Unless the United States railroad administration lifts the embargo on freight consigned to Wichita Falls within ten days, between 700 and 1,000 workers engaged in building trades in this city may be without employment.

Yard Practically Empty. The Alfalfa Lumber company's yards are practically empty.

Contractors are in no better business position than the lumber and supply men. A carload of gum and hardwood lumber by Taylor Brothers of this city 60 days ago is still "somewhere on the road."

Local railroad officials have no power in the matter, and whatever relief, if any, comes, must come from the headquarters offices in Dallas and Fort Worth of the lines running through Wichita Falls.

Shortage of Lumber. "We're stopped, that's all," Mr. Moore added. "Our firm has 50 carloads of lumber stalled on the road, and 100 more loads tied up at the shipping points."

On Mr. Moore's desk this morning was a spike holding more than a score of telegrams from lumber companies and lumber mills in Beaumont, Houston, Shreveport, Rochelle and other cities, each telegram telling the same story.

The Moore & Richolt yards customarily kept in stock an average of 1,000,000 feet of lumber today they contained less than 200,000 feet, including odds and ends, and the most of this is already sold.

According to Mr. Moore's figures, there are approximately 500 car loads of lumber billed to Wichita Falls that either have not left the shipping points or have been sidetracked en route.

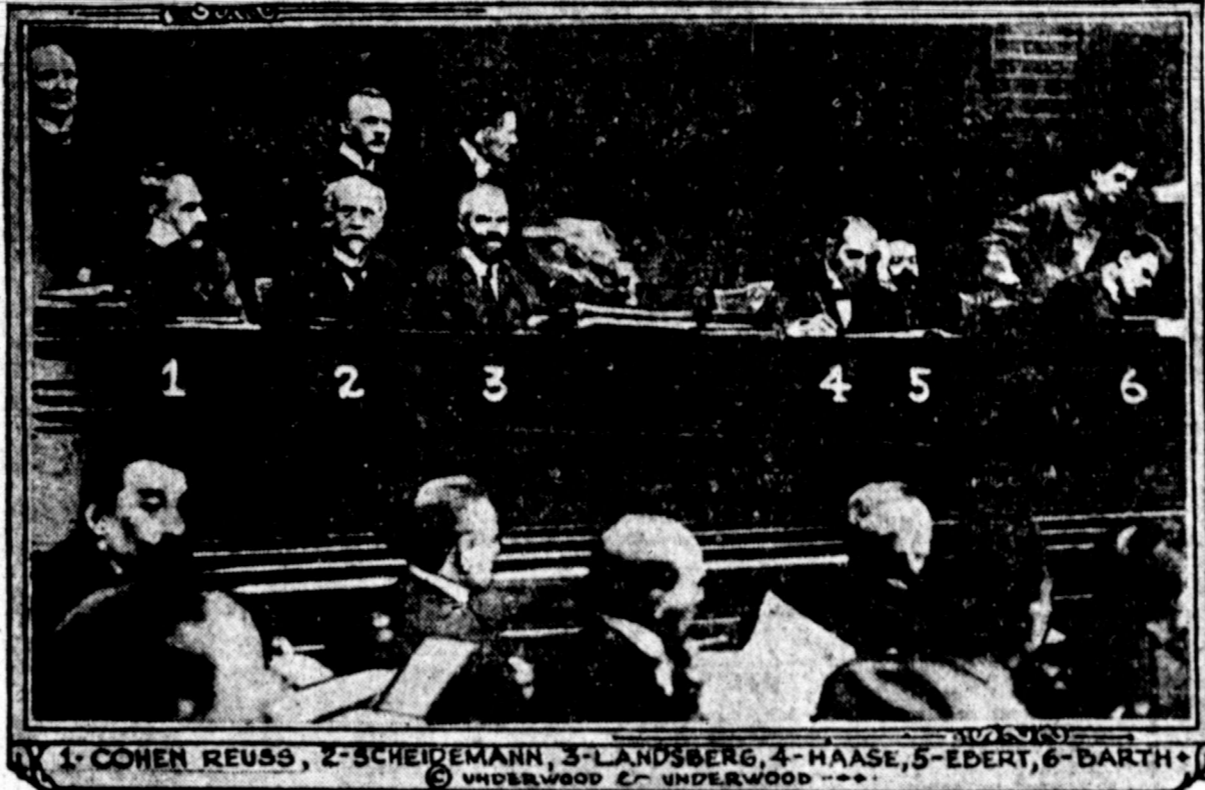

SENATOR BORAH DECLINES TO DINE WITH PRESIDENT

ASKS TO BE EXCUSED FROM CONFERENCE TO HEAR REPORT ON LEAGUE.

OPPOSED TO THE PLAN

Declares Nothing Can Make Him Agree with the Constitution as It Now Stands.

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Senator Borah of Idaho has asked to be excused from attending the dinner at the White House at which President Wilson and members of the foreign relations committee of congress the constitution of the proposed league of nations.

White House officials said no other member of the committee had declined the President's invitation, and that it was understood all the others would accept.

On receiving the Idaho senator's letter today, Secretary Tumulty immediately transmitted it by wireless to President Wilson aboard the transport George Washington on his way home from France.

Senator Borah is one of a group of senators which included some democrats as well as republicans who oppose any sort of internationalization and whose opposition to the league as proposed has been regarded as a foregone conclusion.

SENATOR BORAH DECLINES TO DINE WITH PRESIDENT

(Continued from Page 1)

Senator Borah's letter follows: "I greatly appreciate your note honoring me with an invitation to meet the President February 25 to discuss the league of nations—a matter of most vital concern to the whole country. Meetings at the White House, according to a long standing custom, are always regarded as strictly confidential upon the part of the guests. This meeting, I take it, would be regarded as especially confidential, otherwise the President would have spoken, according to his custom, to the open Senate. The difference between the President and myself on this question are fundamental. I am sure no suggestion of mine would modify in the slightest the view of the President and nothing could induce me to support this league as outlined in this proposed constitution or anything like it.

"I feel, therefore, that it would not be fair to the President to accept his confidence or to receive from him confidential information concerning this subject. Neither in my view of the subject, could I receive information which I would not feel perfectly free to transmit to my colleagues or use in public debate. After much reflection I beg, therefore, to be excused from attending the meeting.

"In writing this note and in taking this course, I mean no personal disrespect to or disregard of the President. I simply find myself in such disagreement with him to feel so intensely concerning the matter that I cannot do other than candidly advise him not the fact, to be excused from attending the meeting.

Several republican members of the committee stated privately today that they would not regard themselves bound by confidence and that they would accept the President's invitation with reluctance.

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Mexico City Paper Praises Wilson and League of Nations

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 18.—The Universal prints an editorial this morning under the heading "President Wilson evolves new world policies," which praises the ideals of the league of nations and asserts that Mexico will be protected by it. The newspaper declares that President Wilson more than any other man of all times, deserves the gratitude of mankind. "Territorial integrity, liberty and prosperity," the editorial says, "are guaranteed to peoples by the league of nations, which upon the conclusion of the war will eliminate the useless formula of the balance of power and resolve international disputes, not by war, the recourse of savages, but by arbitration, the recourse of civilization."

Paper Emphasizes Satisfaction With Plans for Navies

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Referring to the league of nations covenant, the Times in an editorial emphasizes the satisfaction it gives to contentions of the British navy during the war regarding neutral countries bordering on enemy waters. The provision regarding passage over the territory of a member of a league the newspaper says makes the Baltic an open sea if Sweden and Denmark join the league. "The right claimed by the league to cut off communication between a criminal power and any countries, whether members of the league or not," the editorial continues, in effect abolishes neutrality in a war like the one just passed and re-inforces the disciplinary strength of sea-power in a future war.

Doctor Farrand To Be at Head of Red Cross Work

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—That the Red Cross will continue as a large and active humanitarian agency is assured by the recent announcement that Doctor Livingston Farrand has accepted the chairmanship of the Central Committee.

Red Cross officials feel no doubt as to the future success of the Red Cross under the leadership of Doctor Farrand. Doctor Farrand's achievements in the educational and medical world have been such that he will bring to this work a broad knowledge of the many activities embraced in Red Cross service. An executive secretary of the national Association for the study and prevention of tuberculosis, as treasurer of the American Public Health Association and as editor of the American Journal of Public Health, he enters upon his new office with a fund of knowledge and experience relating to the most generally recognized relief factor—public health.

Since the United States entered the war, Doctor Farrand has been in charge of the tuberculosis relief work in France. To carry on this work Dr. Farrand was on leave of absence from the University of Colorado, the presidency of which he resigns to become the head of the Red Cross. In making

the announcement of Doctor Farrand's appointment, Henry C. Davison, chairman of the War Council, stated that the Red Cross has secured as its future head the man of all men best fitted to carry on this work, and that on March 1 when Dr. Farrand assumes his new duties and announces the peace program of the Red Cross, every chapter in the country will realize that Red Cross work will not must go on.

GREAT BRITAIN MODIFIES MAXIMUM LUMBER PRICES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Maximum prices for timber imported into Great Britain were modified February 10, according to cable advices from London received today. Prices per standard of 1.85 cubic foot were announced as follows: Pitch pine log timber, 25 feet and down, 5s 9d, six to eight inches 6s 9d, to 13 inches and 3d 13 to 15 inches. Short leaf Darian and Savannah district timber, 1s per cubic foot, or less. Prime pitch pine planks and boards, 11 inches and up, 6s pounds; 10 inches and down 5s pounds per standard.

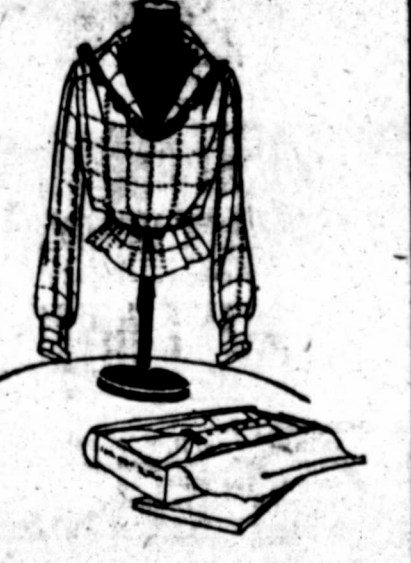

NORTHWEST TEXAS INSANE ASYLUM IS HALF COMPLETED

The Northwest Texas Insane Asylum, for which the Thirty-Eighth Legislature about two years ago passed an appropriation, during the administration of James E. Ferguson as governor, is now more than 50 per cent completed. Leo M. J. Dieleman, of Dieleman Bros., building contractors, in charge of the construction, stated this morning. In about six months the completed institution will be ready to turn over to the state, if working conditions permit, Mr. Dieleman added. At present the concrete work in all nine of the buildings has been completed, and four of the buildings, two receiving wards, and two infirmaries, are totally completed save for the interior finishing. Plastering in these buildings commenced today. Brickwork on the fifth building is practically completed. Mr. Dieleman said a great deal of the interior finishing material is already on the ground, and little delay has been experienced because of lack of materials. The contract with Dieleman Bros. calls only for the buildings, and separate contracts have been let for the plumbing, heating and light fixtures. The construction contract was let for \$343,000, the plumbing and other contracts not being included in this figure.

Former Citizen Of Wichita Falls Here From Tulsa

W. W. Little, one of the pioneers in the Wichita Falls district, is here from Tulsa. Mr. Little was the first correspondent here for the Oil and Gas Journal. At one time he had extensive lease holdings south of Burk Burnett and in the territory between Burk Burnett and Petrolia. He drilled a deep test in the Petrolia district but missed the sand. Several years ago Mr. Little wrote an article for the Oil and Gas Journal on the geology of the Burk Burnett district with some conclusions from his own work. OIL DEVELOPMENT

BAILEY WELL IN BROWN COUNTY IS NOW MAKING 50

SOME GOOD WELLS ARE SHOWN IN REPORTS FROM STEPHENS COUNTY.

PRODUCTION INCREASING

One of the Better Ones is That of the Monitor Parker Company Interests.

Special to The Times.
FORT WORTH, Feb. 18.—After a 40-quart shot of nitroglycerine placed last week, the Bailey well, northwest of Brownwood in Brown county, is making 50 barrels daily, flowing by heads. When the well was shot it bridged over and when the bridge was penetrated the accumulated gas pressure was sufficient to raise the tools, spoil 80 feet of drilling cable and tear the last joint of six-inch delivery line loose from the storage tank. The shot has doubled the quantity of the gas. This production from the Bailey well is important for two reasons, geologists claim; first, because it proves there is high grade oil in the black lime formation of Brown county, and second, that it shows instance of a big structure in the bend formation.

Stephens County Report.
 Stephens county is showing some good wells in the last few days and the production is increasing faster than for several months before. One of the good ones is that of the Monitor Parker interests spraying about 50 barrels from some days. A 50-quart shot brought an initial production of 1,300 barrels the first 24 hours. The location, a mile and a half south of the Mid-Kansas Carey well that spurted at 4,000 barrels a few days, practically extends production that much to the south.

The Gulf Production Company is getting a well in the southwest corner of the Winston land, Section four, a mile and a half west of Caddo and seven miles east by north of the Fincher. It is a fine producer and still making 1,000 barrels. This well extends the good production area along the north line of production in Stephens county several miles and is 11 miles east of the Davis well.

The J. T. White well of the Gulf Production Co. is making 350 barrels and has the appearance of being the best well in Stephens county when drilled in. They are now waiting on pipe line connections. It is located on the

Market Report

Cotton Market

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Realizing caused some irregularity at the opening of the cotton market today first prices being 15 points higher to four points lower. May sold at \$22.69 after the call and July at \$22.19, or unchanged to five points lower but the offerings were quickly absorbed and the market soon firmed up on a renewal of yesterday's buying movement. This found further encouragement in reports that domestic mills were good buyers of spot cotton in the interior yesterday and the near months were relatively firm with March selling at 24.00 and May to 22.90 or about \$1 to 20 points net higher before the end of the first hour. July advanced to 22.50 or 28 points above last night's closing but the inter months met increased offerings on the advance.

Reports that the demand for a 48-hour week resulted in a strike of 2,000 men at one of the South Carolina mill points and of 8,000 at Columbus, Ga., were followed by a break in prices during the early afternoon. May sold off to 22.65 and July 21.45, making net declines of about 64 to 75 points.

Cotton closed weak.

New Orleans Cotton. NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 18.—Further rains in Texas and fear of rain for the western belt generally caused a rise of 19 to 31 points around the opening of the cotton market today but profit taking came from the long side in considerable volume and checked the advance. At the end of the first half hour of business prices were plus to five points down compared with yesterday's close.

Liquidation of long cotton increased and carried prices 20 to 25 points under yesterday's final but at noon the feeling was steadier and the market showed net losses of six to 13 points.

After the advance of approximately three cents a pound from the low levels of last week, general buying was less active and the market met increased realizing this morning. May reacted to 22.59 and July to 22.07 or about 10 to 17 points net lower but there was support from local bulls on the setback and the tone was steadier again late in the forenoon with May ruling around 22.72 and July 22.14 at midday. Private cables claim that shipments of cotton to Spain are already in excess of requirements and that all the mills there are working short time.

Liquidation increased and at one o'clock the trading months were 50 to 65 points under the last quotations of yesterday.

Cotton closed barely steady at a decline of 50 to 100 points.

WILL MAKE EFFORT TO MEET DEMAND FOR EARLY RELEASE OF ARMY.

PROBLEMS IMPEDE WORK

Territorial Boundaries and Indemnities Are Questions Involving Much Study.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Feb. 18.—Some of the Entente powers are planning as soon as the Russian problem is solved by the supreme council of the peace conference, is disposed of and a few more hearings are accorded, representatives of small nations to take up the larger problems of a treaty of peace. The state of public sentiment in America, England, Australia and Canada has impressed their representatives here of the necessity of taking steps to return the soldiers home, which can not be accomplished entirely in advance of the conclusion of the peace treaty. The French government is fully aware of this feeling and expresses its sympathy with the motives that underlie it, but there are fears of dangerous complications and failure to realize the necessary fruits of victory if there is undue haste in the conclusion of a treaty of peace. France is insisting upon compliance with armistice demand for the return of much property taken by the Germans, particularly industrial machinery. This will take a long time and some of the Entente countries believe it should not be permitted to delay the signing of the treaty.

Answering French Objections. Answering French objections that a long time may be consumed in arranging the boundaries of new states carved out of enemy countries, advocates of immediate peace declare that such readjustments as are necessary can proceed after the signature of the peace treaty. They say that Germany, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria should simply be required to sign treaties relinquishing such parts of their former territories as are required to form new states and rectify old boundaries. It is held that it is no concern of these nations what disposition the entente, through peace conference committee or the supreme council, makes of such territories. The same powers hold there should be no delay because of indemnities. It is impossible to ascertain the actual

PARIS, Feb. 18.—When the German came to sign the terms of the new armistice, says a Havas dispatch from Treves, Mathias Erzberger handed to Marshal Foch a twenty-three page memorial in which it was attempted to justify Germany's attitude, it being maintained that she had done her best to meet her obligations. He also gave the marshal a memorandum from Philipp Scheidemann, the new German chancellor, complaining of the increasingly hard terms forced upon Germany and protesting against the Germans being forced to evacuate Poland, delivering German fortresses to the Poles, and abandoning the German people there. A demand was made that the Allies require the Poles to cease their attacks against the Germans.

LAST REQUEST COMPLIED WITH.

This last request has already been complied with, a telegram having been sent to Warsaw from Paris last night. The special commission of the supreme council, charged with drafting the terms of a definite armistice which will hold good until the peace preliminaries are signed, has almost completed its task and it is possible, says a Havas report, that Marshal Foch will be able to notify the Germans on Thursday or Friday of the military and naval terms which will be essentially those of the preliminary peace treaty. It is understood that terms will include clauses by which Germany will be allowed to maintain only 25,000 men under arms to keep order. All war material beyond what is necessary to equip these troops, would, according to report be placed under control of the Allies who will also hold Germany's munition factories.

Banks Are Urged To Respond To the Government's Call

DALLAS, TEX., Feb. 17.—A telegram from the treasury department advises that the amount of subscriptions to current issue of treasury certificates on first day was exceptionally small in all districts and urges that every bank awaken to the necessity of supporting the government in its requirements at this time as the failure of any district to respond to this need may be fatal to the whole. Director of Sales Adams, who says:

"At close of business Monday subscriptions had been received from only 147 banks and amounted to \$40,200,000 while 38 individuals and corporations had subscribed for \$31,900,000, making the total amount to date of only \$434,150,000. More than \$1,000,000,000 in subscriptions will be necessary for this district to reach its quota."

"The time has arrived for the banks to line up and show whether they are still with and for the government. If they refuse to supply its temporary money needs who will do it and what will be the result. Wire your subscription now."

INSURANCE HAS BEEN CANCELLED AT BURKBURNETT

Burkburnett is now practically without fire protection, according to the Burkburnett Star, which records the withdrawal of the Liverpool, London and Globe Insurance company, which is said to have suffered heavily in the fire two weeks ago. The item from the Star follows:

"The Liverpool and London and Globe Insurance Company have notified their agents, Harwell & Logan, this week, to cancel all their liability in the town of Burkburnett. The Liverpool were carrying practically all of the insurance in town, and their withdrawal leaves the town practically without fire protection."

"The company gives as their reason for withdrawing the fact that there was practically no water in the city water tank the night of the recent fire, in which they incurred a \$24,000 loss, which could have been prevented had there been an adequate water supply in the tank."

France Is Giving Financial Problem Serious Attention

By Associated Press.
PARIS, Sunday, Feb. 16.—The financial situation of France is being given serious attention by various committees and groups of the chamber of deputies where it will be the subject of an interpellation at an early date.

France's war expenses are expected to reach a total of 182,000,000,000 francs, with resources to meet it of 158,000,000,000 francs.

In addition to the 24,000,000,000 deficit there are exceptional expenses including compensation to civilians for

war damage, which is placed in moderate estimates at ten billion francs which will make the total deficit 30,000,000,000 francs. It is reckoned that the expenses for 1920 will be 18,500,000,000 francs, of which the existing budget can supply only 8,000,000,000. The question is therefore being discussed in French quarters whether, apart from Germany's war contribution, a new division of war expenses ought not to be considered between the Allies in order to distribute more equitably the burden which it is contended, weighs more heavily on France than on the others.

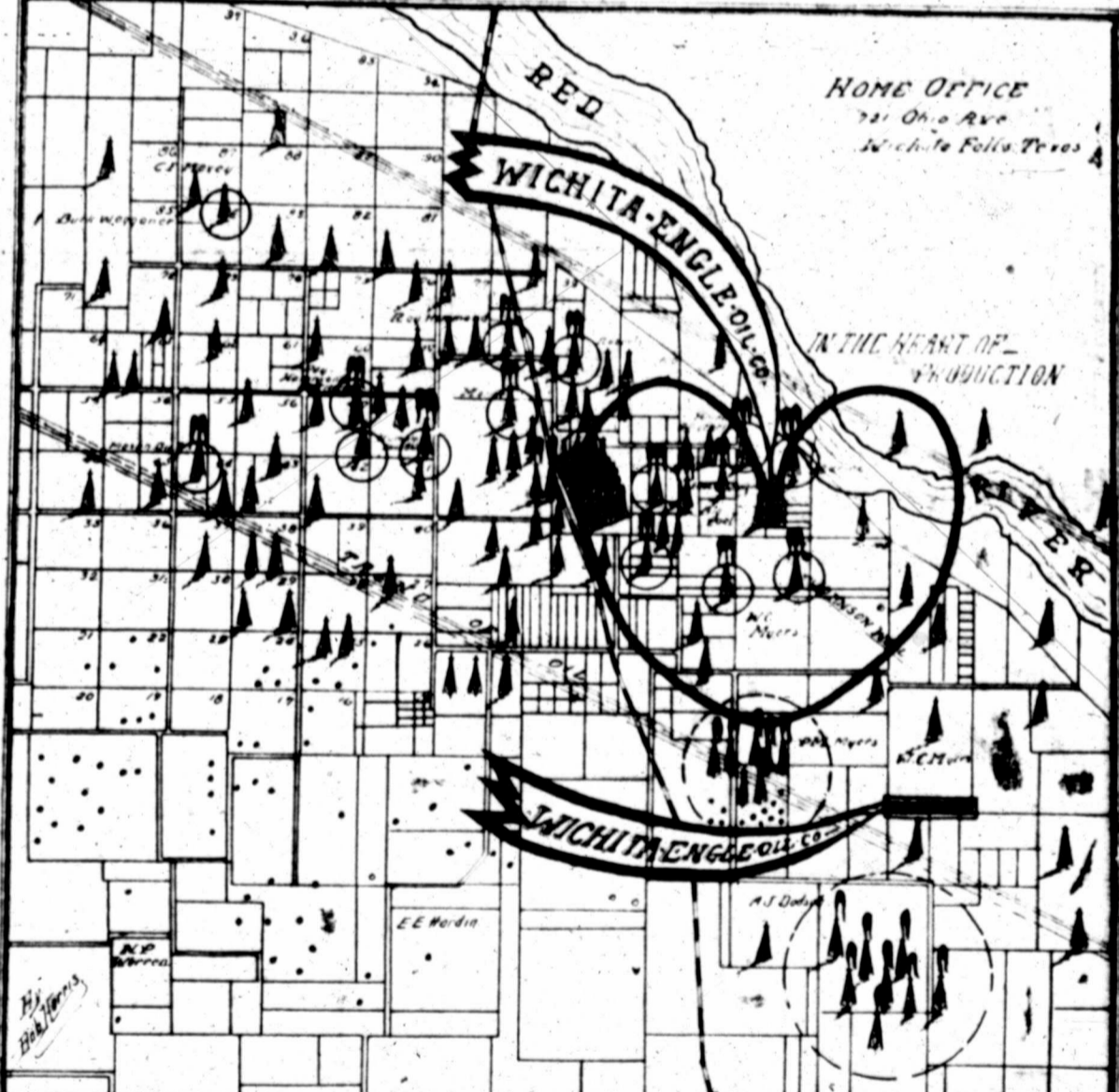

Have you a single room to rent for any sum ranging between, say, \$49 and \$60 a month? You have? Then—Don't list that room with the Wichita Falls chamber of commerce. The chamber, representing the business men of the city with the city's future welfare at heart, has ceased to be a clearing house for profiteering landlords hopeful of getting rich quickly while the boom lasts.

Today the chamber establish fixed rates for all rooms to be accepted on its list. It will no longer serve as a renting medium for any landlord who expects to receive more than \$30 a month for a single room with two occupants or more than \$20 a month for a single room with one occupant. And a flat rate of \$1 per night, per man has been established for transients, while no room will be accepted on the list to rent by the night above a maximum of \$2 regardless of how many occupants it may have.

Credit for the stand taken by the chamber goes to Miss M. R. Kerr, assistant secretary, whose schedule was endorsed this morning by T. B. Noble, chairman of the chamber of commerce committee which is investigating room and house rents.

MEN WITH SMALL INCOMES MAY SECURE TAX FORMS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Individuals with incomes of \$5,000 or less may now obtain income tax return forms at offices of revenue collectors or banks, the revenue bureau announced today. The forms have been distributed throughout the country, and were released today without awaiting signature of the revenue bill by the president. The forms for individual incomes of more than \$5,000 and other tax return forms will be available within two weeks.

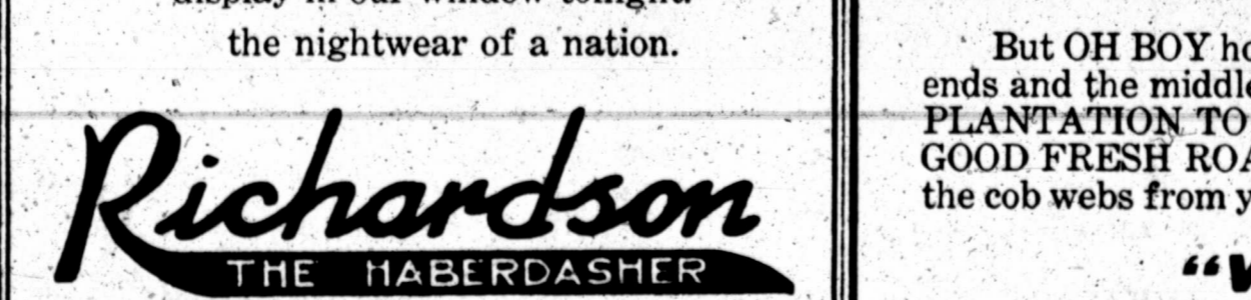
