## GERMAN RECOVERY **COUNT MONSGELAS**

BERNE, Jan. Germany will slow-ly recover from the disasters wrough by the war and will in time regain. its place among the nations of the world but in a democratic, not a mon-archial spirit, according to Count Max Von Montgelas, formerly in charge of American affairs in the foreign office at Berlin and now German minister to Switzerland, Vice Baron Von Remberg, retired.

"This recovery," he said today, will be endlessly hard and will require every ounce of German discipline but it can be accomplished only in case the Entente nations give dermany a sporting chance. 




