STAY-AT-HOMES AND WEATHER AFFECTS VOTE

BERLIN, Monday, Jan. 27.—Sharp winter weather and an unusually large number of stay-at-homes may have been responsible for the small vote in the Prussian elections on Sunday, as compared with the balloting for the national assembly eight days ago. Lack of polling places forced thousands of voters to stand in line for hours and this, combined with a letting-up of enthusiasm, resulted in a defeat among the bourgeois voters, who apparently were suffered to leave the field to both wings of the social democratic party. Up to three o'clock today the results reported showed the social democrats had a big lead in greater Berlin, where they were already credited with two-thirds of the seats in the new parliament. The clericals, clericals, conservatives and national liberals will divide up the remainder. Scattering early returns from other sections of Prussia indicate that the majority socialists are everywhere maintaining their lead and, with the independent socialists, threaten to make up the majority.

FOOD CONTROLLER TERMS CONDITION AS ANARCHY

By Associated Press. LONDON, Jan. 29.—Weakness and subordination of conventions to their personal interests is charged against many of the trade union leaders by Food Controller George H. Roberts in an interview printed in the Mail today. He says that this is one of the chief causes of the present anarchy in the industrial circles of Great Britain. Mr. Roberts, a veteran labor leader and recently minister of labor, said: "It is time that union leaders make a definite and determined stand. If subordinates refuse to honor their leaders' agreements, the leaders must resign. The modern idea is that a trade union official exists only to carry out the behests of any temporarily dominant section. This is one of the chief causes of the present anarchy and often prevents officials from following the dictates of their convictions. "If young bloods are allowed to rush the trades union organizations we will have to face a long period of industrial chaos and a long process of disillusionment."

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POPULAR SAVINGS TO BE ENCOURAGED BY GOVERNMENT

Special to The Times.

DALLAS, TEX., Jan. 29.—The rapid establishment of a nation-wide agency for popular savings is foreshadowed in an announcement made today by Carter Glog, Secretary of the Treasury.

"In the newly established savings function of the treasury of the United States, it is believed we will have a thing which is a permanent convenience the oft-quoted methods of Europe. Through it we hope to establish new motives for saving that will capitalize into a permanent national characteristic, the wide-spread willingness to save and lend to the government awakened by the war."

"The ultimate aim is to make investment in government securities an everyday matter with us as it has become with the people of France and England. Most Frenchmen and Englishmen look forward very early in youth to the day when they will be the proud possessors of 'rentes,' neighborly bonds are called. Rich and poor buy them for income, for old age protection, to provide education and dowry for children and to add to family and business security and happiness."

"Twenty million Americans, through interest in Liberty bonds and War Savings stamps have begun to gain a similar taste for saving through government interest-yielding securities. Essence of Democracy. Whereas before the war the government was financed by some 300,000 investors, 20,000,000 people have become its financial partners. Such partnership must engender a more intelligent interest in the actual operations of the government. Such popular support by all classes of citizens, I regard as the very essence of democracy."

"As an agency for Americanization, Liberty bonds and particularly Thrift and War Savings stamps, have been among the most effective erasers of the hyphen. With money saved through the stamps, many, hitherto restless, gained the idea of buying homes and settling down in the community."

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London Crowded Beyond the Limit Of Accommodation

LONDON, Jan. 29.—There is such a lack of sleeping room in London now that American blue jackets here on leave before they have to sail away home have to be put to bed in the houses of parliament and the grim law courts buildings.

"OIL QUEEN" OF WYOMING COMES TO WICHITA FALLS

MRS. L. C. HARNSBERGER BECOMES INTERESTED IN BURK-BURNETT FIELD.

ENTHUSIASTIC OVER CITY

Has Distinction of Having "Bosser" Job of Drilling First Well on Shoshone Reservation.

Wyoming's "Oil Queen," as Mrs. L. C. Harnsberger is known throughout that state, has transferred her activities to Wichita Falls, and for the first time will have interests outside the Wyoming fields. The "Oil Queen" was induced to come to look over the Wichita Falls fields by W. R. Duke, who is associated with her in ventures in the Wyoming fields, one of them being a million-dollar concern in the Red Desert field, where the famous Lost Soldier wells are located. Though she has been here only one day, she is very enthusiastic over Wichita Falls, and is keenly interested in seeing Burk Burnett, though she says she does not have to see the field, that the prosperity seen on every hand is evidence enough for her.

Interesting Personality.
Mrs. Harnsberger is one of the most interesting personalities in the oil fields today, and she has the picturesque distinction of having bossed the job of drilling in the first well on the Shoshone reservation, which practically opened up the Wyoming fields in 1909. Her forerunner quite on her after striking the third vein of water, when he had just finished fighting his streams. He declared there was no need of going further down, that there wasn't anything but water and quit. And Mrs. Harnsberger took the job in charge and stayed with it until the "pay sand" was struck at 1505 feet, a rich flow of liquid asphaltum.

Leads Active Life.
There are many sides to Wyoming's Oil Queen, her friends who have known her for many years say. They have seen her addressing public meetings. Wyoming was the pioneer state in giving women the vote. They have seen her in Washington, D. C., in diplomatic society, they have seen her acting as hostess in her own home, with her two daughters-in-law, one of whom, the wife of Captain George Harnsberger, now in France, is known as the prettiest woman in Wyoming. And they have seen her in the field, in charge of drilling her wells, running the engine when necessary, driv-

ing teams to haul materials, when teamsters failed her, or in the cook-shack preparing her "roughnecks" three square meals a day, when the Chink happened to fall by the wayside.

Reputation as Geologist.
Mrs. Harnsberger has also quite a reputation as a geologist. Her knowledge is gained through practical experience, as for ten years she has been studying formations in oil fields, and those who have had the privilege of working with her in Wyoming, and who have finally succeeded in bringing her down to Wichita Falls, say they will back her judgment with the best "book learnin'" geologist, regardless of the letters following his name.

It was a pretty long jump from Washington, D. C., and the cosmopolitan and diplomatic society of a dozen years ago, of which Mrs. Harnsberger was a member, to Wyoming and placer mining claims, but she made the jump, and has proven her adaptability in every possible way, for she gives the impression of being on the clever club woman and admirable hostess from her appearance, while a few minutes conversation on the subject of oil fields establishes beyond a doubt the truth of the stories concerning her active participation in the drilling operations, for she has a knowledge that comes only from experience.

To the question, "Are you a suffragist?" Mrs. Harnsberger replied: "Exercises Citizenship."

"I am a citizen of the United States

and exercise all the privileges and prerogatives of a citizen." She takes such pride in the fact that her adopted state is the pioneer suffrage state, and that since its admittance to statehood women have had equal privileges with men. She has found time, despite her work of developing oil fields, to take part in club and political activities and has been prominently identified with various movements.

During the past year and a half Mrs. Harnsberger has been devoting her entire time to war work activities and has worked in Liberty Loan and War Savings campaigns, Red Cross activities, and the various money-raising campaigns.

"My son went into the war at the beginning, and for more than a year has been in France, and I went into it with my whole heart and gave all my time to it. Now, however, since the Allies have terminated the war successfully I'm getting back into the line of my regular work. So long as the war was on I couldn't think of doing anything for myself, but now my interest in getting back into the same in this big new field is very keen."

Liverpool made a very firm showing and early advices confirmed yesterday's reports of a reaction in cotton freight rates but it looked as though the higher prices had attracted a good deal of southern selling and after opening steady at a decline of three to 13 points active months sold 40 to 65 points net lower before the end of the first hour. There was liquidation by some of yesterday's buyers on the break, which carried March contracts off to 23.55, May to 22.15 and July to 21.58. Liverpool was a seller on decline and there was also selling for New Orleans account. Reports that the labor situation in New England was still critical and curtailment of manufacture was increasing probably served to encourage selling.

After the close of Liverpool selling became less active and there was a very sharp recovery during the middle of the morning on renewed covering, trade buying and support from Wall Street sources. May sold up to 23.17, or 102 points from the early low level, and July touched 22.32, making net advances of about 20 to 40 points on the more active months. This bulge met continued southern selling, however, and the market was very unsettled later in the morning with May rallying around 22.35 shortly after midday.

The market became very weak during the early afternoon. Reports of dissensions in the peace conference were considered responsible for the unsettled ruling of the stock market, probably stimulated the selling of cotton. Part of the pressure was attributed to the liquidation of old lines and the decline carried prices into new low ground for the day with May selling at 21.80 and July at 21.40 and with old crop months generally showing net losses of 85 to 105 points. The market closed barely steady.

New Orleans Cotton.
NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 29.—Selling pressure was felt by cotton today before the first call was over. On the opening the old crop months were five to 10 points up on a continuation of the buying movement of yesterday, but October was 19 points off. After the call a general decline occurred which landed the market 23 to 30 points under yesterday's close.

Reports that export business had been done at the ocean freight rates gave the market a better tone and a sharp reaction occurred. Late in the morning the trading months were 20 to 54 points over the final prices of yesterday.

Offerings for short account gradually increased and in the early afternoon a heavy volume of selling was coming on the market. At 1 o'clock prices stood 75 to 95 points under the closing level of yesterday. Cotton closed barely steady at a decline of 106 to 145 points.

Oats were governed by the action of corn. After opening 1/4 to 1 1/2 higher with May 59 1/4 @ 60, the market sagged to below yesterday's final level.

A sharp cut in Argentine vessel rates led subsequently to material declines in deferred deliveries. Prices closed nervous 2 1/2 net lower to 1 1/4, advance with May \$1.17 1/2 to \$1.17 1/2 and July \$1.14 1/2 to \$1.13 1/4.

Shorts and packers were the chief buyers and their competition was sufficiently urgent to prevent the least downturn in prices.

Maximum advances took immediately for all provisions due to scarcity of offerings.

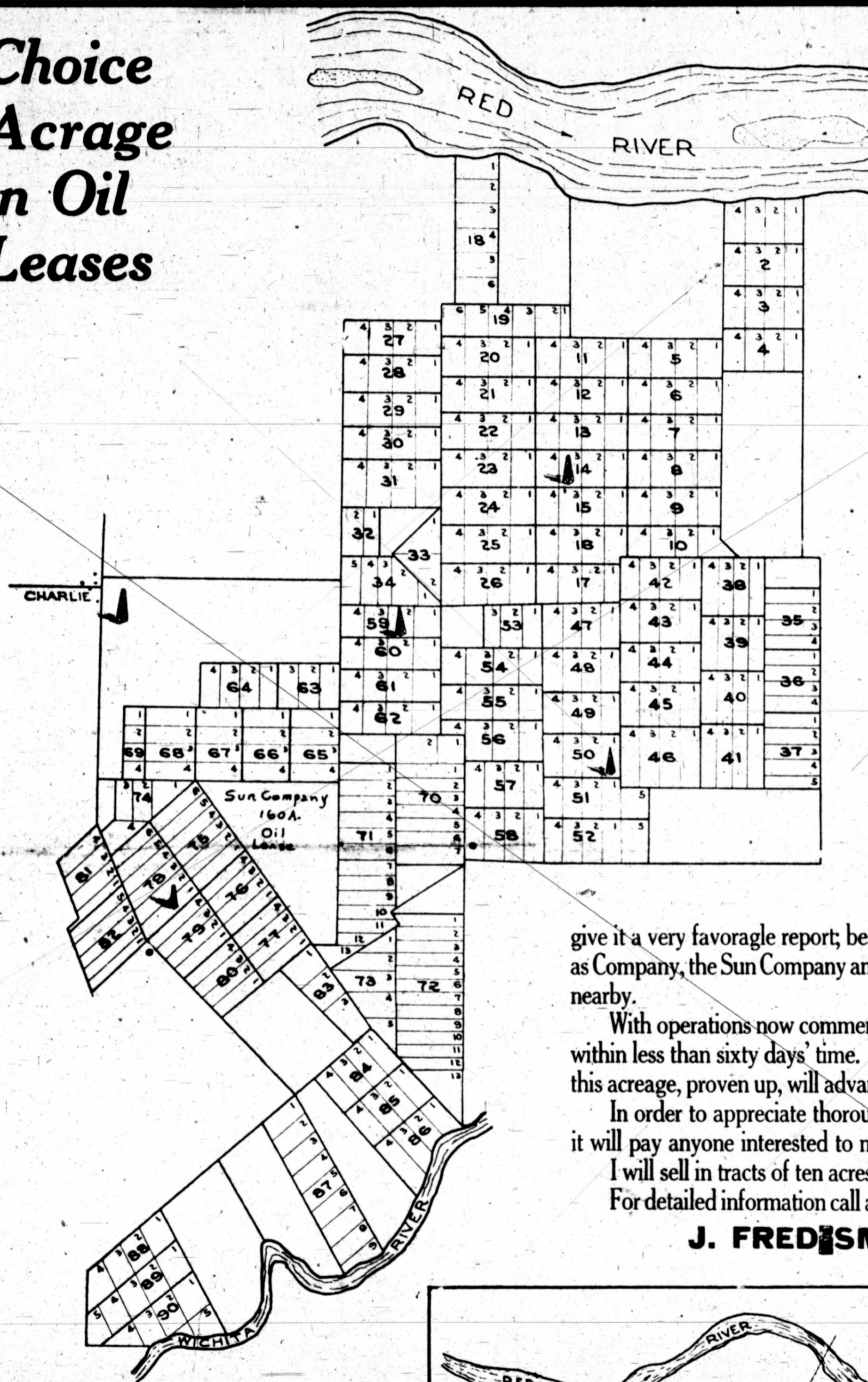

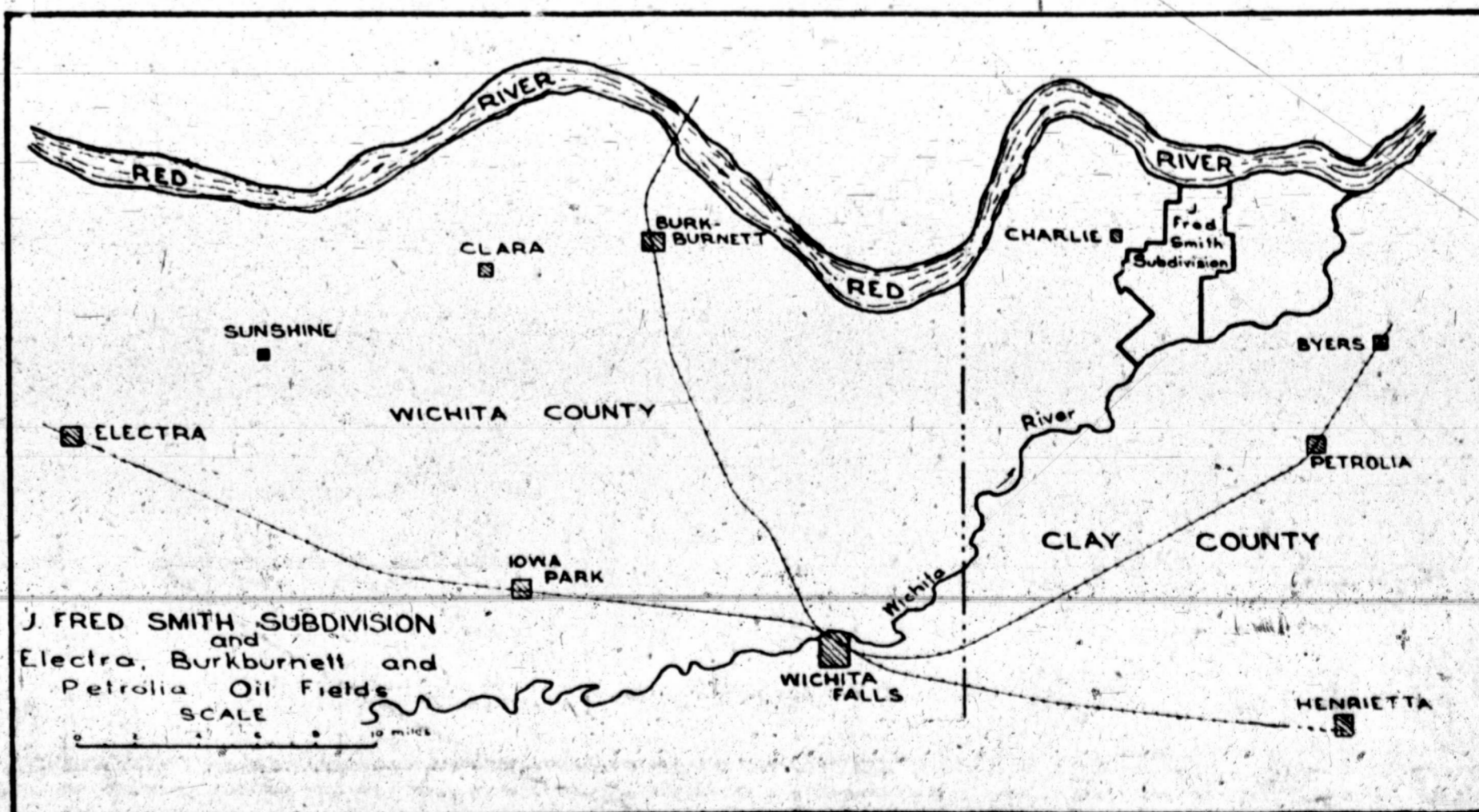

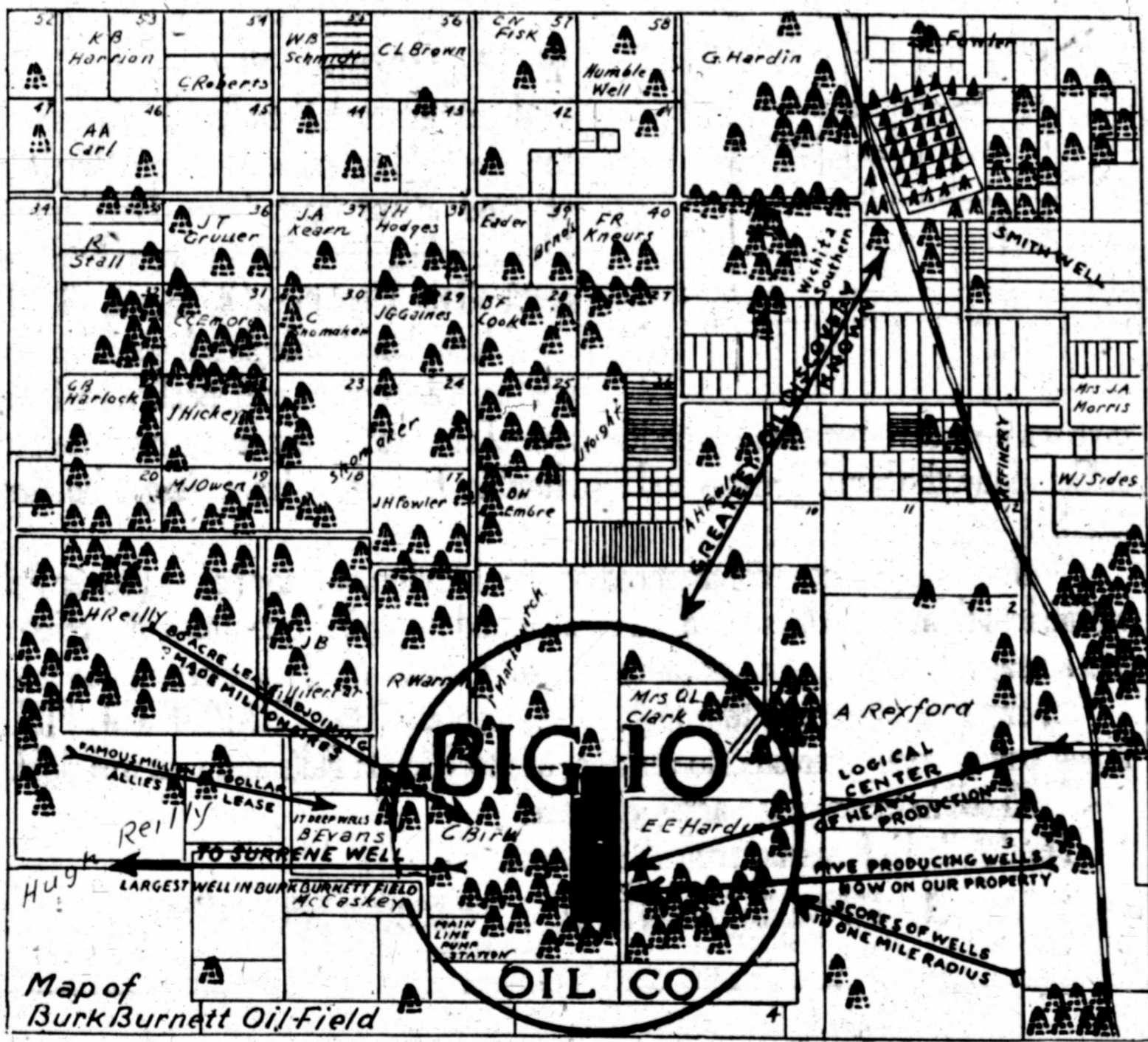

SECOND TRIP FOR PRESIDENT SEEMS PART OF PROGRAM

CONDITIONS SUCH THAT HE MAY FEEL IMPELLED TO RE-CROSS THE ATLANTIC.

CONDITIONS TO CONTROL

Abandons Idea of Returning by Oxford for Deares and Wagon Haaten Return to America.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 28.—Much as President Wilson still hopes to avoid a second trip to Europe, it begins to look as if the trend of peace conference affairs would cause him to feel impelled to recross the Atlantic in the early spring.

Recent statements, purporting to announce definitely that the President had arranged to come back to Paris after going to Washington in February and even mentioning the date of his sailing on his return trip, was founded it may be said on definite information. The President, while still hoping it will turn this another trip to Europe will be necessary, is awaiting to see what the remaining 15 days of his stay in France will bring forth before finally deciding on his course.

Plans to Hurry Home.

The President is said to have told his confidants that if events pointed to the need of his return he felt that his course would be found fully justified when he addressed congress, as he plans to do almost immediately on his return to the United States. It has developed that he has abandoned the idea of returning by way of England and stopping at Oxford to receive the degree which that university desires to confer upon him. If his plans in this respect hold, therefore, he will sail from Brest on the steamer George Washington, now on her way to France, some time between February 10 and February 15, going direct to the United States. The steamer probably will take the southern route which she followed on her way over, to avoid bad weather. It is realized here that President Wilson's arrival home with plans for departing for Europe again would bring up the question of an extra session of the new congress with republican majorities in both houses. The best available opinion here is that if any extra session be thought inevitable, the President would call it before his return to France, probably setting the date ahead to some time in June.

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GERMAN COLONIES PRESENT THE MOST SERIOUS PROBLEM

SUPREME COUNCIL NOW HEARING EXPERTS ON QUESTION OF DISPOSITION.

INTERNATIONAL CONTROL

Plan Discussed on Monday is Receiving Immediate Further Consideration.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Thursday, Jan. 28.—The future of the colonies taken from Germany has assumed a place as one of the most interesting of the immediate bases of the many-sided problems under consideration by the supreme council of the peace congress. Hearings are now being given by the supreme council to members of the conference and to colonial experts upon the disposition of the colonies. The council is at the same time proceeding with the consideration of a general policy which shall be adopted by the five great powers in this matter. At present it appears that these powers through the supreme council intend to dispose of the subject, confident of the approval of its decisions by the conference itself. The hearings have already progressed to the stage where the existence of views greatly at variance with those set forth in President Wilson's fourteen points have been disclosed.

Urges American Plan. This development has determined the American delegates to remind the others powers of that fact and to urge the adoption of the American plan at the very outset in order to keep the rival claimants within the bounds of fairness.

This plan which was discussed Monday and is receiving immediate further consideration looks to international control of the colonies, backward nationalities and tribes by individual powers or by agents to be known as "mandatories" of the league of nations. These agents are to derive all their powers from the league and to act entirely on the lines of policy dictated by that body.

The distribution of these guardianships is to be made by the league of nations; so it again happens as in the case of many of the projects of reform broached at the conference that its successful operation is wholly dependent upon the consummation of the league.

Oppose League Control. One argument against the league's control of the colonies advanced by the British colonial officials was that the "mandatories" might feel themselves saddled with enormous financial responsibilities in an effort to develop their wards and yet be subject to criticism in the event that they failed to bring them forward. President Wilson himself felt called

upon to answer this question by the statement that by the American plan contemplated the mandatory power would be liable for administrative expenses; other expenditures would be made only upon the order of the league unless the colony itself would finance itself out of its revenue. The plan had not progressed to a point where has been made to assign particular nations to these guardianships; the matter has been the subject of special thought and consideration. In the case of America it has been suggested that owing to its large influence in Turkey through the numerous graduates of Robert College and because of the conviction among the Turks of the disinterestedness of the United States if it is called upon to assume such charge it must naturally first take upon itself the guardianship, not only of Turkey in Europe but also a considerable portion of Turkey's former provinces, including Armenia. Up to this moment the whole project is still subject to complete broad-judgment. Nevertheless it is felt by some of the delegates that the league of nations is assured on a basis of freedom of discrimination, the great powers may be willing to abandon their plans for the complete annexation of former German colonies and separated sections of late enemy states, although opposition is expected from the colonial governments to such a scheme.

Greeks Plan To Purchase Chasers From U. S. Navy

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 29.—Greek naval authorities have been examining American submarine chasers which have been in the Adriatic with a view to their purchase. The Greek navy already has two former American battleships and experts in the service favor a further augmentation of the fleet with American craft. A fleet of 36 chasers was seen to the Adriatic to cooperate with the cruisers Olympia and Birmingham and eight destroyers in carrying out America's role in the execution of the provisions of the armistice with Austria. The chasers are now at Malta for overhauling but in the meantime, the Greek government is making overtures for their purchase. These proposals may be entertained as the close of the war makes it probable that there will be little further need of the chasers, which are particularly suited for navigation in shallow waters like those of the Greek Archipelago.

DEFENDS ITALY'S CLAIMS UPON THE DALMATIAN COAST

By Associated Press. BOSTON, Jan. 29.—Colonel Ugo Pizzarello, head of the mission from the redeemed provinces of Italy, defended Italy's claim to a portion of the Dalmatian coast in a speech here last night. He said the Jugo-Slavs had wrongfully accused his country of being "imperialistic." "We restricted our claims," he said, "to the central part of Dalmatia. That means we are leaving to the Jugo-Slavs more than 250 miles of coast with 14 natural harbors and claiming for ourselves only 100 miles. Perhaps we should we have claimed the whole thing and now make a gracious gift to the Jugo-Slavs of a small outlet to the sea." Colonel Pizzarello declared that the Jugo-Slavs had fought in the Austrian army until the end of the war and that Jugo-Slav regiments fighting along the Plava river had been mentioned for bravery in the last communique issued from Austrian army headquarters.
