

LAUNCH CAMPAIGN FOR A PERMANENT SYSTEM OF ROADS

BUSINESS MEN AND OTHERS MEET WITH COMMISSIONERS TO DISCUSS MATTER.

PLAN ADDITIONAL BONDS

Committee Will Confer with State Highway Commission Monday to Enlist Aid.

With state and federal aid practically assured, and with many prominent Wichita falls citizens pledging their support, members of the county commissioners court this morning voted to suspend all temporary work on county highways pending action toward another bond issue...

In addition to the members of the county commissioners' court, the meeting this morning was attended by a committee representing the chamber of commerce and Rotary club...

Mr. Connor declared that to his knowledge the chairman of the state highways commission is anxious to see better, more permanent roads in Wichita county and that he is ready to furnish state aid and do anything within his power to further the proposed change.

The attitude of the people of the county must determine the results you obtain, he added. Go before the commission next Monday with a pugnacious attitude, if necessary, and what you need, and what you are prepared to do. You now are entitled to \$50,000 state aid and \$60,000 federal aid—ask for more. I congratulate the county for the common sense shown here.

Federal Co-Operation. Mr. Faulstich was equally optimistic in his belief that additional federal aid can be secured...

The question of changing the present road plans was introduced at a meeting by Judge E. Huff, who, after calling attention to the recent bond issue of \$750,000, asserted that the original plans for roads in Wichita county could be made more permanent and permanent of the steadily increasing traffic.

It was the purpose of the chamber of commerce, he added, "to say to you gentlemen, the state highway commission is anxious to see better, more permanent roads in Wichita county and that he is ready to furnish state aid and do anything within his power to further the proposed change."

"You know what we say is true," he insisted. "You know that temporary roads will not solve this county-highways problem. It is only a question whether you as county commissioners have the sand to put it up to the people in the same way."

For the county commissioners, R. L. Eeds stated that the court stands ready to make the change, and that it is anxious to be willing to build the best roads that money can put down, that the two problems of cancelling existing contracts and of raising the necessary money for permanent highways are the only problems requiring solution.

Every member of the court favors at least 60 miles of permanent roads, J. B. Crockett voiced his opinion as (Continued on page two.)

PAROLE DOES NOT PREVENT ARREST ON NEW CHARGE

AUSTIN, TEX., Feb. 12.—Robert Nelson, in application for writ of habeas corpus made to the court of criminal appeals, contended that he was at liberty under parole from the state penitentiary and under control of the prison authorities, restraint of him under warrant issued in connection with an indictment for different offense was illegal. Nelson was held in Fayette county under charge of murder. The court of criminal appeals refused application writ of habeas corpus and ruled that his status does not prevent his arrest under process from courts.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Members of the house ways and means committee after a brief discussion of the request of Secretary Glass that congress increase the amount of Liberty Bonds authorized but unissued from five billions to approximately ten billion dollars, declined to call the secretary before the committee for a hearing tomorrow.

SAYS BOLSHIEVIK HAD YIDDISH AID FROM NEW YORK

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Success of the bolshevik movement in Russia was attributed to Yiddish aid from New York by Rev. G. A. Simons, former pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church in Russia, testifying today at the senate judiciary sub-committee's inquiry into lawless agitation in the United States.

Referring to bolshevism, Dr. Simons said: "I have a firm conviction that this agitation is Yiddish and that one of its bases is in the lower east side of New York. I don't think the bolshevik movement in Russia would have been a success except for the support it got in New York."

Immediately after the Kerensky revolution in 1917, Dr. Simons said, settlement in Russia was pro-ally with the bolshevik movement. A paragraph on religion of the bolshevik with more than half the agitators were many from New York.

Woman Meets Germans. The witness called agitators a member of his church and a teacher in a Yiddish school, Petrograd, headquarters of the bolshevik before they overran Kerensky, requested to see German officers at a council table with bolshevik leaders and reported hearing German spoken more frequently than Russian.

Dr. Simons said he was having in mind the agitator coming to him on apparently good authority that the governing committee of the northern commune in Petrograd in December 1918, obtained only sixteen true Russians.

Followed by Agitators. The witness called agitators agitators followed him when he delivered lectures on Russia and distributed at his door pamphlets entitled "Seventy-six Questions and Answers about Bolshevism in Russia, written by Albert Williams, a speaker at a recent meeting in Washington, which prompted the senate committee's new inquiry.

Dr. Simons left Russia last October and was associated with the "United Square Methodist Episcopal church, New York. He had been in Russia since 1907.

After Dr. Simons had described at length personal experiences involving threats of death from terrorism in Petrograd, Senator Wolcott of Delaware said:

"Then I gather from what you say that the whole regime is maintained by a small minority through the use of terror."

"That is absolutely correct," replied the witness.

Later he added that he believed 90 per cent of Russian peasants were pro-bolshevik and that he had known men who know say that three-fourths of the workmen hoped the bolshevik soon would be overthrown.

After he had described the bolsheviks as "opposed to religion of all kinds and absolutely atheistic," Senator King of Utah asked:

"Do you see any difference between this in this country and the bolshevik?"

"I am strongly impressed that they are identical," replied Dr. Simons.

ACCEPT PLAN FOR RESTORATION OF SIBERIAN TRAFFIC

PROPOSAL OF JAPAN IS AGREED TO BY UNITED STATES, SAYS MR. POLK.

AN AID TO RUSSIANS

Will Enable Them to Regain Their Normal Conditions in Life In Opinion Given.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Acting Secretary Polk announced at the state department today that the United States now has accepted formally the proposal of the Japanese government in regard to plans for the restoration of railway traffic in Siberia.

The other members already appointed are Senator Henry F. Hollis of New Hampshire, whose term in the senate expires March 3; Homer H. Johnson, of Cleveland, and Brigadier General Charles G. Dawes of Chicago, who is now serving with the American expeditionary forces.

Under the plan, which already is being put into effect, the Siberian Railway system which includes the Chinese Eastern railway, is to be supervised by an international committee with a Russian as chairman.

Technical and economic management of the railways will be in the hands of the technical board, the president of which will be John F. Stevens who was head of the American railway commission sent to Russia in 1917.

county road superintendent. "Such roads will cost \$25,000 a mile. We are now finishing the grading on 107 miles of roads, but that work can stop and it will be found, I am confident, that less than \$3,000 has been wasted on the grading if all the temporary plans are changed. We have now 13 cars of gravel on hand, also, that can be disposed of at more than we paid for it."

The federal attitude on county problems of highway construction was outlined by Mr. Fauntleroy, who asserted that location, grading, drainage and the selection of the proper wearing surface are four fundamental principles to be applied to permanent highways.

Pays to Build Right. "The more money you build into your road surface," he declared, "the less you have to spend for maintenance in the future. The question of raising funds is a question of education; the bringing home to the people of the saving involved to them. In the case presented by this county, we believe it is extremely wise to build permanent roads, not gravel roads with surface treatment. We recommend permanent roads; that is our stand, and we are willing to help you knowing the money will not be wasted."

On the motion of Judge Huff, it was voted that the county commissioners stand sponsor for the movement for permanent highways throughout the county; that the meeting pledge itself support to the court; that a committee be appointed to sound out the sentiment of Burkburnett, Electra, Iowa Park and other communities and that a later meeting be held for further discussion.

A committee, headed by Mr. Crockett and assisted by Mr. Connor and Mr. Fauntleroy, also will be selected to confer with the state highway commission next Monday morning at 10 o'clock and to lay before that body the county's detailed needs to ask for additional appropriation and to state the support the county is prepared to give to the movement.

Aviation Record Shows Flying Is Reasonably Safe

LONDON, Feb. 12.—According to figures compiled by the British Air Ministry covering the last three years of flying on the western front, the destination safely in an airplane are almost as good as his chances of safe arrival by bus, street car or other surface vehicle. Since January, 1916, the Air Ministry's figures show a total of about 1,000,000 flying hours or 114 years. During this time 3,346 officers were killed. Most of the fatalities were the direct result of actual battle, and only a small proportion due to accident. Major General Sir P. H. Sykes, chief of the air staff, in an address before the London Chamber of Commerce recently said that improvements made in the last months of the war had reduced the risks of flying to an almost negligible point. The new parliament will be called upon, early in its first session, to pass measures for the regulation of civil flying. The proposed measures, already drafted, deal with traffic rules, air routes, landing places, safety requirements, pilot license requirements, etc.

SIR BORDEN TENDERED U. S. AMBASSADORSHIP

MONTREAL, QUEBEC, Feb. 12.—Sir Robert Borden, the Canadian premier, who now is in London in attendance at the peace conference, has been offered the post of British ambassador to the United States, according to reports in newspapers. In London received by the Canadian press here.

TOTAL CASUALTIES AMERICAN FORCES IN SIBERIA 324

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—A cablegram today from the headquarters of the American expeditionary forces in France gave the total casualties in American forces in Siberia up to February 9 as 10 officers and 314 men killed, died of wounds and disease, wounded and missing in action. The total was divided as follows: Killed in action, two officers, 69 men; died of wounds, one officer, 11 men; died of disease, 54 men; died of accident, five men; wounded severely, two officers, 67 men; wounded slightly, three officers, 30 men; wounded, degree undetermined, two officers, 53; missing in action, 31 men. These casualties are being published individually in the regular casualty lists, the war department announced.

The picture represents a war of Titans. It is a calm and dispassionate in its viewpoint. It mirrors actual conditions without exaggeration. There are no horrors—no babes impaled on bayonets, no special heroics; but the effect on the audience is all the stronger for this repression. There are moments when the emotions are so stirred that nobody dares breathe lest he break the spell which holds him, and the ominous silence becomes

ROY VAN TREAS AND ASSOCIATES ARE CONVICTED

CINCINNATI, Feb. 12.—Roy Van Treas, president of the McAlester, Okla., Real Estate Exchange, and 15 associates charged with conspiracy to defraud by the use of the mails, in the sale of Indian lands were found guilty by a jury in the United States district court here today. The jury deliberated seven hours.

Attorneys for Van Treas and his associates gave notice that they would move for a new trial. Early last February the defendants were arrested by postoffice inspectors and the offices of the McAlester Real Estate Exchange in Cincinnati and McAlester, Okla., were searched. It was charged that Van Treas secured an option on lands in southwestern Oklahoma after he found he could not buy enough at the government sale of Indian unallotted lands to fill his contracts. The government charged that the McAlester company perpetrated a fraud when it took \$133,000 for the land, and then sold the land to the customer, and then sold the land it had bought private at a profit.

EXPECT SENATE TO PASS NAVAL APPROPRIATION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The naval appropriation bill carrying a total of \$721,000,000 for the next fiscal year and retaining approval of the new three year building program of ten battleships and ten scout cruisers, was sent today to the senate. The measure was passed by the house late yesterday by a vote of 281 to 50. Prompt action on the bill is expected in the senate in view of the short time remaining before the close of the session on March fourth.

FORMER RANGER HAS A PLAN FOR REORGANIZATION

AUSTIN, TEX., Feb. 12.—J. H. Rogers, United States marshal for the western district, who said that he had served as a ranger for twenty-eight years, today outlined before the ranger investigation a plan for the reorganization of the ranger force. He thought that there should be only one company of rangers in the state, and that this company should be under command of a high class captain. Commissioned lieutenants should be appointed with the approval of the captain, the adjutant general and the governor, and non-commissioned officers and privates be chosen by the captain, who should be responsible for their actions. He thought that the provision in the Caddo ranger bill would destroy the efficiency of the force and said that under the present system the adjutant general could not keep in close touch with his men.

Jackson of Alpine, an executive of the Texas Cattle Raisers Association, told of a mass meeting at Alpine at which the citizens appealed to the governor for protection from border raids. He also opposed the bond feature of the Caddo bill, and said that big land owners would go on rangers' bonds and thus secure control over them. C. E. Berniman, in charge of the bureau of investigation of the United States department of justice with jurisdiction over Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, said that Ranger Captain W. M. Hanson had given very efficient co-operation with his department and shown extraordinary judgment in the avoidance of bloodshed. He said that the ranger force had been one of the strongest aids to federal officials in Texas and many deserters and slickers have been apprehended through them. Mr. Berniman also considered that bonding would hamper rangers.

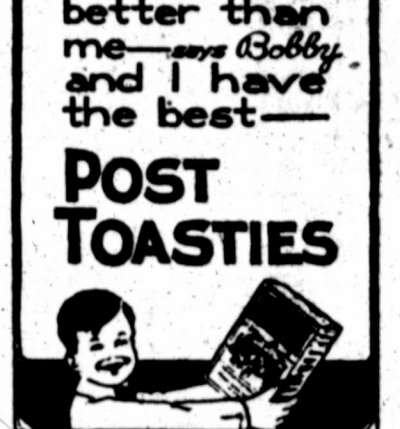

### PREPARE AN AMENDMENT

Proposals Also Criticized by the Radical Section of the British Press.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—While the press generally approves of Premier Lloyd George's labor program it fails to entirely endorse the parliamentary labor party, which has proposed an amendment to the reply to the speech from the throne, regretting the absence of definite proposals dealing with the present causes of industrial unrest and for securing, as regards wages and working hours conditions of labor which will establish a higher standard of life and social well-being for the people.

Mr. Lloyd George's proposals are also adversely criticized by the radical section of the press, which regards them as vague and unlikely to be carried out by what is alleged to be a "reactionary parliament." The labor situation reaches a crisis today in conferences between the government and the three great unions, representing nearly 1,500,000 workers, the results of whose demands is awaited with keen interest by the entire labor world. The unions are the Miners' Federation of Great Britain, membership 590,000; National Union of Railway men, membership 400,000 and the National Transport Workers' Federation membership 250,000. The unions are acting together and it is believed they have agreed on joint action if dissatisfied with the conference. The railway men's demands include a 48 hour week and control of railways by representatives of the management and workers. This latter clause is considered a step toward nationalization but an alternative has been prepared in the form of a mission of labor delegates and boards of directors. The miners want a six hour day and a 30 per cent increase in wages while the transport workers demand a 44 hour week and a wage advance of 20 per cent.

While the Northcliffe papers generally approve of the Lloyd George program the premier is attacked by Viscount Northcliffe in a new weekly published today. The attack is an article sent to the publication by cable by Viscount Northcliffe, who is in Southern France. Mr. Lloyd George is said to be "political chameleon."

#### SPECIAL COMMISSION TO STUDY BELGIUM CLAIMS

PARIS, Feb. 12.—It is stated that a special commission will be appointed to study Belgian claims as has been done in the consideration of the territorial problems, says a Havas report. In addition to Marshal Foch, Marshal Petain and Field Marshal Haig, General Pershing and General Diaz will be present at today's session of the supreme war council to deal with the terms for the renewal of the armistice.

#### FRENCH ASSOCIATIONS TO ORGANIZE CONGRESS

PARIS, Feb. 11. (Havas).—Delegates representing 90 associations having a membership of 10,000,000 have met here in order to organize a national French congress. They will sit from February 27 to March 1 to deal with the terms to be presented to the peace conference.

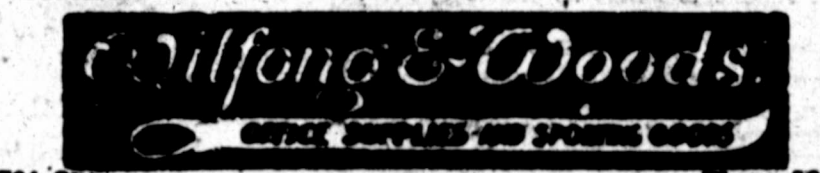
