ROBERT CECIL SAYS LEAGUE NATIONS IS INDISPENSIBLE

DECLARES THIS NECESSARY TO CONCLUSION OF AN ENDURING PEACE. STATEMENT NOT OFFICIAL. Views Are Personal and Not Intended as Expression of Government's Policy.

PARIS, Wednesday, Jan. 8.—Robert Cecil, who has arrived here with the first section of the British peace delegation, expressed his opinion on the Associated Press today that definite organization of a league of nations is indispensable as a first step toward a permanent peace...

League Is Necessary. In my opinion a league of nations is necessary as the initial step in the peace negotiations, said Lord Robert. It is not only necessary to insure peace but also for the proper treatment of many international questions...

It is our business to give this league definite form here and now. I agree that this congress must regard itself as the first regular meeting of the nations forming the league, he said.

Asked how far armaments can be limited by a league of nations, Lord Robert replied: That, in my opinion, is probably the most difficult problem the peace congress will have to face.

Question of Assurance. So it is with the league. Individual nations will hardly be willing to disarm until they are sure of peace and justice through the operation of the league, he said.

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POSTPONEMENT OF CONFERENCE WITH THREE PREMIERS

LLOYD GEORGE IS DETAINED IN LONDON IN CONNECTION WITH CABINET.

TO MEET NEXT WEEK

Informal Meeting With Premier Orlando and Japanese Representatives Today.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 9.—President Wilson's conferences with the premiers of Great Britain, France and Italy which were to open today have been delayed and probably will not begin before early next week.

Mr. Lloyd George is detained in London by work incident to the reconstruction of his cabinet. Premier Orlando of Italy said he is due today but probably will not return for his presence for forty-eight hours is necessary because of matters under consideration by the Italian parliament.

There will, however, be a meeting today at the office of Stephen Pichon, foreign minister. It will be attended by President Wilson, Premier Orlando and Japanese representatives, but it will be informal because of the absence of Mr. Lloyd George, although British representatives will probably be present.

Referring to the conferences as being between the chiefs of the Entente governments, the best informed French statesmen say that it is probable or less than a meeting—perhaps the last—of the higher Allied war commission. The procedure that will be adopted will be the simplest possible, having the advantage of avoiding laborious parleys and exchange of notes between chancelleries.

Simple Procedure. The French government communicated to the Allied powers some days ago a complete plan of work amounting to a suggestion of co-ordinated program.

First Consider Germany. As regards questions concerning enemy countries it is expected that those concerning Germany will be taken up first and then those of Austria-Hungary and finally those of Bulgaria and Turkey. These details will probably not be decided until the league of nations part of the program has been exhausted, however.

It is not expected that the premier's conference will deal with more than the most general principles of the peace settlement and that the commission in question will be composed of premiers and foreign ministers of the Allies. Mr. Wilson serving as American premier.

As expected, that there will be a long debate at the conference, newspapers saying that the French government communicated to the Allied powers some days ago a complete plan of work amounting to a suggestion of co-ordinated program.

Program of Procedure. The procedure now being discussed is, roughly as follows: First, a general agreement between the United States and the Entente belligerents for the creation of a league of nations or similar machinery, to enforce the terms of peace and preserve it.

Second, the setting up of new independent states growing out of the war.

Third, the assessment of damages and indemnities and the manner of their payment.

Fourth, the conclusion of peace treaties with the central powers.

The peace treaties may be left to the last because none of the agreements can bind the central powers unless, in the meantime, they have established governments which satisfy the peace congress as to their stability and purpose of carrying out the treaties made.

Question of Time Required. At this point arises the question of how long the peace congress will wait for the central powers to arrange their governments. It is pointed out by some of those working on the problem that neither Germany nor Austria can complete their governmental machinery until it is determined what the two peoples desire in this matter.

There is always the possibility that if no response is received as to give assurance the obligations undertaken will be carried out by the nations represented at the congress could do in carrying out such an undertaking. Only as Last Resort. Such action if taken at all would be only a last resort but if taken the question would arise as to how far the United States would participate.

COTTON GINNED TO JANUARY 1ST SHOWS INCREASE

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Cotton ginned prior to January 1 was 10,761,278 running bales, including 145,712 round bales; 17,570 bales of American Egyptian and 36,270 bales of Sea Island, the census bureau today reported.

Prior to January last year total ginnings were 10,434,532, including 184,104 round bales and 86,955 bales of sea island.

Final Statistics American Cotton Crop Year 1917

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Final statistics of the American cotton crop of 1917, announced by the census bureau, place production at 11,248,242 running bales, equivalent to 11,532,875 bales of 500 pounds each, gross weight, and worth \$1,522,690,000 to the growers.

Production of cotton seed amounted to 5,040,000 tons, worth \$333,550,000. For the "cotton year" ended July 31, 1918, consumption amounted to 6,566,589 bales, exclusive of linters; exports amounted to 1,288,420 bales; net imports 217,381 bales; stocks on hand at beginning of year 2,750,173 bales and at the end of the year 3,450,188 bales.

For the entire world the production of lint cotton destined for factory use was 17,419,000 and the mill consumption 17,710,000 bales of 500 pounds net weight.

Massachusetts still retains its supremacy in cotton manufacturing, the report announced, with a mill consumption during the cotton year of 1,493,113 bales, including linters. Next in order were North Carolina with 1,186,314 bales, South Carolina with 892,532 and Georgia with 880,395. The mill consumption of those four states alone represents nearly three-fifths of the total for the country.

GERMAN GOVERNMENT OPENS NEGOTIATIONS

TRANS-ATLANTIC SHIPPING SUSPENDED DURING STRIKE

BUENOS AIRES, Wednesday, Jan. 8.—All trans-Atlantic shipping has been suspended until the harbor strike is ended, it was announced after a meeting of shipping agents here tonight. The government was attempting to assist in loading and unloading vessels by using a few government tugs but the agents decided that no attempt will be made to move vessels.

England and Italy Have Not Named Food Commission

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 9.—England and Italy have not yet appointed their members of the international food commission and consequently re-arranging plans under the direction of Herbert C. Hoover have not been perfected. This delay also has rendered it impossible for him to arrange for the purchase of fats and other foodstuffs urgently needed by the populations of regions evacuated by the German armies.

It is expected that the German ships required to send food to the people to be supplied will be available shortly after the opening session of the peace congress. The delay in formulating preliminary food plans is causing the greatest uneasiness among representatives of the people who are now seeking relief as a means of checking bolshevism.

Athens Streets To Be Named for Entente Leaders

Five of the principal streets in the city will be given the names of the five leaders.

CAPT. M'DONNELL DIES IN FRANCE ON DECEMBER 22

News was received here this afternoon of the death of Captain Albert McDonnell in a hospital in France on December 22. Two years ago, Albert McDonnell was in Wichita Falls with a surveying party, and during the months that he made this his headquarters he made many friends to whom the news of today comes as a sad shock. He was in Wichita Falls when the war was declared and was among the party of young men that went from here to the first officers training camp at Leon Springs. He is the second of the Wichita Falls party receiving commissions from Leon Springs in August, 1917, to meet with death at the front. Lieutenant James Y. Manahan having been killed in action in September, during the Saint Mihiel drive. He went to France with the 90th division as a first lieutenant and aide to Brigadier General Johnston. When General Johnston was transferred to the 91st division, Lieutenant McDonnell went with him, and on October 3, was struck with a fragment of shell while the 91st headquarters was being bombed. He was then slated for a promotion to a captaincy, which he received in November. Mail was received from him during Christmas week, in which he said he would come home on a stretch, but it was believed that his condition was satisfactory, until the telegram was received by friends this morning.

Captain McDonnell's mother resides in Austin. He has a sister, Miss Emma McDonnell in school at Sweetbriar, Va., a brother, who is an officer in France, and a smaller brother, who lives in Austin.

CHILD IS INJURED WHEN STRUCK BY AN AUTOMOBILE

While running across Tenth street, shortly after 12 o'clock, at the Floral Heights fire station corner, Ira Leo Uitz, nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Uitz, was struck by an automobile, driven by Mr. Cunningham and was unconscious for a short while. Physicians on an examination said that the child's injuries will not prove serious. Mr. Cunningham stopped his car and carried the little boy to his parents' home, 1917 Eighth street. The accident occurred during the noon recreation hour and the boy was one of a group of children playing near the Alamo school on the lot adjoining the school campus and was struck when he ran across the street.

Bureau Explains Plans To Secure Soldiers Release

A number of persons have appealed to officials of the local government employment office to use their influence to obtain the release of men in the service whose presence at home is badly needed, without first taking the proper steps themselves towards the men's release and therefore are disappointed when they are told by the employment officials that nothing can be done on that account. It is clearly pointed out by Mr. Milton, examiner of the local employment office, that first of all the soldier must have application asking for a discharge filed with his commanding officer, before any application from outside sources will be considered. After the soldier has made application for release then the employer who desires the service of the man, must file a certified statement with the war department to the effect that the services of the soldier in question are badly needed and that it is impossible for him to secure help from among civilians for that particular work. When this is done the U. S. Employment officials will take the matter up and at once make request for the release of the soldier, but they must also make the statement that they cannot fill the position from among civilians. If the above instructions are carried out when making request for the discharge of a man considerable delay will be avoided, Mr. Milton states.

The local employment office of the U. S. Department of Labor has received orders for three men for work in South Africa, with a large lumber company.
