

GUNS ALONG MEUSE ROAR GRAND FINALE OF ELEVENTH HOUR

CHEERS AND FLARES SUCCEED MOMENTARY SILENCE AT LAST ZERO.

FINAL WEEK NO JOY RIDE

Private George W. Lejon Reaches Front to Fire It's All Over But The Shouting.

The following interesting account of the reception given news of the armistice by the American forces at the front is contained in the "Stars and Stripes" of November 15, a copy of which was received here in Monday's mail.

At the eleventh hour on the eleventh day of the eleventh month, hostilities came to an end from Switzerland to the sea. Early that morning, from the wireless station on the Eiffel Tower in Paris there had gone forth through the air to the wondering, half-incredulous line that the Americans held from near Sedan to the Moselle the order from Marshal Foch to cease firing on the stroke of 11.

On the stroke of 11 the cannon stopped, the rifles dropped from the shoulders, the machine guns grew still. There followed then a strange, unbelievable silence as though the world had died. It lasted but a moment, lasted for the space that a breath is held. Then came such an uproar of relief and jubilation, such a tooting of horns, shrieking of whistles, such an overture from the bands and trains and church bells, such a shouting of voices as the earth is not likely to hear again in our day and generation.

When night fell on the battlefield the clamor of the celebration waxed rather than waned. Darkness? There was none. Rockets and a ceaseless fountain of star shells made the lines a streak of glorious brilliance across the face of startled France, while the light of flares and the glow of all its dancing, boasting, singing people was as clearly visible as though the sun sat high in the heavens.

German Celebrate As Well.
The man from Mars, coming to earth on the morning of November 11, 1918, would have had hard put to it to say which army had won, for, if anything, the greater celebration, the more startling outburst, came not from the American but from the German side. At least he could have said—that man from Mars—to which side the suspension of hostilities had come as the greater relief.

The news began to spread across the front shortly after the sun rose. There was more or less of an effort to send it forward only through military channels, to have the corps report it calmly by wire to the divisions, the divisions to the brigades, the brigades to the regiments, the regiments to the battalions, and so on down to the uttermost squad, quite as though this were an ordinary order and nothing to get excited about.

There was the effort. But it did not work very well. The word was spread on the kind of wireless that man knew many centuries before Marconi came on earth. It spread like a current of electricity along the wirey mess lines, hopping up and down and sniffling and scuffling as they waited for the morning coffee. It spread along the chains of singing and mending along the creeping columns of camions. Driver called it to driver and runners tossed the word over their shoulders that they burst by. Now and again a fleet of motorcycles would whizz along through the heavy mist.

Hard to Get at First.
In fact, the front was so thick with the smoke of the guns that it was hard to get at first. "The guerre will be fine at 11 o'clock. Finée la guerre."
You could hear it called out again and again.
"What time?"

"Eleven o'clock."
A pause.
"Say, you, what time is it now?"
They took it a little incredulously at first. That was the stuff, that rumor. They had heard it again and again during the past fortnight.
"Well, the captain says it's so."
"Hell, who's he? I'll wait till Foch comes and tells me himself."
Why, the preceding Thursday night—that was the night the envoys came over from Spa—was that what the doughboy seems to prefer calling the "Armistice" had been signed spread like the Spanish flu from Grandpre to the Meuse.
That night the flares inflamed the skies, the rockets streaked the night. Bands burst into long suppressed music, and the headlights twinkled all along the road. It did not last long, this little unbidden flurry, and there was much scolding; but, as a matter of fact, nothing much more startlingizing to the enemy could well have been staged than this spectacle of the F. A. American Army celebrating so—being he had not heard.
Up in the high observation post an American observer was trying to penetrate the mist with his German field glasses. The young officer with the bow asked him to look due west. What did he see? Well, not much—the road to the crippled full of traffic, no shell fire, a forested airplane in the field below.
"Lord, Lord, what good are those glasses? Why, without them, I can see a little house in Kansas City. There's a nursery on the second floor and the sun shining in the window, just touches a cradle there. Inside that cradle, in my daughter, I have never seen her before. She was born since I sailed for France."
Meanwhile, on the roads below, the Engineers were working with a will. No time to celebrate, for the roads must be kept in shape. But they sang as they worked.

Send the word, send the word over there
That the Yanks are coming, the Yanks are coming—
The words, in that hour, had acquired a new significance. While here and there across the devastated land where Yanks were at work, you could hear a knot burst into song. And the burden of all the songs was this:
It's home boys, home, it's home we ought to be,
Home, boys, home, in the land of liberty.
So came to an end on the 11th day of November, 1918—the 85th day since America entered the war.

Attack Before Vignoulles.
Probably the hardest fighting being done by any Americans in the final hour was that which engaged the troops of the 28th, 81st and 7th Divisions with the Second American Army, who launched a five-on-attack above Vignoulles just at dawn on the 11th. It was no idle thing, that last flare of the battle, and the order to cease firing did not come until the front line until the last moment, when runners sped with it from fox hole to fox hole.

Then a quite startling thing occurred. The skyline of the crest ahead of them grew suddenly populous with dancing soldiers and down the slope, all the way to the barbed wire straight for the American came the German troops. They came with outstretched hands, ear-to-ear grins and souvenirs to swap for cigarettes, so well did they know the little weakness of their foe. They came to tell how pleased they were the fight had stopped, how glad they were the Kaiser had departed for parties unknown, how fine it was to know they would have a republic at last in Germany.

Civilians Cross Trenches.
When the great hour came, across the trenches from our side swarmed a small army of civilians bearing food and clothing to their kith and kin on the other side. From the highest steeples in Thann the tricolor fluttered gayly and within the church there knelt in thanksgiving all the old folks nearest to the Rhine—was held by those negro soldiers who used to make up the old New York 15th and have long been brigaded with the French. They were in Alsace and their line ran through Thann and across the railway that leads to Colmar.

Up to the front, past Montfaucan and Romagne, past Remonville and on up a truck trundled that morning. Over the tailboard, at the endless mud

CORSICANA MAN HAS EXPERIENCE WITH BOLSHEVIKI

By Associated Press. CORSICANA, TEX., Dec. 3.—Frank W. Micheau, an oil man of this city, and his wife, have just returned home after five years spent in Russia, and after experiencing the terrors of the bolshevik reign. Mr. Micheau lived at Eaku, near the Caspian Sea, where he represented a manufacturing company. Immediately after the Russian collapse, Mr. and Mrs. Micheau left for the United States, and after a journey of nine weeks, finally reached Vladivostok, a trip which usually required but five days. Their journey began on May 8, and it took until September to make the trip. During all of this time the travelers remained upon the train and their cooking was done by the side of the track. The country through which they passed was very fertile and the refugees were always able to obtain milk and eggs, said Mr. Micheau. The bolsheviks began uprising and they were held up in the traveling until an army of Czech-Slovaks came to the rescue. The rest of the journey was then accomplished as the Czech-Slovaks drove back the bolsheviks and the refugees. Mr. Micheau is enthusiastic in his praise for the Czech-Slovaks, who he declares are the only soldiers who approached the bolsheviks in intelligence and physique. They are an intelligent race in Russia, he states, who stand for law and order, and are attempting to establish a good government for Russia.

REFUSE TO RETURN HOME BY WAY OF GERMANY

(Havas).—It is reported from Warsaw that fifteen hundred soldiers from Alsace-Lorraine, who were taken prisoner by the Russians, have refused to return to their homes by the way of Germany. POPE MANIFESTS SYMPATHY WITH GERMAN PEOPLE

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 2.—A Cologne dispatch to the Maasbode says that in response to Cardinal Hartmann's request for papal intervention to prevent the destruction of Germany, Cardinal Gasparri, papal secretary of state, declares that the pope throughout the war manifested deep sympathy with the German people and unwaveringly begged the belligerents to abandon their attempt of destroying each other. "Equally, under the present circumstances," the papal secretary continued, "he has repeatedly applied to the leader of a great belligerent state and adjured him by the precious blood of the Redeemer to adopt a benevolent attitude toward the armistice offer and the peace negotiations, so that a just and honorable peace may be attained."

SMALL VESSELS COULD END WORK OF BOLSHEVIKI

BERLIN, Monday, Dec. 3.—If a few British torpedo boats or light cruisers with even a small landing force could reach Riga this week, they could dam the bolshevik flood which is surging toward London, burning and plundering Estonia and Livonia, according to a declaration made to the correspondent by Baron Aexkuell of Esthonia, who escaped from that country on Thursday in disguise. Baron Aexkuell reports that German forces refused to retreat from Narva, when they were surrounded and defeated. The Russian army officers, under the leadership of Colonel Keller, of the old Russian regime, were attacked by a superior bolshevik force. The guards gave protection a month ago to five hundred Russians who alleged they had deserted from the bolshevik army because of had treatment. They brought twenty-three machines with them. While the attack was proceeding last Tuesday, these Russians fired upon the white guards from the rear contributing materially to their defeat. The white guards, half annihilated, retreated. Esthonian workmen are nearly all bolsheviks, according to Baron Aexkuell, and the Russian forces of Livonia are facing the reign of terror that the bourgeoisie of Russia have suffered.

COMMERCIAL CONDITIONS ARE EXCEEDINGLY GOOD

P. Martin, federal reserve agent. Commercial conditions are exceedingly good, the report states.

RESERVE OFFICERS MAY WEAR UNIFORMS AWHILE

The department today rescinded its order requiring soldiers upon discharge to account for all articles of wearing apparel issued by the American Red Cross and other charitable organizations.

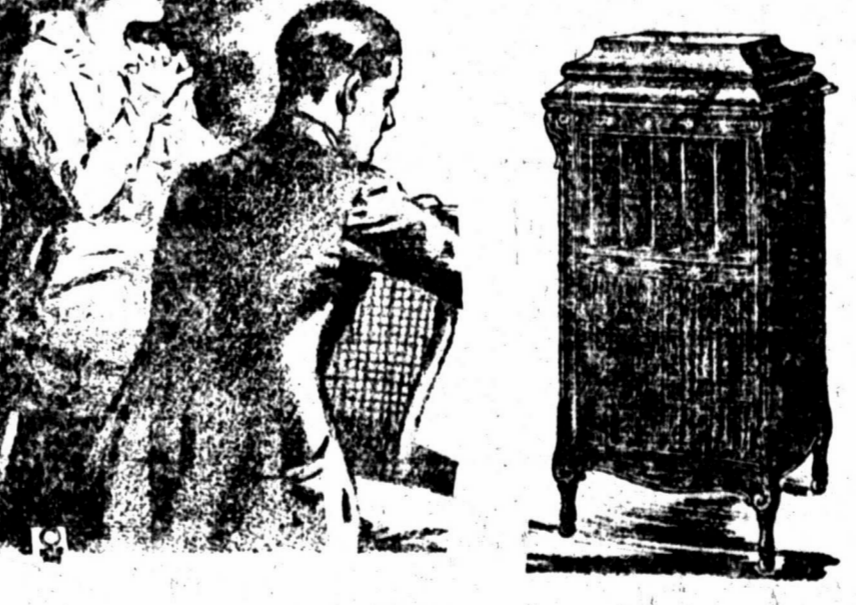

Market Report

Cotton Market

 NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—The cotton market was still not nervous and unsettled to fully meet an advance in Liverpool at the opening today and the tone was barely steady. Prices however started at an advance of 2 to 36 points and while later fluctuations were irregular, the tone showed some improvement toward the end of the first hour. After selling at 25.19, January reacted to 24.85 and March eased off from 24.15 to 24.95 but showed rallies of a few points later on trade support and scattered Wall Street buying for a reaction. The market was helped to some extent by reports that ocean freight rates for February shipments from Liverpool to North Atlantic ports had been reduced from \$5.50 to \$4.50 per hundred. Houses with Liverpool and Japanese connections were moderate sellers here during the early trading. The advance extended to 25.38 for January, 24.50 for March during the middle of the morning, with active months generally showing net gains of 41 to 63 points. At this level there was some realizing and prices turned easier late in the forenoon with active months showing reactions of 20 to 35 points shortly after mid-day. Some of the local shippers said there had been no reduction on the ocean freight rates of the British government from North Atlantic ports to Liverpool but understood the government was assigning 10 per cent of cargo space to general commodity shipments. A prominent Alabama firm estimates the crop at 11,565,000 bales, excluding linters.

There was considerable buying after the noon hour and the market rose 45 to 50 points.

Cotton closed steady.

New Orleans Cotton.
 NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 3.—A good demand sprang up in the early trading in cotton today, apparently being based on expectations of a bullish crop estimate from the government next week. In the first half hour of trading prices rose 31 to 60 points. Liquidation appeared and pared the gain down to 12 to 15 points.

A telegram from the bureau of markets was construed to mean that there was little chance of bollies going on contract and prices improved to new higher levels, where they stood 62 to 65 points up net toward noon.

Moderate recessions appeared and at 1 o'clock trading months were 41 to 49 points over yesterday's final prices.

Cotton closed steady at an advance of 102 to 118 points.

Later an advance took place largely as a result of estimates that hog increase had more than kept pace with gains in corn production, and that no unusual surplus of feeding grain was in prospect. PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN OF 1920

The Houston Post, in summing up the political outlook for 1920 and the probable alignment in the next presidential campaign, suggests that the soldier will be a predominating figure and that the vote of the men who fought the good fight for liberty will have much to say about who shall serve the people and upon what issues the campaign will be waged. The Post also sees a possibility for new party alignments in a probable shift from one organization to the other, as indicated in the following review of the situation:

"According to Senator James Hamilton Lewis, the main political issue of 1920 will center around the international alliances which are to result from this war.

"It is far too early yet to predict what will be the issues of 1920, but it must be remembered that 2,000,000 men now in France may have a good deal to say in that regard. If peace shall be concluded now, and those 2,000,000 men are not pleased with the terms of that peace, they are likely to say so in no uncertain tones in 1920. That issue will, for them at least, overshadow all others and 2,000,000 returned warriors can and will exert no little influence in a presidential campaign.

"Another possible issue is that of government control or ownership of public utilities. The proponents of this policy will have the support of railroad and telegraph employees who have profited much from government control to this time. They will have too, the aid of those who are accustomed to follow the leadership of William Jennings Bryan. But there are great numbers of voters—a large majority it is to be hoped—who will oppose both continued government control and government ownership with all their power, and this may be the leading issue of the 1920 political campaign.

"By that year, too, the problem of maintaining peace throughout the world may have been discussed until the American people shall have some very divergent views upon that subject; and it may be a dividing line between millions of American voters. Then there will be the old question of preparedness, which is likely to arise again with the end of the present conflict. There will always be those who oppose expenditures for military and naval purposes, and this may be a live issue in 1920.

"Altogether the country may expect that the 1920 presidential campaign will not be devoid of interest. There will be issues in plenty, and they will be based upon great problems that must be solved wisely. The words 'republican' and 'democrat' may not mean much in that campaign, unless the former party shall choose to make the fight upon the single plank, 'We want the offices'; and many members of each party will be tempted to vote with the other."

TWO AVIATORS KILLED IN CRASH AT CALL FIELD

Lieutenant Clarence E. Holburn and Cadet Alton K. Lincoln, of Call Field, were instantly killed this morning when the plane they were driving fell from a height of about three hundred feet just off the flying field, near the railroad. The machine was entirely destroyed. The crash occurred about 10:40 this morning.

Cadet Lincoln had been at the field only a month and was taking some of his first lessons.

Lieutenant Holburn has been here for several months. He was commissioned in April. His home was in Brookings, S. D. Lincoln's home was in Pittsfield, Mass.

The bodies will be sent to their former homes by the Hines Undertaking company.

WILL PAY DISABLED SOLDIERS FOR A PERIOD

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Soldiers disabled during the war will be paid \$5 a month during the period of their convalescence, which will be directed by the federal board for vocational training, Dr. C. A. Prosser, director of the board, announced today. He said that the government had authorized the board to make this payment to the soldiers, with an additional \$10 if they have dependents.

MEXICANS KILL MEMBER OF CREW AMERICAN SHIP

By Associated Press.
 GALVESTON, TEX., Dec. 3.—Immigration officers have been informed by members of the crew of the Ward Line steamer Monterey of recent clashes at Tampico and Vera Cruz between Americans and Mexicans. The information is to the effect that one man, a member of the crew, was killed recently at Vera Cruz and that two members of the naval reserve unit on the Monterey were severely injured when set upon by Mexicans at Tampico. One Mexican captain was said to have been killed. It was reported that the trouble began when one of the naval reserve petty officers went ashore at Tampico in search of one of his men who was on shore without leave. The Monterey arrived at Texas City yesterday.

Official report was made to the immigration authorities that Willard E. Moore, junior engineer of the Monterey, had been killed at Vera Cruz by a Mexican.

PRESIDENT WILSON TO VISIT POPE BENEDICT

ROME, Monday, Dec. 2.—President Wilson, during his stay at this capital, will pay a visit to Pope Benedict. It is announced by newspapers here. He will go to the Vatican, it is stated today from the American embassy instead of from the Quirinal, where the president and Mrs. Wilson will be the guests of the king and queen while in Rome.

OIL DEVELOPMENT

IOWA PARK WELL ATTRACTION FOR MANY INVESTORS

Iowa Park investors intend to reap the harvest of the new oil field opened by the Harry Zink well, as bright and early Monday morning the nearby farms were visited by numerous investors searching leases, and by the middle of afternoon all of the land for miles around, except for a few farms which the owners declined to lease, were tied up, with practically every lessor an Iowa Park business man. The well which caused the commotion on the main Iowa Park road, just one mile south of the town, and in the southwest corner of the Zink land on the east of the road. Monday the well was shut down, as there were no available tanks, and no pumping facilities but the slush pit was filled with oil and the machinery covered with the thick crude. Arrangements are being made to put the well to pump.

The Zink farm, consisting of more than 300 acres, has all been leased for \$25 an acre. A. L. Brubaker of Iowa Park buying the lease. The Zink family was aroused before daylight from their slumbers by parties of oil men, from all over the county, who had heard of the well and came to get in on the ground floor, and other families in that immediate vicinity report the same experience.

Eastside Begins Preparation On Vancleave Tract

Active operations preparatory to drilling on the Eastside Petroleum Company's tract on the Vancleave were begun Monday and the derrick and necessary machinery is being gotten on the ground as quick as possible. This lease is east of the Fowler tract and across the road from the Helen Elizabeth well.

The Eastside lease adjoins the lease of the Helen Elizabeth company on the east, and operations will begin in a short time on this tract also. It is reported. This same company has another lease, a short distance to the southeast from Helen Elizabeth well.

HAMMOND-RAY IS REPORTED IN AT DEPTH OF 1820

The Hammond-Ray well, on the P. C. Chenuit tract, west of Burkburnett, and in the general direction of the Marine and Humble wells, is reported to have hit a good sand Monday night. The well was drilled to the top of the sand at around 1820 feet, where a hard rock was encountered. The casing was set on this rock, according to the report. The present showing is said to indicate a very good well. This well would open up still more territory to the west of Burkburnett and is one of the test wells that have been watched closely for the past few weeks.

To Show Pictures Of Burkburnett At Local Oil Exchange

Oil men will be shown 1,000 feet of motion picture film of the Burkburnett field at the Wichita Falls Oil Stock Exchange, 709 Ohio avenue, tonight at 8:15 o'clock.

The pictures for the film were taken and developed by Duffey Maves, who will personally show them at the exchange. The first scene is that of a train pulling into Burkburnett. Scenes follow showing the crowded condition of the streets of the oil field, the promoters making deals involving thousands of dollars, the flowing wells, the field as a whole and finally the finished product leaving the city of Wichita Falls in the train of tank cars.

Not only are the oil men invited to view the showing of the pictures but the general public is welcome. According to D. W. Young, of the oil exchange who will preside at the meeting.

An intermittent flow of oil is reported from the Bearman well on the Kasper, to the west of the Burkburnett townsite, the well being drilled when the gas pressure causing the flow ceases for a time, according to reports from the well. Baffling has not proceeded for sufficiently long time to make a correct estimate, but it is believed the well will make around 800 barrels.

New York Stocks

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Stocks were firm at the opening of today's trading, largely as a result of the strength shown by minor rails and specialties, but the market soon became irregular, oils and shippings being mainly responsible for the reversal. Investment rails failed to hold the advantage gained in yesterday's later dealings and standard industrials and equipments forfeited fractional gains. Further reactions set in before the end of the first half hour on the weakness of Marine preferred.

Reports that the stock exchange might soon restore the margin to 20 per cent imparted additional strength to the list at mid-day. Steels, equipments and motors again led the movement and marine preferred made up half its losses.

Rails, oils and other leaders reacted 1 to 3 points on profit taking in the last hour. The close was irregular. Final prices on Liberty bonds were: 2 1/2's 98.88; first convertible 4 1/2's 95.10; second 4 1/2's 94.09; first convertible 4 1/2's 97.74; second convertible 4 1/2's 96.50; third 4 1/2's 96.54; fourth 4 1/2's 96.60.

AMERICAN TROOPS RESUME MARCH TO THE RIVER RHINE

By Associated Press. AMERICAN ARMY OF OCCUPATION. Monday, Dec. 2.—After their first night's sleep in Germany, the American troops of the army of occupation were ready at dawn this morning to resume their march toward the Rhine. In advancing toward Coblenz, the American forces are moving ahead, striding the Moselle traveling in a northeasterly direction. Across the Rhine the American army will take up a line a little over sixty miles in length. It will describe an arc of a circle having Coblenz as a center and with a radius eighteen and six tenths miles in length. This circle pivoting upon Coblenz is the bridgehead which the Germans conceded in the armistice. The line leaves the Rhine at a point northwest of Coblenz, swings eastward through Rheims and Oberlahn and turns to the south just beyond Rosbach. It continues through Weierlingen, Molsberg, Diez, Schomborn, Katzenelnbogen, and Wehrhahn and reaches the Rhine again at Caub. Along the Rhine the Americans will occupy a line about forty three miles in length. The front will extend five miles beyond either end of the semi-circle described above, this overlapping in places the lines of the British on the left and the French on the right. During the advance toward Coblenz, the American lines extend about 23 miles on each side of the Moselle. The Americans expect to travel seven to ten miles each marching day with a day or two of rest intervals. The rest days will be decided upon by the commanders as the advance continues. Much will depend on how the men and animals stand the trip and the way the supply service keeps up with the troops.

KURT EISNER IS LOSING PRESTIGE WITH BAVARIANS

By Associated Press. LONDON, Dec. 3.—Kurt Eisner, the Bavarian premier, is losing prestige, according to Munich advices received here by the way of Amsterdam, Copenhagen and Bern. A Copenhagen dispatch says that Eisner was hissed by his own partisans at Munich during a celebration in honor of returning peace. Later a supporter of Eisner was not allowed to make a speech and was obliged to flee from an angry crowd which removed the reg flags along the streets and stormed the ministry of the interior shouting "Down with Eisner." Guards fired over the heads of the crowd which dispersed. A Bern dispatch to the Mail says it is believed that Bavaria is gradually reaching a conclusion to retain its unity with the rest of Germany rather than seeking a separate peace. This message also reports evidences of growing hostility toward Eisner and that there are signs in Munich that a crisis is approaching and that action favoring some form of monarchy may be taken within three weeks.

SUFFRAGE NOW PART OF OKLAHOMA CONSTITUTION

By Associated Press. OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Dec. 3.—Governor Robert L. Williams, issued a proclamation today officially declaring that the woman suffrage amendment voted on in the recent general elections received a majority of all the votes cast in the election and is now a part of the constitution. An election law peculiar to Oklahoma makes it necessary for the governor to officially proclaim the carrying of an amendment before it can become operative, regardless of the vote received.
