



President's Ship Sails Later. The President's ship, the former lin-

er George Washington, will not sail un-til later. The sailing time will be partly determined by the time of the President's opening address to con-gress and by other arrangements which have not yet been perfected. On the George Washington will be carried representatives of the press associations including a correspondent of the Associated Press. It seems to be settled, although not

officially announced, that the President's ship will go directly to France and not first to England as had been supposed. The President, however, undoubtedly will visit England later and ilso Italy. A regulation passport was issued to him today through the usual official channels of the state depart-ment. It permits him to visit Eng-land, France and Italy, and is surrounded by the same restrictions and requirements as would apply if it were issued to any other citizen of the United States

All the arrangements for the Presi dent's trip have been practically completed, except fixing the day and hour of his sailing.
