It is too early to say that Pres ident Wilson's view has prevailed in its entirety but in American quarters there is confidence that a compromise plan which has been accepted in principle, would be worked out with de-

tails which will be acceptable to the American viewpoint.

When the supreme council of the peace conference meets today it will have before it the very plain statement made by President Wilson at Wednesday's late session. So particular was Mr. Wilson to have an exact record made of what he said that act record made of what he said that soon after entering the meeting he summoned one of his personal sten-ographers and kept him at his side

ographers and kept him at his side during the session.

What he said did not appear in the official communique, nor has it been disclosed with any official authority, but it may be stated that it was a very clear re-affirmation of the principles for which the President has previous contended. In phrases stripped of diplomatic niceties, it is said. Mr. Wilson told members of the supreme council he would not be party to a division of Germany's colonial possessions among the powers which

to a division of Germany's colonial possessions among the powers which now hold them and then occome party to a league of nations which in effect would guarantee their title. There are inferences that the President even referred to a peace of "loot."

The net result of the past two days of discussion on the colonial question, is the opinion of many Americans here, has been to clear the atmosphere generally and to force a clear definition of aims on all sides.

President Wilson, it is understood, still bolds to his original opinion that it would be scarcely worth while for the United States to participate in the negotiations unless a league of hations with the accompanying principles were provided for in making peaces.

AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT

MAKES FORMAL OBJJECTION

PARIS, Jan. 31.—The Australian government made formal objection yesterday to the compromise plan of administering the German colonies, says the Paris edition of the Daily Mail today. Her delegates were declared to regard the ownership of New Guinea as vital to the existence of Australia. Premier Clemencea promised Australia his full support in safeguarding her position.

Explaining his bill, Senator New said it proposes that in training youths, they preferably should be called for the scheduled continuous training period in their nineteenth year. Those who are sole support for parents, wives or children would be excused unless the government should contribute to their dependents during the training period. Men in training would receive only nominal pay. The bill also provides for commissions for 20 per cent of the youths trained up to the rank of major of lieutenant commander in the national reserves, the one for the army reserves.



THE FEE SYSTEM OUGHT TO GO.

An effort is again being made to have the legislature submit an amendment to the constitution to abolish the fee saystem of compensating public officers in Texas. There is the usual organized effort on the part of public officials to defeat this legisla-tio, and it will probably be success-ful as it has hitherto. The fee sys-

passed. Too many district judges are being forced to resign their offices in order to make a decent living. A district judge ought to be paid, at least, what a good lawyer ordinarily makes. If their pay is not increased the positions will soon be filled by incompetent men. When this situation exists the district courts will become little more than a court of hearing without jurisdiction and all the cases will go up to the higher courts, adding to the delays and costs of justice. Judges in the trial courts ought to be judges of ability. The low salaries that are new being paid cannot command that kind of talent.

WHEAT PROTECTED, COTTON STANDS ALONE.

Cotton interests so strenuously opcotton interests so attenuously opposed fixing the price of cotton by the
government that, if the war industries
board really ever intended to have the
price fixed, they gave up the idea. Cotton is now selling at about \$40 per
bale under the high record of the season, and if the estimates of farmers'
union officials are correct, the price
is now below the cost of production.
At any rate, cotton has had to take
its chances in the period of reconstruction without government aid. The expected big demand from abroad has
not fully developed and the theory almost universally held in the South
that peace would bring higher prices
is not being borne out in face. Various reasons are attributed for cotton's decline. The main fact is that
cotton has declined instead of advanced, and the cotton farmer is at nced, and the cotton farmer is at disadvantage, compared with the

cotton has declined instead of advanced, and the cotton farmer is at a disadvantage, compared with the wheat farmer.

The government guaranteed a price of \$\$2.26 per bushel for wheat of the 1919 crop, in anticipation that the war would last through the year. The sudden ending of the war has left the government with the bag to hold. European nations will no longer pay the big American price for wheat when they can send to South America and Australia for supplies at much less cost. The release of ships from war duty was the signal for a resumption of traffic between Europe and these distant countries, which are anxious to sell their accumulated surplus of wheat at prices much below the American guaranteed price. The result is that the government will have to put up \$1,250,000,000 or \$12.50 per capita of the population, to buy the 1919 wheat crop. Either the government must then hold up the price of flour, or sell the wheat at market prices and stand the loss. In wither case, the people stand to lose, either through continued high prices for bread, or through taxation to meet the loss sustained by the government if it sells the wheat at market prices. The South will have to put up its proportionate share of the cost of the government keeping its word with the wheat farmers. But the wheat farmer will not have to put up anything on the losses of the Southern cotton farmer. In fact, they are already getting cotton goods cheaper because of the decline in the raw cotton.

From the standpoint of personal gain, the wheat farmer has the better of the deal. The cotton farmer will have to stand his loss unaided. But now it looks as though he would have fared better himself if he had consented to a fixed price of 30 cents on cotton. Can it be that the cotton farmer did 'protest too much?"—Houston Post.



Cotton Market

NEW YORK. Jan. 31.—The cotton market showed a firmer tone this morning on reports of an improved export demand in the South. The opening was steady at a decline of 15 points to an advance of five points. near months being relatively easy under scattering liquidation but these offerings were quickly absorbed with the market selling up sharply before the end of the first hour. There was further covering of shorts, trade buying and sport from Wall street sources on the advance which carried March to 21.10 or about 56 to 72 points net higher.

It was reported that one Oklahoma firm with offices in New York was shipping five or six full cargoes of ecotton to Belgium and that 75 per cent of the Belgium mills were prepared to resume operations as soon as raw material was received. The advance met a good deal of realisting above 22 cents for May however and the market reacted later in the morning with the disposition to take profits evidently increased by reports of further mill curtailment and unsettled labor conditions. May reacted to 21.55 and July to 20.65 or about 46 to 65 points from the early high level with the market nervous and irregular around mid-day.

Trading was less active during the early afternoon and fluctuations were correspondingly narrower with May contracts ruling around 21.73 and July 20.79, or about 26 to 35 points net higher.



Camp Merritt, Jan. 23, 1919.

My Darling Mother:

I suppose you know by this time that I am again in the good old U. S. A. I arrived on the 20th, having sailed from Brest, France, on the 7th. We sailed on the ship Pueblo, a battleship that has seen quite a bit of service.

We had stormy weather all the way across and thought several times we were gone. The sailors said that it had been the worst trip they had ever made. I was sick all the way. We could see nothing but water except for one island and two or three ships. We sighted the island on the 12th of January, which was Sunday.

We are here at Camp Merritt now, but expect to leave at any time,

I intended sending a telegram but we move every day and we don't know when we will leave, so I thought I would fust write.

I left base hospital twenty on the 8th of December. I was there justifierly eight days and was two days getting there from the front. I was gassed about the 28th of October.

It is the base hospital front where we were held in reserve. We had no fighting there. We went then to a front in Alsace, in the Voages mountains. We were ander shell fire there for the first time on July 4th. After leaving there we had, a few days rest and went back almost to the same place. We left there for the St. Mihiel drive on Metz, but did not take an active part in that drive as we were held only as reserve. We then went up to the Argonne, where we started the drive that ended the war. I was under shell fire all the time, we were there, but was not in close items of the front lines as I had five little donkeys to take care of and could not go up. We then went to Verdun and I was sent to the field thospital with influenza. 


