

COMMITTEE IS APPOINTED TO DETERMINE EXTENT OF ARMED OCCUPATION

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 24.—The supreme council of the peace congress at its second session today decided to appoint a committee to inquire into the strength of the forces to be maintained by the allied and associated powers on the western front during the period of the armistice.

The committee will be composed of Marshal Foch, General Staff, Chief of Staff, General Diaz, Winston Spencer Churchill, the British minister of war, and M. Loucheur, French minister of reconstruction.

PRESIDENT AGREES TO THE DEMAND FOR INDEMNITIES

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 24.—During the consideration of the question of reparation at the meeting of the supreme council yesterday the Paris edition of the London Daily Mail, says, the President agreed to the principle that Germany must be made to pay indemnities in addition to the full cost of reparation.

RUSSIAN REVOLUTIONARY PARTY APPROVES PLAN

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 24. (Havas).—The Russian revolutionary party approves President Wilson's proposition, adopted by the supreme council of the peace conference, for a meeting of representatives of the various Russian governments with representatives of the Allies, according to the delegate of that party now in Paris.

ADDITIONAL DELEGATIONS ARRIVE FOR CONFERENCE

By Associated Press. PARIS, Thursday, January 23.—Delegations of Bolsheviks, Lithuanians and White Russians, including representatives from the cities of Vilna and Warsaw have arrived here. They will defend the interests of the Polish population in Lithuania and White Russia and wish to obtain, first of all, assurance that a Bolshevik invasion of these regions will be prevented.

35th Division Loss Was Only 827 Men

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Losses of the 35th Division (Kansas and Missouri national guards) in killed and died of wounds during its entire service in France up to November 7 were 827 men, Secretary Baker told the House Rules committee today in connection with a resolution by Representative Campbell of Kansas, calling for congressional investigation of reported excessive losses in this division.

The resolution, Representative Campbell said, was founded on reports current in Kansas and upon statements made by Governor Allen of that state on his return from service with the Y. M. C. A. attached to the 35th Division. It asked for investigation of reports that the division in a seven day fight in Argonne, France, included adequate artillery support, ammunition, food, airplane protection and adequate care of wounded, 12,000 of whom were said to have been left on wet ground without shelter for 46 hours.

300,000 Americans Participate. In the course of the hearing, General March, who accompanied Secretary Baker, said that roughly 300,000 American troops participated in the Argonne fight. They had behind them 40,000 guns, he said, and an official statement from the chief of staff of

the artillery of the first army of which the 35th was a part, stated that the infantry never got beyond artillery support.

Secretary Baker said the war department invited the fullest investigation of the conduct of the war by congress and called attention to the fact that after the civil war, a comprehensive investigation of this character was made. He indicated that he would welcome a similar investigation after the return of the troops from France when full reports would be available.

Participants Could Tell. So far as the reports as to the 35th Division were concerned, Mr. Baker said, he felt that the men who could tell of all that happened in the fighting in the Argonne were still in France and it would be impossible to hold a just inquiry without their views.

PORTUGUESE MONARCHY PROCLAIMED IN LISBON

By Associated Press. MADRID, Jan. 24.—The monarchy has been proclaimed in Lisbon, the Portuguese capital, according to a telegram received here from Valencia, on the Portuguese border.

VIGO, SPAIN, Jan. 24.—The monarchist movement in Portugal has a foothold at Santarem, 45 miles northeast of Lisbon, according to advices received here. They report that troops under Colonel Silvermora which the Lisbon had sent to aid in suppressing the monarchist rebellion, joined the royalists at Santarem.

PORTUGUESE NAVY IS LOYAL TO GOVERNMENT

By Associated Press. LISBON, Jan. 24.—The Portuguese navy has remained loyal to the government, according to all accounts received in the Madrid. The Madrid newspapers, however, have advices saying that the army is on the side of the revolutionists.

CONDEMN POLICY FOR DEALING WITH RUSSIAN PEOPLE

By Associated Press. LONDON, January 24.—Newspapers here comment warmly on the plan for a conference between an Allied commission and representatives of the various governments in Russia. The Post sarcastically condemns the proposal saying among other things that "it displays more than Christian meekness."

The first subject on the order of business, as was announced yesterday by the supreme council will be international legislation on labor. Under instructions given at the first session of the supreme council, delegations have been preparing written statements of their views on the subject and it is understood that, under a special order, which will give careful study to the various reports and endeavor to amalgamate them into a general project to be recommended to the congress for approval.

CLAIM DECISION IS A VICTORY FOR BOLSHEVISM

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 24.—Russian leaders here think the decision of the supreme council to invite bolshevist leaders to a conference constitutes the greatest victory that bolshevism could even hope to attain. It would not be surprising, however, if the bolshevists would refuse to participate, they say, using the same "imperialist" language which they have already adopted in their communications with President Wilson.

NO PARTY TO HAVE FULL MAJORITY IN GERMAN ASSEMBLY

By Associated Press. BERLIN, Jan. 24.—Based on its common sense and unofficial figures on the results of the German elections for the national assembly as received yesterday from Basel, Switzerland, the Times today points out that no party has an absolute majority in the assembly, but expresses the opinion that there is every probability of a strong combination between the majority socialists and the democrats (the former radicals reinforced by some national liberals) together with whatever recruits they may attract from the other groups.

BIG BREAKS IN PRICE OF GRAIN AND PROVISIONS

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, Jan. 24.—Big breaks in the value of grain and provisions took place today as a result of heavy selling and apparent lack of buying power. Corn showed losses of 4 to 8 3/4 bushels, oats more than four cents and provisions the maximum limit for a single day, 50 cents to \$1.00.

WOULD TAKE FROM PRESIDENT POWER FOR MAKING RATES

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Withdrawing immediately by congress of the arbitrary powers of the President to fix freight rates is asked today by Clifford Thorne, representing various shippers, before the Senate interstate commerce committee. He said incalculable injury would be suffered by the shippers unless this was done.

RECOVER BODY OF ROSA LUXEMBURG BADLY MUTILATED

By Associated Press. AMSTERDAM, Jan. 24.—The body of Rosa Luxemburg, the spartanist leader killed by a mob recently, was found yesterday in the Lanwehr Canal, near Berlin. The body was severely mutilated, according to a report from Berlin. The news, it is said, is being kept secret.

OPEN UP A NEW FIELD NEAR BURK

Fifteen feet of sand with showing of both oil and gas is reported encountered at 575 feet in the Burk-Wagoner Oil Company's well being drilled on Block 84, Red River Valley Lands, about six miles northwest of Burk Burnett. This would indicate one of the most important developments since the first extensions of the Burk Burnett township pool, for this location is a good six miles from the townsite and five miles from where oil has been found, being about this distance from the Herndon and Fink tracts where the Mumble and Hammond-Jett companies have wells on the sand.

TWO SISTERS LEAP FROM VESSEL SIDE AND ARE DROWNED

By Associated Press. BORDAUX, Jan. 24.—Misses Gladys and Dorothy Cromwell, sisters of New York, leaped from the side of the French steamer La Lezardiere, which was in the Garonne river, bound for New York, today. Both were drowned. The bodies have not yet been recovered.

GIRLS WERE PROMINENT IN NEW YORK SOCIETY

The Misses Cromwell, who were twins, were daughters of the late Frederic Cromwell, for many years treasurer and trustee of the Mutual Life Insurance Company. Their brother, Seymour L. Cromwell, was president of the society for the Fatherless Children of France and a recipient of the Cross of the Legion of Honor.

STRIKE EPIDEMIC IN BERLIN EVEN MORE PRONOUNCED

In common with the bourgeois press the socialist Vorwaerts pointed out the revolutionary nature of the strike of the electric workers by which hundreds of thousands suffered great hardships.

Report Capture of Trotzky at Narva

Advances from the same source state that, owing to the intervention of Finnish troops in northern Estonia and Latvia, the country has been completely cleared of bolshevik forces.

HUMANE SOCIETY TO HAVE TAG DAY HERE SATURDAY

At a meeting held at the Club Room of the Library Thursday afternoon, the Wichita Falls Humane and Humane Society perfected plans to have a tag day on Saturday of this week, the proceeds of which will be expended in the superabundance of work now on hand. The general chairman appointed 15 captains, each authorized to select six lieutenants to command the business corners of the city Saturday. A meeting of the 15 companies was to be held at the library this afternoon to receive their assignments of tags and badges.

The organization during its process of formation has a number of infants in its care, and is now endeavoring to install a 24-hour phone service to meet emergencies, that may demand the services of the Welfare and Humane Society. For the convenience of workers who were not able to attend the meeting this afternoon the general chairman and her assistants will be found at the North Texas Furniture company all day Saturday to help workers and give out additional supplies.

PLEASED WITH THE PART OF AMERICA IN PEACE CONFERENCE

By K. WALTER.
(Reciprocal News Service.)
LONDON, Jan. 22.—London, the sounding board of the peace conference, is well pleased with the leading part America is taking in the opening formalities. This part may be largely due to the presence of the President and the official commands. But a significant shifting of balances has taken place in the last few weeks. The vigorous leadership of Clemenceau and the universal sympathy with the extraordinary sufferings of France had combined to give that nation a strong and some thought a too strong position among the peace makers. Her press was the first to put forward large claims for the indemnity of 71 with interest. For her, also, the secret treaties seemed to be more important than to others. She was said to be encouraging Italy's claim on the Adriatic in order to balance her own intentions in Syria.

Visit Relieves Situation.
Meanwhile the victory election campaign was producing sentiments and ambitions of a similar nature in England. Of course, nobody believed half of what was said at such a time, but there was a genuine fear in all moderate circles that England might be committing herself too much to France and eventually make all the more possible by the altered attitude of America to England of the sea question. It was suggested that Lloyd George and Clemenceau had formed a combination against Wilson, and obviously there existed a closer understanding between them that either could have had at the time with the President. This situation was relieved by Wilson's visit here.

Some Apprehension Remained.
There remained some apprehension lest the peace proceedings should be so cut and dried that France and England would run the whole show, which none but the blindest Tory here desires. It would ultimately prove fatal to the government of both countries if their representatives attempted to assume even a limited world dictatorship. With America taking a position so cut and dried that of either of the other two principal parties and accepting responsibilities for the justice and stability of the world's peace, any such misadventure is impossible. America threw her sword into the scales of war. Market Report

Cotton Market

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—There was renewal of heavy general selling in the cotton market this morning and a former violent decline in prices. The opening was firm at a decline of 60 points on January and one point on March but 30 to 50 points higher on later deliveries. The weakness of the spot month was explained by the circulation of notices estimated at 2,500 bales which forced the liquidation of eleven hour longs and the price of that delivery broke to 21.00 after the call, or 135 points net lower. This weakness had an unsettling effect on the general list and the opening advances of later months met pressure from both southern and local sources. March broke to 21.00 and May to 20.10 before the end of the first hour or 30 to 50 points net lower. Trading in January will end at noon today. Liverpool was a buyer of the new months on the break and also bought July.

The early break extended to 21.00 for January, or 185 points net lower. There was increased southern selling of the later months, which sent March off to 20.95 and May to 20.00, or 49 to 61 points net lower.

The pressure became less aggressive at this level and there were rallies later in the morning, the last sale of January being 21.35. Spot hedges were sellers of March which ruled around 21.19 at midday, or about 37 points net lower while the lower while the lower positions were 10 to 25 points net higher on covering and buyers for a reaction.

While still nervous the market showed a steadier undertone during the early afternoon on covering and buying for a reaction. The sharper bulges met further scattered liquidation and were not fully maintained but the market held around 20.60 for May and 19.95 for July during the middle of the afternoon, or about 20 to 25 points net higher. March remained relatively easy but worked up to 21.47, or within nine points of last night's close.

Cotton closed very steady.

New Orleans Cotton.
NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 24.—Selling orders depressed near months 10 to 15 points on the opening call in cotton today, but realizing of profits on the short side became general and a quick advance resumed. At the end of the first half hour of trading the market stood 20 to 40 points over yesterday's close.

At a level 20 to 44 points up selling pressure was renewed and the market responded to it quickly. Heavy liquidation of cotton by foreign interests was rumored. In the trading up to noon the active months fell 25 to 50 points under the closing quotations of yesterday.

Something of a reactionary tendency appeared in the afternoon and at 1 o'clock prices were 21 points off to 35 points up compared with the close of yesterday.

Cotton closed steady, unchanged to 65 points up net.

NEW REGULATIONS GREATLY DIMINISH COUNCILS POWER

BERNE, SWITZ., Jan. 24.—Under the new regulations, which have issued relative to the control of the German army the power of the soldiers' councils will be greatly diminished. The Prussian minister of war, through the army offices, be charged with responsibility for the employment and leadership of his men. He will be supreme chief of the army and he alone will have power to promote officers and soldiers. Soldiers' councils will be formed by all garrisons, regiments or battalions to watch over the activities of officers and see that military authority is not used against government. They must be consulted as to permanent regulations relative to feeding the troops, the granting of leave and discipline, but beyond that they are under strict limitations.

Nearly a Million Men Registered In State of Texas

By Associated Press.
 AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 24.—Nearly one million men in Texas were registered under the selective service law. Governor Hobby announced in his message to the state legislature in describing the administration of the law in the state. Under the direction of Major John C. Townes Jr., four district exemption boards of seven members each were created, 289 local exemption boards of three members each, 289 government appeal agents, 282 boards of instruction of three members each, fifteen advisory boards of twelve members each and seven inspectors.

On June 5, 1917, there were 417,689 men registered in the state. June 5, 1918, there were 34,161, August 24, 1918, about 8,000 and September 12 there were 528,218 men registered—a total registration in Texas of 988,068 men.

Furnish 182,153 Men.

Under the draft calls, Texas with slightly less 5 per cent of the population furnished 83,072 white men and 28,118 negroes, a total of 111,190 men through the draft process. By enlistment and voluntary induction an additional 45,000 men went to the army who were within the draft age. It

addition, Governor Hobby said there were 25,000 men of draft age who joined the navy and Marine Corps, making the total men furnished the army from Texas 182,153 not counting the new National Guard Organization.

The draft law was administered at the expense of the federal government, the total disbursements to Jan. 1 being \$1,065,495.34 the per cent expense of registration, classification, examination and induction in Texas being \$3.88 as against an average in the various states of \$4.93, a maximum expense of \$10.00 per capita and a minimum of \$1.57.

 DALLAS, TEX., Jan. 24.—Some of the West Texas farmers who deserted their homes last summer in pitiful white lines of old prairie wagons are now going back in automobiles. Driven out by a three years drouth, they are going back as oil men.

Stretches of land where the drouth had virtually withered every leaf of vegetation and from which the heartened farmers departed for the cotton fields and other more prosperous sections, are within the new oil district.

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SERVICE CROSS IS AWARDED FOUR TEXAS SOLDIERS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—The commander in chief, in the name of the President, has awarded the distinguished service cross to the following named for Texas and Oklahoma for the acts of extraordinary heroism described after their names:

Sgt. E. Kelley Nail, Co. I, 142nd Infantry: For extraordinary heroism in action near St. Etienne, France, October 8, 1918. Sgt. Nail, in charge of a patrol, successfully flanked a machine-gun nest of several guns which was holding up the advance of his company and captured four German officers and 108 men. The success of the assault was largely due to the energy and good judgment of Sgt. Nail. Home address, Mrs. R. V. Nail, mother, Cleburne, Texas.

Corpl. Frank Johnston, Co. M, 142nd Infantry: For extraordinary heroism in action near St. Etienne, France, October 8, 1918. After his company had been thrown into confusion by running into its own artillery barrage, Corpl. Johnston reorganized a large part of the company and continued the advance. His command was again separated by a barrage of enemy artillery fire but he continued with that portion of the company left under his control until he was twice wounded and carried to the rear. Corpl. Ernest M. Boggs, Co. M, 142nd Infantry: For extraordinary heroism in action near St. Etienne, France, October 8, 1918. 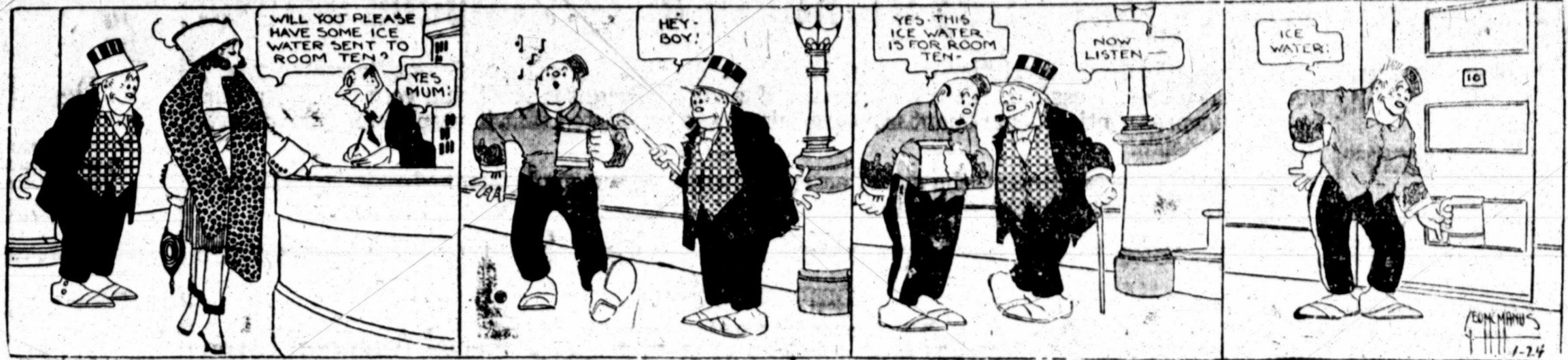

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PROPOSED RAISE OF WATER RATES BEFORE COUNCIL

MATTER IS FURTHER DISCUSSED BUT NO ACTION IS TAKEN BY BOARD.

NO SHOW CENSORSHIP

City Officials Fail to Make Provision As Requested in Petition From Clubs.

Although no official action was taken in the matter of the petition filed by the water company, asking for permission to raise the existing rates, at the meeting of the city council last night, the question was discussed freely and it was the opinion of the council that the books of the company should be audited and if their records show that a raise in rates is necessary then the proposed increase should be granted.

Must Provide Supply. Both Mayor Marlow and Alderman McFall were strong in their statements that if an increase is granted, there must be ample assurance and guarantee that the water company will be able to furnish sufficient water for the city, not only during the present year but in the future.

Audit Is Favored. It was admitted by all members of the council that the question of water supply for the city is a serious proposition and that any steps taken in the matter should be done so only after careful investigation was made.

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is paid six cents per thousand gallons to pump the water from the lake into the mains, the water company paying for all pipes, equipment, treating of water etc., which leaves the electric company no expense with the exception of furnished the actual power to pump the water into the mains. This question should be considered thoroughly, it was declared, and as one member said: "It might be a case of taking money out of one pocket and placing it into another," and that in reality the majority of the stockholders of the water company might not be losing money, as Mr. Lawton claims the books of that company will convince.

Question of Pressure. The question of a lack of pressure in the mains, for fire protection was discussed in connection with matter. The cause of the first last Sunday in which the great loss, it was claimed, was condemned. Members of the council said that the city was paying the water company approximately \$50 for the main in that district, for fire protection to the citizens in the surrounding territory, and that the water company should be forced to furnish the protection. Some of them declared that the water company should pay the owner of the buildings for the loss that occurred, and if the company would not replace the four-inch main by a larger one, the city should take steps toward seeing that such action was taken.

Consider Show Censorship. Representatives of local theaters appeared before the council with a strong protest against the proposed establishment of a board of censors to pass on all pictures and vaudeville entertainments brought here before they are presented to the public. At the meeting of the council last week a petition filed by the different clubs and organizations of the city was heartily endorsed, and the city attorney instructed to draw up an ordinance which would be more effective.

Consider Show Censorship. W. J. Johnson, manager of the Majestic, acting as spokesman for the other theaters, told the council that a censorship board as proposed, would kill the moving picture business of the city. He explained that theater exhibitors pay high prices for the pictures shown here, and that in most cases they are paid for before arriving, and with a censorship board sitting here that would first see the picture, and in the event it was condemned, would mean the loss of several hundred dollars, in some cases, as well as the loss of the entire day for the theater. He said that such a method would be unjust to exhibitors, and if the ladies' clubs and council members wanted to get at the matter in a way that would really be beneficial, as well as not work a hardship on a few persons, they should take the question up with the legislature in

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an effort to get a bill through establishing a censorship board, to be located centrally, to pass on all pictures released for the state. This suggestion met with approval from some of the members.

Theaters Are Represented. Mr. Johnson said, in regard to the vaudeville, that the women termed vulgar and indecent, that he was giving to the public here the same high class shows that are giving in the principal cities of the state, and that he was for only the best and cleanest in the way of shows at all times. He further said that if any members of the civic league or any other of the women's clubs, would come to his theater when a vaudeville program was to be given, that he would be glad to go over the rehearsal with them and receive any suggestions or criticisms that they might make, and that he would promise them a show at all times that would meet with their approval. After this agreement was made the matter of taking the proposition up with the legislature was dropped.

No Complaint at Pictures. Mrs. Smock, who attended the council meeting in the interest of the creation of the censorship board, said that the chief complaints were against the cheap vaudeville and not the picture shows. Mayor Marlow, who was present at the meeting last week, when City Attorney Ralph Mathis was instructed to prepare the ordinance in compliance with the appeal of the women's clubs, did not favor such action, saying that he was confident the theater managers could prevent the vulgar and indecent features of the programs, if they would go at it in the proper manner.

Present at the meeting were: Mayor Marlow, Alderman McFall, McCutcheon, Lea, Bundy and Reed, City Clerk Walkup, City Attorney Mathis, Chief of Police Smith, City Engineer Donald.

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W. J. JOHNSON IS TO BE MANAGER OF WICHITA THEATER

Commencing February 1st, the management of the Wichita Theatre will be in charge of W. J. Johnson, who has been connected with the amusement business in Wichita Falls for a number of years, first taking over the Victoria on Ohio and later connecting with the Empress, but who for the last two years has managed the Majestic and has brought this house to the distinction of paying more war tax on admissions than any other theatre of any size in any town in the state of Texas where Sunday shows are prohibited.

During the month of February Mr. Johnson states, he has several big attractions booked for the Wichita theater and will add to the list as soon as possible. Some of the present bookings are "The Trail of the Lonesome Pine," "Flo-Flo," "Bird of Paradise," "David Warfield, Neil O'Brien and 'Daddy Long Legs.'" Also some big picture attractions will be booked, he having already secured the "Fighting Roosevelts," the pictured life of the ex-President, completed a few weeks prior to his death.

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
