

PASS CRITICAL STAGE IN DISPOSING OF COLONIES

ITALY IS WILLING TO WITHDRAW CLAIM... LONDON, Jan. 31.—The Paris correspondent of the Evening Standard says Italy is willing to withdraw its claim on the port of Plume as part of Italian territoriality and will agree to Plume being a free port.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 31.—The crisis in the peace negotiations over the disposition to be made of Germany's colonies seems to have passed momentarily at least. It is too early to say that President Wilson's view has prevailed in its entirety but in American quarters there is confidence that a compromise plan which has been accepted in principle, will be worked out with details which will be acceptable to the American viewpoint.

When the supreme council of the peace conference meets today it will have before it the very plain statement made by President Wilson at Wednesday's late session. So particular was Mr. Wilson to have an exact record made of what he said that soon after entering the meeting he summoned one of his personal stenographers and kept him at his side during the session.

PRESIDENT OBJECTS TO DIVISION OF COLONIES

By Associated Press. PARIS, Thursday, Jan. 30.—In the discussions concerning the disposal of the former German colonies, President Wilson consistently has insisted on terms that divide the colonies among the Entente nations would be in direct contravention of the "fourteen points" which were accepted as a basis of peace. Such a division, he is said to have added, also would violate the principles of the league of nations which he has laid down in the peace conference.

AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT MAKES FORMAL OBJECTION

PARIS, Jan. 31.—The Australian government made a formal objection yesterday to the compromise plan of administering the German colonies, says the Paris edition of the Daily Mail today. Her delegates were declared to regard the ownership of New Guinea as vital to the existence of Australia. Premier Clemenceau promised Australia his full support in safeguarding her position.

OPPOSES LARGE ARMY

Would Provide Training of Not More Than One Year for All Youths from 19 to 26.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Universal, compulsory military training for American youths as a permanent national policy is proposed in a bill introduced in the Senate today by Senator New of Indiana, republican. Such a policy, the Indiana senator said in offering the bill, "provides the only guarantee against any occasion for the maintenance of a large regular army."

REPORT FAVORABLE TO BILL FOR CREDIT TO FARMERS

AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 31.—House committee on constitutional amendments reported favorably on the joint resolution recommended by Governor Hobby, proposing an amendment to the constitution permitting the state to add its credit to farmers for the building of homes. The resolution was amended so as to form a land valuation commission composed of the governor, attorney general, comptroller and commissioner of land office. The state to buy the land and sell it to farmers on long time.

MAY SEND ARMY INTO TURKEY TO PRESERVE ORDER

HOUSE FOR LOAN PLAN

Bill in House to Carry Out Provision of Text Book Amendment to Constitution.

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 31.—A joint resolution by Senator F. M. Gibson of Tarrant, providing for the creation of a Texas homestead bank with power to loan money to persons desiring to acquire a homestead. A similar resolution has been introduced in the house. Senate committee on internal improvements reported favorably the public utilities bill by Senator Dorough of Bowie, giving the railroad commission jurisdiction over public utilities.

The bill by Senator Walter Caldwell authorizing the state to convey to the first Methodist church of Austin the north half of block 124, of Austin, being the old temporary capitol site, came up for consideration. Senator R. L. Carlock of Tarrant, who opposed the bill, insisted on having the measure read in the senate three times to determine the value of the property. Pending action on the matter, the senate adjourned until Monday morning.

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GLASGOW STRIKERS THROW STREET CARS FROM THE TRACK

By Associated Press. GLASGOW, Jan. 31.—Several persons were injured here today when the police charged a crowd of strikers with their batons. The mounted police were called out and a number of arrests were made. With a view to stopping street car traffic, the strikers attacked cars this afternoon and 12 of them were thrown from the tracks and smashed in the Sale Market. Other cars were attacked in other parts of the city. At least one shop was looted.

VON HINDENBURG'S ACTION ATTRACTS MUCH ATTENTION

PARIS, Jan. 31.—Reports received here today that Marshal Von Hindenburg is raising a four army corps for the protection of Germany's eastern frontier have attracted considerable attention in military circles here. The Allied military men are interested because the existence of such a body of troops would upset the present calculations of Germany's armed strength, on which the size of the Allied army of occupation is to be based.

MARTIAL LAW MAY BECOME NECESSARY IN STRIKE DISTRICT

SITUATION IN UNITED KINGDOM HAS BECOME OF MORE SERIOUS NATURE.

MOVEMENT IS SPREADING

Subject is Discussed at Special Meeting of the Cabinet Held on Thursday.

By Associated Press. LONDON, Jan. 31.—There was still no prospect early today of any betterment in the labor situation in the United Kingdom. If anything, the situation, so far as the government is concerned, has become more serious, particularly in Belfast. The strike movement is spreading to the large industrial establishments and the signs of coming disorders which may entail the proclamation of martial law. The situation was the subject for discussion at a special meeting of the cabinet today. Moreover there is an active force in an effort to bring about settlements, but up to this time without success. The new tax on the railways, which is an governmental interference now would be unwise and perhaps dangerous. The strike movements are local and against the advice of the respective trade unions. Moreover there is infinite variety in the various demands advanced in the different localities. It appears to be generally believed that the chance of strike pay for the men will soon bring about the collapse of the movement.

Davies Warfield, president of the National Association of Owners of Railroad Securities, gave the Senate interstate commerce committee today the security holders' view of the railroad problem. He urged that the roads be returned to private operation as nearly as practicable with legislation insuring a fixed return on property investments saying "The results of federal control and operation thus far extended cannot give comfort to advocates of government ownership."

NO REDUCTION OF NAVAL POWER SAYS SECRETARY DANIELS

STATEMENT MADE ON PRESENTATION OF COMMISSIONERS TO RESERVE OFFICERS.

PROGRAM UNDER WAY

Would Be Sin For America to Be Behind to Any Other Country, Says the Secretary.

ANNE ARBOR, MI., Jan. 31.—In presenting commissioners today to the last class of reserve officers trained at the United States naval academy during the war, Secretary Daniels predicted that "there will be no time of recession of interest in the navy." "Not in your day," the naval secretary told the young officers, "will there be any reduction of naval power. We are now on the last stretch of building the three year program of naval construction which was authorized three years ago." Secretary Daniels said he had no doubt that congress would authorize the recommendation of President Wilson for another three year program of construction in building ships under that program he said types of vessels would be constructed which would "keep our navy abreast of any in the world."

There were two bullet holes through his hat, one through his vest and three through the waist line of his trousers. Francisco was not even scratched but he was distressed over the perforation of his clothing. "I was shot," he said, "which had cost him eighteen dollars."

ORDER THAT MEN BE RESTORED AS BEFORE STRIKE

Two Hangars Are Destroyed Today; Planes Are Saved

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—Two hangars, each containing six airplanes, were destroyed in a fire which was sweeping the naval aviation station at Rockaway Point today. New York City firemen from several stations were fighting the flames which threatened eight other hangars. An hour after the fire started, the commander at Rockaway Point reported that all the planes were removed from the burning buildings before the flames reached them.

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HOUSE COMMITTEE APPROVES THREE YEAR NAVY PLAN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Unanimous approval of the administration's new three year naval program with the number of capital ships reduced from 16 to 10 because of difference among experts over the value of battleship cruisers was voted today by the House naval committee. In addition to the ten battleships, to cost not over \$21,000,000 each, the program as adopted provides for 10 scout cruisers to cost up to \$8,000,000 each. It was decided to leave in advance the proposal to construct 13 smaller craft, in order that the navy department might recommend at the next regular session of congress the vessels needed to round out the navy in the light of war lessons.

VON GWINNER MAY BE PRESIDENT OF GERMAN REPUBLIC

By Associated Press. BERLIN, Jan. 30.—The announcement of the retirement of Arthur Von Gwinner as managing director of the Deutsche Bank lends color to a rumor circulating in Berlin today that he is expected to be elected president of the German republic.

ARGENTINE TROOPS ADVANCE AGAINST THE MAXIMALISTS

By Associated Press. BUENOS AIRES, Thursday, Jan. 30.—Argentine troops have reached Rio Gallegos and will proceed inland to act against the maximalists. The government is informed that the situation caused by the revolutionary strike at Punta Arenas and Port Natales, Chile, is still grave. The governor of the Chilean territory of the Magallanes has asked police aid from the Argentine authorities.

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 31.—Specific charges against rangers of law violations, ranging from drunkenness to murder, were filed by Representative J. T. Canales and read before the joint ranger investigation committee today. Representative Canales' charges name ranger or rangers in each case. His charges are: "On or about April 4, 1918, one Florencio Garcia was killed while in the custody of rangers under circumstances which according to investigations made by the adjutant general's department, which investigation shows that it constitutes murder. I further charge that notwithstanding this investigation neither of said rangers in whose custody the man was at present was discharged from the service, or in any way reprimanded for the action by the adjutant general's department."

# NO ATTEMPT IS MADE TO OPERATE THE STREET CARS

### STRIKING MOTORMEN AND CONDUCTORS HOLDING OUT FOR CONTRACT.

## STATEMENT IS ISSUED

Manager Lawton of Traction Company Discusses Matter in Article Today.

Wheels were not turning and cars still idle in the barns today, while the 42 striking motormen, conductors and other employees of the Wichita Falls Traction Company debated further ways and means to obtain their demands and officials of the company continued to "stand pat" on their refusal to recognize the newly organized union. Frank K. D. president of the traction company, declined to comment on the situation, and an attitude equally silent was maintained by F. M. Lawton, manager of the corporation. There are indications, however, that a statement may be issued later outlining the company's stand with respect to the demands made by the men, and there is still a reasonable hope that arbitration may clear up the controversy within a few days.

**Contention of Employees.**  
It is the contention of the motormen and conductors that their demands for recognition of the union, a nine-hour day at a wage scale of 40 cents an hour and time and one-half for all over time, can be met by the company with no further expense to the company than would be involved in the employment of from two to four additional men.

The chief complaint the men have to make centers around working conditions attendant on so-called "split" runs. On the "split" run, according to Jack Prather, state representative of the American Federation of Labor, a car crew goes to work at 6 o'clock in the morning, works until noon, returns to work at 4:30 p. m. and frequently is not relieved until midnight. Under conditions that existed before the men walked out on strike, four employees of the traction company had "split" runs. It had regular runs and 10 were on emergency duty working on any run where needed at any time.

**Claim Request Previously Made.**  
At the Labor Temple this morning it was stated by representatives of the union that requests for better working conditions first were made to traction company a month ago. The requests were ignored, the men state, and arbitration was refused by Mr. Kell. The decision to strike was reached only after the receipt of the following telegram from W. L. Mahon, international president of the Amalgamated Association of Street & Electric Railway Employees of America:

"Your telegram received. I would advise before you suspend work that you offer to leave all matters in dispute to an arbitration board of three disinterested persons, one to be selected by each party and the two to select the third. If the company refuses this, your division is at liberty to suspend work and will have the approval of the association."

Members of the union appeared last night before the city council and requested that an ordinance be drafted prohibiting the employment of motormen on the local lines unless the men first have had 15 days experience. No action was taken by the council.

Manager Lawton of the Traction Company this afternoon furnished the following statement:  
The officials of the traction company stated this morning that the action of the motormen and conductors in striking early Thursday morning was a complete surprise to them, as they had always looked upon the possibility that such action was contemplated. The company therefore had no time in which to notify the public that the cars would not be operated as usual. The company states that a few weeks ago some labor union organizer came to Wichita Falls and proceeded to induce the men to join a union. At this time the men appointed a committee that waited on the officials of the company to ask their advice about joining unions. The company told them that they had always looked upon their employees as home folk and would at all times be glad to meet with them and discuss any matters of interest to them, but did not feel that the policy of the company should be dictated in any manner by outside officials of any labor organization. At this meeting the men made no request for any increase in wages or shorter working hours.

It appears that the labor union organizers were able to get the men to join the union, and on Saturday morning they held a meeting. At this meeting we understand, after wiring their labor union president at Detroit, Mich., they decided to strike early Thursday morning. The organizers of the strike were given to either the traction company or the public that this strike would take place. The traction company was, therefore, unable to notify the business men, clerks, teachers and school children that there would be no car service Thursday morning.

The company officials state that their relations have always been very friendly with their employees, as nearly all of their men were raised in Wichita county. The wages have been raised on two occasions in order that they might meet the advanced cost of living. At the present time the men received \$108 per month for full time. The working hours are so arranged that the men work six hours in the morning, then go home for dinner, rest or recreation for several hours, then come back and finish their day's run. The actual labor in operating the cars is very light, and this arrangement of working hours is in use by practically all of the traction companies in the United States and has proven very satisfactory to both the employees and the traveling public.

The company officials further state that the car service at Wichita Falls has been operated at a financial loss each year and were it not for the fact that the stockholders of the company are greatly interested in the upbuilding and welfare of Wichita Falls they would long ago have taken steps to relieve themselves of the burden of this car service. They state also that every dollar that has been taken in by the car service has been spent in the upkeep of the system and in the salary of the employees, and the car line has benefited nobody except the traveling public and the traveling public of Wichita Falls.

The company officials state that they could hardly be expected to trust their interests to the discretion of some labor union officials, who know nothing at all about conditions in Wichita Falls, and who have such little interest in the welfare of the traveling public of our city as to order a strike without notice of any kind and thus cripple our business interests and interfere with the operation of

the schools of our city. At the present our city is experiencing a sample of what might be expected from time to time if a foreign labor organization should have the power to tie up the traffic of this city at any moment.

## SAYS SITUATION IN EAST PRUSSIA IS VERY SERIOUS

Several bolshevist divisions are facing the eighth army and seventy thousand are facing the fourth army. The dispatch adds that it is feared the German forces will be insufficient to effectively resist.

**Hammond-Art to Be Standardized for Completion According to Today.**

The Block Thirty-Six Oil Company's No. 2 well on block 36 has been drilled into the sand and began swabbing today. From the amount and nature of the oil and an initial production of from 800 to 1,000 barrels is anticipated. W. B. Hamilton, the manager of the company's interest and of the Texhoma Oil Company, stated this morning, No. 3 well on this same block is a rig.

The Texhoma No. 1 Vanceave is now standardizing, ready to complete, and No. 2 is drilling around 1500 feet. The Texhoma's Hardin No. 1, Dubose Survey, is drilling today below 1100 feet, while No. 2, this same lease, is drilling around 700 feet. The Williamson No. 1 Hardin addition, is reported drilling in this afternoon.

Other late reports from the field show the G. C. Wood's No. 1 Hardin Dubose five acre lease to have drilled into the sand on Thursday. Further west the activities continue practically unchanged. The Hammond-Art well is to be standardized for completion, Mr. Art states.

**HORSES SAVE THE DAY IN KANSAS OIL FIELDS**  
Special to The Times.  
BARTLESVILLE, OKLA., Jan. 31.—Horses saved the day in Butler county. That's a pretty broad statement to

make, but Empire officials in the great oil district after the worst storm in thirty years and the worst roads they were ever experienced in Kansas, now admit that if it hadn't been for 200 head of horses which were purchased a year ago, operations in the field would closely have approached demoralization.

Conditions were bad enough as it were, but in a few days the "cavalry brigade" was organized and outside of heavy hauling jobs, work went on as before. Eighty-nine of the animals were assigned to workers in the El Dorado district, sixty-five to Augusta and the remainder scattered over the minor holdings of the company.

Over half of the horses were used by superintendents and lease foremen who rode in the saddle from one portion of the field to another. The remainder were assigned to hauling jobs. Ten mules played no inconspicuous part in the El Dorado field. According to Ray Shaffer, division superintendent, horses are going to be a permanent fixture with the company in Butler county. The cost of keeping them is comparatively light as there are hundreds of acres of pasture land for them to graze on in summer. Plenty of grain and hay is raised on the Empire's own holdings.

Each horse has been branded on the hoof with a serial number and on the books is known only by the number assigned.

WATERS STRIKE CONTINUES WITH FIVE SIGNED UP

MEMBERS OF UNION SUPPLY SANDWICHES THEY DISPLAY BANNERS.

SERVICE IS INTERRUPTED

Hotels Are Least Affected by Conditions Resulting from Walkout.

A casual visitor to Wichita Falls might have gathered the impression this morning that a minority percent of the population was headed for the country to enjoy a basket picnic—the impression being one result of the strike that started Thursday noon among the cafe and restaurant cooks, waiters and waitresses.

Early today waiters and waitresses walked the downtown streets, carrying huge baskets and sandwiches and pies, the means whereby to obtain food for the local union and at the same time to continue a wage scale lopped off by the strike. The basket parties worked in trios, a waiter carrying the heavy basket, a waitress serving as a walking cashier and another waitress carrying a placard appealing to the public to "Help the Cooks, Waitresses."

There were no demonstrations of any kind, the basket parties made no attempt to contact the police, to areas past restaurants that had not granted the strikers' demands, and the novelty of the idea apparently pleased men and women on the streets and resulted in generous buying of sandwiches and pies.

Two more local restaurants granted the requests of the cooks and waiters' union this morning, the two being the Waffle & Oyster House, and the Four Seasons Cafe, The Hearne Cafe, the Wichita Cafe and Mecca Cafe No. 2.

Under present boom conditions, with the hotel constantly filled, Mr. Williams stated, two waitresses frequently earn as high as \$150 a month. Also they get their rooms here, so it is easy to understand that we anticipate no complaints.

Downtown Service Impaired. In many of the larger cafes downtown, however, there is a serious shortage of help, and restaurant service is extremely slow. At the union station the restaurant is practically unable to handle incoming passengers. Many of the proprietors of the larger cafes in the city are stating that they will not under any conditions grant the requests made by the union.

Prof. A. W. Hoffman, an official of the union, declared this morning that the demonstrations of Thursday in front of cafes that had refused to grant union demands were not fomented by the union and that no members of the union took part.

While these demonstrations were in progress, he added, "the union was holding a meeting. We intend to conduct this strike in a quiet, dignified manner, and if we can't win that way we don't want to win at all."

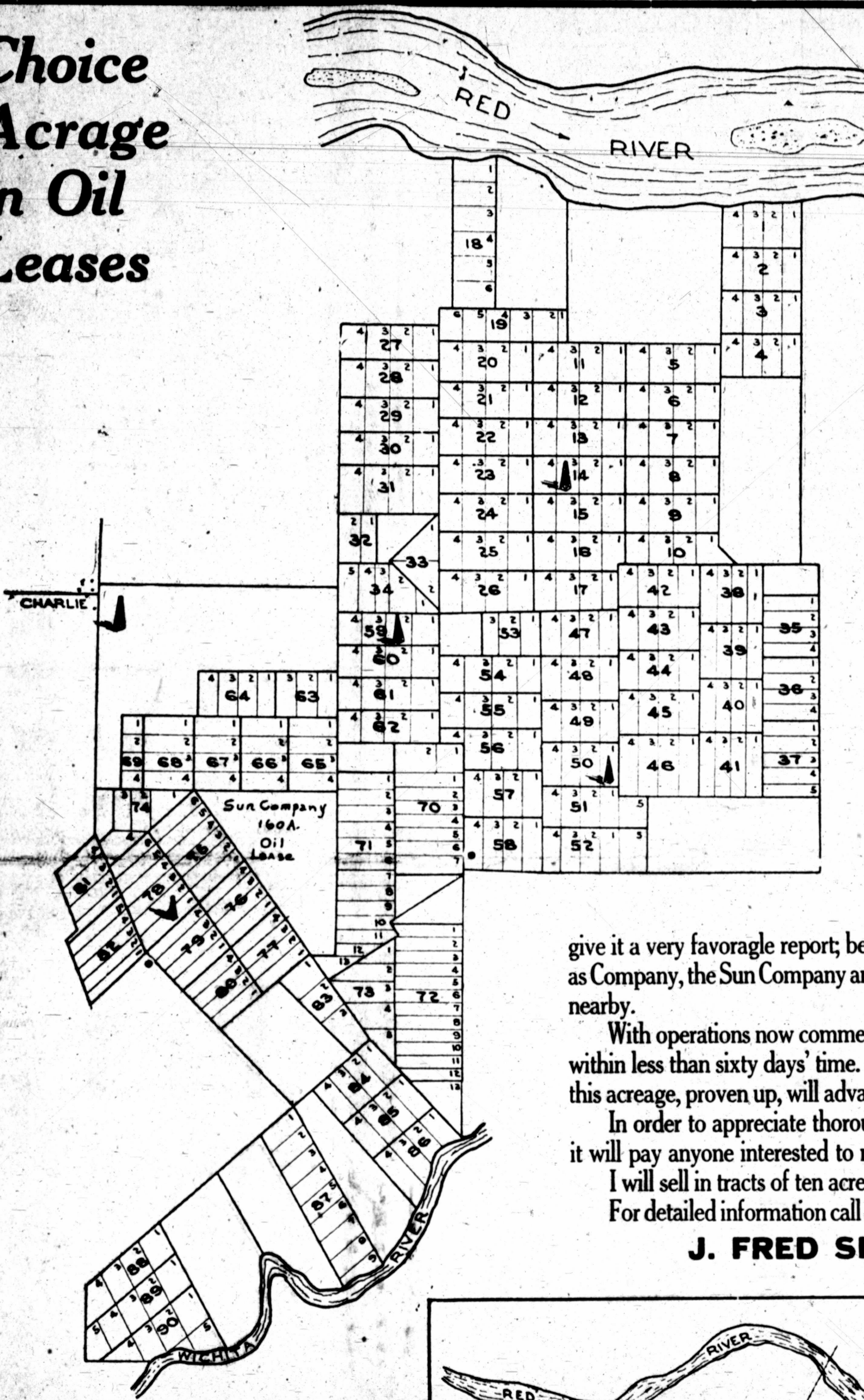
The city council last night declined to interfere in the matter, in announcing a platform of "strict neutrality" in the controversy.

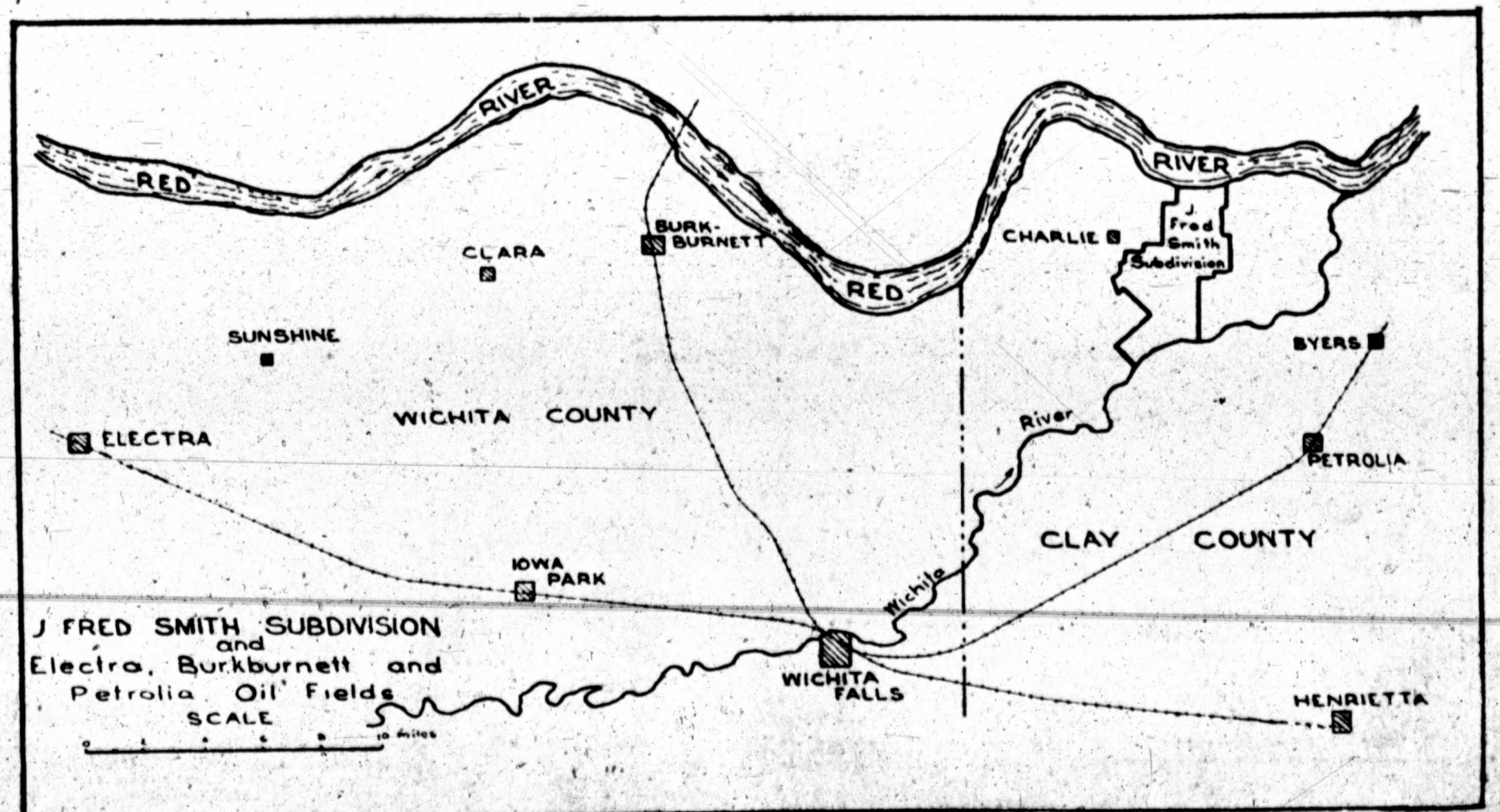

### SPECULATION IN SAVINGS STAMPS NOT PERMITTED

On account of the disposition on the part of certain people to barter government War Savings Stamps it has become necessary for the treasury department to issue a note of warning, as well as to prescribe regulations governing the redemption of the stamps by postoffice and other government institutions. Persons or firms, it is announced in a notice sent out by Postmaster Ed Howard, offering to buy, exchange or accept War Savings Stamps on account or take them in trade are violating government regulations. Accompanying this statement is the following official notice issued by the Secretary of the Treasury:

**Official Notice.**  
"My attention has been directed to the numerous offers made by unscrupulous persons through advertisements and in other ways to buy War Savings Certificate Stamps. As a result of such offers, I am informed that owners of such securities have suffered material losses which could have been avoided by redemption of the War Savings Certificate Stamps at postoffices as provided by law.

"In order that the interests of the owners of War Savings Certificate Stamps of either series (1918 or 1919) may be safeguarded, I hereby notify all persons to refrain from offers to buy War Savings Stamps or accept the same in trade."

As a result of regulations passed by the postoffice department the unscrupulous person who accepts War Savings stamps on account or in payment of debt or the scalper who buys War Savings stamps will be unable to obtain his money on them. The regulations which make it impossible for the unscrupulous scalper to carry on his unscrupulous trade follow:  
"Postmasters are directed not to cash War Savings certificates on which the names of the owners have not been entered or have been erased or changed, since, under the regulations, War Savings certificates are not transferable and are payable only to the original owners, except in case of death or disability.  
"Postmasters are further instructed not to cash any War Savings certificates presented by persons or firms known to be buying or peddling offers to buy War Savings stamps or certificates from the owners unless positive evidence is submitted that the certificates were originally issued to the persons or firm presenting them for payment."

SERVICE LINES BE STRENGTHENED AND OTHER UTILITIES FURNISHED.

## WILL REDUCE EXPENSE

Fire Hazard Will Also Be Eliminated If Current Is Used For Drilling and Pumping.

The Wichita Falls Electric Company contemplating the strengthening of its service lines to Burk Burnett and their extension into the oil field to furnish power for pumping and other purposes.

To do this will require the installation of heavier wires from Wichita Falls to Burk Burnett and extensive improvements of the power plant here.

The electric pumping of oil wells has been so successful in the Kansas oil fields, that some time ago the Wichita Falls Electric Company installed electric motors for Fisher & Gilliland, Oriental Oil Company, Lee Farm Oil Company, Faulkner, Fowler Company, and more recently made a trial installation of an electric motor on the well of the Bank Oil Company at Burk Burnett.

The present method of pumping oil wells at Burk Burnett is extremely expensive, as steam engines are being used which require steam boiler equipment, fuel for use under the boiler, has to be hauled, and the attendance of two men is required for day and night service.

The extension will necessitate an expenditure of considerable money for the necessary installation and the plan is to work out whereby the oil well owners will share the expense of this installation and water will be

reimbursed by being refunded part of their monthly bills for power.

### George B. Gaines Writes Mother of His Experiences

Mrs. Bertie Gaines of this city has received the following letter from her son, George B. Gaines, mention of whose return to the United States was made in the Times several days ago: Camp Merritt, Jan. 23, 1919. My Darling Mother: I suppose you know by this time that I am again in the good old U. S. A. I arrived on the 20th, having sailed from Brest, France, on the 7th. We sailed on the ship Pueblo, a battleship that has seen quite a bit of service. We had stormy weather all the way across and thought several times we were gone. The sailors said that it had been the worst trip they had ever made. I was sick all the way. We could see nothing but water except for one island and two or three ships. We sighted the island on the 12th of January, which was Sunday. We are here at Camp Merritt now, but expect to leave at any time. I intended sending a telegram but we move every day and we don't know when we will leave, so I thought I would just write. I left base hospital twenty on the 8th of December. I was there just thirty-eight days and was two days getting there from the front. I was gassed about the 28th of October. I was sent to England, landed at Liverpool and went from there to South Hampton, England, then to Le Havre, then to an English front where we were held in reserve. We had no fighting there. We went then to a front in Alsace, in the Vosges mountains. We were under shell fire there for the first time on July 4th. After leaving there we had a few days rest and went back almost to the same place. We left there for the St. Mihiel drive on Metz, but did not take an active part in that drive as we were held only as reserve. We then went up to the Argonne, where we started the drive that ended the war. I was under shell fire all the time, we were there, but was not in close contact of the front lines as I had five little donkeys to take care of and could not go up. We then went to Verdun and I was sent to the field hospital with influenza. I came back to the company and was there three days when I got a dose of mustard gas and was sent to base hospital. I got my last letter from home before getting gassed. It was written the first of October, so you see I am getting very anxious to hear from you to find out how all the folks are. I expect to be in Camp Travis by the first of February, and will soon be home I hope. Tell all the folks I am on my way and am coming as fast as I can. Will close with love to all. As ever your loving son, GEO. B. GAINES. Co. I Casual Bn.

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### Apaches Cause of Trouble in Paris Much Exaggerated

By Associated Press. — That Apaches of all nations, dressed in uniforms of the American army, were mainly responsible for the acts of violence which have caused broadcast publicity to be given to an alleged American crime wave in Paris was shown by an investigation conducted by the Associated Press. It was further ascertained that assaults and hold-ups are infinitesimal in number as compared with the public figures, existing nearly exclusively in the imagination of sensational local newspapers. An opportunity was presented to verify at police headquarters the figures respecting crimes during last December. Thirty-four murders charged to Americans were discredited and dwindled to two; 244 hold-ups and assaults were reduced to 80 per cent. There have been numerous fistie encounters, however, but they were mostly between Americans, old-fashioned rough-and-tumble brawls in which arrests are rarely made in American cities. For the most part the pugnacious individuals in America would have been merely requested by the police to go home, or a humorous policeman would advise them: "If you want to fight, go to Europe."

### Nat Goodwin Following Brief Illness

By Associated Press. — Nat Goodwin, 31, died at a hotel here early after a brief illness. He came from Baltimore, where he had been playing break-down, following an operation for removal of his right eye several years ago. Goodwin was a familiar figure on the American stage for many years. He made his appearance in 1914, and played leading roles in many plays, both in the United States and England. Goodwin's dramatic career was said to date back to his school days while at Farmington, Maine, where he won him a reputation for his impersonations of Shakespeare's characters. After brief periods at the University of Maine and at the University of New Hampshire, he studied dramatic art, he made his debut as a newsboy in "Law in New York" in 1914. The following year found him at the Pastors in New York and until his death, his theatrical successes, both as a producer, in America, England, and Australia. Goodwin was five times married. His first wife was Eliza Weatherby, who died in 1917. A few years later he married Nellie Baker in 1918, Maxine Elliott, with whom he appeared in a large repertoire of plays, including several of Shakespeare's; subsequently, Miss Edna Goodrich (Beale Edna Stephens), who was his leading woman for several years, and his most recent wife was Margaret McLeod, now the wife of an army lieutenant. Goodwin's country home was at Ocean Park, Santa Monica, Calif. Goodwin was soon to have taken a sixth wife, Georgia Gardner, of Los Angeles, who is playing in the company in which Goodwin was starring at the time of his death. She came to New York a few days ago to arrange for his care here. The removal of Goodwin's eye was the result of an error an employee made several weeks ago in preparing an eye-wash for the actor. Chloroform instead of the usual liquid was placed in the cup and Goodwin's eye was seriously injured.



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## Made in America Implements Found In German Path

(By Reciprocal News Service) AMERICAN PRESS HEADQUARTERS, British Front, Jan.—Found: A hundred or more plows, harrows, threshing machines, etc., made in America. Stolen by Germans and left at a collecting station near Orsnival, France, which is close to Le Quesnoy. Any farmers missing implements will please not call at this time as the government has enough on its mind. Such is a brief statement of fact. The picture of this jumble of agricultural tools and vehicles can be best appreciated after a travelogue of the country from which they were taken. Broad acres, with an unsholy bleakness upon them, tangled with hundreds of miles of barbed wire, and gashed by hundreds of miles of trenches. No houses standing. Groups of Chinese, with wasteful slowness, pottering around in piles of debris and probably spending most of their time lamenting the low stage of civilization of the white race guilty of all this demolition. The implements are in an orchard in a belt of country just outside the burglarious trench zone. They are jammed tightly together. None are very new, and disuse and the weather have made them appear ancient. Undoubtedly the Germans were pulling them there but for the sudden terrific strain placed on their transport by their retirement.

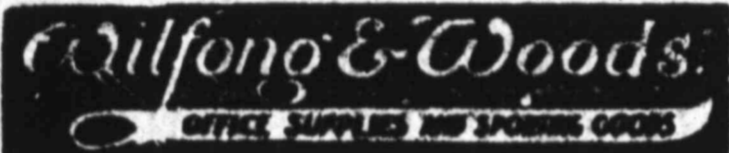

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## Reeves Compiles Information About The Legislators

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 31.—A tabulation of the occupations, religious beliefs and states of birth of the members of the Thirty-sixth Texas legislature has been compiled by Representative L. B. Reeves of Sherman. Law was the leading profession in producing legislators for this session, there being 64 attorneys in the body. Farmers come next in number with 30. Among the rest of the membership there was found; newspaper men, 8; bankers, 4; teachers, 4; merchants, 4; lumbermen, 4; ministers, 2; laborers, 1; doctors, 1; contractors, 1; insurance men, 2; students, 1; real estate men, 2; stockmen, 4; surveyors, 1; commercial traveler, 1; and one member who stated he had no profession. A majority of the House is composed of old members. There are 23 new men against 77 who have been here before. Standing of three members was not available.

Methodist in Majority. Methodists lead other denominations in the House. There are 41 Methodists; 27 Baptists; 21 have no religious preference; 14 are Christians; eight Presbyterians; six Episcopalians; and three Catholics.

Members of the House were born in 18 different states and two in foreign countries. Seventy native Texans are in the list, while Tennessee with seven comes next on the list. One legislator began life in India. Births in other states follow: Kentucky, 61; Georgia, 6; Arkansas, 5; Missouri, 5; Alabama, 5; Louisiana, 3; Virginia, 3; South Carolina, 2; Illinois, 2; Colorado, Wisconsin, Ohio, New York and Michigan have one each. Representative T. B. King, 80 years old, is the oldest member in the House and he is serving his first term. Several members die for youngest place at the age of 25. George B. Terrill of Cherokee county, is serving his sixth session. He leads in the numbers of terms served.

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## United Kingdom Plans To Control Its Electricity

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Thursday, Jan. 30. (British Wireless Service)—Control of the generation and distribution of electricity throughout the United Kingdom is proposed by a bill now being prepared by the government. Authority over electric supply which now is vested in the board of trade and other government departments, would be transferred by the bill to a very small board having probably only five members.
