## WILHELM PLANNING TO RECLAIM THRONE

### Commute Sentence of Thos. J. Mooney

By Associated Press. SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Nov. 29.—The death sentence of Thomas J. Mooney, convicted of murder in connection with the bomb explosion which killed ten people here July 22, 1916, during a preparedness day parade, having been committed to imprisonment by Governor Stephens last night, no further legal steps can be invoked in Mooney's behalf, attorneys said today. Mooney, who is an iron moulder by trade, will be removed from the death cell which he has occupied in San Quentin penitentiary since July 17 of this year, and given employment with other prisoners.

Gov. Stephens has had the case under consideration since last March, when the California supreme court affirmed Mooney's conviction and an application for a pardon was made. In explaining causes which led him to commute Mooney's sentence, the governor said he had made a careful review of the case and found no reason why Mooney should escape punishment. The governor declared there were "certain features in connection with the case which convinced him that the sentence of death should not be executed."

Another reason for the commutation, he said, was President Wilson's "request" for clemency. The governor said he declined to be influenced by the theory that, if maximum punishment is not justified, pardon should follow.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY EXPRESSES SATISFACTION

By Associated Press. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 29.—District Attorney Charles F. Fickert, who prosecuted Thomas J. Mooney and the other defendants in the Preparedness Day bomb explosion case, expressed satisfaction today at Governor Stephens' commutation of Mooney's death sentence. "I believe that Governor Stephens has acted without fear of political or personal consequences," Fickert said. "The sole reason for the commutation of sentence is the intervention of the President of the United States in order to reach an international problem. It is noteworthy that at no time has the President requested action from Governor Stephens on the ground of either Mooney's innocence or on the ground that there existed any doubt as to his guilt."

LABOR NOT SATISFIED SAYS FRANK MORRISON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Communitation of the death sentence of Thomas J. Mooney by Governor Stephens in order to settle the case on the eve of the election, has been denounced today by Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, who claimed that charges of perjury in connection with the conviction make a new trial imperative. "Organized labor will be in full accord with Governor Stephens' statement that: 'It is of course, unnecessary to argue the point that whatever Mooney's character or his past record may have been, this particular case must be determined upon its merits.'"

"In my judgment, however, the commutation does not in any way settle this case."

"It must be recalled that the trade union movement in urging a new trial for Mooney, takes the position that the charges of perjury in connection with his conviction make a new trial imperative. This position is identical with that of Superior Court Judge Griffin, who commuted Mooney's trial and sentenced him to death. In a letter to State Attorney General Webb on April 26 last year, Judge Griffin in urging a new trial said that if the perjury evidence was presented to him before the case left his hands he would unhesitatingly have granted a new trial. On November 21 of this year Judge Griffin renewed his request to Governor Stephens.

"Under these circumstances the trade union movement has urged that Mooney be given a new trial. This could be accomplished by the governor pardoning him and having him immediately arrested on one of the other murder indictments resulting from the bomb explosion. "As the matter now stands Mooney is to serve the remainder of his term in the state prison. The evidence that the trial judge says bears directly upon the credibility of the witness and goes to the very foundation of the truth of the story told by Oxman the state's chief witness on the witness stand."

### MANY MILLIONS WAR CONTRACTS MADE DOUBTFUL

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Government war contracts involving hundreds of millions of dollars were rendered doubtful in status today by decision of Comptroller Watwick of the treasury that orders have not been legally executed unless actually signed by responsible government contracting agents and the contractors.

The war department submitted to the comptroller a form of cancellation agreement without just loss to contractors. He refused to approve the agreement, holding that the department had no authority to cancel contracts on an arbitrary sum to cover liabilities unless specific authorization for this is given in a previously existing contract.

A large proportion of war orders were given informally by telephone, telegraph or letter, it is said. In such cases the comptroller held new legislation will be necessary to permit the framing of agreements for cancellation.

In the confusion and haste of war many manufacturers proceeded with tremendous orders on telegraphic instructions of subordinate army officers, and the termination of hostilities found them unprotected by legal contract. The authority of the comptroller, who has rendered their position questionable grows out of his supervision of all payments by the treasury on order of other departments.

In submitting the tentative form for a standard cancellation contract, Secretary Baker explained that it is important in the interest of labor and the industrial security of the country that these plants, referring mainly to munition contractors, be returned to commerce with as speedily as practicable and so far as possible without a break in their continuous operation and employment of labor.

### GERMAN ADMIRAL PROTESTS ORDER TO LOWER FLAG

By Associated Press. LONDON, Thursday, Nov. 28. Admiral Von Reuter, commander of the German fleet which surrendered to the Allies on November 21, has protested against the order of Admiral Sir David Beatty of the British fleet, directing that the German flag be hauled down. He points out, according to an admiralty statement, that internment in a British harbor is under the terms of the armistice, equity lent to internment in a neutral port where in accordance with precedent flags are allowed to remain hoisted.

Admiral Beatty called attention to the fact that the armistice merely suspended hostilities and that a state of war exists between Germany and the Allies.

### 30TH DIVISION AMERICAN ARMY TO BE RETURNED

By Associated Press. PARIS, Nov. 28.—Announcement is made that the thirtieth division of American troops has been withdrawn from the battle zone and will follow the seventy-sixth and twenty-seventh divisions to the United States.

The thirtieth division was with the British near Cambrai, when the Hindenburg line was smashed. Field Marshal Haig, commander of the British armies, paid a tribute to the work of these two divisions, saying: "Braveheart, Premont, Vaux Andry and Soudry, in the dash and energy of your attack."

### CONGRESS FACES TAX PROBLEM AT COMING SESSION

WILL HAVE TO RAILROAD REVENUE MEASURE TO AVOID COMPLICATIONS.

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Chaotic conditions in the collection of taxes next year now seem unavoidable, according to a treasury statement which has been prepared commenting on the delay of congress in enacting the pending revenue bill. The statement is a warning to congress to expedite the bill, which will explain why the internal revenue bureau now is proceeding with plans to collect taxes under the old law with its long list of deficiencies proposed in the new measure.

The only way to avoid resorting to collections under the old law, the treasury officials probably intend to rush the bill to completion within two weeks. Most House and Senate leaders do not believe this possible. In fact, leaders of both parties are said to share the opinion with the treasury that the measure even may not be enacted at this session.

Much Work May Be Lost. Consequently the situation appears that all the work of congress on revenue legislation during the past six months may go for naught, and that the present revenue law will be enforced for another year with possibly a few additional levies.

In view of the congressional leaders have discussed with treasury officials the advisability of trying to rush through both houses a joint resolution improving the present law, pending the bill and adding to the old law to make up the part of the deficit between the two bills which the treasury probably will need, and the six billions which the treasury believes should be raised by tax action in 1919. An urgent nature of this program is being urged by treasury officials, who believe that the existing provisions for profits taxes have worked recognized hardship on many business and industrial concerns.

War profits taxes would aggravate the situation. The possibility of having no new comprehensive program of tax legislation and consequently of raising less than the six billions sought from this source before the end of the fiscal year is being discussed by the treasury to consider plans for issuing a quantity of short time notes, maturing in one year or less, and paying these notes with a new issue of heavier taxes which would be necessary in 1920. This course would depend largely, however, on the attitude of the next congress on revenue legislation.

The bill as framed by the finance committee will be reported to the senate next week by the treasury department. Protracted debate is assured. The republicans are planning to discuss it at length and oppose to the end the provision recommended by Secretary Adams by finance committee, providing for 1920 revenue.

### EXPECT PRESIDENT TO NAME DELEGATES TODAY

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Rumors here state that President Wilson might announce before night the names of the American delegates to the peace conference. It was said the president had decided to give the names to the public without waiting to include them in the address to be made at the close of congress he will deliver next week just before sailing for Europe.

Discussion of the probable personnel of the American delegation still centered today on Secretary Lansing, former Ambassador White and Colonel E. M. House.

### TO DEMOBILIZE STUDENT OFFICERS TRAINING CORPS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The complete demobilization of the student officers training corps, comprising units in hundreds of institutions throughout the country, has been decided upon by the war department. In making the announcement, Secretary Baker said in some cases the demobilization will start immediately, but in the majority of cases the demobilization will be completed by January 1.

### TWENTY MILLION TONS OF FOOD IS RELIEF PLANNED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—The conservation which will make possible the sending of 20,000,000 tons of food for three months to the hungry people in Europe, will be urged upon the American people through an intensive campaign which will open Sunday. The campaign, the food administration has announced, will seek to awaken the nation to its opportunity for renewed service and sacrifice for the relief of millions of people in Europe.

### AUSTRIA-HUNGARY CASUALTY TOTAL IS FOUR MILLION

By Associated Press. LONDON, Nov. 29.—Austria-Hungary lost 4,000,000 killed and wounded during the war, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen.

Eight hundred thousand men were killed, including 17,000 officers. The German losses were placed at 6,300,000 by the socialist newspapers of Berlin on November 29. The news paper's estimate, which was unofficial, said that up to October 31, 1,500,000 German soldiers had been killed and the late of 290,000 was not known. Four million soldiers were wounded and 10,000 were prisoners.

The British losses in all theaters of war, including killed, wounded and missing, were officially placed at 2,000,000 on November 19. Of the total 650,000 were killed, including 17,000 officers. An official announcement from London Wednesday said that one million men had been killed or were dead through various causes of war, including those who died of disease, killed and died of gas, and those who died of disease, who actually lost their lives, not those who died from disease.

American casualties have been officially announced as totaling 200,000. Of this number 36,124 were killed and died from wounds, slightly more than half of the total.

### APPOINT COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE DEPORTATION OF PRISONERS. INVESTIGATIONS ORDERED

## Cotton Market

**NEW YORK, Nov. 29.**—The cotton market showed steadiness at the opening today owing to firmness in Liverpool over the holiday and continued bullish reports from southern spot markets. The latter emphasized the attitude of holders rather than the state of demand for cotton. The market eased some right after the call under renewal of scattering liquidation. Liverpool and Japanese selling. For a time prices sold off rapidly in the absence of any important support and after opening steady at an advance of 4 to 7 points the market sold 15 to 25 points net lower before the end of the first half hour. January broke from 27.85 to 27.10 and March from 26.62 to 26.30 or about 30 to 50 points from the early high points.

The early decline was checked by a little covering and trade buying around 27.05 for January and 26.30 for March, or about 20 to 25 points under Wednesday's closing figures. There was another flurry of scattering liquidation during the early afternoon and prices advanced 10 to 15 points for the first half hour, selling at 26.85 and March at 26.12, or 38 to 43 points net lower. This decline was in the face of a reported improvement in export demand from the south and reports that Washington advices received in Savannah said that large offerings of ocean tonnage might spring up overnight.

Prices show slight rallies around 2 o'clock but trading was very quiet and the tone nervous.

## Grain Market

Noted Jack Daley Passes In Checks And With Boots Off

By Associated Press. DEADWOOD, S. D., Nov. 29.—Jack Daley, a steel-nerved pioneer, who came to the Black Hills when the population of this territory was made up of miners, gamblers, two-gun men, male skinkers and daring women, is dead, and contrary to all predictions he died in a hospital with his boots off.

To the few old timers still living in this region or scattered about other parts of the country, the death of Daley marked the passing of one of the coolest, bravest and most resourceful Irishmen that ever blazed a trail through the territory. As a wit Daley was considered supreme in his day. As a fighter, it was at one time a hundred to one bet that he would never die.

About all that is known of Daley's early life is that he drifted into the Black Hills in 1876. It was about 10 years after the big gold strike and the district was coastwise open. The principal business—poker and roulette—was conducted with a bang, day and night.

Cool in Sky Limit Game. Daley was as cool in a sky-limited poker game as he was when the bullets sprinkled about him. In the long winter days, when the snow was so high that travelers neither came to Deadwood nor left it, fortunes passed from hand to hand over the poker table, and many strange tales are told of Daley's lively career.

One story is considered typical. Daley was in a no-limit game one night. A miner sitting opposite him was considered the best bluffer in the Black Hills. Daley wore a pair of new boots and they hurt his feet.

The game grew warm as the miner began tilting the pot until the other players one by one dropped out. Then Daley's opponent pulled a heavy leather money bag from his pocket and slammed it on the table, with the remark that he had five of the best cards in the northwest and intended to play them against the universe.

Daley was silent for a moment. Then he suddenly picked up one of his boots and slammed it on the table. "What are you trying to do?" shouted his opponent.

"There is just as much dust in that boot of mine as there is in that bag of yours," said Daley calmly. "I'll see what you got."

The miner glared at Daley and withdrew his bag. "You win," he snarled, and the crowd roared.
