

FAVORABLE REPORT IS MADE TO THE SENATE ON TWO AMENDMENTS

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 17.—When the senate met today, senate committee on constitutional amendments made a favorable report on the state-wide and woman suffrage amendments to the constitution. There was no further action taken on the resolutions at this time.

Senator Floyd had adopted a resolution congratulating Senator Morris Sheppard on the adoption by thirty-six states of the national prohibition amendment. Sheppard being the author of the amendment.

Senator Dudley resigned from the chairmanship of the committee on claims and accounts on the grounds that his other duties precluded giving attention to this chairmanship.

The governor sent up his recess appointments for the confirmation of the Senate. On motion of Senator McNealus, the Senate decided to go into executive session on Monday, January 20, to consider the confirmation of these appointments.

Senator Bailey introduced a bill repealing the so-called Ferguson lieutenant law, in presenting the bill he said he did not intend any politics in the measure.

Other bills introduced by McNealus—Amending the child labor law as recommended by the labor department; McNealus—Prohibiting the employment of aliens on public works in Texas; Caldwell—Fixing the salary of the clerk in the third court of civil appeals at \$3500 and deputy at \$1500.

GOVERNOR WOULD PROVIDE FOR CONSUMPTIVE PATIENTS

AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 17.—Laws to provide for the detention of the incurable consumptive who was termed a menace to the health of the community in which he lived were advocated by Governor Hobby today in his address to the state legislature. He recommended the adoption of suggestions of the Texas Anti-Tuberculosis Sanitarium which would compel the registration of all cases of tuberculosis with a severe penalty for failure to register. He also suggested regarding prevention and avoidance of this disease be taught regularly in the public schools.

WHAT AN ABOMINABLE FALSEHOOD, SAYS WILSON

"I saw yesterday a telegram addressed to the New York Tribune," he said, "in which it was said that President Wilson has threatened to withdraw all his troops and himself retire if certain stipulations of his were not granted. When I showed this telegram to Mr. Wilson this morning he replied to me: 'What an abominable falsehood!'"

When this dispatch was shown today to Garett Garret, managing editor of the New York Tribune, he said: "The Tribune has never received any such statement from Paris and none even remotely resembling such a statement as was denied by President Wilson has ever been published in the Tribune."

From this incident it appears that notwithstanding assurances to the contrary, dispatches filed by American correspondents in Paris apparently are still being censored and perverted.

The situation in Germany is very uncertain, however, and it may be that the men still with the German colors may number far above the estimate.

DR. KARL LIEBKNECHT AND ROSA LUXEMBURG ARE SHOT AND KILLED

By Associated Press. BERLIN, Thursday, Jan. 16.—Dr. Karl Liebknecht has been shot and killed while trying to escape as he was being taken to prison, according to a Frankfurt Gazette. It is reported that Rosa Luxemburg, Dr. Liebknecht's chief lieutenant, was also shot dead after being beaten into unconsciousness by a crowd of Berliners.

When it became known yesterday Dr. Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg were at the Hotel Eden in the western part of the city, a crowd rapidly congregated and stormed the hotel lobby to lay hands on them. Both were spirited out of the hotel into a hotel but the mob forestalled the attempt of the troops to save Friedrich Liebknecht. She was beaten into unconsciousness and thrown into an automobile by the crowd which intended to take her to prison.

Second Mob Appears. A few blocks down the street the machine was halted by a second mob and when the presence of Friedrich Liebknecht became known, a man jumped on the running board of the car and shot her through the head. The body was dragged from the car and carried off. It is supposed that it was thrown into the canal, but it has not been found.

Was Radical Socialist. Karl August August Friedrich Liebknecht was born at Leipzig on August 13, 1871. After being graduated from the University of Leipzig he entered politics as a socialist. He was a radical opponent of the militarist policies of Germany from the first of his political career and this attitude brought about his trial on a charge of high treason in 1907 following the appearance of an anti-military pamphlet written by him. The charge of high treason was not proved but he was convicted on a less serious count and sent to prison for eighteen months. Dr. Liebknecht visited America in 1910 and lectured in New York during his stay in that city.

Identified by Monogram. When Dr. Liebknecht was arrested at the home of a relative on Mannheim Street, he was identified by a monogram "K. L." which was discovered on his shirt. Dr. Liebknecht's capture was due to a telephone conversation overheard by detectives in which he and Rosa Luxemburg agreed to meet at the home of a woman named Marianne in the suburbs of Wilmersdorf. Marianne's home, the police said, had long been one of the gathering places of the Spartacists.

Desperate Dash for Freedom. Dr. Liebknecht's attempt to escape was the last desperate dash for freedom on the part of a man who had left prison last October. When the automobile which was carrying him broke down he was warned against any attempt at flight. The officer in charge asked Dr. Liebknecht, who was bleeding from a wound in the head he had received through being struck by a cane in the hands of some member of the mob, to walk a few hundred yards to the next street where a new automobile could be found.

PLAN VOTE FOR STRIKE JULY 4TH BEHALF MOONEY

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—The resolutions committee of the International Workers Defense League reported a program in behalf of Thomas J. Mooney today. The committee recommended that a committee of five be sent to Washington to demand federal intervention to free Mooney from prison, a campaign of publicity and, if necessary, a call to a general strike July 4, first, however, submitting the strike call to a referendum vote of workers.

FRENCH STEAMER STRIKES MINE AND 500 ARE DROWNED

By Associated Press. ROME, Jan. 17.—The French steamer Chapiro has struck a floating mine in the straits of Messina, sinking in a few minutes. Five hundred passengers, most of them Serbian and Russian, have been drowned. Another steamer saved 150 of those on board.

GERMAN ARMISTICE EXTENDED A MONTH

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 17.—The German armistice has been extended one month by the commissioners who have concluded their sessions at Trepas. The clauses offered by the Allies concerning agricultural implements, Russian prisoners of war, naval conditions and the restitution of material stolen by the Germans from invaded countries, were signed by the enemy delegates.

The meeting between Marshal Foch and the German delegates was featured by protests by Matthias Erzberger, representing the Germans, against the status in which Germany was left during the period of the armistice. The financial and economic dictatorship of the Entente was the theme of his main protest.

AGREEMENT IS SIGNED BY MATTHIAS ERZBERGER

By Associated Press. AMSTERDAM, Jan. 17.—The armistice between the Allies and Germany has been extended, the agreement to that effect being signed by Matthias Erzberger, the German armistice commissioner at Trepas late Wednesday, according to a Berlin dispatch received here.

When will you raise the blockade? Herr Erzberger asked. "The food conditions in Germany are daily growing worse and hunger will produce a mental state which the Allies cannot desire. Your people themselves are not proof against a world revolution."

ly in November, resulting in the abdi-
cation of Emperor William, his flight
and the establishment of a socialist
government Dr. Liebknecht played a
prominent part.

Leads Radical Faction.
When the Ebert government had
been in existence only a few days Dr.
Liebknecht became leader of a radical
socialist faction known as the spar-
tacus element. Rumors came to the
world that a terrorist revolution was
imminent and this developed late in
December. The rising tide of radical-
ism reached its crest during the first
week of January when the spartacus
came into armed conflict with troops
loyal to the Ebert government. After
a week of fighting the spartacus were
defeated. During the conflict it was
reported (times that Dr. Liebknecht
had been killed.

Rosa Luxemburg a Writer.
Rosa Luxemburg was formerly
principal editor of the Vorwarts, the
organ of the German socialists. She
often came into conflict with the au-
thorities and twice underwent impris-
onment for freely expressing her view
on subject connected with the gov-
ernment.

She was consistently opposed to the
war and at one time her writings
brought about criminal proceedings
against leaders of the socialist party.
When the revolution broke out in Ber-
lin early in November she was reputed
to be the leader of the most violent
group of socialists. Later she seconded
Dr. Liebknecht in his efforts to or-
ganize the spartacus element, al-
though she strenuously opposed Dr.
Liebknecht's proposal that elections
for the national assembly be held at
once.

When the spartacus uprising grew to
open rebellion against the Ebert gov-
ernment she played an important part
in urging the revolutionists to attack
the government troops. When it was
evident that the cause, at least for
the time being, was lost, she was re-
ported to have left Berlin. Her ar-
rest was reported on Tuesday.

**"DIVINE JUSTICE," SAYS
BERLIN NEWSPAPER**
BERLIN, Thursday, Jan. 16.—Vir-
tually the entire Berlin press re-
gards the fate of Dr. Karl Liebknecht
and Rosa Luxemburg, the spartacus
leaders, as having "something of di-
vine justice in it" as the Tages Zei-
tung phrases.

Of Dr. Liebknecht, the Lokal An-
zeiger says: "He brought his fate up-
on himself."
Continuing its comment, the news-
paper says:
"The murder of Rosa Luxemburg
shows how true have been the
indignation which has seized the
people of Berlin as the result of the
criminal activities of the spartacus.
Such summary judgments have ordi-
narily been foreign to the German
manner of thinking."
The press in general deplors the

lynching of Rosa Luxemburg but de-
clares she fell victim to the basest
passions which she herself had awak-
ened. Die Freiheit alone tries to lay
the responsibility upon the govern-
ment.

FORMER UNDER SECRETARY ARRESTED AND RELEASED

BASEL, Thursday, Jan. 16.—Karl
Kautsky, former under secretary in
the foreign affairs ministry of the
Ebert government and more recently
said to be supporting Dr. Karl Lieb-
knecht, was arrested at Berlin this
morning. He was later liberated.

Karl Liebknecht was the son of Wil-
helm Liebknecht, a close friend of
Karl Marx and a German socialist
leader. The elder Liebknecht suf-
fered eight months imprisonment for
starting a revolution in Baden in 1848.
He was elected a member of the north
German reichstag in 1867 and served
there almost continuously until his
death in 1900. For his opposition to
the Franco-Prussian war, the elder
Liebknecht was condemned to two
years imprisonment for treasonable
intentions. He has been looked upon
as the founder of the united German
socialists.

ESCORTING OFFICERS ARE PROVISIONALLY ARRESTED

AMSTERDAM, Jan. 17.—Officers
commanding the troops escorting Dr.
Karl Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg,
who were shot in the forest, were
killed, according to a Berlin dispatch
received here which adds that all per-
sons implicated in the incident will
be severely punished.

ROSA LUXEMBURG WAS AGGRESSIVE CHARACTER

BERLIN, Thursday, Jan. 16.—Rosa
Luxemburg was dubbed the "strongest
woman in Germany" but contrary to
the general impression she did not
have an active personal part in the
staging of the revolutionary move-
ments in Kiel and Berlin as she was
in prison until a few days before the
outbreaks of November.

However she lost no time in enter-
ing the fray and in a nine weeks cam-
paign she became even more radical
than Dr. Liebknecht, earning the title
of "high priestess of bolshevism."
She was small, fat, misshapen and
uncomely but keen eyed and mentally
vigorous. She possessed a remarkable,
almost masculine, vocal equipment.

Rosa was born in Russian Poland
December 25, 1870.

She married "Doctor" Luebeck in
Dresden for the sole purpose of ob-
taining German citizenship. They
parted the day after the wedding. The
Russian government did not recognize
the marriage, the purpose of which
was to prevent her extradition.
Her dual citizenship annoyed her
constantly at international gatherings
of radical socialists. Rosa was a
skilled parliamentarian, although
many of her intellectual comrades
called her a superficial agitator. For
Bebel, Haase and other German so-
cialists she was termed the socialist
party's "enfant terrible." She studied
in Zurich specializing on economics
but she was never permitted to par-
ticipate in the inner councils of the
radicals.

Cast a Spell Over Comrades.
Rosa seemed to cast a spell over
her German comrades with her fiery
fanaticism. Her effect on the masses
was even more pronounced. She
would step to the edge of the plat-
form the minute she was announced.

CAPT. HODGSON'S SENTENCE HAS BEEN COMMUTED

52,725 Accidents In State of Texas Year Ending Aug. 31

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 17.—For the fiscal year ending August 31, 1918, there were 52,725 accidents, of which 223 were fatal, reported to the state industrial accident board, according to its annual report filed today with the governor, and for this same period 12,510 claims for compensation were filed. Compensation to the amount of \$686,968, was paid out by the insurance companies writing workmen a compensation business, not including \$214,972, paid for medical services and hospital fees, which included, reaches a grand total of \$901,941 paid out. There were at the end of the year, 6,500 employers of labor who were subscribers under this act, representing approximately 27,000 employees.

Market Report

Cotton Market

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—The cotton market showed continued nervousness during today's early trading. Cables were lower than due and Liverpool was a considerable seller here at the opening, while there also was a good deal of selling for southern account and liquidation by some of yesterday's buyers for reaction. The opening was weak at a decline of 20 to 56 points in consequence and active months sold about 30 to 43 points under last night's closing figure during the first few minutes.

At 24.80 for March and 23.37 for May the decline was checked by trade buying and covering but rallies of 2 or 25 points were not fully maintained although the influence of the lower cables was offset to some extent by the bullish shipping news.

The early rates met increased selling, particularly for Liverpool and southern account. The market broke in consequence and before midday sold 55 to 75 points lower with January touching 25.60, March 24.50 and May 23.98. Offerings tapered off at this level and the tone was steadier during the middle of the day with prices showing rallies of several points on covering and trade buying.

The early afternoon rally carried the market about half a cent from the low level of the morning and the market was quiet around 2 o'clock with March selling at 24.90 and May at 23.55, or about 15 to 24 points net lower. Exports for the day were 25,195 bales. There was more trade buying during the afternoon and the appearance of these orders served to check selling for short account.

Cotton closed steady.

New Orleans Cotton.
NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 17.—There was some liquidation in the cotton market today and prices were 16 to 23 points lower. The market was steadier later by reports of continued wet and cold weather in the belt.

Bear pressure increased and carried the 48 to 63 points below yesterday's close. Around the middle of the morning short covering became heavy and at noon prices were back within 8 point or two of yesterday's final.

The market turned dull but steady, standing at 1 o'clock at a net decline of 15 to 17 points.

Cotton closed steady at a decline of six to 22 points.

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—Corn developed new strength today owing more or less to dispatches putting stress on the urgency of trans-Atlantic need of big supplies of food. Opening prices, which ranged from 1/4 to 1/2 higher with February \$1.34 1/2 to \$1.34 3/4 and May \$1.28 1/2 to \$1.29 1/4, were followed by a moderate reaction, and then by an upturn to above initial top figures.

Oats fluctuated in line with corn. After opening 1/4 to 3/4 up, with May 68 1/2 to 68 3/4, the market scored solid further gains.

Later the market reacted sharply as a result of reports of a free movement of the grain in northern Germany propaganda. They purported to record the activities of Dickinson and his conversations with persons high in official life including President Wilson, during the months that preceded the break with Germany.

The "coffin ship," he said, had been loaded with steel and other heavy cargo until those in charge said the remainder of the cargo must be of something very light. "We had no wheelbarrows or other implements," Mr. Thorne said, "and there were a lot of coffins that would be needed overseas, so we completed the cargo with coffins and the story went abroad about a shipload of coffins."

FEW CASES GENERAL DISEASE IN ARMY OF OCCUPATION

By Associated Press. PARIS, Thursday, Jan. 16.—In the American army of occupation there were during the week ending December 31, 1918, 10 cases of general disease representing a yearly rate of seven cases out of a population of one thousand. For the whole American expeditionary force the rate has been reduced to 34 per thousand yearly. Before the war the rate was between eighty and ninety per thousand which was itself much below the civilian rate. Five segregation camps have been established at embarkation centers where men found affected will be placed in quarantine until they can sail for the United States. The average time for quarantine, it is expected, will be at least forty days.

FRENCH WANT ONE OF "BIG BERTHAS" AS WAR SOUVENIR

Associated Press Mail Correspondent. PARIS, Dec. 28.—The French people want one of the German "Big Berthas" or super cannon which bombarded Paris to display in the Place de la Concorde as a souvenir of German frightfulness that failed of its purpose to destroy French morale.

The armistice does not stipulate that one of these instruments shall be surrendered but there is a movement to urge the government to demand it. There is no expectation that the Germans will include one of these weapons among the 2,500 guns they are required to give up under the armistice. Facts obtained by military experts show that the first guns that fired upon Paris on March 23 last numbered three. They were installed near Mont Jole, in the forest of Saint Gobain. Two were on the same railroad spur leading out of Laon while the third was a little further east in the vicinity of Crepy.

Shell Weighs 300 Pounds. According to the latest information, the guns were fired simultaneously more than 65 degrees, a charge of three hundred pounds of powder propelling the projectile to a height of one hundred thousand feet (nearly 19 miles) on its murderous mission to Paris. With every shot ten or twelve marine guns of sixteen or seventeen inch calibre fired simultaneously upon targets unknown in order to conceal the location of the super cannon. The shell was of 210 millimetre calibre (about eight inches.) It weighed three hundred pounds but the charge of explosive contained therein varied between thirty and forty pounds. In the manufacture of the shell resided an innovation of the Germans. It is said to have been made of special steel treated with tungsten so as to offer the maximum of resistance for a minimum of weight. The guns' only protection was in camouflage and it proved to be no protection at all as allied aviators soon located them. There is a report that several aviators Americans, French, British, lost their lives in locating the first three Berthas in the forest of St. Gobain but upon that point officials are silent.

Soissons-Chateau Thierry line by the counter-offensive of the Allies. Commandant Mirbel, the military expert, who organized the Turkish artillery before the Germans assumed charge of the military affairs of that country, told The Associated Press that the whole secret of the German long distance gun lay in the invention of a special high explosive powder which could only be used in guns constructed with a special steel of extraordinary resisting power. The Germans had commenced the generalization of the process and they were manufacturing several guns similar to their Soissons one but Marshal Foch's of incisive deranged their plans.

TWO ARE KILLED WHEN NITROGLYCERINE EXPLODES

By Associated Press. BARTLESVILLE, OKLA., Jan. 17.—Two persons were killed and the plant of the American Glycerine Company, four miles south of Bartlesville, was destroyed late Thursday when ninety quarts of nitroglycerine were exploded in an unknown manner. The dead employees of the plant were Herbert Singleton and Roy Anderson. Their bodies could not be found. A huge hole marks the spot where the explosion occurred. Windows were shattered in Bartlesville by the concussion.

TEN INCH SNOWFALL OVER WESTERN TEXAS

By Associated Press. SAN ANGELO, TEX., Jan. 17.—An average snowfall of ten inches through out West Texas last night and today has caused the suspension of motor traffic and seriously delayed train schedules. Some loss among livestock on the open ranges is feared. The weather was moderating slowly tonight.

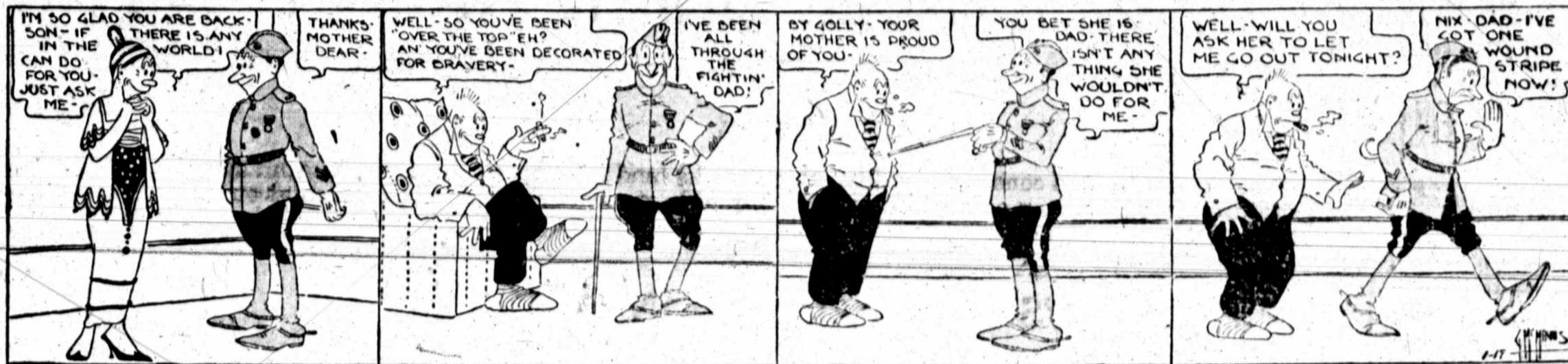

Band of Mexicans Raid Guadalupe Wednesday Night

By Associated Press. FABENS, TEX., Jan. 17.—Guadalupe opposite here, was captured and held overnight Wednesday night by a band of armed and mounted Mexicans, reported to be a part of General Felipe Angeles' command in the north. Guadalupe is thirty miles southeast of Juarez. The men rode into the main street firing at the fleeing fiscal guard, who composed the only armed force in the garrison at the time. A house-to-house search was then made for ammunition and arms and all were seized, together with the horses belong to civilians. The Guadalupe priest crossed the border here today and reported that the sergeant commanding the fiscal guards and a private soldier, were taken to the foothills and executed after which the band rode eastward toward Juarez. A company of cavalry from Juarez passed through Guadalupe in pursuit of the Angeles men.

EL PASO, Jan. 17.—Mexican families are moving to the American side of the border from Ojinaga, Chihuahua, fearing an attack by the rebel forces under General Felipe Angeles, according to a special dispatch from Presidio printed tonight in La Republica, a Mexican daily here, favorable to the Angeles movement. Ojinaga is opposite Presidio, Texas. The dispatch stated that Angeles' column was advancing from Cuchillo Parado, which was occupied Monday, advance guards having been seen at La Mula Pass, twenty miles south of Ojinaga. American military sources have no confirmation of the reported advance of the Angeles force toward the border. PLAN CENSORSHIP OF SHOW BUSINESS IN WICHITA FALLS

MATTER IS DISCUSSED AT MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL HELD LAST NIGHT.

WILL REGULATE TAXIS

Ordinance Providing for Six Months Residence and License Passes on First Reading.

The adoption of a resolution regulating the operation of service cars, unanimously agreeing upon an ordinance to create a censorship committee to pass upon all shows offered in local theatres, and the assurance of a hearty co-operation on the part of the city with the proprietors of the proposed bus line between Wichita Falls and Burk Burnett, were some of the matters acted upon by the city council at its regular weekly meeting last night.

An ordinance drawn up and presented by City Attorney Ralph Mathis, with the recommendation that it be passed as soon as possible, was accepted on its first reading and will be a city law after being passed at two more consecutive meetings of the council. This ordinance with a purpose in view of protecting bona fide residents of this city who are engaged in the operation of service cars, as well as help in maintaining a more uniform and just price for services on the part of taxi drivers, provides that no person shall operate a service car in Wichita Falls who is not a bona fide resident of the city, and has not been such for six months preceding the time he begins the operation of a car; and that before he engages in the profession of a service car driver, must first register his name, address, make of automobile, serial number, and state how long he has been a resident of the city, at the city clerk's office.

Protection to Local Drivers.
City Attorney Mathis on presenting the ordinance said that he believed that such action should be taken by the council in order to protect the residents of the city from outside car operators who come to Wichita Falls on certain days, operate their cars for a short time, charge unfair prices, and then skip out. He also said in this connection that a large number of outside operators were accustomed to bringing immoral women with them, when coming here, which should be prohibited, and which problem the proposed ordinance would solve, insofar that no outsider could operate a car in the city. It was also pointed out by Mr. Mathis, that outside service car drivers come here and charge unreasonable and varying prices for their services, which is not just to the established car lines, being run by citizens, who maintain a uniform and even scale of charges.

Endorsed by Citizens.
An action of the council at the meeting last night, which will be considered of great importance by many citizens, was that of endorsing a petition presented by Mrs. C. H. Dent and Mrs. E. B. Kirley, representing the Civic Club, in which the council was asked to pass an ordinance creating a board of censors to pass on all theatrical and moving picture programs before they are presented to the public at local show houses.

This petition bore the endorsements

of practically all clubs, societies and civil welfare organizations of the city. It stated that severe criticism and condemnations, on the part of the public had been heard recently, of the vulgarity and almost obscenity included in stage and motion picture shows being presented by local theaters, and asked the council to pass an ordinance, which would provide for the creation of a board of three or five to be selected by the council, to act as a censorship on all plays and shows that are brought here by the theaters, said board to pass on the programs before they are presented to the public.

Favored by Members.
This matter met instant favor with members of the council and in discussing it, the question of making for better shows for Wichita Falls in the future, was always held in mind. The ladies in presenting the petition said that shows had been given in local theaters that were of such character as would tend to endanger the morals of the children of the city. Alderman McFall voiced the opinion of the council body when he said only elevating and educational programs should be shown in local play houses. The selection of the members of the censorship board should be made cautiously, as only those who would serve the city were checked and approved by the council last night.

Endorsed by Civic League.
The matter of a censorship for Wichita Falls theaters was formally acted upon at a meeting of the Civic League, on December 3, when that club endorsed such a movement and at once took the matter up with other clubs over the city for their approval and co-operation.

The following clubs and societies endorsed the petition that was presented by Mrs. Dent and Mrs. Kirley: Womans Alliance, First Baptist Church, New Idea Club, Ladies Aid, First Christian Church, Council Jewish Women, Altas Society, Sacred Heart Church, Daughters of Isabella, Women's Guild, Episcopal Church, Bohian Society, Beta Deiphian Society, Missionary Society, Methodist Church, Wichita Travel Club, Wichita Falls Rotary Club.

Bus Line Represented.
Representatives of the Yellow Motor Bus Line, of Waco, appeared before the council and asked for the privilege to use some portion of a down town street as a parking place for the cars of the bus line, which they propose to establish here, to operate between Wichita Falls and Burk Burnett. They were informed that it was not necessary for the city to grant them a right to use any portion of the streets as a parking stand, but due to the congested conditions which exist on Eighth street between Ohio and the depot, it was thought best that the vehicles should not park in this district, but Ninth and Seventh streets were pointed out as available for such purposes. He failed to make the bond and is still in the county jail. The sheriff of the Colorado town is expected to be in Wichita Falls today or tomorrow, to carry the prisoner back there for trial. Sheriff McFall will claim the \$50 reward offered for his apprehension, by the Colorado officials.
