To Improve Sanitation.

Lieut. Coates will have charge of arranging a system of sar-ation for the district where at present there is no such thing as sanitation, and will direct the work which Burkburnett and Wichita Falls business men interested in the situation have under taken. Floors will be put into the taken. Floors will be put into the tents and other improvements made which will better the sanitary situation. The fund that was raised in Eurkburnett and Wichita Falls is expected to prove ample for all needs, but if more is needed the assurance is given that it will be forthcoming.

Miss McCarty has been promised the assistance of several nurses at Burkburnett and the women of the Red Cross are standing behind her in her work among the sick people, Mr. Cline stated. Both the medical officer and the nurse are to stay in Burk-burnett while the present emegrency

Mayor Ross and the others at Burkburnett who are taking the lead in the move to clean up the tented set-tlement are much pleased over the interest Major Atkinson has taken in in giving the services of his department. People bought these stocks be-lieving that they would have a rich investment, and would make money as an odoubt they would, had there been an oil company. These swindles have been perpetrated, if they have been perpetrated as it is alleged, to the hurt of the entire community and in a manner reflecting on those who are en-gaged in the legitimate business of producing oil and selling stock in le-gitimate companies. It is the grand jury's duty, if such things have hapned, to investigate and take prope

pened, to investigate and take proper action, that those who have perpetrated such swindles may be properly dealt with, and that similar frauds may not be enacted in the future."

Judge Bonner included in his charge to the grand jury the customary charges demanded by law. He also told the grand jury that they would have the privilere of adjourning immediately upon their convening as a body, until the first of the new year, if they desired. 

DR. LEE WRITES OF EXPERIENCES

Following are extracts of an interesting letter from Dr. Q. B. Lee to Mrs. Lee at Munday, Texas, written on November 13. Mrs. Lee writes that she expects the doctor home soon when they will again be with Wichita Falls friends:

"I left Bordeaux on the fifth of Sen-

taey will again be with Wichita Falls friends:

"I left Bordeaux on the fifth of September and went to B. H. 15 at Chaumont in northwest France to be sent to the front. From there I went to Savilly which is about seven miles south of Verdun. This was on the eleventh of September, two days bestore the St. Mihiel drive.

"At this time we were six or seven miles from the line and my first experience in war.

"The artillery fire was something terrible, the whole sky was like an elecritcal storm and the noise so loud it almost shook me out of bed. The barrage kept up for hours, I think about two days without ceasing. Of course by that time we began to get so busy we did not have time to think of the fight.

"The first week I was here a plane "The first week I was here a plane came over and dropped a few bombs, killing some men near by but none hit close to the hospital. However, I grabbed my gas mask and helmet and made a hasty retreat for the dug out.

"They dropped bombs on other occasions, but I was busy in the operating room and had to keep on working. None were near enough to hurt us but the explosion sounded plenty close, especially when you had to stay on the job and couldn't run to a shelfer.

"After the St. Mihiel drive we had a few days rest and then the real work started when the drive north of Verdun began. Honestiy we work ed until it made me almost sick to see them brought in. This kept up with about a three weeks stretch with no let up. A week ago they got so far abeed of us that we had to move. The teams were sent on while the hospital was being moved. I want to mobile hospital No. 1 at Esnes, north west of Verdun. The boys kept advancing so rapidly that we started to move again.

"We had gotten about half way moved to Boutheville, which is still further north when the armistice was signed. I am now back at Savilly suppose on my way back to the base and I hope home as soon as possible. Young Kinsner is only seventeen years old, having celebrated his seventeenth birthday on a troop transport bound for France.
