OOSTERLAND, Holland, Dec. 3.—"I have not renounced WANT TO KNOW anything and I have not signed any document whatever," the former German crown prince declared to the correspondent today. "I was convinced early in October, 1914, that we had lost the

# AMERICAN TROOPS RESUME MARCH TO

Associated Press.

AMERICAN ARMY OF OCCUPAtion, Monday, Dec. 2.—After their first night's sleep in Germany, the Ameri-can troops of the army of occupation were ready at dawn this morning to resume their march toward the Rhine. In advancing toward Coblenz, the American forces are moving ahead astride the Moselle traveling in a rortheasterly direction.

Across the Rhine the American ar-

my will take up a line a little over sixty miles in length. It will describe an arc of a cifcle having Coblens as a center and with a radius eighteen and six tenths miles in length. This circle pivoting upon Coblenz is the bridgehead which the Germans conceded in the armistice. The line leaves the Rhine at a point northwest of Coblenz, swings eastward through Rheims and Oberlahr and turns to the south just beyond Rossbach. It continues through Woelferlingen, Molsberg Diez, Schonbron, Katzenelnogen, and Welteroth, and reaches the

Along the Rhine the Americans will occupy a line about forty three miles in length. The front will extend a few miles beyond either end of the semi-circle described above, this overlap-ping in places the lines of the British the left and the French on the

During the advance toward Coblenz, the American lines extend about 29 miles on each side of the Moselle. The Americans expect to travel seven to nine miles each marching day with a day or two of rest intervals. The rest days will be decided upon by the com-manders as the advance continues. Much will depend on how the men and animals stand the trip and the way the supply service keeps up with the troops.

# AMERICAN TROOPS RESUME MARCH TO

By Associated Press.

AMERICAN ARMY OF OCCUPAtion, Monday, Dec. 2.—After their first
night's sleep in Germany, the American troops of the army of occupation
were ready at dawn this morning to resume their march toward the Rhine. In advancing toward Coblenz, the American forces are moving ahead astride the Moselle traveling in a rortheasterly direction.

Across the Rhine the American army will take up a line a little over sixty miles in length. It will describe an arc of a circle having Coblens as a center and with a radius eighteen a center and with a radius eighteen and six tenths miles in length. This circle pivoting upon Coblenz is the bridgehead which the Germans conceded in the armistice. The line leaves the Rhine at a point northwest of Coblenz, swings eastward through Rheims and Oberlahr and turns to the south just beyond Rossbach. It continues through Woelferlingen, Mulsberg Diez Schonbron Katzenein. Molsberg. Diez, Schonbron, Katzeneln-bogen, and Welteroth, and reaches the Rhine again at Caub.

Along the Rhine the Americans will occupy a line about forty three miles in length. The front will extend a few miles beyond either end of the semicircle described above, this overlap-ping in places the lines of the British on the lift and the French on the

During the advance toward Coblenz, the American lines extend about 20 miles on each side of the Moselle. The Americans expect to travel seven to nine miles each marching day with a day or two of rest intervals. The rest days will be decided upon by the commanders as the advance continues.





FIND DIFFICULTY

Assistance of the Chamber of Commerce in completing arrangements for the motor car service to Burkburnett, was asked at today's meeting of the board of directors, by O. E. Maer, the railway superintendent at this place. Some difficulty has arisen in securing a site at Burkburnett for the construction of the Y and in order that the additional service, which has been asked of the railroad by many interests, may not have to be given up, Mr. Maer arked the Chamber of Commerce to take active steps to secure the lease of the hecessary ground. R. E. Shepherd, W. D. Cline and W. C. Myers, all former citizens of Burkburnett, were named a committee to take action immediately to secure the lease. High Price of Ground.

The main difficulty, according to Mr. Maer, is the high price which prevails on all land at Burkburnett since the townsite is a proven oil field, it being impossible to talk to anyone about leasing any amount of land, without talking in terms of oil money, and that the railroad was hot able to compete with the off lease terms.
