OIL DEVELOPMENT

HUMBLE WELL ON HERNDON MAKING MORE THAN 2,000

When turned loose on Sunday the Humble well on the Herndon started flowing, and through Sunday night put oil into the tanks at the rate of 2,000 barrels a day, according to authentic reports from the field. The well had been drilled further into the sand Friday and bailed to clean out, then was shut down until Sunday for final completion. The flow for the first 11 hours was 1,000 barrels.

MOGUL WELL IS REPORTED TO BE ON SAND AT 1595

The Mogul Oil Co. in block 106 of the Willis tract is reported on the sand at 1595 feet. A star rig which was being moved to the well to be used in drilling it in is mired down in the mud and it may be several days before it can be gotten into place. If the Mogul makes a good producer it will be an important extension of the field to the southeast.

Navarro Company Among the Newer Oil Organizations

The Navarro Oil Company is among the new organizations formed to operate the local developments in the main offices in Room 415 of the First National Bank building. The company holds two and a half acres out of the J. N. Harlan tract, located near the Marine well on the northwest side of the town of Burkburnett.

COURT RULES ON GROSS PRODUCTION TAX IN OKLAHOMA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Oklahoma decrees giving effect to the state's 1916 gross production tax upon oil and gas produced by those operating under federal as well as private leases of Indian lands were set aside today by the supreme court. Without rendering an opinion the court sustained an appeal of the Large Oil Company, operating in the Osage reservation from orders requiring it to pay the taxes to the state auditor.

DEVELOPMENTS IN VICINITY OF DUKE DISCOVERY WELL

Special to The Times. FORT WORTH, TEX., Jan. 27.—The Shilly Well, 7200 feet southeast of the J. N. Duke discovery well, is down 2665 feet, according to reports received by the Magnolia Petroleum Company. Rumors at Cisco are that the drillers have gone more than 2800 feet with no encouraging indications. The Crescent well, 4000 feet west of the Duke discovery well, hit the sand between 2680 to 2690 feet with small oil. They have shut down and will build tanks before going further. The Snodgrass well, 1500 feet southeast of the Duke discovery well, claims to have hit the sand at 2600 feet. The Ephler well, about three miles northwest of the Duke well, has shut down at 2710 feet. The Leon Valley well, 8000 feet due south of the Duke well, found sand between 2645 and 2690 feet and is reported a dry hole. The Payne well, 1800 feet southeast of the Duke well, reports sand 2665 feet with a trace of oil.

REPORT TWO WELLS BY TEXAS COMPANY. Special to The Times. FORT WORTH, TEX., Jan. 27.—New wells near Ranger and Breckenridge were reported Monday morning to have been brought in by the Texas company. A well on the Sypers survey, two miles northeast of Ranger, is making about 500 barrels. The other well is in the C. S. Houston survey, 2074, Peters Colony land, four miles southeast of Breckenridge and is making about 47 barrels.

# PRESIDENT VIEWS DEVASTATED AREA NORTHERN FRANCE

## MAKES FIRST TRIP TO BATTLE FRONT VISITING CHATEAU THIERRY AND RHEIMS.

# WAS VISIBLY IMPRESSED

## Unable to Put into Words His Feelings After Viewing Scene, the President Said.

By Associated Press.

PARIS, Sunday, Jan. 26.—President Wilson today made his first trip to the battlefront and devastated regions, visiting Chateau Thierry and Rheims. At the close of a tour that took him through a dozen ruined villages, ending in the ruins of the historic Cathedral at Rheims he made this comment:

"No one can put into words the impressions I have received amongst such scenes of desolation and ruin."

That was Mr. Wilson's only expression of his feelings after a trip that every Frenchman has been hoping he would make before he takes part in deciding what is to be exacted from Germany for the devastation of northern France.

**Considers Trip a Duty.**

Accompanied by Mrs. Wilson, Admiral Grayson and a very small party, Mr. Wilson left the Marat residence early this morning, foregoing attendance at church and the rest which he felt he needed very much, to perform what he said he considered to be a duty. The party motored first to Chateau Thierry, where lunch was taken on board a waiting train. The party then proceeded by motor to Rheims, passing through many ruined villages and along the old fighting lines, where evidences of combat are still to be plainly seen. After visiting Rheims, the

President and his party abandoned their motor cars, and boarding a special train, returned to Paris. The last part of the motor trip was made in a swirling snowstorm, the first snow Mr. Wilson has seen since last winter.

**Visits Bellary Wood.**

The first fighting ground was reached as the party neared Bellary Wood, immortalized in the history of the war by the gallant fighting of American marines. The motor cars turned off the main roads and crawled perilously through back lanes to bring the President close to the place where the fighting took place.

The country folks in that neighborhood are striving to reclaim their country from war's devastations. The farmers were plowing the shell cratered fields as the President stood beside the graves of one hundred or more American boys who gave their lives at that point and looked across the strategic valley to Bellary wood, a mangled mass of tree trunks and underbrush, but now a national monument to the marines after whom the French government has named the place.

**Col. Watson Tells of Battle.**

Colonel Edward M. Watson, of Martinsville, Va., who commanded an artillery battalion in the fight and was later chief of staff of the seventy-seventh division in the Argonne fighting, stood beside President Wilson and Brigadier General William W. Harris and told the story of the battle in detail.

Then Mr. Wilson drove up the hill, over which the American troops smashed the crack Prussian divisions mustered there to crush the "green horns" and where the advance on Paris was checked. This was near Chateau Thierry, and the post promises to be a mecca for Americans for many years to come. Mr. Wilson saw the ruins of bridges over which the Americans thrust back the enemy lines at the nearest point to Paris and the shell-marked houses which survived the battles of those memorable days.

**Enters Chateau Thierry.**

On entering Chateau Thierry, the mayor greeted Mr. Wilson, who responded quite informally. He then drove on towards Rheims, passing along the battle line between long lanes of barbed wire entanglements now rusting away in the first winter of peace between long muddy trenches reaching over the hills and down into hollows as far as the eye could see, and past the wrecks of dugouts, ammunition dumps, aviation sheds, hospitals, barracks and all the other life left behind by the defeated enemy in his flight.

It seemed as if the fields had been sowed by Mars with the wreckage of war in the hope that it would take root and blossom. American, as well as French graves, lay along the roadside. There were German graves to be seen too. Desecrated cemeteries were found in many cases. At every turn of the road was a farm, deserted and in ruins, the fields dotted with shell holes filled with water and crusted ice. There was a constant panorama of destroyed or charred vineyards, gardens and homes.

**Welcomed at Rheims.**

The President was welcomed at Rheims by the mayor and a committee to whom Mr. Wilson explained that he had not come to the devastated regions sooner because he had been wholly engaged at Paris with the business of making peace. Before going to the Cathedral, he passed through the streets of a deserted city, which was once the home of 115,000 people but where less than five thousand are now eeking out an existence among the ruins. He visited Red Cross canteens where hundreds of destitute persons are fed night and day and the hospital where the sick and injured are cared for. The champagne cellars beneath the city, said to contain some seventy million gallons of wine were not visited.

A light blanket of snow covered the ground as the President drove up to the Cathedral, and Rheims, ravished and naked in all its misery and desolation, looking like a graveyard in

the moonlight. There were more crows in the air, circling over the ruined town, than were human beings below in the littered streets.

**Cardinal Meets President.**

Cardinal Luçon, archbishop of Rheims, who stood steadfastly by his charge for four years, during which time scarcely a day passed without a German shell hurling death into the city, met the President at the fence door and the great rose window, said to be the most beautiful in the world, where Field Marshal Von Moltke in 1870 sat and watched the sunset, in sheltered by shell fire until it looks like camouflage set up by the roadside. Mr. Wilson followed the cardinal to the ruins of the chapel, where old-time kings watched through the night at the time of their anointing and to the museum, where priceless Flemish tapestries.

As they left the cathedral, the cardinal gave the President a stained-glass panel from one of the windows taken down in time to save it. The panel is unscarred. It is circular and about three feet in diameter. It shows a figure of the Saviour done in many colored glass of the early centuries.

From the cathedral, the President drove to view the ruins of the town which the Cathedral was built, of the Renaissance style of architecture and the Palais Royale, an eighteenth century edifice.

**Stone is Crumbling.**

The chalky stone of Champagne, of which the Cathedral was built, is scaling off from the effects of German fire and the falling snow flakes were mixed with an almost constant drip-

ping of fragments. Pausing a moment before the scene of the crucifix above the north door and before the painting of the coronation of the Virgin, over the central door, Mr. Wilson silently viewed the destruction wrought upon those masterpieces by the burning of the scaffolding when the Germans set fire to the roof of the edifice.

### MUCH ACTIVITY IS MANIFEST IN IOWA PARK FIELD

Special to The Times. IOWA PARK, TEX., Jan. 27.—The Keller Oil Company, an Eldorado, Kans., organization, composed of experienced oil men with headquarters at Wichita Falls, is selling stock to their company, styled the Texas Big Four Oil Company. The company has extensive holdings in Iowa Park lots in block and groups of blocks, and it will put down its well No. 1 on block 163 in Iowa Park, and has also made a drilling location for another well in the north part of town. The company is capitalized at \$85,000, and promises big developments in the townsite of Iowa Park, and will soon open offices here in the Overbey-C. Troutman building in the part recently vacated by the Cash and Carry Grocery.

A stock company has been formed to put down a well on the George Norwood farm, two miles south of Iowa Park. Operations have been started again on the Park Oil & Gas Company's 30 acre tract on the Overbey north of Iowa Park, after delay caused by inability to get material.

Location has been made for Zink No. 4 and drilling will be started at once. The Como Oil Company is making preparations to put down several wells on the south 40 acres of the Mrs. Dase Brown farm, south of Iowa Park three miles.

The latest report from the well on the farm of Mrs. M. A. McCleskey, south of town, was that the casing was being set. The same formations were found in this well as those at the Zink wells, and at the same depths.

The Humble Oil & Refining Company has completed its pipe line from the Burk Burnett field and is now pumping oil into its 55,000-gallon storage tank which was erected here some time ago.

Contracts for deep tests have been let on the Weatherford farm, northwest of Iowa Park, and leasing is now running riot in all directions from Iowa Park.

John T. Overbey this week sold to Richey Abernathy of Waco a 183-acre farm south of Iowa Park for a consideration of \$60 per acre. Mr. Abernathy will move his family here in a few days and make his home on the farm. He is a brother of R. F. Abernathy.

Iowa Park Leases Are Active. Zink's Nos. 1 and 2 are both pumping, and the oil from these two wells is being delivered by pipe line to the Wichita Valley Refining Company at Iowa Park, and Zink No. 3 is drilling, as are also Reed No. 1 and Oliver No. 1 on the J. F. Reed farm and Mrs. M. A. McCleskey's farm, respectively.

Numerous contracts are being let for wells in the valley to the east and northwest of the Zink wells. Several companies having organized, and drilling will be extended at least two miles northeast from the group of wells on the Zink farm within the next 30 days, and maybe sooner. Leases are changing hands with lightning-like rapidity, and great interest is being manifested in leases close by to the John T. Overbey 32-acre tract half a mile east of Iowa Park. The Inspiration Oil Company has leased 80 acres out of the N. L. Lawrence farm, 1 mile east of Iowa Park.

### To Resume Work On Burdette Well Near Frederick

Special to The Times. FREDERICK, OKLA., Jan. 27.—The West Texas Production Company, a stock corporation, with a capitalization of \$300,000, has just taken over the T. L. Ball and Company holding east of the city, including the Burdette test well, which is down about 500 feet.

This company includes some of the strongest financiers in Fort Worth and other Texas cities. In its holdings is large acreage near Hornte and Blackwell, Texas. With the taking over of the Tillman county leases it will have in the neighborhood of 25,000 acres of promising oil territory.

T. L. Ball, manager of the Burdette company, states that this meant that the test would be pushed to completion, as the West Texas Production company has large resources, and is organized to thoroughly develop all its holdings. The company has a capital stock of \$300,000. Its stockholders include many leading men of Fort Worth and vicinity, among whom are probably a score of millionaires.

Operations on the Burdette location have been at a standstill pending this deal, but will be resumed soon, said Ball.

### PIPE LINE MEN ARE VICTIMS OF A HOLD-UP GANG

HENRIETTA, TEX., Jan. 27.—Thursday night of last week the company of pipe line men was held up and robbed at their camp about eight miles east of Henrietta Friday morning.

Four men did the job, he said. They had their faces masked by tying handkerchiefs over their mouths, and passed from one tent to another with drawn revolvers, giving the command to put up hands. One man stood at the door of the tent, another went to the side and gathered up the money, while the other two kept a lookout on the outside.

The amount of money secured is unknown, but it is considerable, because the men had been paid off that day.

After going through the bunch of pipe liners, the robbers mounted their horses and rode away. Thus far no clues to their identity have been obtained.

The pipe line men were camped in tents, which were pitched in a circular form, giving the robbers on the outside a good command of all the tent doors. None of the men attempted resistance, because they were either unarmed or their guns were not at hand. One man said he could have shot them as they rode away, but his gun was in a suit case in another tent.

COLLECTOR WALKER STARTS ON INCOME TAX DRIVE OF 1919

PREPARING TO HANDLE LARGEST COLLECTION IN HISTORY OF THE TAX.

MANY ARE AFFECTED

Explanation is Made of Application of Old Law and the Measure Now Pending.

AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 27.—The income tax drive of 1919 is now under way, and every preparation is being made to handle the largest collection in the history of income tax.

"The income tax obligations imposed by the old laws, as well as the measure now in congress, consist of two distinct operations. One is to file return of statement of all items of income and items of deductions allowable by law, and to do this within the period named in the law.

"Neither of these obligations can be met without a careful revision of income and expenditure for the tax year. That is the big job right now, and that is why I say the income tax drive is already under way.

"When the new bill is enacted into law, I will have the proper return forms distributed throughout the district, and everybody will be informed of the date when the sworn return must be filed.

"Meanwhile, let me say again, there is no need in delaying the preparation of figures. Anything that congress does now will not affect the amount of a person's earnings for 1918. Let us avoid the belated throwing together of figures that may hit or miss. Guesses cannot be accepted as the basis of

taxation. It is clearly the duty of every person to compile correct figures and ascertain whether his income for 1918 was sufficient to make necessary a sworn return.

1918 a Banner Year. "The year 1918 was a banner year for salaries and wages, and the high war prices brought unusual profits to the average small tradesman and to the farmer in many sections of the country.

"All signs indicate that the income tax this year will reach many working men and women, and nearly every merchant, shop keeper, as well as a big percentage of farmers. Not all will have to pay the tax, but nearly all will be obliged to make a sworn statement of the year's income.

"I am therefore advising every unmarried person who earned \$1000 or over during the year 1918, and every married person, who together with wife or husband, earned \$2000, to sharpen his pencil and figure out how he stands.

"He must ascertain accurately his gross income from all sources. There's his salary or wages, including overtime pay and any bonus received as additional compensation. A married person having children under 18 who are working should include the earnings of such children.

"If he sold any property at a profit, the gain must be computed and included in gross income. If he rented any property to other persons, the total rents received in the year must be ascertained and from that figure a deduction may be taken for taxes paid on rented property, the necessary minor repairs, fire insurance, any interest he may have paid on mortgage and a reasonable allowance for annual wear and tear of the rented property.

"The balance is included in gross income for the year.

"Interest on bank deposits, whether withdrawn or added to his bank balances, must be included in all calculations of income and interest received during the year must also be included, except interest on municipal, county or state bonds. Interest on United States bonds need not be included by the ordinary bond holder who purchased small amounts.

"Dividends on stock shares are income, and must be included in the gross figures, although the law does

not impose the normal tax on distributions made by domestic corporations.

Merchandise Business. "A person buying and selling merchandise must find his profits for the year on the following basis: First, ascertain the gross sales or total cash receipts. Then add together the inventory at the beginning of the year and the purchases of goods for resale. From this latter sum subtract the inventory of goods on hand at the year's end, and the result is the cost of goods sold.

"This cost, plus necessary expenses incurred solely through conduct of the business, is to be deducted from the gross sales, and the result is the net earnings of the business.

"A professional man arriving at his professional income by ascertaining the total of fees for services and deducting therefrom all expenses connected directly and solely with his practice, must figure up all income derived from the sale or exchange of products during the year, whether such produce was raised on the farm or purchased and resold.

"The farmer is not required to include in his income tax computation the value of farm produce consumed by himself and family. But in cases where he exchanges produce for merchandise, groceries, etc., the market value of the articles received in exchange must be included.

"All other items of income arising during the year through personal service, business or trade, through use of property or money, should be added into the gains of 1918.

"Everybody wants to know what income is exempt from tax. Very few items that fall to the average man may be legally disregarded in figuring up his 1918 income. Gifts and bequests can be eliminated; also proceeds of life insurance received by the beneficiary of an insured person. A person who cashed in an endowment policy need report as income only that por-

tion which exceeds the total of the premiums he paid in all years on that policy. Annuities are not taxable, unless the person received in the year payments which represent, when added to all prior payments on the annuity, an amount greater than the original cost of the annuity. Dividends on unexpired life insurance policies are not taxable income; but dividends on paid up policies must be considered income, although they are not income to the recipient, nor is it an allowable deduction on the part of the person who pays.

Deductions Allowed. "From the total of all items of income, there are certain deductions allowable by law. All interest paid on personal indebtedness and all taxes paid during the year are deductible, except federal income and excess profits taxes, inheritance taxes and assessments for local improvements, such as sidewalks, sewers, etc. Losses incurred in business or trade are allowable; also

losses arising from fires, storms, shipwreck or other casualty, or from theft, in cases where such losses are not compensated for by insurance or otherwise. Losses incurred outside of a person's regular business are allowable to the extent of gains reported from similar transactions within the year.

"Depreciation on property used in a profession, in business, or in farming is another item that may be claimed as a deduction. The storekeeper may claim depreciation on his fixtures, and on his delivery horses and wagons, but not on his stock held for sale. The professional man may claim similar deduction on his instruments; and, in the case of a physician who maintains a team or auto for making his calls on patients, reasonable depreciation may be claimed.

"The farmer may claim depreciation on his farm bullock, aside from his personal rest-

deuce, also on his farm machinery, his work horses and farm wagons. The theory of depreciation, in connection with the income tax, is that wear and tear caused by use in earning income is a real expense in the earning of that income. The rate is determined by the number of years that the property ordinarily would be useful, and the cost of the property is the basis of the computation. If the property, suffering depreciation was bought or acquired prior to March 1, 1913, the market value as of that date is used, instead of the cost, in figuring depreciation.

**Contributions or Gifts.**  
"Contributions or gifts actually made in 1918 to organized operating exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific or educational purposes, and to societies for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals, may be deducted, to an amount not exceeding 15 per cent of the net income computed without the benefit of this deduction.

After the total of all income is found, and the deductions allowable by law have been computed as an offset, the amount of income as an excess of such deductions is the net income, which forms the basis of the assessment of tax.

"If every person in this district will examine his own 1918 income and his allowable deductions, in line with data that I have given, he will know beyond doubt whether he must file his return when the blanks arrive. And here is how he will determine his liability to file a return.

If he is single he must file if his net income is \$1000 or more, and this requirement is enforced whether or not he is the head of a family. If he is married, he must file his return if his net income, including that of his wife and minor children, was \$2000 or more.

"I want to emphasize the co-operation feature of the collection of the income tax this year. The policy of the internal revenue bureau is to aid taxpayers to meet the requirements of the law. We are going right to the people, not to swing clubs or to mulct the wage earner of his savings, but offering every helpful governmental function that will assist people to do their duty."

**PORT ARTHUR MEETING FAVORS POOL HALL BILL**

PORT ARTHUR, TEX., Jan. 27.—At a mass meeting here Sunday afternoon a resolution was unanimously adopted urging the representatives from Jefferson county to support the anti-pool hall bill before the Texas legislature. The meeting was attended by 1,000 men.

### SOCIALIST LEADER ENDORSES PLAN OF THE PRESIDENT

HJALMAR BRANTING DISCUSSES WORK OF CONFERENCE NOW ASSEMBLING.

### THE FUTURE OF GERMANY

Is Extremely Pessimistic as to the Outcome of the Controversy in That Country.

By Associated Press.

BERNE, SWITZERLAND, Sunday, Jan. 26.—A tone of carefully modulated optimism as to the results expected to be established by the international socialist and labor conference now assembling here characterizes the views expressed by Hjalmar Branting, the Swedish socialist leader on his arrival to attend the conference.

M. Branting mentioned the visit paid to Paris by Arthur Henderson, the British labor leader, and his conference with Foreign Secretary Balfour as an indication that the peace conference intended to attach weight to the demands and desires of labor. He hoped, he said, that the conference would find a way to establish perhaps a minimum of living standards for working men, although he recognized it naturally was impossible to attempt to standardize wages, since the buying power of money and prices for commodities varied so largely in different countries.

Endorses Wilson Plan. The Swedish socialist leader expressed whole-hearted endorsement of President Wilson's ideas regarding the making of the peace, although some of his remarks appeared to indicate that he was somewhat skeptical as to whether these ideas would triumph completely. Although he was known throughout the war as anti-German, M. Branting expressed the hope that the entente would supply the former empire with food and raw materials as soon as possible because these were absolutely essential to the well-being of all workmen.

He was extremely pessimistic as to the German workmen's future, however, declaring that the situation in Germany was extremely critical notwithstanding the Spartan defeat, and he feared the results unless relief came quickly.

Reactionary Party Exists. There still existed in Germany, M. Branting claimed, a strong and vigorous reactionary party which had not learned its lesson from the victory of the Allies and which must be offset by a coalition of the majority, socialists with the liberals on the one

hand and the Conservative minority socialists on the other hand if Germany was not to revert to her old status.

Bolshevism was referred to by M. Branting in terms of sarcastic condemnation, although he said he spoke with full realization of its dangerous possibilities. He gave as one of his reasons for believing that Germany should be fed and supplied with raw materials, that such action would make industry possible and prevent bolshevism spreading across German territory and placing France, Belgium, Italy and England in danger of contagions.

M. Branting quite obviously does not look with favor on the decision of the peace conference to make an opportunity for conferring with the bolshevik but he merely said the Allies would see they had made a mistake.

Regarding the American delegates who had failed to get passports for the convention M. Branting criticized the United States for its attitude in this respect but said he understood the wide difference between the American socialist and the European socialist democrat.

## CONSTITUTIONALITY OF ESPIONAGE ACT IS BEING ARGUED

**WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.**—Oral arguments began in the supreme court today on the constitutionality of the espionage act, in the cases of Eugene V. Debs, socialist leader, convicted of violating the law in a speech at Canton, Ohio, last June, and Jacob Frobenwerk, of Kansas City, found guilty of writing alleged seditious articles for the Missouri Staats Zeitung.

Counsel for the defendants attacked the act as an attempt to abridge the constitutional right of free speech and a free press. John Lord Bryan, special assistant to the attorney general, contended that the law obviously was intended to protect the military program against all types of interference and that congress surely could require citizens to refrain from deliberate obstruction of the process of obtaining necessary fighting men.

While a general attack was made upon the law by Seymour Stedman, of Chicago, attorney for Debs, special attention was directed by him to the amendment passed last May making it a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of \$10,000 or 20 years imprisonment to "wiffully utter, print or publish any disloyal, profane, scurrilous or abusive language about the form of government, constitution, or the military or naval forces or for the purpose of interfering or hindering the government in the prosecution of the war. This, he argued, interfered with freedom of speech and of the press in clear violation of the first constitutional amendment.

## REVIVE INTEREST IN THE PROPOSED INTERURBAN LINE

"I feel that the recent interest relative to the necessity of an interurban line from Dallas to Wichita Falls, via Denton, and the advisability of some preliminary movement being started, calls for a word of explanation from me.
