Co., No. 1 is also reported drilling.

Numerous Derricks Erected. The Helen Elizabeth Oil Company have the derrick up at their No. 2. The Fowler Farm Oil Company, derrick for Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4. The Texas Company is rigging up No. 1 and has made a location for Nos. 2, 3 and 4. Wheeler and Johnson, McPhail and Co., Dr. Gooch et al., Nos. 1 and 2. Burk-Waco, Hising Worth, Adams Oil Co., Liberty Petroleum Co., Home Oil Co., all have derricks up.

Locations reported on this 100-acre tract owned by young VanCleave, include: Sentinel Oil Co., Spencer Oil Co., Burnett et al., East Side Petroleum Co., Big Chief Oil Co., Horn Oil Co., Dr. Gooch et al., Nos. 1 and 2. Edgington et al. have a location for well No. 1 to be drilled in the bed of Red River. This is the first of the wells that will probably be drilled in the river bed, as permits have been secured from the state to drill along the entire length of the section.

The American section holds that in view of probable closer commercial relations between North and South America, it would be of immense value to business interests to substitute the meter, kilometer, centimeter, liter, hectoliter, hectare, gram and kilogram, for the yard, mile, inch, quart, gallon, acre, ounce and pound.

## POLES CHARGED WITH PILLAGING JEWISH QUARTER

By Associated Press. BERLIN, Wednesday, Nov. 27.—The charge that the Poles, after capturing Lemberg, the Galician capital, sacked the Jewish quarter, where the victims numbered several thousand is made by the Lemberg correspondent of the Berlin Tageblatt, who says he left the Galician city November 24. He telegraphs his newspaper from Breslau as follows:

"Since Friday Lemberg, which has been the scene of desperate fighting is again in the hands of the Poles after having been stubbornly defended by the Ukrainians. The casualties among the soldiers and civilians are estimated as in excess of one thousand. A large section of the inner city was completely destroyed. The postoffice is a heap of smouldering ruins.

Several Thousand Victims. "Immediately upon entering the city the Poles proceeded to sack and burn the ghetto district, whose victims numbered several thousand. The streets were filled with the charred bodies of murdered Jews, many of whom in the frenzy of despair had leaped within the burning buildings, which were surrounded by Polish troops. The Polish authorities were indifferent and declined to take measures to halt the slaughter. Polish legation refused to issue uniform tickets for the ghetto and methodically proceeded to pillage, rape and burn.

"The Polish authorities are attempting to blame uniform bandits for the programs, although it is commonly known terrorists are not amply supplied with arms and munitions but that they have seized the Jews. In the event Lemberg was captured."

WOLFE RESIGNS AS CHAIRMAN OF THE PROHIBITIONISTS

DALLAS, TEXAS, Nov. 28.—M. H. Wolfe, chairman of the statewide prohibition committee, has tendered his resignation, in connection with which he has issued the following statement, giving an account of his stewardship: "In the spring of 1918 a large company of prohibitionists of Texas held a conference in Fort Worth, selecting as chairman of the statewide prohibition committee to wage the campaign to have the people in the July primary of that year instruct the legislature to submit to a vote of the people a constitutional amendment providing for statewide prohibition. "The campaign was ardently and effectively waged and the victory won over the liquor traffic, however, the liquor traffic over the legislature that the instructions of the people were repudiated and the submission of the amendment defeated. "Without regard for this temporary defeat the committee continued to urge the people obeyed and in furtherance of the cause succeeded with the aid of Gov. Hobby, in getting the last legislature to pass several stringent regulatory liquor laws, together with the statewide statutory law, thus closing for the time being every saloon in Texas. "Furthermore, during the last state political campaign the prohibition question was urged and prosecuted before the people, resulting in the county conventions of more than two hundred and twenty counties instructing their delegates to the state democratic convention to insert in the state democratic platform a plank demanding that the next legislature submit to a vote of the people a constitutional amendment providing for statewide prohibition. "At the democratic state convention at Waco on September 5th, this year, the convention, by resolution, declared the instructions of the people of two years ago, as set forth in the primaries to be still binding and made the further demand that the next legislature, as early as possible, submit such amendment to a vote of the people. Thereby the democratic party of Texas is unconditionally committed to the submission of the statewide prohibition amendment and without doubt such action will be taken early in January of next year. "Therefore, the task committed to me and the committee appointed at Ft. Worth some two years ago, has been practically accomplished. And acting for myself and the other members of the committee we give this account of our stewardship and turn back to the prohibition forces of Texas the responsibility of waging the campaign to have the constitutional amendment adopted by the people. "A group of prohibitionists, headed by Col. Thos. H. Ball, of Houston, have called a conference of the friends of prohibition to meet in Austin on Dec. 11th, with the view of starting an effective organization to wage the campaign among the people in order to make sure of the adoption of the constitutional amendment, and let me urge that prohibitionists from every part of the state at the Austin conference and see to it that a strong and effective organization is promoted and take no chances on the defeat of the amendment to the end that the prohibition question may be settled in Texas for all time to come."

Excepting Dailies Restrictions On Paper Is Removed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Withdrawal of all restrictions affecting the publication of periodicals except dailies, Sunday and weekly newspapers, effective immediately was announced today by the war industries board. Publishers of daily and Sunday newspapers, in recent conference with the board, requested that it continue control over the use of newsprint for the present. Daily publishers are urged to send in November reports without delay. It is explained that regulations affecting their business may be withdrawn within sixty days but that complete reports should be on file in the event this work is turned over to another department.

Restrictions governing weekly newspapers will be lifted December 1 the board says, because the amount of paper consumed by these publications was not sufficient to affect materially the newspaper situation. Restrictions on the manufacture of wall paper also are withdrawn, effective at once.

INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC RAGING IN NEW ZEALAND

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Tuesday, Nov. 26. (Via Montreal).—The influenza epidemic is still taking a heavy toll in New Zealand, especially among the natives. Hotels and breweries are closed and the newspapers are asked not to publish the mortality returns. The government has authorized discretionary closing of banks, owing to their depleted staffs.

KEEN INTEREST IN RESULT OF BERLIN CONFERENCE

COPENHAGEN, Tuesday, Nov. 26.—Keenest interest is felt throughout the German empire in the result of the conference of representatives of the federal states at Berlin. The questions of summoning the national assembly and ensuring the unity of the empire are being discussed everywhere. It is generally expected that a decision will be reached to call the national assembly at the earliest possible moment, otherwise Bavaria, Wurtemberg and Baden are reported to be considering the formation of a separate republic. Hesse, Hanover and German Austria are also credited with demanding a meeting of the national assembly. It is stated that feeling at Bremen and Kiel is against the Spartacus party.

Must Deal Firmly With Germany Says Secretary Daniels

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Deliberations of the coming peace conference should be guided by principle and justice, touched with mercy to the weak, and not by passion or emotion, said Secretary Daniels, speaking at Buffalo's community Thanksgiving service.

The Allies and the United States having won the war, Mr. Daniels said, "the theory that every man in the world, high or low, rich or poor, shall have a chance to make the most of himself is now the fixed philosophy of all nations."

Germany must be dealt with firmly at the peace conference, continued Mr. Daniels, because the sins of her rulers and all who followed their spirit are black and bitter and her crimes deserve such treatment and such punishment as will protect the future.

"But no policy of hatred," he said, "no spirit of vengeance should guide this world renewal. The protection of women and children knows no frontiers and no enemies. The rebirth of modern civilization should not go forward under any spell of mere revenge or malice to millions of men. Principle and justice, touched with mercy to the weak should guide this congress, not passion or emotion."

FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION REPRESENTED AT CONFERENCE

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The federal trade commission probably will be represented among the advisers of the American delegates to the coming peace conference, it was learned today. Such a representative is desirable, officials say, in order that the conference may have the benefit of the information on foreign affairs which the commission has gathered in the course of its work. Such advice will be especially useful in the probable selection of the commission to handle this work.
