EBERT GOVERNMENT IS **GETTING UPPER HAND** OF BERLIN SITUATION

PARIS, Jan. 10.—The lates news PARIS, Jan. 10.—The lates news received here from Germany, although fragmentary and sometimes contradictory, indicates that the Ebert government has won a victory over the spartacans owing to the sudden impetus given the government's cause by the support of the loyal elements, whose numbers increased with the prospects of the government's success. In the sanguinary fighting of the last five days the spartacans are reported to have suffered very heavy losses.

BERLIN, Jan. 9.—The government forces are in complete control of that section of the inner city between the Brandenburg Gate and Friedrich Straase. It has issued an order prohibiting all processions.

In issuing its order against proces-

sions, the government gave warning that its troops have orders to fire without waiting for the spartacans to be-gin and to shoot to kill.

The spartacans apparently are los-ing hope. They failed to summon a mass meeting of their supporters to-day and the streets almost are de-serted.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—The cotton market had a steady opening today, first prices being 20 points higher to three points lower with the active three points lower with the active months higher on the firmness of Liverpool and overnight buying orders brought about by bullish spot advices of yesterday. The market soon weak ened under scattering liquidation, however. March broke from 27.28 to 26.90 and May from 26.23 to 25.80, or about 30 to 45 points net lower on the old crop positions.

A sharp break in Liverpool stimulated the selling here shortly after the opening and the market was very unsettled during the middle of the morning. Stop orders were uncovered on




