PRESIDENT SPEAKS TO GOVERNORS TODAY ON THE LABOR SITUATION

CHIEF WEAKNESS IS IN EASTERN EUROPE SAYS LONDON TIMES

TERMS OF FOCH SEVERE AND WILL DISARM CENTRAL POWERS NEAREST FRANCE.

ENGLAND IS INTERESTED

Hope of Barrier of Free States As a Protection to the Middle West Section.

By Associated Press. LONDON, March 3.—Commenting upon the terms which Marshal Foch will present to the Germans, the Times says: "There will be severe and such as will effectively disarm the central powers on the side nearest France."

WASHINGTON, March 3.—Opening the White House conference of governors and mayors on peace time business and labor problems today, President Wilson promised that the federal government would consider itself the servant of the states municipalities and counties in solving readjustment problems and would perform its duty guided by suggestion of the conference.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—State governors and mayors of cities in conference on labor and business problems at the White House today unanimously adopted a resolution endorsing a statement by Secretary of Labor Wilson that it was the secretary's duty to report all persons advocating the overthrow of government by force.

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The president said he hoped these conference discussions would assume a wide range, including means of restoring labor conditions to a normal basis as soon as possible, and to effecting such a situation in the coal and iron and steel industry as the circumstances may make necessary.

Touching upon the peace conference he said the conference at Paris regarded themselves only as servants of about seven hundred million people of the world and not as their masters.

Consequently, said the president, the conferees are anxious to keep in close sympathy with the peoples whom they represent "to find out how we can best assist in making their lives what they wish them to be by giving them the opportunity that they ought to have."

The president spoke briefly, confining himself largely to welcoming the visitors and promising complete federal co-operation. He explained that the demands upon his time during the day and a half he could remain in Washington made it impossible for him to participate in the conference.

President's Speech. "I wish that I could promise myself the pleasure and the profit of taking part in your deliberations. I find that nothing deliberate is permitted me since my return. I have been trying under the guidance of Secretary Mr. Tamm, to do a month's work in a week and I am hoping that not all of that has been wasted, inasmuch as there is a necessary pressure upon my time. I know that you will excuse me from taking a part in your conference, much as I should be profited by doing so."

"My pleasant duty is to bid you a hearty welcome and to express my gratification that your representatives of cities and states have met at this time and the inclination to come together on the very important matter we have to discuss."

Duty First. "The primary duty of caring for our people in the intimate matters that we want to discuss here, of course, falls upon the states and upon the municipalities and the function of the federal government is to do what it is trying to do in a conference of this sort—draw the executive minds of the country together so that they may profit by each other's suggestions and plans and so that we may offer our services to co-ordinate their efforts in any way that the states may desire to co-ordinate. In other words, it is the privilege of the federal government in matters of this sort to be the servants of the states, cities and municipalities and countries, and we shall perform that duty with the greatest pleasure if you will guide us with your suggestions."

Meet in Disposed Methods. "I hope that the discussions of this conference will take as wide a scope as you may think necessary. We are not met to discuss any single narrow subject. We are met to discuss the proper method of restoring all the labor conditions of the country to a normal basis as soon as possible and to effect such readjustments of labor and industry as the circumstances may make necessary. I think I can testify from what I have seen on the other side of the water, that we are more fortunate than other nations in respect to these great problems. Our industries have been disorganized by a peace basis, very seriously, indeed, by the war, but not so seriously as the industries of other countries, and it seems to me, therefore, that we should approach these problems that we are about to discuss with a good deal of confidence—that if we have a common purpose we can realize that common purpose without serious or insurmountable difficulties. Impression is Gained.

"The thing that has impressed me most, gentlemen, not only in the recent weeks which have passed, but in the future on the other side of the water, but for many months before I went across the water, was this: We are at least learning that the business of government is to take counsel for the average man. We are at last learning

Five million workers in the United States and probably a larger number of general prosperity after a short period of readjustment of industry, I would be folly, Secretary Wilson said, to attempt a reduction of wages now. He declared that factory doors should remain extra war profits, adding that many manufacturers were disposed to hold down activities because of abnormal prices.

Proper disposition on the part of industry would make it possible, he thought, for prices to come down without affecting existing wages. It will be one year before the national military forces are fully mobilized, he predicted, and as demobilization must be gradual the labor shortage is bound to exist.

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BULGARIA FACING FINANCIAL CRISIS RESULT OF WAR

SOFIA, BULGARIA, Feb. 10.—Bulgaria is facing a financial crisis, it is asserted. The war cost the country over \$1,500,000,000 while its estimated wealth is only \$2,300,000,000. The national debt before the war was \$160,000,000.

Of the national debt as it now stands Bulgaria owes to Germany \$660,000,000 which was advanced in installments of ten millions, but last winter Germany discontinued this practice and demanded payment for munitions in cash. Germany, evidently was not in the business of helping the Allies for nothing, as the prices charged Bulgaria for gas masks clearly indicate. For each mask it charged \$15 and a respirator, as compared with the cost of a similar article for the United States army in England of \$4.50.

Financial experts agree that the solvency of the country can only be preserved by the presentation of counter claims against Germany. Even if Bulgaria's national indebtedness to Germany is outweighed by Bulgaria's counter claims, oppressive taxes must be imposed for a decade or two in order to meet the remaining debt heavy Bulgarians. The state revenues before the last three years averaged \$50,000,000 per annum. Recent taxation added \$20,000,000 to this sum. To fill the gap between what is possible to raise by taxation and the needs of the nation it is now proposed to confiscate wealth illegally obtained in addition to drastic taxation of war profits.

Under Germany's tutelage the financial policy maintained by Bulgaria sank the country deeper and deeper every year in debt. It was the only belligerent country which issued no internal loan, but contented itself with printing paper money to the total of almost \$500,000,000, at the normal rate of exchange. As a result Bulgaria's currency has depreciated more than one-half, while the accumulation of private wealth has paralleled the rapidly mounting state debt. More than eighty banks were closed, having a total capitalization of nearly one hundred millions.

Bulgaria's sole negotiable article of export is tobacco, and this she must use in the world's markets in exchange for food, clothing, cotton, oils, medicines, etc. At present there are in the country the crops of the past two years, valued at about \$3,000,000,000.

DEVELOP FRICTION IN CHINESE PLANS FOR A CONFERENCE

SHANGHAI, Mar. 2.—The delegates of the Northern Chinese government in session here with representatives of the southern government for the purpose of adjusting differences which have led to fighting during the recent past, have telegraphed their resignations to Peking, asking that they be replaced by "more competent" representatives who enjoy the complete confidence of the government.

It is understood that the actual reasons for the delegates tendering their resignations lie in the fact that the Peking government has failed to enforce satisfactorily the armistice in the province of Shensi, where the military government is reported to have attacked southern forces, and also that Chu Chi-Chun, the chief northern delegate is considered as a mouthpiece of the government which has attacked southern forces, and also that Tang Shao-Yi the head of the southern delegation, are binding on the south. If Peking accepts the resignations the peace conference will break up.

Observers here believe that if the conference is dissolved the northern military will have won a triumph and that the China-Japanese military convention providing for the building up of a new army officered by men trained in Japan will go forward. The China-Japanese military convention, which has been extended by a special clause signed February 10 to the time when the Allies will withdraw their forces from Siberia, contains military and naval clauses, it is said which apparently bind China very closely to Japan in advisory and control in military and naval matters. All the details, however, are kept secret and have not been disclosed to the delegates here.

An Official Order Must Be Had To Secure Narcotics

WASHINGTON, March 2.—In an interpretation of the so-called Harrison anti-narcotic act the supreme court today declared unconstitutional the section prohibiting sales of drugs

except on official order forms or physicians prescriptions given in good faith.

Decrees holding that this section was unrelated to the collection of excise taxes and was beyond the power of congress to enact, were set aside by the court. The case resulted from the dismissal of indictments against C. T. Dossanus in Texas.

BANKS ARE URGED TO SUBSCRIBE FOR THE CERTIFICATES

DALLAS, TEX., March 1.—The following statement was issued tonight by O. P. Adams, director of sales for the Federal Reserve bank here:

"Subscriptions to treasury certificates at the close of business on March 1 amounted to \$10,381,600. Of this amount \$10,230,000 was subscribed by 160 banks, and 31 individuals and corporations took \$150,000. It is evident from these figures that less than nine per cent of the total of 1901 banks have subscribed to the current issue. A large part of the amount that has been subscribed is due to a few member banks that have utilized their privilege of borrowing money from the Federal Reserve bank on their 15-day notes, using the certificates as collateral. They pay the Federal Reserve bank four per cent for the loan, and, as the certificates bear four and a half per cent, there will be a net profit of one half per cent to the borrowing banks. There is no reason why every member bank should not pay its subscription in this way, if other funds are not conveniently available.

"The amount that a member bank, either state or national, may borrow in this way is not limited by law nor will such borrowed money be considered in any manner by the executive committee of the Federal Reserve Bank when considering applications for loans from the bank for use in its regular business. Neither does money borrowed in this way affect the lending ability of the subscribing bank.

"The federal reserve act does not permit notes given for this purpose to bear a longer maturity than 15 days. The Federal Reserve Bank may grant a renewal if conditions and circumstances warrant.

"If member banks which have not subscribed will avail themselves of this privilege it will help the situation materially. If the member banks will supplement this with subscriptions for a fair amount this district will have no trouble in absorbing its allotment. The subscription books will close Thursday, March 6, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and subscriptions should be sent in before that time."

SAYS CIVILIZATION AND BOLSHEVISM CANNOT MEET ON A COMMON GROUND

Associated Press Staff Correspondent. LONDON, Feb.—Murders of clergy, men constitute the latest feature of bolshevik terror in Russia, says Professor Peter Struve, a distinguished Russian economist, who has escaped from Russia and arrived in England after hiding from the bolsheviks for months in Moscow, and after a long journey on foot to reach safety in Finland.

Not Due Consideration. At the beginning of the bolshevik movement, I publicly expressed the opinion that not even a German would hold converse with a bolshevik as a Russian Constitutionalists it is completely inapplicable to me how any allied government and contemplate discussion of any sort, in any circumstances or at any place, with anyone who calls himself a bolshevik.

Those who imagine that there can be any pact between the forces of civilization and bolshevism, have no conception of the real state of affairs in Russia. The most moderate form of restoration of order and liberty in Russia would make the existence of bolshevism impossible.

OIL DEVELOPMENT

LARGE PER CENT OIL SUPPLY GONE OFFICIAL REPORT

By Associated Press.
 WASHINGTON, Mar. 2.—Forty per cent of the total known oil supply in the United States, exclusive of oil shale deposits in three states, has been exhausted, according to estimates transmitted by Secretary Lane to the Senate Commerce Commission in compliance with a resolution presented by Senator Russell of Louisiana, and made public today by the committee.
 Up to last January 1, Mr. Lane said, a total of 4,598,000,000 barrels had been produced while the known available oil resources, not counting the shale deposits in the ground and in field storage were estimated at 6,740,000,000 barrels. Distillation of shale deposits in Colorado, Utah and Wyoming, however, would produce seven billion barrels of oil, the Secretary said.
 In response to the same resolution, Secretary Daniels informed the committee that four million barrels of fuel oil would be required by the navy in 1919, while \$1,200,000,000 would be needed by the shipping board. Most of the oil for the navy department, he said, comes from the mid-continent field in Kansas, Oklahoma and Northern Texas, while some is obtained from the Gulf Coast field.

Work on the Rig Of "Lucky Two" To Start This Week

Work on the rig of the Lucky Two Oil Company, on a ten acre tract out of Block 73, is to begin the first of the week, according to the announcement made Saturday night by O. Z. Gullede, of Fort Worth, secretary of the company. The contract for the rig has been let to J. T. VARDEMAN SAYS ANTHRACITE COAL IS IN MONOPOLY

ALLEGES THAT OUTPUT AND PRICE REGULATED BY EIGHT COMPANIES.

REPORT TO THE SENATE

Statement Made Following Investigation of the Situation in United States.

By Associated Press.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—Senator Vardaman of Mississippi, chairman of the Senate manufacturers committee, today inserted in the congressional record a statement on the committee's investigation of the anthracite situation...

Chairman Vardaman explained that the committee was unable to present its report at this time as not of the testimony taken at hearings in Washington and in the Pennsylvania coal fields had been printed...

Monopoly is Charged. Testimony before the committee, he asserted in his statement, had disclosed in his opinion that there is no commodity in common use that is so absolutely monopolized as the anthracite coal production.

Shortage of anthracite during the war and the existing shortage of the commodity, he said were due almost entirely to this monopolistic control.

Transportation corporations controlling production in the Pennsylvania fields—the only source of marketable anthracite in North America were named in Senator Vardaman's report as follows:

Coal and Iron Co., the Jersey Central, (which in turn owns all of stock of the Lehigh and Wilkesbarre Co.); the Lehigh Valley, the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western; the Delaware and Hudson; the Lehigh Navigation Co. (which owns and controls the Lehigh and New England); the Erie, and the New York, Ontario and Western.

Prevent Fair Competition. Although only controlling 72 per cent of the production of anthracite, the statement asserted the eight companies had made it "impossible for independent operators to compete with them on any fair basis."

Expressing the hope that congress might see the necessity of legislation to protect the principle of the United States from what he designated as "the greed, cupidity, and avarice of these soulless corporations," the Mississippi senator said that "if the constitution of Pennsylvania which forbids the transportation companies to mine coal is a dead letter in that state," the federal government under the state commerce clause of the nation's constitution compel the divorcement of transportation companies from mining corporations.

Recommendations. Price Fixing. The statement made the recommendation that the price of coal be fixed by the government which would guarantee a fair return to the mining companies and which would "vouchsafe to the people of America an ample supply of anthracite coal at a reasonable price."

The statement also said millions of tons of coal could have been obtained to relieve the recent shortage had the fuel administration compelled transportation companies to develop culm banks or turnover this accumulation of small sized coal to many independent concerns willing to reclaim it.

The large corporation also were charged by Senator Vardaman with maintaining the sale price of coal through publication of "circular prices."
