CAPTAIN LILLARD PAYS TRIBUTE TO ALFRED CARRIGAN

Credit for saving the entire Seventy-first Infantry Brigade from annihilation is given Lieutenant A. H. Carrigan Jr., whose death in action on October 8 has brought grief to practically the entire city, this information being given in a letter, to Judge and Mrs. Carrigan from Captain S. L. Lillard, Lieutenant Carrigan's commanding officer. Captain Lillard says that it was due to the bravery of Lieut. Carrigan that the brigade was able to advance and capture a larger number of German prisoners, and he adds that he should receive the Distinguished Service Cross for his noble sacrifice.

The letter, which gives more of the details of the manner in which the young Wichitan met his death, follows:

Capt. Lillard's Letter.
Company L 142nd Infantry,
American A. F. A. P. O. 796,
Nov. 5, 1918.

Judge and Mrs. A. H. Carrigan,
Wichita Falls, Texas.
Dear Friends:

It is my sad duty to write you concerning the death of your son, First Lieut. A. H. Carrigan Jr., who was killed in action near St. Etienne, France, on October 8.

Lieut. Carrigan was my second in command in this fight and was rendering me the most efficient and effective service when killed. Our company was held up by a machine gun fire and by a network of wire entanglement. Lieut. Carrigan was endeavoring to make an opening through the network of wire when he was killed by a machine gun bullet.

Your son died doing his duty. He was endeavoring to make an opening so that his company could advance. The lives of every man in the company depended upon our being able to advance, and it was to this noble duty that your son volunteered and for this purpose he gave his life. His death was not in vain. Through his efforts we were able to advance and capture the machine gun nest, taking over 150 prisoners.

In my opinion the act of Lieut. Carrigan saved the entire 71st Infantry Brigade from being annihilated. For Company L had not captured this machine gun nest it would have played havoc with our entire brigade, as the position it occupied enfiladed the entire brigade and it was due to the bravery of your son that our brigade was saved. Lieut. Carrigan should receive the Distinguished Service Cross for his noble sacrifice.

The fact that his death saved the lives of many others is the only balm to heal the wound I am,

COMPLAIN THAT WICHITANS ARE CASHING STAMPS

Complaint is made that citizens of Wichita county are cashing their War Savings Stamps, contrary to the plans of the government and against the policy to aid financially in carrying out the purposes of the nation on entering the war. The practice is being carried on to such an extent that the matter has been brought to the attention of Director Lipsitz who in turn has addressed a letter on the subject to Postmaster Howard, giving him instructions regarding future applications to convert stamps into money, including the furnishing of the name of such purchaser. The postmaster is also instructed to return stamps until such party shall have first given the required ten days' notice.

The letter, which discusses this matter in detail, is as follows: Letter from Mr. Lipsitz, Mr. Ed Howard, P. M., Wichita Falls, Texas.

Dear Sir: I learn through the depositing office at Austin that War Savings Stamps are being cashed at Wichita Falls, and it would seem that the citizens of Wichita Falls have either suffered many calamities since the armistice was signed, or else they have failed to appreciate their responsibility to their government at this time. I wish you would make it very plain to the patrons of your office that the privilege of cashing War Savings Stamps is extended by law only with the intention of taking care of those people who have bought War Savings Stamps and then have suffered some misfortune or calamity which they could not foresee, and that if any person who was able to hold his War Savings Stamps takes advantage of this provision of the law to cash them when he can by any possibility keep them, is not only unpatriotic but he is withdrawing his support from the government at this time when it is most vitally needed.

Require Ten Days' Notice. I wish that you would in every instance take the full ten days' notice and not cash War Savings Stamps for any one without requiring that they give you the notice that the law provides, then I ask that you send me the names of every person who applies to cash War Savings Stamps where you know of your knowledge that such person has no crying need for money. I would also like to have you say to every person who proposes to cash W. S. S. that the Treasury Department has announced that it will spend \$18,000,000,000 this fiscal year to pay expenses already contracted for and this requires an expenditure at the rate of \$50,000,000 a day to maintain our armies now in France, Russia and Italy, and in training camps in this country, a total of 5,764,000 men.

The government has no way of financing itself except through taxes and the sale of its securities, and the men who now cash War Savings Stamps before peace is declared and before our government has demobilized our army, are subject to just as

much criticism as there were in actual warfare. It would appear patriotic if a thoughtful person who really had the interest of his country at heart would at this time withdraw his financial support because by doing so he indicates that he merely bought War Savings Stamps in order to appear to be patriotic, when in point of fact, he intended to cash them secretly at the earliest possible moment.

Texas is asked to invest \$91,000,000 in War Savings Stamps, not simply to buy \$91,000,000 worth and then turn around and cash them again in a few days or weeks, but to buy and hold them, and the honor of Texas is in the hands of the people of Wichita county, for if they cash their W. S. S. Wichita county will fail to make its quota and, therefore, Texas, will fail in its allotted task.

The quota is based not upon the amount of stamps bought, but upon the amount of stamps held on December 31, and when a person signs a pledge to buy W. S. S., he signs a solemn, binding obligation to the Secretary of the Treasury, not only agreeing to buy certain number of stamps but, at the same time, pledging himself to save and economize, the spirit of the pledge as well as the letter of it being, that a person who signed agreed to save his money and loan it to the government as long as the government had need of it, up to maturity date of War Savings Stamps, which is January 1, 1922.

Comparison is Made. I wonder what the people of Wichita county would think of a man who enlisted and is now in France and at the moment that an armistice was declared, deserted and sneaked back home. He would be a deserter just as though actual fighting existed, and would be shot as a deserter because we are still in a state of war although peace is in sight.

A man who has enlisted his dollars and now withdraws them is taking them from our soldiers and sailors, the food and clothing and comforts which they are entitled to, and the signing of an armistice has not reduced the war expense of this government materially. It is my duty to see that people in Texas invest in War Savings Stamps, and when one invested to inquire into the reasons whenever they ask for their money back. Therefore, please report such cases to me where you know that they are cashing them without reason.

Germans Shedding Wings in Retreat as a Surrender

By Associated Press. LONDON, Wednesday, Dec. 5.—There will be no formal surrender of German airplanes as at one time expected, because it has been found impracticable to assemble 3,000 airplanes at one place and it is doubtful whether Germany has a sufficient number of reliable pilots for that purpose. Hence the first surrender in history of an air fleet is being effected by piecemeal. The Germans are shedding their wings in the course of retreat and the advancing Allies are picking them up.

LOCAL BOARD IS NOT IN POSITION TO AID SOLDIERS

"We are being besieged daily by requests from people all over the county to get their sons, husbands or other relatives out of the camps. Various reasons are being assigned for the desire to get the men out of the service, but for all requests we have but one answer. That matter is entirely beyond our jurisdiction, when the draft board sent the men to camp they went out of their hands and now only the mastering out order of the war department can serve to release them from duty."

George Thorburn, secretary of the board, makes this statement in order to save time and trouble, both for the board and for possible inquirers. No person or organization, he continued, is able to secure the release of any man in the service either in camp here or overseas and the government is planning to master the men not needed out as quickly as possible. Only a little patience is needed. To those who offer as their excuse for wanting their sons or other relatives sent home, the fact that they are sick, and "not doing the government any good in the hospital," Mr. Thorburn states that it is the policy of the war department to send all men back to their homes in as good a condition as they left them, and they will certainly not send an ill man home, but will keep him in the hospital until his health is restored. He also added that the military hospitals are in charge of specialists in every line and that a sick soldier is much better off in their care than at home.

VOLUNTARY ENLISTMENTS OPENED FOR THE NAVY

Voluntary enlistments have been opened up for the navy, according to a letter received today by the Draft Board from Commander H. Ball, U. S. N., retired, in charge of the district recruiting station at Dallas. Enlistments will be accepted without regard to the draft board, the letter states, and recruits in every line and in every branch of the service. A list of their September 12 registrants, below the age of 21, and will prepare a list within a short time, Mr. Thorburn, secretary of the board stated.
