



### NEGRO PROBLEM IS DISCUSSED AT THE TUSKEGEE MEETING

**TUSKEGEE, ALA., Jan. 23.**—In discussing before the twenty-eighth annual Tuskegee negro conference the question of the negro in the South after the war, Emmett J. Scott, special assistant to the secretary of war in matters affecting the interests of negro soldiers, sought to allay and dissipate the spirit of unrest and apprehension regarding the return of discharged negro soldiers, which he said seemed to prevail in the south. "The fear over the negro's homecoming is, in my opinion, without foundation," said Dr. Scott. "Thousands of them volunteered for military and naval service regardless of the selective service law and they will return no less anxious to perform their full duties as citizens. "They will return both physically and mentally benefited by reason of military training and experience and with a broader vision and appreciation of American citizenship as well as with new ideas of that liberty and freedom that mean to the negro."

Dr. Scott said the negro soldiers' conduct overseas has won for him the commendation and gratitude of the greatest governments on earth. "I am sure," he said, "that as a homeward he turns his face, his resolve for better citizenship is even more firmly fixed. He will not, I am sure, seek to jeopardize or impair the honor and fame his race has won in this war by any thoughtless or unmanly word or deed. On the contrary, he will be anxious to renew and strengthen the friendly relations that he left behind, confident that a spirit of justice abides in the land to which he is returning. "Highly respected by the law abiding himself, he confidently expects that law and order will prevail, that lynchings and all forms of mob violence which have driven so many of his race from the south will be stamped out by duty constituted authority and that every man, regardless of color, who has fought and served under the stars and stripes and who has been loyal to the emblem of liberty and justice, will be granted that recognition to which all true Americans are entitled. "Assigned for Convoy. "The policy of the war department in the demobilization of the negro soldiers, Secretary Scott said, is to gradually dissolve them from time to time in proportion to the white soldiers discharged as rapidly as economic and other conditions make it wise to return so large a number of men to civilian life. He said the following negro units have been assigned for early convoy and would reach the United States within a very short time: 367th infantry, first and third battalions; 368th infantry, second and third battalions; 370th infantry, second and third battalions; 372nd infantry.

**DEMILITARIZATION PLANS DISCUSSED BY NEGROES**

**DEFEAT OF BOLSHEVISTS DEVELOPED INTO ROUT**

### Large Pipe Line And Storage Plant For Burkburnett

Announcement is made of the location of a large pipe line and storage business for which permits have already been secured on the railroad north of the station. Operations, it is understood, will begin just as soon as the plant can be installed and all possible speed will be used in its construction. "The company, which will be largely of a co-operative nature, in that it will include many producers among its stockholders, has been organized and will be known as the Producers Pipe Line & Storage Co., with a capital stock of \$20,000 and with the following officers: T. J. Wren, president; Jack Baldwin, secretary, and W. M. Frank, treasurer. The trustees of the company are W. M. Frank, T. J. Wren and L. J. Gould. These are all well known and successful business men. Mr. Gould was formerly connected with the Roxana Petroleum Co. and the Yashola Pipe Line Co., an engineer. "Much of the stock, it is planned, will be placed with men engaged in production, and the company also announces that ample storage capacity will be provided so that there will be no occasion for their customers to shut down wells for lack of accommodations.

### SAYS BILL WOULD "CRIPPLE" PACKERS

 Witness said that only two Chicago packers canned salmon, Wilson and Co., and Libby, McNeil and Libby. Of the 8,000,000 cases packed annually, he said, Libby packs only six per cent and Wilson 1 1/2 per cent. "This was in reply to an assertion which Mr. Swift said Chairman Colver of the federal trade commission had made that since large packers had become 'heavily interested' in canning salmon its price had increased. "Mr. Swift said Mr. Colver had declared that large packers forced wholesale groceries to buy packers' breakfast food or be cut off from other packing products. The witness asserted that Armour was in the grain business before entering the packing industry, is the only packer handling breakfast foods. "Would Take Customer. "I am sure," said Mr. Swift, "that if Armour would refuse to sell other lines of goods, it would be great opportunity for Swift and Company to secure a good customer, and we would not hesitate to take this customer." "Mr. Swift said the proposed bill appears to provide definitely for government acquisition of refrigerator and stock cars, stockyards, branch houses, and storage facilities, and that it also appears to provide for operation under licenses of the facilities. He said Mr. Colver explained that the purpose is first to utilize the controlling provision and if this fails to apply the more drastic features. "I think you will agree with me," said Mr. Swift, "that this is very unusual legislation and the assumption that only the minor and less drastic features will be utilized is hardly fair to the packers." "Mr. Swift said the proposed legislation gives practically an unlimited and undefined power of control over a private industry and added: "It seems to me that a less dangerous method of procedure would be government supervision. "Explains Stockyards. "Mr. Swift said his company built stockyards because of the necessity that 'new interests' should develop these yards as facilities for stock growers. He said that this pressure from livestock interests and local people caused his company to build yards in St. Joseph, Port Worth, Sioux City, Denver and St. Paul. "And," he added, "we are associated with from 50 to 200 stockholders (meaning the general public) in each case and in nearly every case own less than the majority. At each place we were instrumental in organizing a small bank and a cattle loan company, simply to give livestock growers and stockmen facilities."

### Cotton Market

**NEW YORK, Jan. 23.**—The cotton market showed renewed weakness this morning under a continuation of the recent selling movement which probably found encouragement in the reports of unsettled labor conditions at home and abroad and slightly larger spinning figures than expected. The opening was steady at an advance of five points to a decline of five points on overnight buying orders which had probably been inspired by reports of an increased trade demand late yesterday. The moderate demand was soon supplied, however, by more or less general selling which included scattered but offerings from the south and the market soon showed net losses of 37 to 52 points with active months marking new low ground for the season. March sold at 23.00 and May at 21.80 before the end of the first hour. The census report showed 11,051,845 bales ginned to January 16 compared with 10,570,733 last year.

### SCHOOL PROBLEM DISCUSSED TODAY BY JUDGE MARTIN

#### PRESENTS FINANCIAL SITUATION IN ADDRESS BEFORE THE ROTARY CLUB. SOLUTIONS SUGGESTED

Meeting Will Be Held Tonight to Devise Some Relief for the Local Teachers.

The financial problems of the Wichita Falls public schools were discussed by the Rotary Club at its regular weekly luncheon today. Judge J. A. Martin, a member of the school board, laid the situation before the club. John W. Bradley, B. J. Bean and W. D. Cline took part in the discussion.

Judge Martin declared that the schools of the city had been "absolutely overwhelmed by a scholastic population that was all out of proportion to the city's finances." He said that the schools finished last year with a deficit of more than \$5,000 and that despite an arbitrary increase of 25 per cent in valuations for school taxing purposes the deficit this year would likely be more than \$20,000.

He revealed that more than three-fourths of the teachers were paid salaries of less than \$70 per month, and told how many of the best teachers were resigning on account of inadequate pay. He called attention to the fact that these teachers were compensated to pay from \$40 to \$50 a month for board.

One thing that could be done now, he said, was for citizens to open their homes to these teachers and charge them for board at the actual cost. He paid high tribute to Superintendent Clark and his principles, declaring that they could not be beat in the State of Texas, but said that they were helpless to remedy the situation brought about by the lack of finances.

Judge Martin invited inquiry and investigation into the situation and said the school board would gladly welcome suggestions.

Following Judge Martin, John W. Bradley discussed the situation briefly, declaring that in our race for money we were too prone to forget the things underlying our life. He said the schools had gone too long without proper support. "This is an emergency," he said, "and a very dire one. Our children are being denied the advantages of the best teachers who are being forced to leave our schools because of inadequate salaries."

He suggested a committee be appointed to co-operate with other bodies in the city to raise money to support the school.

Bert Bean suggests plan. B. J. Bean said he had lived in Wichita Falls since the first school was opened here. He said he had gone to school when there was only one teacher. "I have never known the citizenship of Wichita Falls to kick when the tax for school purposes was raised. They'll not do so now." He pointed to the fact that the revenue had been increased by a 25 per cent increase in valuations for school taxing purposes. "There's the solution," he said. "Raise the valuations 50 per cent. Yes, 75 per cent or even 100 per cent and the people will gladly pay it."


W. D. Cline told of a movement that had been inaugurated for the erection of a building here for the young women, in which they could have board and lodging at a reasonable price. He said that a meeting was to be held tonight at which it was expected some definite action would be taken. He said he had already invited two of the teachers to come to his home.

At today's meeting of the club President McFall was authorized to appoint a committee to select a jewel or emblem and have engraved thereon a suitable inscription for presentation to John W. Thomas Jr., born while his father, a prominent member of the Rotary Club, was in the service of his country in France.

### HOTEL COMMITTEE EXPECTS TO AWARD A CONTRACT SOON

After a trip of inspection of new hotel buildings in Wichita, Kansas and Tulsa and Oklahoma City, C. W. Snider, R. O. Harvey and N. H. Martin, returned this morning, and will submit the results of their trip to the remainder of the building committee for the new \$600,000 hotel structure. Several architects are to submit plans and propositions and Mr. Snider started this morning that he believed that the architect would be selected within a week's time.

"We were especially impressed with the Lassen Hotel in Wichita," said Mr. Snider, "and we believe that it will fill the needs of Wichita Falls. It is a beautiful hotel and is only a little larger than we contemplated erecting. The Lassen has ten stories and we expect to have eight stories."

"At Eldorado, Kansas, where a boom something like that of Wichita Falls is now experiencing, struck some years ago, we were informed by business men that we are taking the right step in building a big hotel. They told us that if the banks and business interests of Eldorado had had foresight enough to build a large hotel when the boom was first on, they could have held thousands, who went to Wichita when they failed to find accommodations at Eldorado, and finally settled in Wichita. They told us that we would make no mistake in building a large hotel for the future as they had found by experience that to be conservative does not pay when an oil boom is on."

# SITUATION ASSURES AGREEMENT ON PLAN

(Continued from page one.)

circles surrounding the peace congress that it should be announced that the first plan for a league of nations to be considered comes from Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain. This is quite in consonance with what has been known in a very small circle close to the American delegates that President Wilson plans to have European ideas come before the congress in advance of his own. American officials explain that Mr. Wilson's purpose is not only out of deference to European nations which have sacrificed so much in the war or out of deference to the views of European statesmen but that there is a technical advantage in reserving American plans until all others have been fully discussed, when they may be brought forward, probably to form a bridge by which disagreements that may have developed may be dispelled.

Mr. Wilson has told his colleagues that he has no personal pride of authorship in the plan for the league and is quite ready to place himself in a position of supporting some other nation's plan rather than proposing one of his own, if he feels that this procedure will best serve the common purpose. If discussion goes on according to this plan it appears likely that both the British and French plans will be discussed before the president brings out his own, which is now entirely completed and ready for presentation at any time.

Mr. Wilson will go ahead with his announced purpose of devoting all his energies to the reducing of various views on the league of nations to a basis of agreement while awaiting results from the effort to compose the differences between Russian factions. He intends to adhere to his determination to hold all other plans secondary including his visit to Brussels and his trip to the battlefields and devastated regions.

It is now definitely settled that a large number of American troops will go to America with President Wilson on the liner George Washington. Mr. Wilson has personally given orders that every available bit of space on the liner be given over to troops and that the personnel of his party be reduced to the minimum.

# 25,000 MEN ARE DESIGNATED FOR EARLY TRIP HOME

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Practically the complete strength of the 27th division (New York National Guard) about 25,000 men, has been ordered assembled for early convoy home from France. A cablegram to the war department today shows that it will be the first combatant division to come home as a unit. It was announced Tuesday that the 27th, 30th and 37th had been ordered to prepare for embarkation and it is understood the assembling of the twenty-seventh as a unit means that the same course will be followed in returning the other two.

# IT'S NOT "DEAR OLD BLIGHTY," BUT "HOME, SWEET HOME"



Three troop ships, with 7,706 men aboard, have arrived at the Port of New York, all of them docking at the army piers in Hoboken. On the President Grant, formerly a German liner, were nearly 5,000 troops, while the battle ships South Dakota and Montana carried the remainder of the homecoming troops which reached port yesterday. All three were overdue, having been held up by storms. There were three complete units of field artillery on the President Grant—the Second, Eighty-First and Eighty-Third—practically all regular army men who had never been in the fighting. The two latter regiments were formerly in the cavalry, and were transformed into artillery, which accounted for their being so late in getting to France.

Colonel J. C. N. Jones, commanding officer of the Second Field Artillery and in charge of the Eighth Field Artillery brigade, whose home is in Grand Rapids, Mich., said that the boys were mightily disappointed they did not get into the fighting. "We were in France only two or three months," he said, "and we were ready to get into the fray, but the Boche saw the handwriting on the wall—he had learned his lesson and he stopped fighting before our guns got at him."

**New Telephone Toll Rates**  
 Effective January 21, 1919

In accordance with the order of the Postmaster General, dated December 13, 1918, new schedules of rates for telephone toll calls (to points outside the local service area) under which all toll calls throughout the United States are placed on a uniform basis, become effective 12:01 a. m., January 21, 1919.

Under these new schedules the "station to station" rate is the base upon which all rates for the various classes of service offered, are computed. This rate is determined by the air line distance between toll points and is computed, for the initial period, on the basis of 5c for each 6 miles up to 24 miles and 5c for each 8 miles beyond that distance.

For toll calls where the calling party does not specify a particular person to be reached at the called telephone, the "station to station" rate is charged. This method provides the cheapest and quickest form of toll service.

"Station to station" calls must be made as far as possible by giving the telephone number of the called telephone. Where the number is not known and telephone directory information is not available, the number should be obtained from "Information," or if the called telephone is at a distant point, the name and address of the called subscriber should be given to the toll operator.

For toll calls where the calling party specifies a particular person to be reached at the called telephone and the connection is established and conversation held with that person, the "person to person" rate is charged. As this service requires a greater amount of operating effort, the rate for such calls is about one-fourth greater than the "station to station" rate. (Minimum "person to person" rate 20c.)

For toll calls on a "person to person" basis, where the calling party, in placing the call, designates a definite time at which he will talk and the conversation is held, the "appointment" rate is charged. As this service involves the making of the appointment in addition to the operating effort necessary for a "person to person" call, the "appointment" rate is about one-half greater than the "station to station" rate. (Minimum "appointment" rate 25c.)

For toll calls made on a "person to person" basis where messenger service is required to secure attendance of the designated person at the called telephone, the "messenger call" rate applies. This rate is the same as the "appointment" rate, plus any necessary charge for messenger service. (Minimum "messenger call" rate 25c.)

In connection with all toll calls other than those made on a "station to station" basis where the called station is reached but the conversation is not held, because of any reason beyond the control of the telephone company a "report charge" is made equivalent to about one-fourth of the "station to station" rate. (Minimum "report charge" 10c, maximum \$2.00.)

Reduced rates, applying only to calls made on a "station to station" basis are quoted for toll service between the hours of 8:30 p. m. and 4:30 a. m. The rate between 8:30 p. m. and 12 midnight is about one-half the "station to station" day rate, and between 12 midnight and 4:30 a. m. about one-fourth the "station to station" day rate. The minimum night rate is 25c. Where the "station to station" day rate is 25c or less no reduction is made for night service.

For the purpose of applying reduced rates, for evening and night "station to station" service, the time of day at the calling point is used. Day rates apply on all calls other than those made on a "station to station" basis, whether they are made during the day, evening or night.

## LORD ROBERT CECIL SUBMITS VIEWS ON LEAGUE OF NATIONS

DOES NOT BELIEVE WORLD IS READY FOR RIGID SYSTEM TO ENFORCE PEACE.

### IS NOT PRACTICABLE

Does Not Believe an International Tribunal With Absolutely Binding Powers is Advisable.

By Associated Press.  
LONDON, Wednesday, January 22.—Lord Robert Cecil who today announced at Paris that he had submitted to the peace congress a draft of the British view on the subject of the league of nations, believe the world has not yet reached a stage at which an absolutely rigid system for the preservation of international peace can be set up, according to a Reuters dispatch from the French capital. In discussing his idea of the form of the league should take, Lord Robert says he thinks an international tribunal with absolutely binding powers is not practicable at present.

"The creation of a non-rigid international machinery by which a council by exerting influence toward conciliation may work, will be the main strength of future peace makers," he said. "Such a body must, however, possess at least sufficient international guaranteed power to be able to prevent surprise declarations of war and to compel disputants to accept delay during which forces of civilization may have time to try to avert a calamity."

No Nation To Itself.  
"The interdependence of modern states has become so great that no nation can control its own affairs entirely without regard to the effects of its actions on other nations. It is important to proceed with the utmost respect for sovereignty. At present certain international organizations such as posts and telegraphs are regulated by international agencies. Before the war we had the Danube commission, the Rhine convention and even international labor organizations. It is easy to see that in the future certain cities located on waterways

will have to be under international control which will guarantee free access to them. Some of the new states formed out of the Austro-Hungarian empire, for example can not possibly have independent access to the sea. Switzerland, according to newspaper dispatches is considering a plan which will give her a way to reach the water. Certain nations have a strong interest in having free access to Sioniki but it is out of the question for them to plan possession of that port. The most important example of this kind, of course, is that of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus.

Lead to New Organization.  
"These examples of international agencies which are necessary, lead naturally to a new organization, the object of which will be the welfare of the nations of the world."

"Delay which can give opportunity for discussion and conciliation will be the main resource of the league in dealing with disputes in which the vital interests of great nations are involved. In case of smaller disputes the ultimate decision must rest with the great powers, since as a last resort, the league can enforce its decisions only by the military powers which will always be possessed by the great nations."

Speaking of the attitude of other powers represented at the congress, Lord Robert said he had found in conversations with delegates that there was in very large measure an agreement on the principles he had outlined. In case of smaller disputes between there is no reason, he said, why they should not be settled by an international tribunal.

Power of Public Opinion.  
"In general the power on which the league must mainly rely will be public opinion," he continued, "and it is for this reason that the power imposing delay on disputants is so important."

Lord Robert said he favored the establishment of a permanent international council of the league which would sit at a place agreed upon. Above this, he said, there should be a superior council, consisting of premiers or important members of various national governments which meet regularly and during the next few years very frequently.

New states formed out of the wreck of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy, Lord Robert said, could be admitted to the league without difficulty as soon as settled governments were established.

## PROPOSED LAWS AFFECTING STATE OIL DEVELOPMENT

The following reference to the attitude of the legislature on matters of interest to the oil fraternity is from the pen of Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald, editor of the Fort Worth Record, who refers especially to the proposed bill having for its object the validating of mineral rights to purchasers of state lands, giving title to such rights to purchasers of such lands out of the lands of the public school, university, asylum and public lands. The article, in part, is as follows:

"Oil tanks won the war. Oil and tanks overwhelmed coal and the steam railway. Germany had the coal, Germany had the steam railway. The allies had the petroleum and they hand the tanks."

"Texas is in the eye of the world. Recent oil development has placed Texas in the eye of the world. One of the important house committees, if not the most important to thousands of Texans, is that of gas, oil and mining."

"Dan McMillin of Grayson county is chairman of the committee. He is a banker at Whitewright and is said to be largely interested in the cottonseed oil industry. He has the reputation of being a lawmaker who believes in conservation and the forward movement."

"Former Judge Marshall of Hardeman county is vice chairman of this committee. Marshall comes from the oil country. This is his first term as a lawmaker. He has been a citizen of the Panhandle for 20 years and has studied the oil industry in all its stages of development."

"This committee contains the fol-

lowing members from Tarrant and the territory west of Tarrant: Brown and Malone of Fort Worth, King of Throckmorton, Parrell of Wilbarger, Cox of Taylor, Neill of Eastland, Pool of El Paso, Wright of Archer, Mack Taylor of Erath, Parsley of Young, Darroch of Goldthwaite, Stephens of Runnels, Stewart of Reeves, Sackett of Coleman and Kelly of Sterling.

"There are 15 members of this important committee who hail from west or north Texas without counting the chairman. Culp comes from central Texas, Atlee from the Rio Grande border and Hall from Harris county, which calls itself the oil city of the lower country. Daval county has oil wells and Atlee hails from that section."

"A bill is being prepared by Representative Marshall to validate mineral rights to purchasers of state lands from the state giving title to such mineral rights to purchasers of lands out of the lands of the public school, university, asylum and public lands of the state of Texas."

Most Important Bill.  
"This bill is likely to be one of the most important considered by the Thirty-sixth Legislature being a broad departure from the policy heretofore pursued by the state."

"It is claimed by Representative Marshall that the bill will affect all parts of the state, benefits accruing to citizens of west, north, east and south Texas alike. He said that recently developments have shown very clearly that deposits of mineral in one form or another are likely to be found under state lands or lands bought from the state."

"Inasmuch as past, present and future purchasers of state lands will be vitally interested in their patent carrying with it all that their real estate may contain from the earth's surface to the bowels thereof," said Representative Marshall, "I cannot but believe this bill will interest favorably the major portion of the legislature. Mineral rights in all lands sold under acts of 1883 and 1889 should be validated by the present legislature except in such instances as it may appear such mineral rights were

specifically reserved in the award of sale. I desire to clear this big question from any further cloud of chance for lawsuits in the premises."

Constructs Ancient Law.  
"Representative Marshall suggests that the act of the legislature in 1882, bearing on the mineral reserve for the state provided for sale of the lands, but did not provide for the sale of minerals separately from the lands, that the act of 1889 reserved the mineral rights to the state, but did not provide separately except for mining claims."

"I contend that the original intention of the legislature in making mineral reservations was that such reservations should be perpetuated only on those lands where mineral was at that time known to exist," said Representative Marshall, "and briefly my bill will provide that where lands are sold under the act of 1883, the act of 1889 having repealed the prior act, then such specifically reserved rights of the state should be protected but validate titles to all minerals in land sold under the 1883 act where minerals were not specifically reserved in the classification or award of sale."

"Those representatives from the west who are members of the oil committee are for the most part young and aggressive. They believe that Texas should go forward and they are

opposed to oppressive or repressive legislation of any variety. They realize that the war has piled heavy burdens upon the American people and that to increase the wealth of America as well as the annual income of America to meet the financial obligations imposed by the war it is vitally

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# ERNEST C. HALL TO INAUGURATE COMMERCIAL AIRPLANE SERVICE

Ernest C. Hall, former civilian instructor at Call Field, with the rank of Chief Flight Instructor, is to start an airplane service with Wichita Falls as headquarters, having been organizing his service for the past two months. However, until his release from government service he has not made his plans public until this time. He has secured the backing of a number of wealthy and influential business and oil men of this district, and has already signed up almost 100 men already for air trips, several planning to make a round trip to Fort Worth by air, for business purposes.

Mr. Hall holds the agency for the Curtiss planes and will use a new JN4D ship for his passenger service. He will probably place two or three other airplanes with men in this section who have announced their intention of buying airplanes for use in the oil business. As soon as his ship arrives he will be ready to give all those who have been longing for a trip through the air, just for the novelty of the thing, a "joy ride" and will also be ready to make trip to Dallas, Fort Worth, the nearby oil fields, or other points within the radius of several hundred miles. As stated above, already a number of men have signed up for flights, at prices ranging from \$25 to \$200 for a round trip to Fort Worth.

During the entire period of the Call

Field flying school, Mr. Hall has been chief flight instructor, coming here from the Wilbur Wright Field at Dayton, Ohio. He has made many friends both among the men of the camp, and among the business men of the city, and his qualifications as a flier are known to be the highest. He has had ten years flying experience, as pilot and manager, and is one of the veterans of the game, though a young man, and his opinions as regards aviation in general are regarded as most authoritative by those who have been associated with him.

Mr. Hall became interested first in the theory of flight at Warren, Ohio, and nine years later he constructed and flew one of the first airplanes. This machine, designed and built by Mr. Hall, is very similar to the Loening monoplane, which is the fastest two seater in the world today.

Since that time he has followed the game very closely and has devoted all of the past ten years to the industry. He has constructed and flown three different machines, which he has sold. In 1914 and 1915 Mr. Hall owned and operated one of the pioneer flying schools in the country, located at Exposition Park, Conneaut Lake, Pa., and at the time the United States entered the war Mr. Hall offered this school to the government free of charge that the training of aviators be delayed as little as possible. Between the park and Conneaut Lake, a distance of five miles, Mr. Hall operated what is known as the first airplane passenger line in the United States.


O. D. Zorn as Mechanician. Mr. Hall's airplane and motors will be in charge of O. D. Zorn, well known mechanic, Master Signal Electrician, who has been in charge of the Call Field machine shops and motor repairs, since the opening of the field. Mr. Hall states that he considers Mr. Zorn one of the most able mechanics he has ever known.

In discussing the proposed passenger service by airplane, Mr. Hall stated that while he believed the airplane was destined to become a common means of transportation, nevertheless it was still more or less of a novelty. "Just as people used to condemn the airplane and look on it only as an 'infernal machine' of some sort, of no value except as an instrument to take the place of the old hot air balloon at the fairs and carnivals they today predict wonders for its future. Almost every individual goes from one extreme to another. Today almost every one predicts that airplanes will be as common as automobile within a few years. They do not realize that aviation is taking only its first steps. Machines will not be practical for private use for many years. It is just as expensive as it ever was, a million to the sport. The only machine practical today for civilian use is the two seater known as the training machine. I consider the proposition which I understand has been advanced by Fort Worth people, to convert a bombing plane to carry passengers, impossible and absurd. Liberty Twelves cost \$10,000 apiece and they might run 100 hours before going to pieces. A bombing plane such as that suggested would cost \$100,000 and then some pilot might take it out and crack it up.

Will Become Common. "It is true that before long airplanes will become common, but never so common as automobile. I should say more like the passenger, express and freight trains. Just as it takes an

expert to pilot an express train, a man with years of experience, so will it require experts to pilot the plane of the future. Aviation is not a game one can learn in a few hundred hours. It requires thousands of hours for

quires the services a licensed pilot. There is nothing to the dream of putting in an airplane service of a lot of discarded government machines and costly equipment for commercial purposes, in my opinion, at present. It is a safe and speedy means of transportation only in the hands of skilled mechanics and clever pilots and the cost connected with it will not prevent its general use at the present time.

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

### LATIN-AMERICAN ISSUE DELAYED IN PEACE CONGRESS

PROBABLY SEVERAL WEEKS BEFORE QUESTION WILL HAVE CONSIDERATION.

### MORE PRESSING WORK

Dispute Between Chile, Peru and Bolivia is the Only Acute Situation Confronting Conference.

By Associated Press.

PARIS, Wednesday, Jan. 22.—It probably will be several weeks before any Latin-American questions will be considered by the peace congress because of the more pressing nature of the European problem. The Tanca-Arica dispute between Chile, Peru and Bolivia is the only acute situation in Latin America but it seems that even this is not likely to command attention before the league of nations is formed. The league is expected to be especially qualified to deal with boundary questions in a scientific manner.

The United States has many experts in Paris with full information about South and Central American questions which are likely to be brought to the attention of the delegates. The boundary between Guatemala and Honduras in which Secretary of State Lansing was named as arbitrator is said to be moving toward settlement and can probably be adjusted without reference to the peace congress.

Colombia Not Complaining.

As yet Colombia has not made any overtures in reference to her differences with the United States and no formal steps have been taken to bring any of the scores of Latin-American boundary disputes to the attention of the congress, although it is expected that many of these historic controversies will be referred to the league of nations as the logical tribunal for their consideration. Should the status of Pan-America be changed as a result of a possibility of a new sea policy, it is expected that Latin-American nations as a whole will make representations of their rights of sovereignty of the United States. Investigation by the league of nations of Colombia's alleged assistance to the German navy by permitting the use of her islands is also regarded as probable.

Many diplomats interested in the league of nations believe that boundary disputes, especially those in remote sections of Latin America, are largely due to the lack of accurate surveys and the dearth of scientifically collected historical data. They are confident that by assisting in the preparation of this data the league can remove many possible causes of serious differences.

## PRESIDENTS OF SWITZERLAND AND U. S. WILL MEET

EXECUTIVE OF SWITZERLAND VISITS PARIS TO PRESENT THAT COUNTRY'S VIEWS.

### STATEMENT IS ISSUED

Meeting with President Wilson Will Take Place This Evening at Seven-thirty.

By Associated Press.

PARIS, Wednesday, Jan. 22.—The presidents of the United States and Switzerland will meet tomorrow evening at 7:30 o'clock. President Ador, who arrived here from Bern today, will, before he meets President Wilson, confer with President Poincare, Premier Clemenceau and possibly Premier Lloyd George.

He comes to Paris bearing a statement of the views of the Swiss government on pending international questions, which will be laid before the peace congress. The statement in part follows:

Statement is issued.  
"1.—Switzerland expects to be admitted with other states to the peace negotiations as far as they deal with her own special interests or with problems of general importance. Exclusion from deliberations on problems of the league of nations would be considered by the Swiss people as inconsistent with the principles of democracy.

"2.—Switzerland highly approves of the creation of a league of nations to preserve peace and expects from it a complete reform of international relations.  
"3.—Switzerland recognizes the necessity for action which may ultimately consist of military pressure within the system of the league of nations. Nevertheless, Switzerland is determined not to abandon her neutrality, which is laid down in the Swiss association and based on the tradition of 460 years of peaceful politics. This neutrality is necessary for Switzerland considering the composition of her population, as well as on account of her being in a particularly exposed strategic position.

"4.—Freedom of production and commerce is of vital importance for Switzerland. As far as limitations would be imposed concerning importation, exportation and free passage of goods and raw materials, all states should mutually accord each other most favored nation treatment.  
"5.—Switzerland highly approves of principle of free access to the sea. Switzerland attributes great importance to the maintenance and improvement of the existing international waterway of the Rhine from Basel to the North Sea, and fully expects besides that it will be soon possible to come to an understanding with France and Italy for opening the Rhine and Po-Ticino rivers for navigation on a big scale.  
"6.—The political, legal and economic principles formulated by President Wilson are so entirely in conformity with the traditional wants of Switzerland that she will adhere to them, whatever difficulties may lie in the way of their realization."


