Billy Buss Is Killed Instantly and Would Use German Vessels As World Smith Orval Sustains Serious Injuries.

Billy Buss, laborer, was instantly killed, and Smith Orval, foreman for Lilman and Wright contractors, was badly hurt when the truck in which they were riding was struck by the north bound Katy about eight fifteen

Spartican writers provided copy for hand bills which were to sued under the caption "Red Vor-waerts." Meanwhile the red guard waerts." Meanwhile the red guarda had posted sentries at the doors and windows to repel invaders. One of these sentries was an unkempt spartacan carrying a rifle in one hand and an umbrella in the other. The hand-bills contained a report of the demonstration, and explained the seizure of the paper which was claimed to be warranted "under the new law born with the revolution."


