

"BLUE SKY" LAW WILL BE CONSIDERED ON TUESDAY

(By Associated Press.) AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 20.—The house of the Texas legislature today commended Governor and Mrs. W. P. Hobby for their action in requesting the abandonment of the inaugural ball.

After postponing until next Tuesday consideration of a bill which would require limited partnerships, joint stock companies, etc., to file with the secretary a copy of the agreement under which they work, the house took up consideration of a senate bill which proposes the appointment of a legislative committee to investigate the subject of taxation and recommend such changes in the system as they conclude would be beneficial.

Salary Amendment Passed. A bill carrying out the provisions of the free text book amendment to the constitution has been passed finally by both houses of the Texas legislature. The measure, which originated in the senate, was amended in the house but proponents of house amendments say that they did not materially change the bill, and they expect the senate to readily concur in these amendments.

The plan of the bill is that a central depository shall be maintained, and the state board of education shall control the distribution of the fund. Requisition for books shall be made up in accordance with the average of the school which shall be determined April 1 of each year. Twenty-five per cent above the estimated requirements of each district is to be allowed to meet emergencies.

Joint Resolution to Amend the Constitution of Texas so as to raise the governor's salary from \$4,000 to \$10,000 a year has been adopted by the legislature. The resolution proposes that this amendment shall be amended to the voters on May 24, 1919, the same date which has been set for submission of the woman suffrage and prohibition amendments. It is not necessary that the governor sign this resolution in order to secure its submission.

Will Study Taxation. The bill proposing the appointment of a legislative committee to investigate the subject of taxation was referred to the house committee on revenue and taxation.

A senate bill giving permission to the Rivers Beach and Western Railway Company to take up a portion of its track was passed finally.

Consideration of the Senate bill which proposes to carry out provisions of the free text book amendment to the constitution was taken up in the house. The bill is on final passage, and proponents of house amendments adopted when the subject was referred to the house committee on revenue and taxation.

AMERICAN TROOPS IN NORTH RUSSIA IN GOOD HEALTH

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Colonel George F. Stewart, commanding the American troops in northern Russia, cabled the war department today that "alarmist reports of the condition of troops in northern Russia" were not warranted by the facts.

The health of the entire command is excellent, Colonel Stewart reports, and the sick and wounded are being cared for by the American command in a manner that is capable of taking care of itself against the whole bolshevik army.

Major Brooks Has Been Assigned To Honolulu Islands

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Major General Peter E. Traub, who commanded the 25th division in the attack on the island of Iwo Jima, was assigned to the Hawaiian Islands today by the War Department.

GERMAN TROOPS TO BE EMPLOYED IN NEUTRAL ZONE

(By Associated Press.) AMSTERDAM, Feb. 20.—Marshal Foch has agreed to the employment of German army troops in the neutral zone comprising the ten kilometer district east of Cologne but not including Düsseldorf and also in the Rhine region south of Bonn in order to suppress local disturbances, according to a telegram received here from Muenster.

GENERAL PERSHING MAKES REPORT ON BREAST SITUATION

DECLARES SICK RATE IS UNUSUALLY LOW THERE AND IN CAMPS.

HAS MADE INSPECTION

General Submits Figures Showing Condition of Health Obtaining in the Army.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—General Pershing cabled the war department today that an inspection general has reported the soldiers now in Germany comfortably quartered and in good health.

Health conditions at Brest, France, general camp conditions and the method of handling troops through that camp "have received high praise from all who inspected since the first formative day," General Pershing reported today to the war department. The message said General Pershing himself, General Harbord, his chief of staff, the chief surgeon and the inspector general of the A. E. F. had all personally inspected the camp during the last month.

Conditions at the camp have been described as "terrible in published reports and by witnesses before congressional committees."

Hospital Reports Given. Tables of hospital rates were included in General Pershing's report. The daily admission rate per thousand men for troops in Brest and vicinity for the first 19 days of February was 1.45. The similar rate for November was 2.11, for December 1.2 and for January 1.63.

"The sick rate is unusually low," General Pershing said, "and is a direct measure of the high standard of camp life. Corresponding rates for the whole American expeditionary force not counting men wounded in action, is as follows: For November 2.2; for December 2.14; for January 2.04."

Average Death Rate. The daily average death rate per one hundred thousand men for troops at Brest and vicinity is shown as follows: November 6.15; December 2.08; January 3.15; February to date, 3.63.

More than 955,000 men entered France via Brest, the cable states, and of these 150,000 were afflicted with influenza and pneumonia cases were arriving on transports from the United States and were in no way due to any health conditions existing at Brest.

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Feb. 20.—The Earl of Reading, British ambassador to the United States, sailed today to resume his post at Washington.

(By Associated Press.) PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 20.—Work is virtually at a standstill at the Hog Island ship yard today following a strike of 400 foremen. They asked for an increase of approximately \$6 a week. This would make their weekly earnings about \$70.

SECRETARY WANTS LAW TO CONTROL SHEEP DOGS

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Secretary Houston of the department of agriculture has sent a letter to 20 state governors urging enactment of more adequate state laws to control sheep dogs. While there has been a gratifying increase in the number of sheep in the United States, he says there is room for further expansion of the industry, but farmers in many instances are discouraged from keeping sheep on account of the danger of damage by dogs.

VICTOR L. BERGER AND FOUR OTHERS SENTENCED TODAY

(By Associated Press.) CHICAGO, Feb. 20.—Victor L. Berger and the four other socialists convicted of violating the espionage act were each sentenced to 20 years imprisonment by Judge Landis today, after he had overruled motions for a new trial.

After the motion of a new trial had been denied Judge Landis asked if any of the defendants desired to make any statement before sentencing.

Henry Coehms, counsel for Berger, declared that his client wished to do so. "Socialism is a struggle against the step before the bar, took five pages of typewritten matter and nervously began to read.

"This is the first of five trials I must face for the position the socialist party and the Milwaukee Leader have taken in this war," Berger read. "I am not guilty of the charge against me any more than your honor. The government in this case has not shown any single instance of insubordination or interference with the war effort. A verdict of this kind could not be handed down in any court except in the United States and possibly Japan.

"Socialism is a struggle between labor and capital and the capitalists know that it can continue."

Weevil Destroyed \$3,500,000 Worth of Potatoes Last Year

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Unless rigid control methods are practiced to prevent the spread of sweet potato weevil in the gulf states, America's sweet potato industry may be seriously jeopardized, according to specialists of the department of agriculture. The weevil last year destroyed \$3,500,000 worth of sweet potatoes in the gulf states, Texas, Louisiana and Florida growers suffered the heaviest losses while in other sections of the crop was damaged 25 to 50 per cent.

Introduce Bill To Repeal War Prohibition Law

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—A bill for the repeal of the war time prohibition law which becomes effective July 1, introduced by Representative Gallivan of Massachusetts will be considered by the house agriculture committee today. There is little or no prospect of action on the measure at this session of congress.

AMERICANS ARE DECORATED WITH FRENCH CROSSES

(By Associated Press.) ARCHANGEL, Tuesday, Feb. 18.—Thirty officers and men of the American forces in Northern Russia were today given French war crosses for gallant service under French command on the Volzha Railway front during the brief offensive against the bolsheviks in September, October and November. They were given their medals by the French commander in the presence of Commander in Chief Major General Edmond Ironside and Colonel George E. Stewart, commanding the American forces in the future to be available at New Urushtz to equip interests. Reports will be received tomorrow and evening.

CLEMENCEAU'S CONDITION REPORTED ENCOURAGING

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Feb. 20.—The bullet which wounded Premier Clemenceau penetrated his lungs, it was revealed by the official statement issued shortly after noon today.

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Feb. 20.—The radio examination of Premier Clemenceau's wound, it is stated on good authority, showed that the bullet lodged on top of the premier's right lung and that the lung had been touched by it.

After the X-ray examination had been completed, Premier Clemenceau walked out on the balcony of his house, overlooking the garden, to take a breath of fresh air. The morning was a beautiful one, the first real spring day.

The premier seemed vigorous, although he spat a little blood.

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Feb. 20.—Goods news came early this morning from the sick room of Georges Clemenceau, where he was being attended for the wound inflicted upon him yesterday by the anarchist, Emile Cottin, in the attempt to assassinate the French premier. While all France, and in fact, all the world, was waiting in suspense for word of his condition the announcement was made that the aged statesman was resting comfortably, that no fever had developed and that no complication had appeared.

Vigorous for Age. Nothing definite, however, can be known as to what the result of the premier's injuries are likely to be until an X-ray examination of the wound taken this morning is developed and examined by the doctors. The wound in itself is slight but necessarily serious for a man as old as is the French prime minister. The physicians, however, say that this heart and arteries are young and they point out that he has been a life long abstainer from alcoholic drinks, has not smoked for 20 years and that he has followed a careful rule of living. This has resulted in making him an extraordinarily vigorous man for his years, one who has triumphed over the usual ills to which old age is subject, while as a stimulus toward his recovery he has the knowledge of the heartfelt sympathy and good wishes of his own and every civilized country.

Difficult Patient. His enforced inaction is weighing heavily on the premier, however, and the doctors find him a difficult patient, unwilling to obey all their orders. He insisted on receiving visitors all day yesterday and in discussing current business with Stephen Pichon, the foreign minister, who called on him late in the evening for the third time after the shooting.

The premier raised the question as to whether the supreme council should sit this afternoon as had been arranged and expressed the wish that the decision be left to the delegation of the other great powers.

Is Growing Impatient. Personally, M. Clemenceau is impatient to resume his place at the head of the conference. As he refers to the subject in his conversation with the press, he gives the impression of believing he will be taking his chair at the sittings again in four or five days for he keeps repeating "in nothing but a matter of days." None the less his wound occasionally gives him much pain. He bears this exceptionally well and the twinges do not impair his customary good humor or prevent him indulging in lively sallies. Thus, shortly after he was wounded, when one of his colleagues who is an old trusted friend and partner in the premier's career came to see him, the premier, smiling broadly, remarked:

Anarchist Who Hunted. "The Mahatma of Bikaner invited him to hunt the tiger in his country. Well it is the anarchists who have hunted the tiger, but they missed him."

The premier yesterday sent for Sister Theodosie, the nun who nursed him when he was operated upon a few years ago, and she now is attending him. He spent the day yesterday in his arm chair, but asked that his favorite old grandfather's chair should be brought up from his country house at Bernoville. The premier's mind never was clearer nor his thought more rapid.

If the early reports regarding the premier's condition are borne out, M. Clemenceau probably will be able to resume his activities when President Wilson and Premier Lloyd George and Orlando return to Paris. Meanwhile the French premier's absence from the supreme council takes away the last premier of the European powers at the peace conference.

Lansing May Preside. One of the four vice presidents elected at the time Premier Clemenceau was chosen president of the conference—Premiers Lloyd George and Orlando, Secretary of States Lansing

and Marquis Saloni—will preside over the full conference if a plenary session is held before his recovery. In the council of ten, Stephen Pichon, the French foreign minister, will represent France with Jules Cambon or Andre Tardieu to second him.

Premier Clemenceau was stricken just as he was starting for a meeting that might have had a decisive influence in systematizing the conference to lead the transactions of the body from war conditions to a state of peace.

British, American, Italian and French sentiment was crystallizing on plans to begin the constitution of the actual peace treaty and this would undoubtedly have been discussed at yesterday's conference with Premier Clemenceau; Arthur J. Balfour, the British foreign secretary, Colonel E. M. House of the American peace mission, and Baron Sonnino, the Italian foreign minister, as participants. Expect Early Draft of Treaty. The preliminary soundings had already been taken and the prospect seemed good for the decision upon an efficient procedure permitting the early drafting of the essential parts of the peace treaty; perhaps by the time of President Wilson's return from America. In such an event the enemy delegates could have been called in by April and the actual peace consummated by early summer.

One of Premier Clemenceau's first thoughts after being shot was to send word to Secretary Balfour, Colonel House and Baron Sonnino that he could not keep his engagement. Mr. Balfour and Baron Sonnino went to Colonel House's office on receipt of the news and although deprived of the French point of view, the conference, it is understood, reached an agreement that will materially advance the procedure of the conference and hasten the conclusion of peace.

CHAUFFEUR IS DECORATED FOR DEFENDING PREMIER

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Feb. 20.—According to latest published reports tonight Premier Clemenceau's condition is improving, owing to his fatigued condition, an X-ray examination will not be taken until tomorrow morning. Doctors Gosset, Tuffier, Lauby and Paut have made a complete examination and deem M. Clemenceau's appeal for an immediate X-ray examination have ordered the premier to be kept in the physicians during the examination that he wanted the work done as soon as possible so that he could get back to his duties on Tuesday.

This evening the premier asked General Mordeacq, his military aide, to decorate Chauffeur Decaudin. The ceremony took place in the premier's study at 6:30 this morning. It was stated at Premier Clemenceau's residence at 6:30 this morning that the premier had passed an excellent night.

PRESIDENT WILSON SENDS MESSAGE OF CONDOLENCE

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—President Wilson has sent the following message of condolence on receipt of the attack upon Premier Clemenceau:

"Lansing, American mission, Paris: Please convey to Monsieur Clemenceau my heartfelt sympathy and my joy at his escape.

"I sincerely hope that the report that he was only slightly injured is altogether true. We were deeply shocked by the news of the attack on the premier. (Signed) 'WOODROW WILSON.'"

ANARCHIST IS REMOVED TO THE SANTO PRISON

(By Associated Press.) PARIS, Wednesday, Feb. 19.—Emile Cottin, who attempted to assassinate Premier Clemenceau, was taken to Santo prison tonight. An examination of the automobile in which the premier's riding place when he was fired upon showed seven distinct bullet marks.

Plan Legislation For Punishment of The Anarchists

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Legislation to punish anarchist activities or propaganda and the display of flags or other emblems of violence was recommended unanimously today by the Senate judiciary committee favorably reported a measure combining the "red flag" bill of Senator New of Indiana and other bills designed to check unlawful agitation.

149 PRODUCING WELLS OUTSIDE WICHITA FIELDS

PORT WORTH, TEX., Feb. 20.—Thirteen and one-fourth per cent of all wells completed in the West Texas territory are producers. Forty of the remainder are gas wells and slightly over 200 are non-producers.

SUGGEST ORDINANCE REQUIRING THOSE WHO RENT ROOMS TO SECURE LICENSE.

WOULD LIMIT CHARGES

House Building Plan and Postoffice Situation Discussed by Chamber of Commerce.

Profiteering in rents and additional steps to forward the plans of the industrial housing corporation were matters that again occupied the greater part of the time devoted this morning to the weekly meeting of the board of directors of the chamber of commerce.

But with no legal authority behind us to use in combating the evil, Mr. Noble said, "the committee is ready to throw up its hands and drop the entire matter."

Plan Appeal to Council. The statement, however, that one landlord was charging \$10 a night for a room located at Twelfth and Scott streets stirred the directors to sudden action, with the result that the investigating committee was empowered to go before the city council and ask for the passage of an ordinance requiring all men and women renting rooms or houses for profit to obtain a city license—the city to have authority to refuse to grant licenses in all cases where the rent is considered exorbitant.

Frank Kell dropped a depth bomb into the meeting when he asserted that the plan to organize a \$100,000 corporation to build homes for working men was not "seamless, not good business and that every cent put into it will be lost."

to send telegrams to Washington urging relief. "We are so congested," declared Postmaster Howard, "that I've already gone over the inspector's head in appointing five more clerks whose salaries are coming out of my own pocket. I can stand that for one month, but some other means of relief will have to be obtained. The postal business here has increased 100 per cent in the last three years."

Secretary Whaley also reported briefly for the highways committee which recently visited Austin, stating that the State Highways Commission had promised Wichita county \$200,000 this year and probably \$250,000 next, with the understanding that the county will vote enough bonds to bond 60 miles of permanent cement roads.

There was no indication of southern selling on the early setback and the market showed renewed firmness late in the morning on a renewal of bull support and covering. Prices made new high ground for the day on this bulge, selling up to 22.50 for May and 21.56 for July, or about 87 to 107 points net higher on the general list.

Reports that cotton factors were planning to buy March contracts here and demand deliveries served to stimulate buying on the early afternoon advance but after the bulge to 22.50 for May, fluctuations were irregular with reactions of 20 or 25 points around 4 o'clock.

Cotton closed very steady.

FREDERICK MEN PLANNING TO FILE NEAR RED RIVER

Special to The Times. FREDERICK, OKLA., Feb. 20.—Plans have been completed by approximately 150 Frederickans to file oil and mineral claims on Indian allotment land along the Red River in Tillman, Cotton and Jefferson counties, it was learned Wednesday.

The claims were to have been filed Wednesday, although it could not be learned here whether or not the filings had been made. It is surmised that the files intend to contest their right to file on the land, although details of the claims have been so effectively bottled up that efforts to obtain complete information proved futile. One attorney declared Wednesday that the files were "monkeying with fire"—that they are apt to throw themselves open to federal prosecution, for the lands being filed upon belong to the Indians and can not be considered as public domain. There are special laws protecting Indians and their rights, for they are looked upon as wards of the government, it was said. The lands filed upon are said to show every indication of being rich in oil.

The well of the Eleanor Oil Company, also known as the American Refining Company's well, block 192 Red River valley lands, has been completed below 1550 feet and abandoned as a dry hole, officers of the company announced today. This library is one frequented by Maximilists. The woman informed her husband of what she had heard and he notified the police, who assured him that the persons in question would be closely watched.

Soap Serves As Bribe To Secure Soldiers Release

COBLENTZ, Feb. 19.—Half a cake of soap used as a bribe, opened the road to liberty for an American soldier who recently rejoined his regiment after being imprisoned in Germany. William Litch, a private in the 26th Infantry, was captured October 1, during the fighting in the Argonne

and taken to a prison camp near Baden. From another American who had received a prisoner's package Litch procured a piece of soap, not much larger than his thumb. A few nights before the signing of the armistice Litch gave the soap to a German prison camp guard and stepped out of the stockade, a free man. He began traveling by night and hiding by day but before he reached the front he was overtaken by other released American prisoners who told him of the armistice. Even today in the American occupied area soap will buy articles

Geologist Long Interested in the Canadian River

Special to The Times. AMARILLO, TEX., Feb. 20.—Mr. Gould stated yesterday that his attention was first attracted to the Canadian river as an oil prospect when, in 1904, he was making a survey for the United States government, and says that the geological report for that year shows his findings in this vicinity. 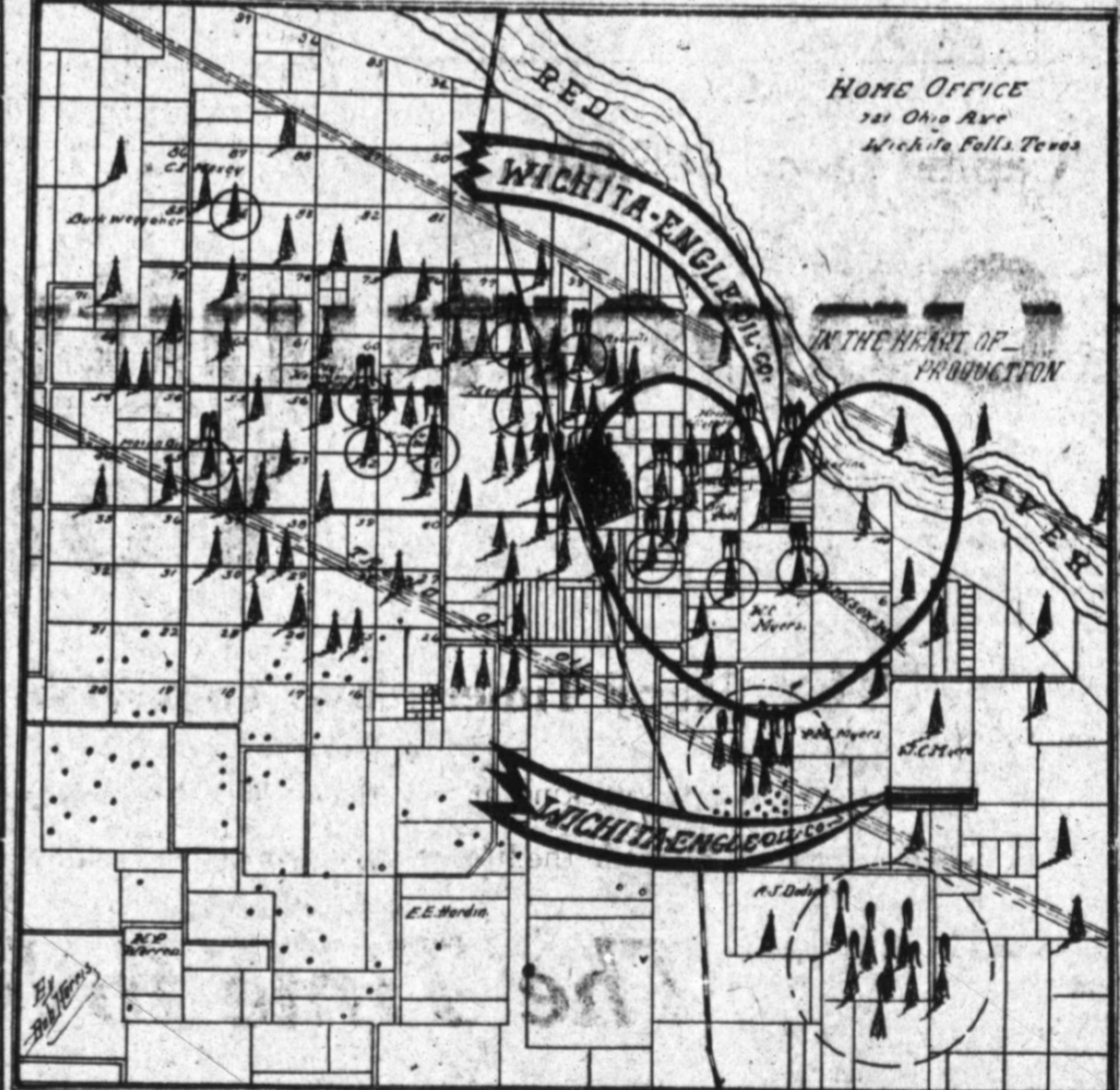

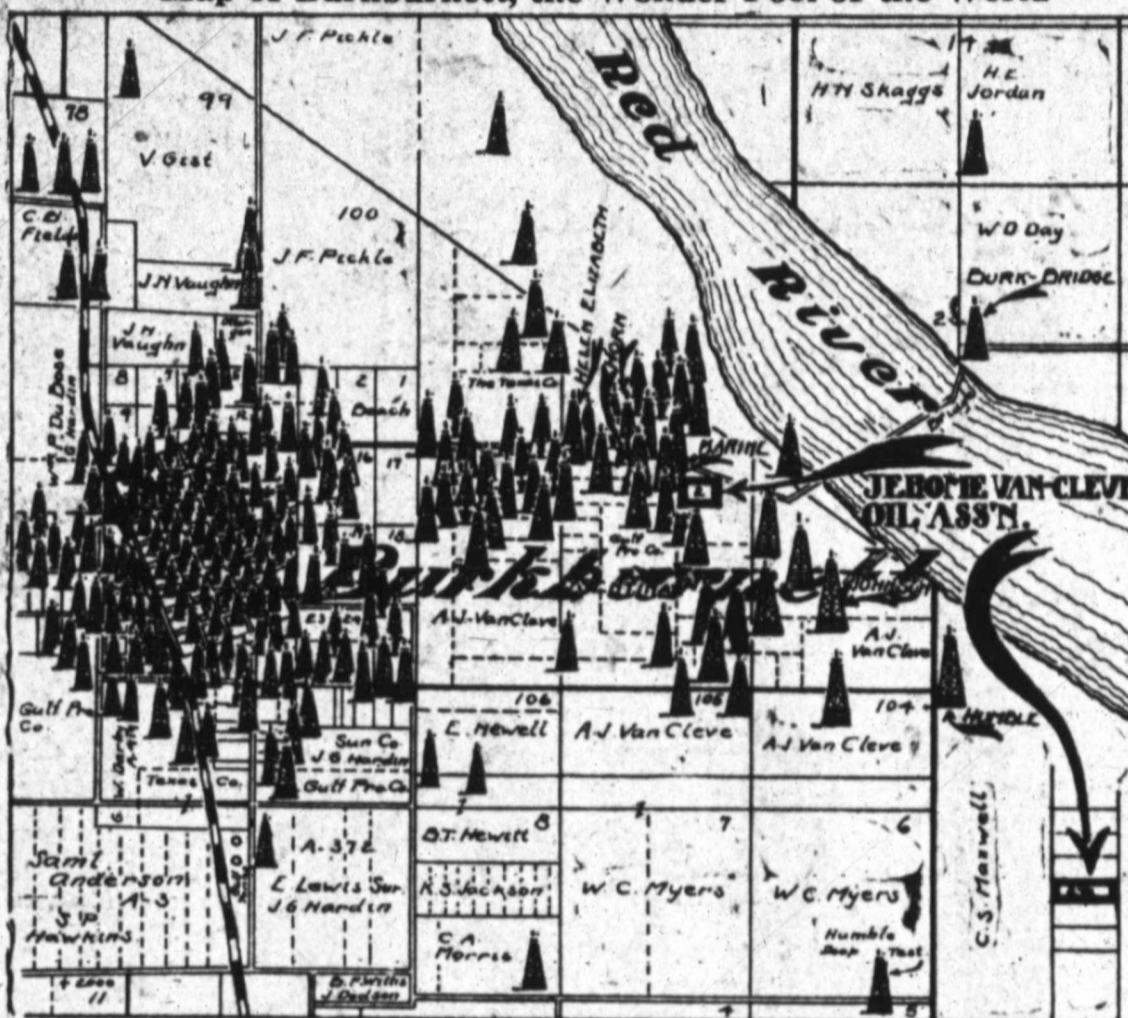

PLAYGROUND AND RECREATION PLANS RECENT PROPOSAL

Playground and recreational activities, with healthful outdoor amusements for juveniles and adults, are proposed for Wichita Falls in a letter received by the chamber of commerce from Myron A. Kesner. Kesner is a playground authority of national reputation, formerly representative of the war department commission on training camp activities in community organization and superintendent of public recreation for the city of Dallas.

The plan proposed would include the selection of sites here for parks, playgrounds, athletic fields and social and community centers, with supervision of playground activities including the conducting of a training class of local workers. Among the activities would be athletics, self-government, organized games, folk dancing, pageants, dramatics, community singing, industrial work, gardening, domestic science, swimming and the organizing of the work of the Boy Scouts and the Camp Fire Girls.

It is doubtful, however, if Wichita Falls at this time is ready to undertake the extensive program Mr. Kesner suggests, according to the opinion of Mrs. T. B. Smock, president of the Civic League.

"All money available for parks and improvements is now in use," Mrs. Smock said Wednesday, "and the city treasury cannot stand any more strain at this time. The work proposed by Mr. Kesner unquestionably is beneficial to any city, and the future may see an extensive system of recreational activities here."

Kesner's plan classifies cities according to population, with a yearly fee payable monthly and ranging from \$1500 yearly for cities of 150,000 and more down to \$120 for cities of 1,000. Wichita Falls would be classed at \$720, payable \$60 monthly.

To Enlarge Scope Of Labor Bureau In Wichita Falls

H. R. Christian, federal employment service examiner for the Houston district, arrived in Wichita Falls Wednesday to assume charge of the local office until a man is appointed to succeed G. M. Minton.

Although no details have been made public, it is generally believed that plans are under way for the establishment here of a branch office of the United States employment service, adequate to meet the needs of not only the city but also of a large area of outside territory. It is known that Patrick Casey, official representative of the service in Washington, and H. W. Lewis, federal state director, are due here late today, with a view to obtaining data regarding the need of such an office.

Mr. Christian stated Wednesday that powerful efforts will be made to obtain co-operation between the employment service office and local employers of labor.

"If the employers will decline to hire labor from the streets, and will agree to clear their help through this office, the government will be enabled to gather data that will be of value in solving labor problems. And there will be many such problems during this after-the-war era on which the nation has just started."

RECENT DISTURBANCE IS CENTRAL IN OKLAHOMA

INVESTIGATION OF ALL PHASES MEAT INDUSTRY URGED

By Associated Press.

HUTCHINSON, KANS., Feb. 20.—Close investigation of all phases of the meat business from producer to consumer was urged before the Kansas Livestock Association here today by Thomas E. Wilson, head of the Chicago packing company bearing his name. Mr. Wilson argued that such an investigation was necessary if legislation affecting the industry is to be intelligent, and added:

"Personally I have no objection to any helpful legislation that may be found necessary but I do not believe any such legislation can be enacted until we are furnished with a complete report of the entire situation."

Mr. Wilson quoted from President Wilson's letter to the Federal Trade Commission dated February 7, 1917, and calling for an investigation of "production, ownership, manufacture, storage and distribution of foodstuffs and by-products." Instead, he said the trade commission spent \$250,000 compiling "a report which has ignored all elements except the packers."

A permanent clearing house for the five banks in the city has been opened by H. L. Hunter in his office, basement of the Kemp and Kell building. All of the banks will clear through this office, instead of clearing at the various banks. Mr. Hunter advised the banks clear at 10:45 each morning.
