UNITED STATES "DRY" ON JANUARY 16, 1920

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Ratifica-tion of the prohibition amendment to the federal constitution was proclaim-ed formally today by Frank L. Polk, acting secretary of state. The procla-mation is dated today but legal au-thorities of the department say ratifi-cation was accomplished when the thirty-sixth state acted favorably on January 16 and that under the terms of the amendment itself prohibition becomes effective one year from that date.

The proclamation was signed by Mr. Folk at 11:20 o'clock in the presence of Senator Sheppard of Texas, author of the amendment, former Secretary Bryan, Representative Randall of Cal-itornia, prohibitionist member of the house and officials of the anti-saloon league of America, the Women's Christian Temperance Union and other anti-saloon unions. Bolshevik Spread **Propaganda** Thru Nations of Orient


Associated Press Mail Correspondent. COPENHAGEN, Dec. — Bolshevit propagandists were sent from Russis, not only to Germany but to China. England and France, says Harold d-Scavenius, the Danish Minister to Petrograd who has just returned from Russia together with the staff of the Danish Legation. While at the Russian capital he had been acting in behalf, of the Entente Powers. Four hundred Russian propagandists, he de-clares, were in Berlin before the Ger-man revolution began and instructions were given for numerous bolshevists. to be despatched to England ant France by underhand routes. The hearings have already progressed to the stage where the existence of views greatly at variance with those set forth in Presi-dent Wilson's fourteen points have been disclosed. been disclosed

This development has determined the American delegates to remind the others powers of that fact and to urge the adoption of the American plan at the very outset in order to keek the rival claimants within the bounds of fairness. This plan which was discussed Mon-day and is receiving immediate fur-ther consideration looks to interna-tional control of the colonies, back-ward nationalities and tribes by indi-vidual powers or by agents to be known as "mandatories" of the league of nations. These agents are to de-rive all their powers from the league and to act entirely on the lines of policy dictated by that body. The distribution of these guardian-ships is to be made by the league of nations; so it again happens as in the case of many of the projects of reform broached at the conference that its successful operation is whol-by dependent upon the consummation of the league.

A fleet of 36 chasers was see. to the Adriatic to co-operate with the cruisers Olympia and Birmingham and eight destroyers in carrying out America's role in the execution of the provisions of the armistice with Austria. The chasers are now at Malta for over-hauling but in the meantime, the Greek government is making over tures for their purchase. These pro-posals may be entertained as the close of the war makes it probable that there-will be little further need of the chasers, which are particularly suited for navigation in shallow waters like those of the Greek Archipelago.

BOSTON Jan. 29.—Colonel Ugo Pizzarello, head of the mission from the redeemed provinces of Italy, de-fended Italy's claim to a portion of the Dalmatian coast in a speech here last night. He said the Jugo-Slavs had wrongfully accused his country of being "imperialistic." "We restricted our claims," he said, "to the central part of Dalmatia. That means we are leaving to the



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
