GLASSCOCK-PARR CONTEST POSTPONED UNTIL TUESDAY

RIOTING OCCURS SUNDAY NIGHT RESULT EFFORT TO TAKE BALLOT BOXES.

MOB'S ARE REPULSED

Fighting Takes Place on the Streets and Spartacans Make Attempt on Newspaper Office.

BERLIN, Sunday, Jan. 20.—Twenty-four of the 831 election districts in greater Berlin give the following totals:

WILSON IS GUEST OF FRENCH SENATE LUNCHEON TODAY

IS WELCOMED IN EULOGISTIC ADDRESS BY PRESIDENT ANTONIN DUBOIST.

GIVING SELF TO PEOPLE

Speaker Touches on Problems Now Facing the Allies in Forming a Peace Program.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 20.—President Wilson was the guest of the French senate at a luncheon today. He was greeted by Antonin Dubois, the president who made an eulogistic address in which he said that the senate welcomed the President and his ideas. "Mr. President," Mr. Dubois said, "myself thank you for having been so good as to accept our invitation and to give us some of your time which we know to be devoted to the high meditations which are the result of negotiations upon which the fate of the peoples depend. From your first steps on the land of France and since your entry into Paris the French people have spontaneously given their hearts to you and they perceived at once in your frank smile and in your so loyal and open physiognomy that you too were spontaneously giving yourself to them.

In an Old Palace. "You are today in an old palace of France and it is among these grand reminders of past times that with thoughts rejuvenated by republican ardor, yet with patriots' memories, the senate sketches a history which already counts fifteen centuries. We welcome, here, Mr. Wilson, you and your ideas. Nowhere could your splendid ambition to substitute for the periodically broken equilibrium of material forces the definite award of moral forces, elicit more enthusiasm than in France and nowhere more than in the senate since the statute of international peace has been first of all and for a long time prepared by some of its most eminent members.

New World Order Possible. "Our national problem, therefore, in combining our European past and our actual material conditions, is to find the conditions of the new order for which you have given so noble a formula because this new order will ever have to lean on some force for which France will, when all is told, stand the most advanced and exposed sentinel. We firmly believe with you, Mr. President, and allow me to add, sincere and great friend, that a new world order, perhaps a world harmony are possible in which our French country will at least be liberated from the nightmare of invasion—conquest for which nearly 1,400,000 men of France have just given their lives.

OUTLINE OF NEW CONSTITUTION FOR GERMAN REPUBLIC

LONDON, Jan. 20.—Details of the proposed new constitution for Germany drawn up recently at a conference of widely known authorities on constitutional law, including Hugo Preuss, state secretary of the interior in the Ebert government, are given in an official wireless dispatch sent out from Berlin and picked up here. It states that the empire is to consist of its former component states—besides any territories which by virtue of the right of self-determination declare to be received into the empire. The dispatch declares that the people have the right, regardless of former frontiers, to erect new German free states within the empire providing any such free state has a population of 2,000,000. If the people of a border country wish to join the German empire the assent of the German people shall be required. The imperial president, who is to be elected by the people, must be 35 years of age and must have been a citizen of Germany for 10 years before his election. He will be elected by an absolute majority of all the votes of the empire. The president will represent the empire but declarations of war or conclusions of peace with the reichstag. Treaties with foreign states require the assent of the reichstag. As soon as a league of nations, the object of which is the exclusion of secret treaties, has been formed, all treaties with the league shall require the assent of the reichstag. The imperial president's tenure of office will be for seven years and his re-election will be permissible. The imperial government will be composed of a chancellor and ministers who will be chosen by the president of the reichstag. The government must have the confidence of the house or deputies and shall be responsible to the reichstag.

SUGGEST KILLING A RESULT OF MISTAKE

FORT WORTH, TEX., Jan. 20.—The falling into Bolger's hands of a letter, addressed to a party with a name similar to Bolger's, is said to have caused the shooting. The senate adjourned before acting on the resolution. The senate resolution recommending U. S. Senator Morris Sheppard for the presidency in 1920 was adopted after three o'clock this afternoon by a vote of thirteen to nine.

SOCIALIST GROUP IN HUNGARY WILL JOIN NEW CABINET

BERNES, SWITZ., Jan. 20.—The socialists in Hungary, according to a telegram from the Hungarian press bureau, have decided to enter a cabinet headed by Former Minister of Justice Berinkey, in which they will collaborate with the non-socialist parties. The socialists, it is added, would receive the portfolios of war, interior and public instruction. Another telegram from Budapest says that Count Karolyi, the president of the Hungarian republic, has entrusted M. Berinkey, with the formation of a ministry and that the following cabinet has been named: Premier and minister of foreign affairs, minister of justice and minister of nationality, M. Berinkey. Minister of the interior, M. Nagy. Finance, M. Szende. Commerce, M. German. War, M. Boehn. Agriculture, M. Guza. Provisioning, M. Balogh. Social assistance, M. Feidell. Ministers without portfolios, M. Szasz, Stephen Szabo, M. Kraja and M. Kunassy.

CABINET ENJOYS THE CONFIDENCE OF PARTIES

By Associated Press. AMSTERDAM, Jan. 20.—The new Hungarian cabinet of Dionys Berinkey, according to a dispatch from Budapest, enjoys the confidence of the socialist and bourgeois parties. The new cabinet, it is said, includes four socialists, including M. Konfi as minister of public instruction. Large Number of Fines Assessed in City Police Court. The largest number of fines in any one day for several weeks was collected in police court this morning, when nine men charged with gaming paid fines of \$15 each, and three others donated \$10 each on a charge of disturbing the peace, to which they plead guilty. The arrests were all made Saturday night. Officers McDonald, Landers and Schwend made the raid on the gaming party in a rooming house, and placed them all under bond to appear before City Judge Ogilvie this morning. One man charged with disturbing the peace had his case passed over until tomorrow. The fines paid totaled \$165.

Market Report

Cotton Market

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—The cotton market showed continued nervousness and irregularity during today's early trading. Liverpool was weak but private cables attributed the decline there to straddle selling in expectation of a further easing of ocean freight rates and Liverpool houses were buyers of July and later deliveries here. This caused the irregularity at the opening first prices, being 40 points lower to 30 points higher with late months relatively firm. After selling at 24.50 on the call, March rallied to 24.94 on covering and trade buying while May sold up from 23.20 to 23.72 with the more active positions showing net advances of four to 35 points but the bulge met further southern selling and local pressure encouraged by reports of unsettled conditions in the goods trade. The market was very weak and unsettled later in the morning under heavy general selling with March breaking to 24.00 and May 22.75 and old crop months generally 65 to 70 points net lower while October showed a net loss of 35 points. There was covering enough at these prices to cause rallies of 20 or 25 points but the bulge were not fully maintained and the tone showed little improvement.

Trading was not quite so active during the early afternoon but offerings increased on comparatively slight bulges owing to the continued unfavorable news from mill centers. This included reports that one of the leading manufacturing concerns in New England had adopted a new operating schedule of only 6 1/2 hours per day owing to lack of orders. March contracts ruled around 24.97 and May 23.72 toward 2 o'clock, or about 83 points net lower. The market closed easy.

General selling developed, based on lack of a spot demand, prospects of lower prices for cottons, and uncertainty regarding ginning returns to January 15. At noon prices were 39 to 89 points under the final quotations of Saturday.

There are doubtless men engaged in the promotion of oil companies at Burkburnett whose motives are improper and who will, in the end, skin the investors in their companies. The greater number are men who will earn what they get in the way of promotion stock.

MUCH ACTIVITY IN EVIDENCE IN THE RANDLETT SECTION

BURKBURNETT, TEX., Jan. 20.—The Oil Center Brokerage Co. of Wichita Falls, has completed a new derrick which is located on the northwest quarter of 17, south and 12 west on the east 80. This company will put up another derrick in the near future on the northwest quarter of 7, town 8, so. and 12 west. The following gentlemen compose the company: J. A. Hogan and F. E. Nolte, both of Handlett; F. H. Butcher of Burkburnett, and Thos. Sutton of California. Nolte and Hogan, both own several acres of fine farming land near Handlett. F. H. As soon as the machinery arrives it will be installed and drilling will commence at once, which will be watched with great interest. The Carter oil people are drilling day and night now. They are trying to get close to Rabbit Creek valley. G. S. Miller, who owned 320 acres on sections 8 and 9, town 13, south range 13 and 14, sold his two quarters for a consideration of \$32,000.

TIGHTEN EMBARGO ON RAIL SHIPMENTS TO BURKBURNETT

NO FREIGHT IN LESS THAN CAR LOTS EXCEPT NECESSITIES IS ACCEPTED.

TRUCK IS ONLY RELIEF

Delays Are Occasional and Cost of Drilling Operations is Very Materially Increased.

No freight in less than carload lots, with the exception of food, for human and animal consumption, medical supplies, caskets and empty tank cars, is being accepted for shipment to Burkburnett, with the exception of freight to companies that have private sidings at the oil town. A partial embargo has been in effect for two months but the lines are now being drawn tighter and tighter, as the congestion grows worse.

This embargo makes the freight truck the oil contractor's only solution, where supplies for individual wells are concerned, and consequently the gross cost of drilling a well is greatly increased, where materials have to come from a distance as there is a difference of about 36 cents per hundred pounds between the freight and trucking prices. The bad weather of the past month has made hauling of freight overland extremely hazardous, because of the bad roads, and though the roads are now materially improved, there are still numerous piles of casing and other well supply materials lying by the side of the road, where trucks were obliged to get rid of part of their load before it was possible to pull out. These difficulties have been responsible for numerous shut downs at Burkburnett, but the development of the field continues in spite of every obstacle that offers itself.

The Burk-Mann well on the Wigham addition, which has had a fishing job on for the past two weeks, is now reported swabbing about 400 barrels daily.

The Block 36 Oil Company's No. 2 well, Block 36, is reported drilling at 1561 feet today.

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PRACTICALLY ALL COMMANDERS ARE AWARDED MEDALS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—Practically all army corps and division commanders of the American expeditionary force together with the heads of staff departments, have now been awarded Distinguished Service Medals by General Pershing for the conspicuous service. The war department today made public citations of 27 officers in addition to the list of 24 given out yesterday.

Among the officers decorated were Major General John F. O'Ryan, commanding the second division (New York National Guard) division, the only guard division commander to retain his command throughout the war and Major General John A. Lejeune, of the Marine Corps, commanding the second division of Marines. Major General E. M. Lewis, commanding the thirteenth (Wildcat) division, also was decorated. This division and the twenty seventh served with the British army and helped to smash the famous Hindenburg line.

Engineers Flag of Texas University Has 13 Gold Stars

Special to The Times. AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 20.—When the final compilation of the University of Texas Roll of the Dead is made, thirteen names from the Engineering Department will appear on it. Thirteen gold stars now adorn the large service flag which was unfurled in front of the engineering building at the beginning of the winter term.

The latest name to be added to the roll of honor is that of Captain Albert Sneed MacDonnell, '12, who died of wounds received in action at St. Nazaire, France, on Dec. 22. Louis John Jordan, E. E. '15, famous in the University as the peerless captain of the 1915 football team, was the first student of the university to fall in action on French soil. Among the deceased in American training camps was Emil Zuhike, '18, who succumbed to influenza-pneumonia at Camp Dix, N. J., on September 29, 1918. Perhaps the most tragic casualty was that of James J. Goodfellow, who fell on October 14, 1918, while battling against 18 German planes high up in the clouds single-handed. Even the honor list with the death of Captain Charles Joel Moore, E. E. '17, who died of wounds received in action in October, 1918. Captain Moore was tutor in electrical engineering and student assistant in mechanical engineering during his university career.

Forty-One Road Associations Are Holding Meeting

By Associated Press. KANSAS CITY, MO., Jan. 20.—A national organization will be formed here tomorrow by representatives of forty-one big trunk line road associations for the purpose of seeking federal aid for established national highways. It is hoped that out of the convention will grow a union sufficiently strong to impress Congress with the need of official recognition of the highways proposed and of extension of federal aid to fully develop them. The convention was decided upon recently at a joint convention of the American Association of State Highway Officials and the Highways Industries Association at Chicago. Representatives of thirteen trans-continental and inter-state highway associations attended this conference. It is expected that a definite system of roads covering the entire country, for which federal backing is desired, will be outlined at tomorrow's convention. At the Chicago conference H. O. Cooley of Minneapolis was appointed temporary chairman and Frank A. Davis, Kansas City, temporary secretary. Mr. Davis says that the road associations interested in the convention represent between 35,000 and 40,000 miles of established highways. By combining their efforts instead of continuing as individual organizations, it is believed that rapid progress in road building will be possible. Mr. Davis said.

OPPOSITION TO GOVERNMENT IN MEXICO FAILING

By Associated Press. JUAREZ, MEX., Jan. 20.—Francisco Villa has less than 200 followers in scattered bands in western Chihuahua, General Felipe Angelin's movement at birth, Felix Diaz has fewer than 100 men although he has been in the field two years, and the proposed coalition of all factions opposed to the Carranza government is considered impossible because they cannot agree on a leader. This was the summing up of the Mexican situation given by General Jesus Augustin Castro, sub-secretary of war in charge of that portfolio, today. He arrived here yesterday from Chihuahua City accompanied by Governor Andros Ortiz of Chihuahua to take command of the northeastern military zone. General Castro said he would launch a general campaign in May against Villa, Angelin, Avisto Perena, the Felix Diaz leader in the north, and all other rebel bands in his zone, promising to have the zone freed entirely of bandit activities by November 1.

CHIEF M'CLURE INJURED IN RUN TO SUNDAY FIRE

THROWN FROM TRUCK ON HEAD AND SHOULDERS AT LEE AND SEVENTH.

DESTROY THREE HOUSES

Firemen Unable to Save Property Because of Lack of Water Which to Fight Flames.

J. L. McClure, chief of the fire department, was painfully if not seriously injured Sunday afternoon about 1:30 o'clock while fighting a fire that destroyed three dwellings and numerous other minor properties, and for a while threatened an entire block on the east side on account of lack of sufficient water pressure for the fireman to successfully cope with the flames. Chief McClure was thrown from the back end of truck on which he was riding and struck the street on his head and shoulders. He was picked up in an unconscious condition and rushed to his home where medical attention was given immediately. For a time it was feared that the fall had fractured his skull but today he has been resting fairly well and physicians are inclined to believe that he will recover in a few days if complications do not set in, and that a severe shock with painful bruises on his head and shoulders will prove the extent of his injuries.

Standing on Rear Step.
Chief McClure was standing on the rear step of his truck when it turned at corner at Seventh and Lee, at the same time hitting bumps and chug holes, which threw him on the street with such force that he landed at least ten feet from the truck and rolled several feet further after striking the ground.

The buildings which were destroyed were two large two-story rooming houses at 306 and 302 Sixth street and a five-room dwelling around the corner on the same block at 508 Adams. The building at 304 Sixth caught fire but with a constant stream of water playing upon it, was saved with slight damage. A number of sheds and outbuildings to the rear of the rooming houses were swept away and for an hour it looked as though the entire fire block would be licked up by the flames. The entire fire department was on the grounds and did everything possible to save the buildings but were not able to offer much resistance because of lack of water. The hose engine was connected with the main and the pump kept running all the time in an effort to add more pressure to hose, but the main was practically empty, they reported.

Starts at 302 Sixth.
The fire broke out in the building at 302 Sixth street and within a few minutes had burned over the entire roof and caught the adjoining one on the corner. These two rooming houses were owned by Charles Hill and the loss was estimated at \$20,000, with insurance to the amount of \$5,000. It was stated that nearly thirty families lived in the two buildings and many

of them lost the greater portion of their furniture and personal effects. The families occupying the upper rooms were the heaviest losers. Those in the lower rooms had time to remove part of their belongings, but the flames spread so rapidly that it was impossible to save hardly any of the things from the upper rooms of either building. The entire property loss was placed at \$25,000.

Cottage is Destroyed.
Following the rooming house on the corner of the block the residence of C. W. Huguey, a five room building, at 508 Adams was the next structure in the path of the fire. This building burned completely but the household goods and furniture was saved. The flames spread in each direction from the two large buildings and several sheds and outbuildings to the rear were destroyed while the residence of Mrs. C. W. Hill, 304 Sixth, was damaged slightly and for a time looked as though it would be lost. The slight wind that was blowing while the fire was in progress was in favor of the firemen and had there been a wind blowing in the opposite direction, in all probability the whole block would have been swept clean.

Starts from Gas Stove.
The fire broke out at practically 1:10 in one of the lower rooms of the building at 302 Sixth street from a gas stove, according to occupants of the house.
The flames ran up the walls of the building and within a few minutes had covered the roof but had there been anything like a normal supply of water, there is no question but that the firemen would have saved the building which caught first from complete loss, and would have prevented the loss of the others. When the water was first turned on it was evident that the pressure was low but the firemen thought that when the pump of the large truck was connected they would have plenty of pressure. They did not understand the lack of water in the main, which at times afforded only enough pressure to throw the water 10 or 15 feet.

Young Man Injured.
The rapid burning of the wooden buildings caused a dense smoke which could be seen all over the city and within a few minutes after the fire began several hundred people were watching the flames, and as many as possible assisting the firemen. A young man, whose name was not learned, suffered a severe cut on his hand from broken glass while assisting the firemen. It was learned that he lived in Fort Worth.
About 1 o'clock last night the fire man made a run to the ruins of the buildings when it was reported to them that one of the adjacent dwellings had caught fire. The alarm was false, however.

CORFU.—If William Hohenzollern, the former German emperor, should try to spend the remainder of his career on the island of Corfu, as some recent reports indicated, he would not be received by the natives with any great show of hospitality or cordiality. The villa here which he last occupied in the summer of 1914 and which he owned, is now used as a military hospital and floats the French flag. Even the especially built dock on which he was accustomed to land is now used for military purposes.
The Greek and Serbian population, many of whom are refugees, realize well the misery and suffering that Hohenzollern caused the world and are in no mood to receive him even as temporary visitor.
"Achillion Palace," he villa, stands high up on the rocky coast of Corfu amid a wealth of cypress trees and overlooks the picturesque Ionian Sea. The snow-capped mountains of Albania are only a short distance away. The villa has been occupied lately by
