



NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—The cotton market showed continued nervousness and irregularity during today's early trading. Liverpool was weak but pri-vate cables attributed the decline there to straddle selling in expecta-tion of a further easing of ocean freight rates and Liverpool houses were buyers of July and later deliv-eries here. This caused the irregular-ity at the opening first prices, being 40 points lower to 30 points higher with late months relatively firm.
