THREE STORY STRUCTURE

Will Be Erected at Corner of Fifth Street and Ohio Avenue by J. A. Kemp.

The Penick-Hughes Company, of Stamford, one of the largest whoelsale Stamford, one of the largest who elsale hardware houses in Texas, is to establish in Wichita Falls. R. L. Penick, head of the firm, today s'gned a contract for the construction of a three-story brick building at Fifth and Ohio, work on which will be started immediately by W. Y. Hammack, local contractor. The structure is being built by J. A. Kemp, and a five-year-lease on the property already has been obtained by Mr. Penick. The building will be 50 to 150 feet, and the contract calls for its completion in 90 days.

(aynie, general sales manager, will have supervision over the sales end here as well as in Stamford. The company expects to employ at least five men traveling out of this city, in addition to a large staff of shipping clerks and officers workers.





SUGGESTION MADE TO PAY TEACHERS

W. S. Curiee has offered a solution for the problem of where the money to pay the school teachers raise is coming from. Mr. Curiee's proposition is to be responsible for the increase in pay of one teacher, possibly more, from now until the school term ends, if other business men of the city join him?

The school board has already authorized the raise the teachers are entitled to this raise, and the citizens of Wichita Falls will have to pay this raise, for there is no money in the school fund. The schools belong to the people, in fact ond the people should feel a responsibility. I, for one, am ready to shoulder my share of the responsibility," said Mr. Curiee this morning, in speaking of the proposition for individuals to pay the raise of one or more teachers.

Average \$15 a Month.

"There are many business men in Wichita Falls who could pay the raise of several teachers, without ever missing the money. The individual raise, I am informed reliably, will average around \$15 a month. There is only about three more months of this term, so the expense on the individuals would be slight. Something must be done by the city. The school board has come to the Chamber of Commerce for assistance, and the Rotary and Wichita Clubs have pledged assistance, but this is such a busy time that the matter seems to be somewhat overlooked. However, it should not be overlooked, but immediate action must be taken."





MAKE PROPOSITION

IS SUBMITTED AT SPECIAL MEET. ING OF CITY COUNCIL THIS MORNING.

Asks Nothing of Council But Moral Support and Approval of the City Engineer.

A proposition which, if accepted, will result in the paving of several miles of city streets without cost to the city was sbumitted to the City Council at a special meeting this morning by Lester Levy, a Dalias contractor. No decision will be reached until next week, but the plau

signature of the city engineer approving the work. Just as soon as a proving the work. Just as soon as a sufficient number of property owners have been signed up to guarantee the paying, work will be started on that street. I am prepared to have two gangs of workmen here almost immediately, and I will have the proper forms and note blanws here for the inspection of the members of the city council early next week. I ask only this body's support and aproval and then I am ready to go to work at once."

In answer to a question from Mayor Marlow. Mr. Levy declared that he was not seeking to "corner" the paving contracts, but merely wished the council to protect him where his work was showing results: work was showing results:

"For instance," he explained, "if l

have a good percantage of property owners signed up on a certain street I simply ask that you guarantee that no other contractor cut in on my field there. It is entirely a matter where in I am bearing all the original expense, and am gambing on my ability to persuade the property owners to sign and therefor it is only fair that I should receive support when I can show on any street that fam making progress."

progress."

In view of the fact that the council has bee swamped recently with petitions from property owners who wish their streets paved and who are willing to bear the expense, it is generally believed that Levy's plan is practical and will be welcomed by Wichita Falls citizens.

Plan Used in Temple. R. M. 

In each case the authorities will make careful meetingation, and where it is shown the man is not a wilful deserter the charge of desertion will be set aside. But the charge of desertion will not be set aside unless such investigation by competent authority has been made and proper written recommendation is made to the officer having general court martial jurisdiction. All other draft deserters will be tried by general court martial. If proven guilty their separation from the army shall not appear as honorable. If physical examination shows such men physically unfit for service they may be discharged without trial as provided in Army Regulations.

out trial as provided in Army Regulations.

The military authorities are preparing lists for publication of all men considered as draft deserters. Until the lists are published the usual efforts toward apprehending and punishing draft deserters will be made. When these lists are published all draft deserters appearing thereon will be considered as any other deserters and action will be taken as prescribed in army regulations.

The lists of deserters will serve not only to inform the police officials but to inform the deserter himself and his friends and acquaintances that a charge of desertion stands against him.

Pending further instructions all inquiries for information as to draft deserters will be referred to the adjutant general of the state concerned.

Commanding officers are allowed to use their own discretion as to whether draft deserters who voluntarily surrender shall be confined or merely retained within the limits of military jurisdiction pending the determination of their status.

Draft deserters must voluntarily surprender themselves to the nearest military authorities at once in order to avoid the humilistic of arrest. By order of the Secretary of War, General Peyton C. March, Chief of Staft, has issued a circular setting forth, the policy of the War Department to settle definitely the status of draft deserters.

The order of the President of November 11, 1918, directing suspension of miblination and induction under the Selective Service Law, says the circular, provided specifically that it did not operate to relieve from the consequence of his acts any registrants who had become delinquent or a deserter.

All department commanders, camp commanders and other authorities competent to receive deserters, as instructed that they shall accept all draft deserters who may be delivered to them in accordance with regulations.


