PROPOSE ENDORSEMENT OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS

The British officer in command explained to the burgomaster that the supplies were sent in recognition of the fact that Austria had treated her British prisoners with consideration in contrast with the inhuman treatment given them by the Germans.

Death of Priests Within 30 Minutes Of Each Other

By Associated Press. CORPUS CHRISTI, TEX., Jan. 15.—The Rev. John Scheid, chancellor of the Corpus Christi diocese of the Catholic church and the Rev. Paulinus Doran, pastor of St. Patrick's Catholic church here, died today of pneumonia. The two priests, who were well known in the state, were taken ill ten days ago and their deaths occurred ten minutes within thirty minutes of each other.

MEXICAN ARMY WILL CONTAIN 100,000 MEN

By Associated Press. MEXICO CITY, Jan. 15.—According to plans of the War Department the Mexican army, in 1920, will contain 100,000 men. Recruiting has been stopped. Only native Mexicans will be admitted into the military service. Soldiers of immature years are being discharged and other reforms calculated to increase the efficiency of the troops are being adopted. These facts were given out for the announced purpose of disproving rumors that the government planned to increase the army to 400,000. One hundred thousand, it is said, are sufficient to maintain order in the republic.

Times to Install Press With 30,000 An Hour Capacity

The Times Publishing Company has closed a contract with the Duplex Printing Press Co. of Battle Creek, Michigan for the early installation of a 16 page tubular press in its press room. The new press will have a capacity for 30,000 papers an hour and will represent an investment of more than \$21,000 when installed in the Times pressroom.

This press will be the fastest newspaper press in Texas and will be the first press of the type to be installed in the state.

The installation of the new press has long been looked forward to by the management as a great and necessary step in the building of a greater newspaper in the greater city of Wichita Falls. It is expected that its installation will enable the Times to meet every demand of its growing circulation and the increasing number of its pages.

The circulation of the Times has grown steadily from the day of its first publication nearly twelve years ago. The installation of a Duplex flatbed press with a capacity of 4500 to 5000 eight pages an hour a few years ago was regarded as a venture that was hardly justified by existing conditions then. But its circulation has outgrown a press of that capacity and a severe strain has been put upon the pressroom to meet the demands of the Times circulation which is now growing more rapidly than ever.

The new press will mean a bigger and better paper and will enable the Times to extend its circulation and influence throughout this section of the state. The Times means to keep step with 10-story, million dollar business in Wichita Falls.

WILSON REFUSES TO RECOGNIZE ALL ITALIAN CLAIMS

UNWILLING THAT THEY EXTEND TERRITORY BEYOND TRIESTE AND TARENT.

POSITION IS EXPLAINED

By Associated Press. LONDON, Jan. 15.—In commenting upon the conference between Premier Orlando of Italy and President Wilson last Friday, persons in touch with the Italian mission declared that the premier was surprised at Mr. Wilson's attitude, says the Paris correspondent of the Daily Mail. "President Wilson was firm in his refusal to recognize Italian claims beyond Trieste and Tarent," the correspondent writes. "It is known that Foreign Minister Sonnino of Italy demands an important part of the Dalmatian coast as well as Fiume, while Premier Orlando would be content to give up the Dalmatian coast if safe of Fiume. It is reported that even at this point, Mr. Wilson was unwilling to give way."

While the majority of the inhabitants of Fiume are Italian, that port is the natural outlet for the Adriatic. It is therefore claimed that a few thousand Italians in Fiume are not to be balanced against the needs for a sea outlet for the commercial necessities of the Jugo-Slavs demand an outlet to the Adriatic and that Italy ignores these necessities, she may incur the enmity of the population and create a new danger to the peace of Europe.

CLAIMS OF GREECE ARE LAID BEFORE PEACE CONGRESS

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 15.—Greece has laid before the peace conference a memorandum signed by Premier Venizelos setting forth the Greek claims in the settlement of the war. The memorandum says the Hellenic nation consist of 8,250,000 persons, of whom 55 per cent live in the Kingdom of Greece and the remainder outside its limits.

Greece asks for northern Epirus, Thrace (except Constantinople), parts of the vilayets of Asia Minor and all islands in the Aegean which are ethnographically, geographically and economically Greek. Predominance of population is claimed by Greece in all these territories.

"Since Constantinople, according to the twelfth point of President Wilson's program, can not remain under Turkish rule, the memorandum declares, "the natural solution would be to award Constantinople to Greece and to establish international guarantees for the freedom of the straits."

TELL STORY OF HASTILY BUILT SUB CRUISERS

LONDON, Jan. 15.—The admiralty today permitted to be made public the real story of the submarine cruisers the British successfully constructed at the time the Germans were boasting of their super-submarine. The British craft have two funnels and make 24 knots an hour on the surface under steam power. They carry from eight to ten torpedo tubes, two or three four inch guns and also are equipped with internal combustion motors for surface cruising.

SUPREME COUNCIL OF PEACE CONFERENCE HAS RESUMED ITS SESSIONS

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 15.—The supreme council of the peace congress resumed its sessions at 10:30 o'clock today. Those in attendance were Premier Clemenceau and Foreign Minister Pichon for France; President Wilson and Secretary of State Lansing for the United States; Premier Lloyd George and Foreign Secretary Balfour for Great Britain; Foreign Minister Sonnino for Italy, and Viscount Chinda and Baron Matsui for Japan.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 15.—With the resumption today of the meetings preliminary to the peace conference it is apparent that the movement to create a league of nations is being carried on by two forces having the same object but differing as to the means for making it effective. One of these represent the contentions that the conditions of the league must be backed by its combined physical forces, while the other represents the view of the peace conference that the league should be a common world police force.

Diplomats seem impressed with the view that both ideas are moving toward a common goal which for example, might provide that the nations could reserve for each individual cause their decision, whether they would utilize armed force or avail themselves of other means.

There is reason to believe that such an arrangement would meet with the support of some of the European statesmen and there is nothing to indicate that it would be rejected by the American representatives.

The work before today's session of the supreme council comprised completion of the allotment of representation of the various nations and a further delving into the question of whether Russia should have delegates in the larger body. In a large sense, the work today may be compared to that of a credit committee convened prior to the sitting of an American national convention.

The preliminary session will continue work on the question continuing with the expectation of having it entirely disposed of by Saturday, when the first formal sitting of the peace congress will be held.

DISATISFACTION OVER APPORTIONMENT PLANS PARIS, Jan. 15.—While the apportionment of delegates to the peace congress has not yet been officially made known, the list published today at Monday's session of the supreme council has caused an unfavorable impression among some of the missions, particularly those of the Serbians and Belgians, who are notably dissatisfied with the giving of three delegates to Brazil while they are only permitted two each in the case of Belgium.

Logically, it is pointed out, it ought to be divided equally between the two countries. With only two delegates, the representative of one party must needs be dropped.

BUSINESS IN LIMA IS PARALYZED BY GENERAL STRIKE

By Associated Press. LIMA, PERU, Jan. 15.—Business in Lima has been paralyzed by a general strike declared yesterday. Maritime workers and men engaged in transportation service are idle. The strikers have pulled up rails on several roads and have attempted to cut off the city's water supply. A few trains were operated last night by the military authorities.

PRESIDENT TO HAVE SURVEY OF THE DAMAGE TO FRANCE AND BELGIUM

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 15.—President Wilson will have before him an independent estimate of the actual physical damage suffered by France and Belgium during the war, when the peace congress reaches the stage of discussing indemnities. A survey is now being planned and will probably be conducted by more than 500 army officers chosen especially for the work. Many difficulties are presented, for in many of the devastated regions there are absolutely no records available upon which to base an estimate of what existed there before German guns and troops ground the towns and villages into heaps of ruins.

DRY AMENDMENT IS NOW RATIFIED BY 33 STATES

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, Jan. 15.—Within twenty hours and possibly sooner the United States probably will have been voted dry by action of the legislatures of thirty six states which constitute the 75 per cent necessary to read prohibition into the constitution.

Up to one o'clock this afternoon the legislatures of thirty-three states had ratified the amendment and one house of two legislatures had voted to ratify. The states which ratified today were Colorado, Iowa and Oregon. This left but three more states necessary. BERLIN, Tuesday, Jan. 14.—Dr. Karl Liebknecht, the spartanac leader, George Ledebour, head of the revolutionary independent socialist element and the immediate supporters of the revolutionary chiefs were so certain that their plans for the recent uprising would succeed that they had prepared a proclamation dated January 6 in which the Ebert-Scheidemann government was declared deposed and formal announcement made that the government had been taken over by the revolutionists.

the damage inflicted will, therefore, take many weeks, and probably months. In the opinion of some observers the bill of actual damages, when computed, will be so great that the Entente nations probably will be more concerned with the ability of the German people to foot the bill as it will stand than with the possibility of exacting further damages in the nature of punitive indemnities and war costs. President Wilson's attitude toward the question of what indemnities are to be exacted from Germany has been made plain on several occasions.

He believes that damages should be restricted to restitution, reparation and restoration and should not be extended to financial punishment of the German people.

WICHITA CLUB HEARS DISCUSSION OF ROAD PROBLEM

MR. FOWLER OF STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION IS GUEST AT LUNCHEON.

MORE MONEY NEEDED

Standing Committees of Club For The Year Are Announced By President Martin.

Information that legislation was being considered for the organization of shoring districts containing more than one county for road improvement work, was divulged in an address at the regular weekly luncheon of the Wichita Club by Mr. Fowler of the State Highway Commission, who is here to inspect the roads in Wichita county for which state and federal aid has been voted. Mr. Fowler said that a bill providing for such legislation was now being drafted.

He said that he knew of no place in Texas where the need of improved highways was so acute as in Wichita Falls. The traffic here, he said, was unequalled in any part of the state. He said that both the state and federal governments wanted the best roads possible to be built. He said it was poor economy to build roads for \$5,000 or \$6,000 a mile which would require repairs before they were completed. \$15,000 to \$20,000 would provide roads that would not have to be touched for twenty years.

Want Additional Bonds. Following Mr. Fowler, Mr. Huff asserted that in Wichita county we could not get the kind of roads we wanted for the money that had been voted and his suggestion that the Wichita Club act with other organizations in a movement to vote an additional three-quarter of a million dollars in bonds to provide the right kind of roads was enthusiastically received.

R. H. Martin, president of the Club, suggested that the Club members set their minds to some kind of a plan to give relief to the housing problem here and mentioned this subject for discussion at the next meeting.

T. B. Smock, chairman of the committee appointed at the last meeting to investigate the possibility of securing the buildings at Call Field to use to shelter homeless people here, reported that there was little prospect that the government would let the camp be used for this purpose.

GLOWING VISIONS OF WICHITA FALLS

(Continued from Page 1)

West Texas and praised the work of the men who were building Wichita Falls. "The words of the philosophers and of the men with long hair are all right and fine," he said, "but we must place our dependence in the man who presents opportunity for labor and for capital and who does things that contribute to our well being and happiness." He said he had been watching with great deal of curiosity the dispute between Fort Worth and Dallas as to which was the oil town. "There are certain things," he said, "that are so well known that nobody ever stops to assert that they are so. Everybody knows them. Why, I never had to be told that my name was Kay, its just as well known that nobody we know were the oil town. Not only do we know it but these outsiders know it."

"On the Pennsylvania railroad at this minute," he said, "powerful engines are fighting the steep slopes of the Alleghenies and the drifted snow in order that men may get to Burk Burnett before it is everlastingly too late to get two and one-half acres for \$15,000."

He pictured a brakeman on the B. and O. stumbling over cars of pigs and machinery with a waybill in his hand and muttering "where in the name is Burk Burnett? Yes, our name is great among Gentiles," he said. "What are we going to do about it?" he asked. It was our duty, he continued, to see that our town was the right kind of a town; that it was a clean town and that the right kind of people were encouraged to live here. He wanted to see it great in finance, great in education, great in industry, great in religion. He wanted to see a fine place to live in and a safe place to die in.

Referring to the housing problem he explained to the representative of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce that we had plenty of beds "but we let 'em sit up as an advertisement. The man who sits around our depot these long winter nights because he can't find a bed is going home and tell the folk that Wichita Falls is sure town."

E. B. Hendricks, who has lately opened a law office here, spoke on the theme, "Vim, Vigor and Vitality of Oil." "No man," he declared, "ought to say, I'm too busy making wealth to provide for the future. Wichita Falls, he believed, was the most wonderful city in the world.

From Top of Loop.
Lieut. Glen McCaddam gave a pre-

view of "North Texas from the top of a Loop." Mr. McCaddam, after some clever word acrobatics made his loop in the vicinity of Bowie and from the bottom of the loop upside down pictured what he saw. He pictured a chess board of 10,000 square miles within his vision, the section lines forming the squares with Lake Worth at the east, Lake Wichita to the west, Red River to the north and innumerable tanks and streams gleaming like silver.

"The whole view is like a gigantic chess board with the villages as castles, the individuals kings and the oil derricks the pawns. I do not believe there is a similar area within the United States with such tremendous possibilities," he said.

Among the possibilities to be developed he mentioned irrigation and the oil industry. Among other things he suggested for Wichita Falls was a thoroughly modern system of street cleaning. His suggestion prompted enthusiastic applause. He closed by reciting verses beginning "When you knock at four town you knock at your self."

From Our Skyscraper.
"From Our Skyscraper" was C. W. Reid's topic. Mr. Reid paid tribute to the pioneers of Wichita Falls who had built the first important buildings here. From the top of the new ten story building to be built by the National Bank of Commerce and K. J. Bashara he glimpsed a dam across the Big Wichita and a great irrigation system, a packing plant, the new hotel building, a Y. M. C. A. building, good roads radiating in every direction from Wichita Falls, interurban lines, a railroad running north and south through the world's greatest oil field.

Don Farnsworth of New York City who was introduced by Secretary Johnson spoke on "The Modern Commercial Organization," outlining the plan and scope of such an organization. He represented every interest in the city, he said, and should work for the greatest good to the greatest number. No phase of life ought to be overlooked in its plans. The man who does not contribute to the support of the civic organizations

of his town is stealing from his neighbor, he asserted.

Senator Brelsford Speaks.
One of the best addresses of the evening was made by Senator Brelsford of Eastland county. Mr. Brelsford's talk was replete with wit yet was filled with sober thought. Of all the cities of Texas, he declared, there was no city that characterized the spirit of West Texas and what was best in it as does Wichita Falls. He praised the unity and discipline he saw here. Speaking of the unity, he said, "I don't believe there is a single faltering step in the ranks."

The wonderful development in this section, he reminded, had brought with it a responsibility that was al-

most ominous. He expressed with confidence the belief that the next twelve months would see work well under way on a railroad that would link Tulsa and Ardmore, Okla., and Wichita Falls, Eastland, Brownwood, Brady and San Antonio.

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TWO ARE DEAD AS RESULT EXPLOSION EARLY LAST NIGHT

MRS. WALTER RHODES AND MRS. R. W. FERGUSON ARE BURNED TO DEATH.

HOUSE IS WRECKED

Supposed To Have Been Caused From Gas Pipe Being Left Unoccupied in One Of The Rooms.

Mrs. Walter Rhoads was instantly killed, her body being charred to a coal, and Mrs. R. W. Ferguson, her sister, received burns which caused her death within a few hours, as a result of a gas explosion occurring at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson at 1305 Fifth street about nine o'clock last night, which completely wrecked the three room house and its contents. The explosion is thought to have been caused from a gas flow pipe in an adjoining room to the one occupied by the Ferguson family, possibly left open by a party who had moved away Tuesday. When Mrs. Ferguson turned the gas on in her room the flow at once filled the empty one and when the door connecting the two rooms was opened the gas rushed into the one where the stove was burning and in an instant the entire building was aflame, so loud was the explosion that it was heard for six or eight blocks away.

Neighbors attracted by the sound of the explosion and the flames of the building rushed to the scene immediately. Within a few seconds after the building had become a mass of flames Mrs. Ferguson ran from the house and fell in the yard un-

conscious, and her body burned almost beyond recognition. She was hurried to the General Hospital but died this morning at 10 o'clock without regaining consciousness. It was impossible for neighbors who reached the building first to recover the body of Mrs. Rhoads and not until the firemen had cleared away the ruins of the house and its furniture, was the body found. From the position where it was found it was evident that the woman had made her way partly to the door leading outside when she fell exhausted and her clothing a mass of flames. The body was burned to a crisp.

Fire Chief Investigates. Investigations made by Fire Chief McClure this morning showed that the flow pipe extending into the room which had been occupied by the other family had been left unoccupied. When Mrs. Ferguson turned the gas on in her room it did not take the other room but a few minutes to be completely filled from the gas pouring through the three-quarter inch pipe. There was no stove in the vacant room and the explosion occurred when the door connecting the two rooms was opened, which let the gas pour into the one in which the stove was burning. Instead of the usual explosion the women striking a match in the one which was empty, as was thought last night.

Buildings Is Destroyed. All trucks from the central fire station were rushed to the burning building within a few minutes after the explosion occurred but when they arrived the building was completely enveloped in flames and a portion of it had already fallen down. The building was a three room structure and was valued at fifteen hundred dollars. Buildings on both sides of the one destroyed were slightly damaged and had it not been for the rapid work by the firemen and the fact that they were only slightly damaged.

Funeral Service Held. Funeral services for both women were held this afternoon at 3:30 at the residence of the Rhoads family, 402 Bluff avenue, with Rev. Powers, pastor of the First Baptist church, officiating. The bodies were buried here.

The parents of the unfortunate woman, Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Bruce, Marietta, Okla., were notified of the tragedy last night and arrived in Wichita Falls over the Katy today. Besides her husband Mrs. Rhoads is survived by a six-year-old son, who was not in the house at the time the explosion occurred and escaped injury. Mrs. Ferguson is survived by her husband, who was recently discharged from the U. S. Army at Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

Babe Deserted By Woman Here Who Planned to Elope

A small baby only a few months old deserted by its parents, and its mother preparing to run away with another man, were some of the facts unearthed in a case which the police department is working on today. The baby was found left with another family near the factory, without any means to support it, and although the man and wife are not separated, the police say the wife was planning to elope with another man without making any provisions for the child, which had not left its mother's breast.

The woman is being held by the police and the man is also under surveillance. Chief Smith declared that the parents must either support the child or they will be held in jail. It is expected the grand jury, now in session, will investigate the case. The police were informed of the intention of the woman after she had left the child with a neighbor family and she was arrested here immediately.

Examination Is Waived and Bond Fixed at \$1,000

Ernest Bashum of this city, who was arrested at Fort Worth Monday and is charged in district court here with stealing an automobile, waived an examining hearing when arraigned before Justice Arrington this morning, and was remanded to jail on bond of \$1,000, to await the action of the grand jury, which is now in session. Bashum is charged with stealing a Ford car belonging to Avis Taylor, 1008 Lamar street, last Friday night. Sheriff R. L. McFall went to Fort Worth Tuesday and returned with the prisoner yesterday afternoon. Bashum pleaded not guilty to the complaint.

BERLIN'S LONG WEEK OF BOLSHEVISM ENDS

By Associated Press. BERLIN, Tuesday, Jan. 14.—Berlin's long week of bolshevism is finally ended. Here and there scattered desperadoes, mostly youths, still fire occasionally from their hidden positions and during the night attempts are made by small bands of the followers of Dr. Karl Liebknecht to revive the reign of terror. They are insignificant, however, compared with what has passed. A few spartanists tried to recapture the Charlottenberg police headquarters the night after it was taken by government troops.

Over 200 Are Killed.

Losses inflicted on each side during the last week are as yet estimated only roughly but it is believed that they will greatly exceed 200 dead and 1,000 wounded. The overwhelming majority of these are bolsheviks. The reinstatement and arming of the police gives the government a new force of trained men who know the criminal world and whose absence during the first days of the revolution gave the disorderly element a free hand. Police records, including those of the Bertillon system, were destroyed as was at first reported.

Property Loss Great.

Property losses during the week of terror amount to tens of millions of marks. In addition to the damage to newspaper plants and government buildings merchants' losses through looting are very high, one youth being captured with 60,000 marks worth of jewels which he had stolen. In some streets near the police headquarters every store was systematically looted. Bolshevist troops holding the Silesian station had so much butter that they used it to grease their guns and boots.

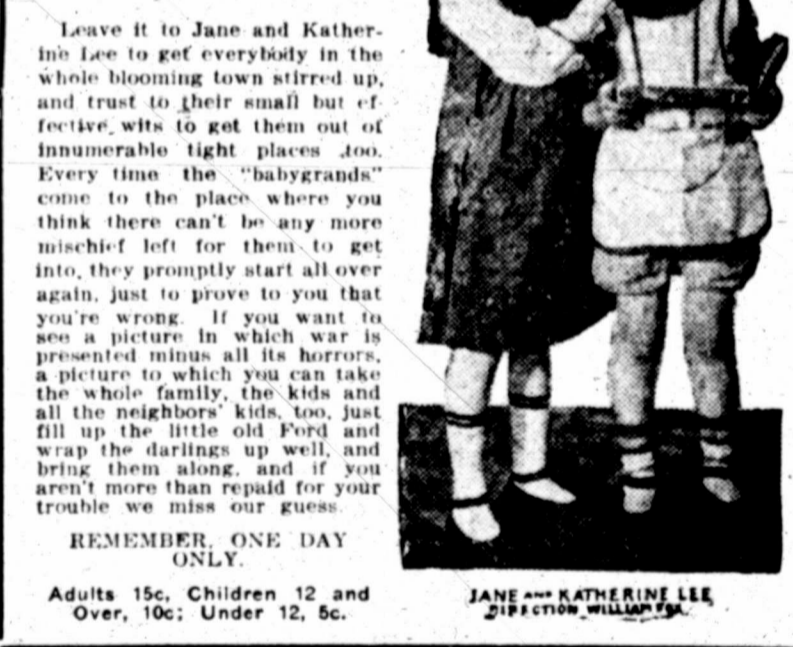

NEW YORK, Jan. 15.—The cotton market showed weakness early today, to continued liquidation and southern selling. The opening was steady at a decline of 20 points to an advance of nine points; with new crop months relatively firm on buying of October by houses with Liverpool and southern connections. There was also some trade buying over the near months but the demand was quickly supplied and the market became very nervous and unsettled before the end of the first hour with active months selling some 40 to 50 points not lower. March contracts declined from 25.35 to 25.00 and May from 28.85 to 28.45. Southern selling was considerably in evidence in the early break and was accompanied by reports that the hedges were being sold against spot supplies but around 25.00 for March and 28.45 for May offerings became more active. Prices rallied later on covering and a moderate demand from trade sources with March ruling around 25.34 and May 28.83 shortly after mid-day. There was a renewal of general active selling during the early afternoon. Except for a little trade buying and covering no demand appeared to have developed on the mid-day rally and there was continued southern selling. The break uncovered stop orders as prices reached the low level of the morning and the market sold about 55 to 60 points net lower with March touching 24.85 and May 28.30. Cotton closed steady.

MOTOR BUS LINE TO BURKBURNETT STARTS ON FEB. 1

By February 1 the Yellow Motor Bus Company will be ready to put a bus service on between Burkburnett and Wichita Falls, according to the announcement of Lieutenants Levy and Simmons, the representatives of the company, who met with directors of the Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday and Wednesday. They met with much encouragement in their proposed service, Lieutenant Levy stated this afternoon and will make a favorable report to the head offices of the service in Waco.

Members of the transportation bureau of the Chamber of Commerce will work with Lieutenants Simmons and Levy, who will be in charge of the line at this place, in securing a station for the buses in this city, and will give their assistance with the other details that are necessary. The two young men, who have recently been discharged from Camp MacArthur, will be in Wichita Falls for several days before February 1, completing the necessary final arrangements.

Four big buses, which are now available, will be put into use, running on an hourly schedule from early morning until after midnight. Lieutenant Levy stated this afternoon. These buses have a carrying capacity of fifty passengers. One feature of the new service will be in enabling residents of Wichita Falls who are employed at Burkburnett to return to their homes at night, instead of having to board in Burkburnett. The buses will also help solve the problem of transportation of the hundreds of investors and sight-seers that are coming from all parts of the country to Wichita Falls and the Burkburnett oil fields, who will find the hourly schedule very convenient. The price, which will approximate that charged by the railroads, according to Lieutenant Levy, will be another feature to commend the service.

The buses will be electrically lighted and steam heated, finished in the same manner as a passenger coach. They are the same type of bus as those used on Fifth avenue, New York, except they are without the upper deck, he added. Four buses will be used in the beginning.

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LORD ROBERT CECIL EXPLAINS VIEWS ON LEAGUE OF NATIONS

HAS LITTLE TO SAY RELATIVE TO LIMITATION OF ARMAMENT.

MUST WAIT EVENTS

Sees No Conflict With Monroe Doctrine in Organization of Proposed League.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Tuesday, Jan. 14.—Lord Robert Cecil, who discussed with American journalists his views as to the work of a league of nations had little to say relative to the limitation of armaments. He expressed the opinion, however, that the league of nations "certainly would provide for the limitation and decrease of present armaments."

He declared that this feature of the work to be done is of deepest concern although no definite agreement has as yet been reached. He said that the league if formed, would go away with all treaties inconsistent with its tenets including compacts providing for a balance of power.

Monroe Doctrine not involved. Asked what effect the information of a league of nations would have upon the Monroe doctrine, Lord Robert asserted he could see no conflict with the doctrine. He said that the nations were raised as to what would happen in case Mexico or a South American country did something that caused trouble with the league and Lord Robert replied:

"Then I think an arrangement could be made by which America could act in behalf of the league." Regarding the admission of the central powers and their allies to the league, Lord Robert said they should be admitted, if they showed an inclination to do the right thing.

Speaking of Germany he said: "We must await events. If she turns over a new leaf and tries to repair the damage she has done there is no reason why she should not join. The league is for the good of humanity, and not for any select group, it will benefit her if she comes in."

Austria, on account of her internal troubles, is not yet ready for the league, Lord Robert said. Dealing with another specific instance he declared it would be an injustice to exclude Bohemia, saying:

Not to blame for war. "She was not to blame for the war and is progressive." Lord Robert said that the league might in some cases take over administrative control of certain territories of great international interest. He said that Palestine and Constantinople might be in this class. He stated that he accepted President Wilson's view that the league must be constituted by the present congress, adding:

"Otherwise it will become an impossibility." Lord Robert felt that the peace congress should get some approval of principles at the beginning of the meeting but was of the opinion that the details should be worked out with care by committees which would report to the peace congress.

All Favor League. Questioned as to the attitude of the Allies as a whole toward the league, Lord Robert said that every one of them favored a league of some sort and that they were not separated by any vital point. As to the scope of the league, he said, there were still many purely legal disputes between nations which he thought to be settled by an arbitration tribunal outside the league. In discussing the probable efficacy of the plan to force obedience to decrees by the league, Lord Robert declared: "If we had had a conference on the reply of Serbia to Austria and had not allowed them to fight for a set period, there would have been no war. If the situation had been known to the world, no action could have forced its people to fight."

German Surrender Is Encouragement To Propagandists

Associated Press Mail Correspondent. MEXICO CITY, Dec. 15.—Germany's surrender served only to spur German propagandists in Mexico to loftier heights of mendacity. In a country where access to news is free than it is in Mexico, these words appear to be the favorites of the anti-journalist since Germany's capitulation. Developments resulting from the return to Mexico of Felix F. Palavicini also are being awaited with interest. Mr. Palavicini, founder of El Universal, led the pro-Entente journalistic campaign for months during the time when Germany appeared at the crest of her military successes. Heinrich Von Eckardt, the German minister, (since re-called) and the Austrian representative not long ago said to have secured the publication in well known papers of "official statements" that the German fleet had not surrendered, but was ready to fight the Allies and that the new Germany was as strong as the old ever was.

REMARKABLE "HUSH" BOAT IS NEARING COMPLETION

LONDON, Dec. 15.—There is now lying at Clydebank, nearly completed, a remarkable "hush" boat of the British navy, which, according to the shipping paper, Fairplay, is something notable in the history of naval architecture. This is the Hood, a battle cruiser of extraordinary size, speed and gun power and which would, says Fairplay, have inaugurated new methods of naval fighting and shown the Germans that we are still far ahead of them in naval construction.

Captain Perkins Praises Work of Boys Over There

Mrs. Mary Ochsner of this city has received the following letter from Capt. D. M. Perkins in answer to an inquiry regarding her nephew, Corp. Ralph E. Scott: Dec. 15, 1918.

Mr. Dear Mrs. Ochsner: Your letter of the 18th of Nov. received today. Made a trip over to Machine Gun Co. 142nd Inf., and today saw Corp. Ralph E. Scott about whom inquiry is made. He is alive and well, in fact, getting fat. (Claims to have written all of you. The mails are irregular over here.) This machine gun company took a glorious part in the battles of this division over here. It went into action first at Somme Py, then Manchant, Luffincourt, Grand Pre, St. Etienne, Chardenny, Quilly Vouziers, Churilly and finally at St. Marie and Attigny, where we drove the Hun across the Aisne river. Of all these assaults I believe the one at St. Marie and Attigny the most notable. Having been informed of the zero hour which was 3 o'clock in the afternoon I went over to that sector to see the boys go over the top. The barrage put down for 30 minutes by the machine gun company was one of the finest pieces of work ever seen over here on a battle field, our boys assaulting St. Marie took the town with the loss of only 14 men killed, and captured several hundred besides the dead on the field. We all feel sure that the success of this action was due almost entirely to the machine gun company of which your nephew, Corp. Scott, is a valuable member.

We are now back in a rest area refitting either to go home or to Germany. Our boys want to go home as we feel like we have paid the price and drank our fill of the War God Mar's cup of sorrow and suffering and we all want to go home to our loved ones in good old Texas.

Was glad I be able to give you the information requested.

The stockholders were informed at the meeting that the bank deposits for the day, January 13, approximated five millions of dollars, the present high mark of deposits for the bank, and Mr. Snider in reviewing the eight years of his stay here recalled how the bank had grown from an institution with \$700,000 deposits to one whose assets were now seven millions of dollars.

Keep Pace With City. Tuesday's action in increasing the capital and surplus to one million dollars puts the bank in the class with city banking institutions, and shows that the stockholders are intent on having their establishment keep pace with the phenomenal growth of Wichita Falls and surrounding territory. In addition to having been most successful during the past year in the ordinary banking channels, the City National Bank was fortunate in having 20 acres of ground in the Burk Burnett tennis pool, that now has several producing wells on it, and may be expected to contribute materially to the profits account of the institution.

Announcement will be made within a few days of the new directors of the bank election of which was authorized Tuesday. The increase in stock is to be placed with local people, it is announced.

HUNGER RIOTS IN PETROGRAD ARE OF SERIOUS NATURE

By Associated Press. STOCKHOLM, Jan. 15.—Hunger riots took place in Petrograd on Saturday and Sunday, according to advices received here. Ten thousand people paraded through the streets shouting for bread and were fired upon by bolshevist troops, who are said to have been Letts. Desperate from hunger the crowds are reported to have asked the soldiers to fire upon them.

Dispatches state that not a single piece of bread is to be found now in Petrograd and that unground oats are being given to the people.

Propagandists, disguised as refugees, are said to have been sent into Finland by the bolshevists. The police there have recently discovered several organizations which are alleged to be plotting a new insurrection.
