The regulations do not provide for it to be threshed regardless of the ultimate disposition of the crop; consequently cane and sudan cannot be threshed for ANY reason regardless of the disposition of

This word of warning is given so that any producer in the county who does thresh cane or sudan will understand the position of the county committee in penalizing producers for this


