### GIANT SEAPLANE IN FLIGHT WITH 50 PASSENGERS

WASHINGTON, November 30.—The navy's newest type seaplane, the Giant No. 1, the largest seaplane in the world, broke all records for the number of passengers carried in any airplane when it made a flight with fifty men on board Wednesday at the naval air station, Rockaway, L. I. No special modifications of the plane were made for the flight, which was made to demonstrate the machine's enormous lifting power. The number 1 is the first American trimotored seaplane and is propelled by three Liberty motors that develop a maximum of 1200 horsepower, giving it a cruising speed of 80 miles an hour. In the test flight the plane was piloted by Lieutenant David H. McCullough of the naval reserve flying corps.

### Postal Zone For 1c Second Class Is Fifty Miles

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—The amendment to the war revenue bill adopted by the Senate finance committee providing for new second-class postage rates after July 1, next, made 50 miles instead of 200 miles, the limit for the old one-cent per pound rate with one and one-half cents a pound applying beyond the fifty-mile area.

When the committee yesterday adopted an amendment repealing the present second class zone system and substituting that for one and one-half cents, respectively, Chairman Simmons and other members announced that the one-cent rate would apply within a radius of 200 miles of mailing points. The amendment actually adopted, however, provides that the one-cent rate is applicable only within the fourth class parcel post zone, which is but fifty miles.

Senators said they understood this zone was 200 miles and some correction to meet the general understanding may be made later.

### EISNER EXPLAINS BREAK IS DUE TO NEW REVOLUTION

LONDON, Nov. 30.—Kurt Eisner, the Bavarian premier, explained to a meeting in Munich that the breaking off of relations between Bavaria and the Berlin government was due to the fact that the German foreign office was the base of a counter-revolutionary movement, according to a Copenhagen dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

### DR. ZIMMERMAN REPLIES TO CHARGE OF EISNER

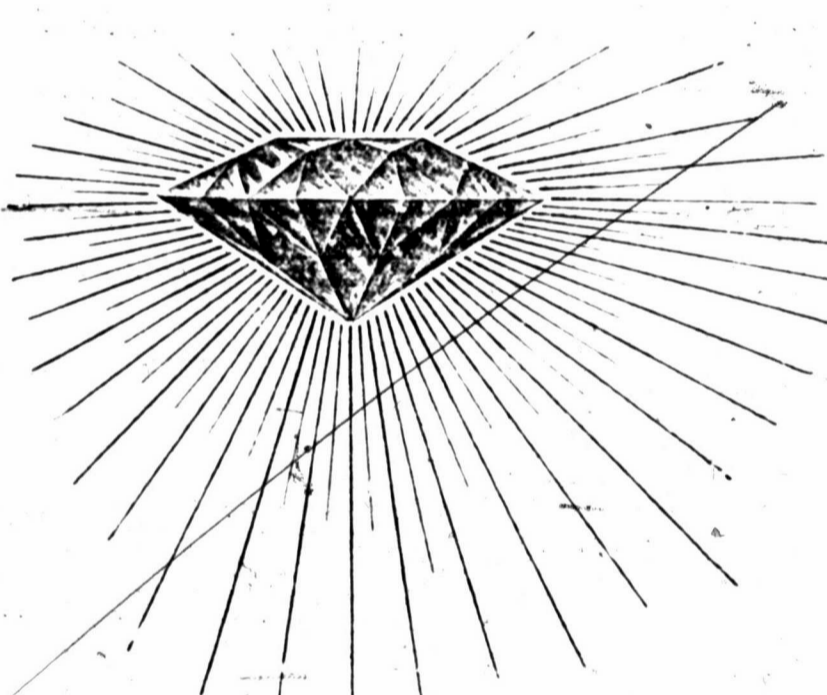
By Associated Press. BERLIN, Nov. 30.—Dr. Albert Zimmermann, former secretary of foreign affairs, replying to the charge of Kurt Eisner, the Bavarian premier, that the government at Berlin was responsible for the war declares in the Deutsche Zeitung:

"We did, in fact, consider that with the crime of Sarajevo, Austria-Hungary's hour of destiny had struck. We did not prompt Austria-Hungary to her action, but expressly advised her against it. The Vienna ultimatum, which we considered too severe, was communicated to us too late for an endeavor to mitigate it."

### BAVARIAN PREMIER SAYS HE TAKES RESPONSIBILITY

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 30.—Kurt Eisner, the Bavarian premier, declared in a speech that he is ready to take all the consequences of a conflict with the former German empire, the result of which perhaps will be that Bavaria will be obliged to act independently, in which case the Rhine provinces and the whole of south Germany will support her, says the Berlin correspondent of National Tidende.

The same correspondent quotes Herr Haase, the minister of the interior of Baden, as saying that the trial of the empire should be maintained but that no Berlin dictatorship will be tolerated.

**ALLIED NAVAL SQUADRON ANCHORS OFF SEBASTOPOL**

LONDON, Nov. 30.—The Allied naval squadron which recently passed through the Dardanelles into the Black Sea, anchored off Sebastopol, the Russian naval base in the Crimea on November 26. The Russian ships, which were in the hands of the Germans and also some German submarines, were surrendered to the Allied naval representatives.

**MRS. JULIA LEISHMAN DIES AT MONTE CARLO**  
NINE, FRANCE, Thursday, Nov. 28.—Mrs. Julia Leishman, wife of John G. A. Leishman of Pittsburgh, former American ambassador to Germany, died today at Monte Carlo. The funeral will be held in Paris.

Mrs. Leishman before her marriage in 1880, was Miss Julia Crawford. Her husband has been minister to Switzerland and Turkey and ambassador to Turkey, Italy and Germany, retiring from the diplomatic service in 1913.

**KILLING AT GORMAN OVER LAND MATTERS**  
FORT WORTH, TEXAS, Nov. 30.—F. B. Gillet, 45 was killed and W. R. Richards wounded at Gorman late yesterday following a shooting, which it is said, arose over land matters.

### PLEDGES TO THE WAR WORK FUND ARE DUE MONDAY

Sixty-five per cent of the Wichita Falls and Wichita county subscription to the United War Work Fund was paid in cash. H. L. Hunter, who is to have charge of the collections, reports. This is an unusually high percentage for cash subscriptions. Mr. Hunter stated, and will serve to simplify his work of collecting the subscriptions.

The first payment on the subscriptions will be due tomorrow, December 2, and at this time 50 per cent of the pledges will become payable. There will be about \$10,500 which must be paid at this time. The remaining 50 per cent on the pledges will be paid in two installments of 25 per cent each in January and February, according to the deferred payment plan which was arranged by the general United War Work committee. These payments can be made direct to Mr. Hunter, at the City National Bank, or to any of the banks.

### IMPROVEMENT IN THE ELIMINATION OF FIRE HAZARD

AUSTIN, TEX., Nov. 30.—The fifth annual report of the Texas fire insurance commission, which was submitted to the governor today, shows that there has been great improvement in the elimination of fire hazard in the state and that rates have been considerably reduced as a result. The report shows that as a result of fire investigation conducted by the state fire marshal, 18 indictments for arson have been returned, three boys committed to reformatory on pleas of guilty for burning, and eight other indictments returned. Mercantile rates numbering 711 have been adjusted, as a result of a total of 31,331 inspections.

The estimated yearly saving due to fire rate reductions is \$37,475, while the cost due to increased rate is \$10,280. This makes a net saving in insurance premiums of \$27,195.

### PLAN AIRPLANE MAIL LINES IN THE SOUTHWEST

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Nov. 30.—First steps in establishing an airplane mail service in San Antonio and the southwest have been taken by the gov-

ernment. Routes and landing places are being mapped out by members of the air service. Three airplanes on such a mission which left Geratner Field, La., arrived in San Antonio late today. Two planes left San Antonio Wednesday for El Paso and were expected to return today but were delayed by snowstorms en route.

### SOLDIER'S COUNCIL HAS STORMY PLENARY MEETING

BERLIN, Friday, Nov. 29.—The soldiers council of greater Berlin at a stormy plenary meeting today expressed dissatisfaction with the appointment of an executive council of 28 men by adopting a resolution appointing a

representative from each of the seven regiments stationed in Berlin to weigh charges against the executive council and if necessary to re-

zation. The charges had been formulated by the soldiers council of the third army corps which declared among other things that the executive council talked instead of acting. It was declared also that executive head "shamefully deceived the high aims of the council, failed to effect co-operation with the soldiers in other parts of Germany, failed to protect the eastern border and hindered every orderly and practical work."

Speakers at the meeting sharply attacked the executive council and were applauded boisterously.

### Austria-Hungary Planning To Form League of Nations

By Associated Press, BERNE, Wednesday, Nov. 27.—"Austria-Hungary will, itself, be a future league of nations, and I would not be surprised to see the organization of this league planned by President Wilson," declared Councilor Julius Meini, probably the wealthiest man in Austria, in discussing the present and future of the dual monarchy today.

Dr. Meini came to Berne as the representative of Professor Heinrich Lammasch, former Austrian premier. So sure is he that Austria-Hungary will always remain a federation of states more or less closely inter-knit that he criticized President Wilson, although he is utterly in sympathy with him, for what probably was unintentional wording of his declaration that peoples must have the right of self-determination.

This phrase, when translated, he said, tended to stir up the people for Austria-Hungary and make them restive under authority.

### BREWING OF BEER IS DISCONTINUED BY PROCLAMATION

By Associated Press, WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Brewing of beer and other malt beverages will stop at midnight tonight throughout the United States. The special presidential committee which recommended the prohibition measure decided today to make no recommendation to President Wilson, on suggestions that the proclamation should be rescinded in view of the armistice.

### ORDER OF MERIT IS BESTOWED ON MARSHAL FOCH

By Associated Press, PARIS, Thursday, Nov. 28.—Following the summer given at the Elysee Palace tonight in honor of King George a reception was held at the British embassy. During the reception King George bestowed upon Marshal Foch the Order of Merit. Marshal Foch is only French soldier to receive this decoration. In bestowing it King George said: "I am happy to give the highest distinction of which I can dispose to the eminent soldier who has conducted the Allied arms to victory."

The British Order of Merit was instituted by Edward VII on June 26, 1902. It is very exclusive and carries with it no special title or personal precedence. The badge of the order consists of a cross on a ribbon and blue enamel of eight points, bearing the words "For Merit" in gold letters within a laurel wreath on a blue enamel center. The reverse of the badge shows the royal and imperial cipher in gold. The whole is surmounted by the imperial crown.

### LOCAL BUREAU OF EMPLOYMENT HAS SPLENDID RECORD

TOTAL OF 2021 MEN AND 112 WOMEN DIRECTED TO EMPLOYMENT.

### AID TO GOVERNMENT

Many Men Are Furnished For War Work in Various Munition Plants.

While the local office of the U. S. Employment Service is mobilizing its forces, preparing to turn the manpower of the returning armies into the normal labor channels, and to provide employment for the soldiers that will soon begin to return to Wichita Falls to take up their work, G. W. Minton, the examiner in charge, has found time to summarize the work of the department has accomplished since June 21, 1918, when the Wichita Falls office was opened. Mr. Minton's report, which will contain some interesting statistics and information, follows:

**Summary Is Given.**  
"In closing the year today we cannot give the full result of our activities for the last half of the year, for the reason that almost one month was gone before the office was established at this place. Still we believe that when it is known that the service at this point for the five months and nine days of activities has received applications from 2169 men and 217 women, the work accomplished will be appreciated.

"Not only have we taken all the applications above referred to, but we have directed to employment 2021 men and 112 women, and three-fourths of the applicants directed have been reported placed by the employer to whom they were referred.

**Service to employer.**  
"In order to give some idea of the service being made of this service by the employers of labor, we have only to refer to the orders placed with us for help. We find in looking through our files that we have received orders for help numbering 339 and these employers call for 2964 men.

"Just before the signing of the peace, justice this office was making every effort to furnish men for munition plants and navy yards, and during August, September, October and the first few days of November nearly nine hundred men were sent to do work for those having army contracts.

"Since we are not sending any more men to the government contract work, we urge the employer to get in touch with us for the help needed, and be in a position to add your own testimony to that of those who have made use of this service to their own advantage."

PLAN TO COMBAT RECURRENCE OF "FLU" EPIDEMIC

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—Plans for combating another influenza epidemic which is expected to sweep the country in 1919 will be considered by health authorities from all parts of the United States, Canada and South America at the forty-sixth annual convention of the American Public Health Association which opens here Dec. 2.

Members of the association say that all the influenza epidemics since 1729 have been recurrent for from two to three years after the initial outbreak. For this reason leading authorities feel convinced that the visitation of 1918 will be repeated in 1919 and probably in 1920. Also it is pointed out that in previous epidemics the second and third outbreaks have been more virulent and attended by a higher mortality rate than were the initial manifestations.

Spain Has Second Outbreak. It was early in 1918, according to Dr. W. A. Evans, former health commissioner of Chicago, that the now so-called Spanish influenza made its appearance in Spain. Now Spain is having its second outbreak, according to Dr. Evans more virulent in form and attended by an alarming death rate.

During the three-day meeting, the methods used in combatting the 1918 epidemic in the United States will be thoroughly considered and plans outlined for meeting any future emergency among those who will present papers and take part in the discussions are Major W. H. Welch, of the National Medical Corps; Dr. E. C. Rosenow, of the Mayo foundation; Dr. Herman Higgs, commissioner of the New York State Department of Health; and Dr. A. McLaughlin, assistant surgeon general of the United States Public Health Service.

There will be discussions regarding proper precautions in the care of children to reduce mortality rates; rural sanitation; the effect of fashions on health; and the use of narcotics in war times.

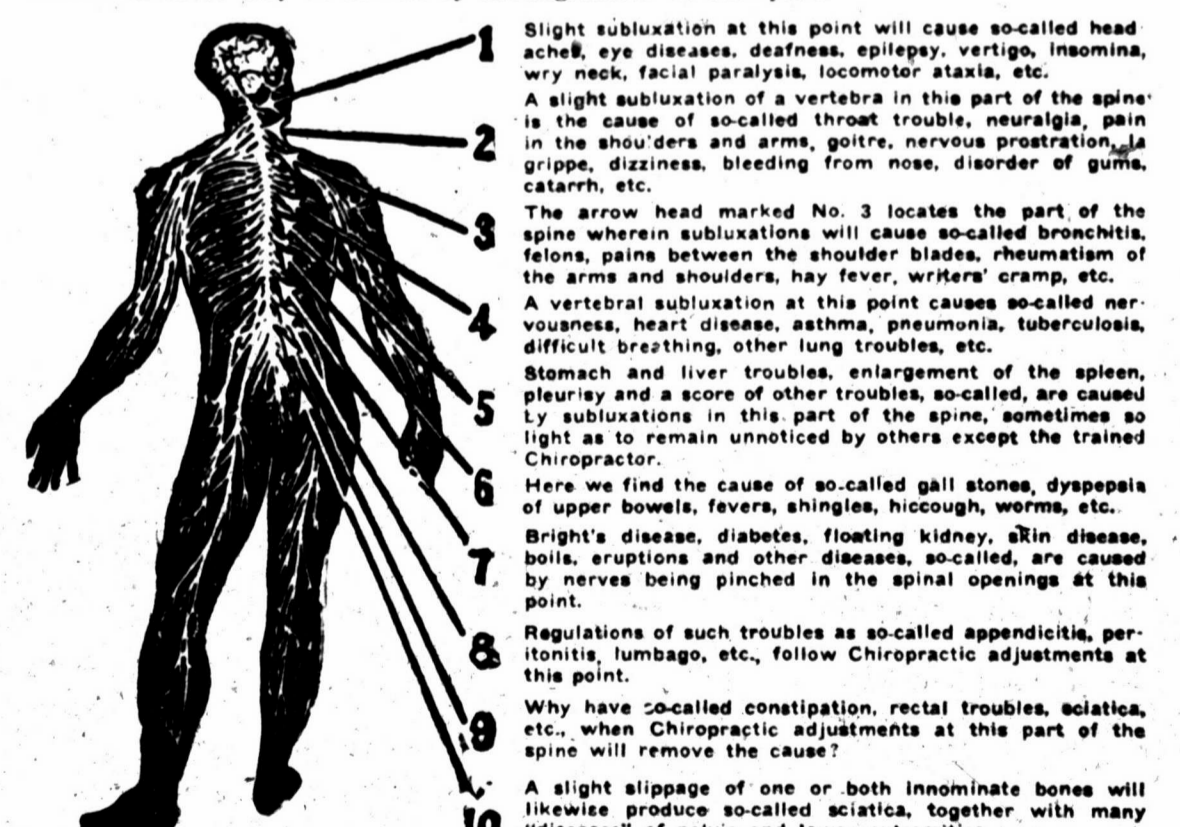

### CAPT. TYSON TELLS MORE OF FIGHTING NEAR THE CLOSE

Captain W. S. Tyson has written another letter to his parents describing a recent successful attack made by his regiment. The letter, dated October 22, was written before he received his captivity.

Dear Papa, Mama, and all the Children:

Well, again, after fifteen days of hell on earth I am still alive, not even wounded, well and fat as a pig. So I guess I have no room to complain and am thankful that I am still living. I am back from the front line and now spending a few days in a rest village that our boys took from the enemy and even though it is very much a destroyed village yet it is a palace compared to where we have just been.

I have received several letters from D. and W. W., also one from Letty Hill and Lizzie, and they are all well and fine.

**Comfortable Situation.**

I have a good bed and plenty of good warm clothes and a good fire to stay by here in the village, so am quite comfortable. We have plenty to eat and a great variety, and our toiling kitchens keep up with us and we have three pots a day.

Ramsey is well and a good soldier. In fact, all the boys are in good health and happy. The Y. M. C. A. keeps us supplied with cigars, cigarettes, chocolate and various other knick knacks that go to add joy and pleasure to the boys that are so far from home.

Support the Y. M. C. A. It is everything the letters stand for, and it is doing for the boys what no other organization can do.

Well, our regiment encountered the enemy and went over the top, and won, won, won! I can't tell you very much, but I will write you a little and you may tell my friends if you wish.

**Called into Action.**

Some fifteen days ago we, or rather the boys of the regiment to which I belong, got word that the enemy was awaiting them at the famous old line you hear so much about, and for four days and nights the battle raged, and I am now fully convinced that Sherman, as good and noble as he was, did not command vocabulary enough to express what war is. They shelled us, they sniped at us, they turned hundreds of machine guns upon us, they gassed us with all the different kinds of gas that a chemist could dream of, but they did not excite the boys of this good old regiment one bit. We gave them ten shots to every one they sent over the top. It really covered the ground with dead and wounded bodies, and then our good old boys made a mad rush and captured the machine guns and the machine guns he was firing and turned them upon him and put the enemy to flight, and we have not been able as yet to overtake him, I think they must be retreating in automobiles.

Surely Texas and Oklahoma will be proud of their sons for they did nobly and they are so happy and glad that they are doing their bit to help win that statue at the entrance of New York Harbor smiling and holding high. Just been.

but there is a sad side to this. You will have to read between the lines for some of our good boys have answered the last bugle call to taps, but a smile was on the lips of every one and they were all facing the enemy.

We established our hospital in a place as best we could. They shelled us day and night but we got by in good shape and helped those that were in need. I can't tell you much more, only leave it to you to guess what I am doing. Will only say, plenty of work for a surgeon. I will have to wait until I return to tell you of details which are many. But I don't believe it will be very long until we can all return to our loved ones for I begin to read the word peace interlarded in all the communications which we receive. Let us hope, for I have seen all I want to see of war and its horrors.

### Commission of Labor Makes Few Recommendations

By Associated Press.

AUSTIN, TEX., Nov. 30.—Woman in industry has not had an easy row to hoe. There has been a tendency on the part of many employers to take advantage of her newness and inexperience. T. C. Jennings, State Labor Commissioner says in his annual report. "This is comparatively easy," the report says, "because of woman's newness in the industrial field and her inexperience in coping with the advantages possessed by the employer in fixing standards under which she must work, as well as the fact that woman is almost wholly unversed in the principle of collective bargaining and unanimity of action."

"Violations of laws governing the employment of women have increased enormously under conditions obtaining since the war began. In many cases, the cry of emergency was only a thinly veiled excuse for profiting and exploitation of helpless men and women."

**Recommendations of Commissioner.**

The chief recommendations by Commissioner Jennings are:

That venue in cases of violations in Travis county as well as in county where offense is committed.

That commissioner of labor or attorney general department be required to prosecute such cases where county officials will not act.

That a woman's bureau be organized with sufficient number of inspectors to raise to a higher standard, the conditions under which women and children labor in Texas.

That the labor department be enabled to enforce the safeguarding of all dangerous machinery.

That adequate punishment be provided for parents who become parties to violations of the law.

That the child labor law be amended to include children on the stage.

That the compulsory education age should be raised to fifteen to conform to the child labor law.

As new legislation, Commissioner Jennings suggests a minimum wage law for women, an act to create free employment bureaus and a boiler inspection law.

The report contains an estimate that not less than 60,000 accidents in industry occur in the State annually, ranging from those disabling the workman only a few days to those causing total disability or death.

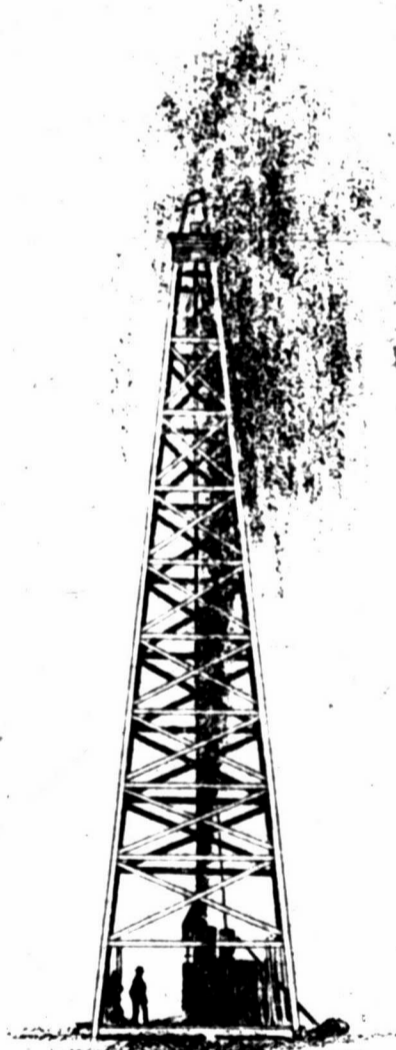
