Aroused by complaints from hundreds of working men and women, the directors of the chamber of commerce this morning named a committee to assist in organizing a company to build, rent and sell homes at moderate prices, and on reasonable terms, to all industrial workers of Wichita Falls who have permanent positions here and who intend to make this city their home. Plans also will be handled by another committee looking toward the construction of homes to be rented or sold at fair rates to all classes of city dwellers, men and women of independent ent incomes and salary and wage earn

This morning session of the chan

This morning session of the chamber not only went deeply into this question of finding a solution of the housing problem, but also resulted in the organization pledging its support to a campaign to raise at least \$15,000 for the school system of the city and further, the taking of sction on the necessary question of permanent roads throughout the county.

Report Alleged Profiteering.

T. B. Noble brought up the matter of alleged profiteering on the part of hotel and rooming house proprietors, declaring that it was common report that visitors to Wichita Falls were being charged a dollar a night marely to sleep in chairs in hotel lobbies, while as high as \$120 a month had been charged for single rooms in private residences. Judge R. E. Huff, president of the chamber, read a letter from J. V. C. T. Christensen, president of the Wichita Falls Foundry & Machine company, urging the building of moderate priced homes for working people.

Miss Roberts stated that the continuous publicity given to the fact that the teachers of this city are underpaid was becoming very distasteful to the teachers themselves. In expressing the views of the teachers, as voiced at the Monday meeting. Miss Roberts said: "While it is true that teachers' salaries are not as high as they should be, yet the majority of the teachers realize that conditions have changed since they signed their contracts and that the situation is not the fault of the school board or the city. They feel that having made their contracts they should and will keep them to the end of the year. They seriously object to being considered and discussed as objects of charity. They realize that there are some among the teachers who have given expressions to statements as a basis for recent articles, and also that there is profiteering among rooming and boarding bouses.

However, the opinion was generally expressed Monday that such jeachers as were dissatisfied with conditions should obtain employment in more remunerative lines without permitting the idea to go abroad that the teach-
