# AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 27.—Complete abolishment of the state ranger force is sought in a bill introduced today in the senate by Senator W. 5. Shulter of Wood county. The bill provides for the repeal of the law creating the force and also the one making appropristions for the support and maintenance of the ranger force. An anti-lynching bill was introduced in the senate today by Senator George W. Dalton of Grayson county. The bill makes it a felony for any person arrested and convicted of having participated with a mob which results in the death of the person assaulted. The venue for the trial of such cases is fixed in Travis county. This is in accordance with the recommendation of the governor. Preferential Primaries. MASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—General March, chief of staff, discussing army demobilization plans today with the Senate military committee, stated that shipping arrangements have been made by which 200,000 men may be transported home monthly and all of the American expeditionary force can be returned home and demobolized within six months.

There are still about 785,000 men in camp in the United States and all will be demobolized within a month from today except those retained for "overhead duty," General March added. Up to noon last Saturday, he said, 140,000 men had arrived from overseas.

## LEGISLATURE HAS TO MAKE PROGRESS

AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 27.—The Thirty-Sixth session of the Texas legislature has fulfilled its promise to dispose of the prohibition and suffrage amendments early. Both of them have been adopted and sent to the Governor for his signature.

But with the passage of these measures, the close harmony of action has been less marked, and warm debates have developed.

The proposal to call a constitutional convention was met with such a flood of amendments on the floor of the House that it was sent back to the committee room for redratting. The legislature has shown its interests in international affairs by adopting a resolution endorsing President Wilson's fourteen points. Another dip into affairs of national scope was the resolution requesting the return of railroads to private ownership, which the Senate adopted. A similar resolution is pending in the House.



#### Exports for 1918 Over Six Billion **Showing Decrease**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Heavy December shipments brought the total exports for 1918 to \$6,150,000,000, a decrease of only \$83,000,000, from the 1917 total, according to an announcement by the Burean of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, Department of Commerce. Imports for the year totaled \$3,021,000,000, or not quite half the exports. Imports for the previous year were valued at \$2,952,000,000.

Exports for December, the first full month after the signing of the armistice, reached a total of \$566,000,000, a decided increase over the \$522,000,000 recorded for November, although not up to the high mark of \$600,000.000 for December, 1917.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—Oral arguments began in the supreme court today on the constitutionality of the espionage act, in the cases of Eugene V. Debs, socialist leader, convicted of violating the law in a speech at Canton, Onio, last sune, and Jacob Frodwork, of Kansas City, found guilty canton, of the mental suprementation of the Missouri Staats Zeitung.

Counsel for the defendants attacked the act as an attempt to abridge the constitutional right of free speech and a free press. John Lord Bryan, special assistant to the attorney generat contended that the law obviously was intended to protect the military program against all types of interference and that congress surely could require citizens to refrain from deliberate obstruction of the process of obtaining necessary fighting men.
