



Paper Emphasizes Satisfaction With







The Northwest Texas Insane Asylum, for which the Thirty-Eighth Legislature about two years ag passed an appropriation, during the adminis-tration of James E. They say that Germany, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria should simply be required to sign treaties re-linguishing such parts of their former territories as are required to form new states and rectify old boundaries. It is held that it is no concern of these nations what disposition the en-tent, through peace conference comtents, through peace conference com-mittee or the supreme council, makes of such territories.
