COURT MARTIAL CALLED IN CASE OF TEXAS FLYER

Is Result of Investigation of Stories of Remarkable Exploits in Battle.

IS SAN ANTONIO MAN

Inquiry Has Been In Progress Since Early In February Report States.

LONDON, March 14.—The investigation of the remarkable air exploits of Captain Edmund Chamberlain of San Antonio, Texas, an officer of the United States marine corps, which has been in progress for several weeks, has developed to an extent that the American naval authorities consider a court martial necessary. The court has been called to sit in London, March 24. The court martial, it is announced, will investigate chiefly whether Captain Chamberlain's recommendations for decorations were all forged and whether there was any truth whatever in his story of destroying an extraordinary number of machines in a short time.

Captain Chamberlain, then a lieutenant, was recommended for the Victoria Cross and the Congressional Medal of Honor, the highest awards for bravery of Great Britain and the United States August 13, 1918, for an exploit on the preceding July 20, over the British front in a battle with twelve German machines. Chamberlain, it was said, destroyed five enemy planes and damaged two others. His plane also was damaged, but he landed successfully following which he was captured and held in a German prison. Then, keeping his captive, Chamberlain was reported to have found a wounded French officer and to have carried him back to safety into the British lines under a heavy German fire.

SPARTACAN FORCES STILL RETAIN PART OF BERLIN SUBURB

By Associated Press. LONDON, March 14.—Spartacan forces still retain part of the Berlin suburb of Lichtenburg and are stubbornly resisting the government forces, an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen says. Fighting is continuing in Lichtenburg and also in the Karlsruh.

LONDON CHRONICLE ANXIOUS FOR RETURN OF AMERICAN SHIPPING

LONDON, Thursday, March 13.—Commenting on Secretary of State Robert Lansing's address at Paris on Tuesday night in which a plea was made for supplying Germany with food, the Chronicle says it is anxious about the only way of tonnage aid extending the available tonnage is for the United States to restore to international use American shipping which she withdrew last autumn. We especially welcome Mr. Lansing's speech because it ought to mean, if it means anything, that a substantial part of this tonnage, which went to the South American trade, will once more be at the service of starving Europe.

CZECHS HAVE REFUSED TO EVACUATE REGION RECENTLY OCCUPIED

By Associated Press. WARSAW, Thursday, March 13.—Notwithstanding the request of the inter-Allied committee the Czechs have refused to evacuate part of the region near Teschen which they have recently occupied and the situation seems to be delicate.

BOLSHEVIKI CLAIM TO OCCUPY TERRITORY LARGE AS FRANCE

LONDON, March 14.—The bolshevik general staff at Moscow claims that during January and February the bolshevik army occupied territory the size of France, having 1,655 miles of broad front under its control and declares that the soviet troops will reach Archangel by May first, according to a Heligoland dispatch to the Mail. After the bolsheviks entered Kiev they are said to have executed four professors, a general and eleven newspaper men.

MEDICAL OFFICERS OF U. S. ARMY ARE HONORED BY BRITISH

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, March 14.—Sixty-six American Army medical officers and men have been decorated by the British government for bravery and distinguished service in the war. Surgeon General Ireland was advised Thursday by the British War Office. Major Emanuel Goldstein of New York City and Captain George P. O'Malley, Cleveland, were made honorary companions of the Distinguished Conduct Medal and Military Cross of Great Britain was conferred upon 15 enlisted men. The officers awarded the Military Cross included: Captain Lawrence M. Taylor, Tuxham, Mexico, and Lieutenants Louis W. Despres, Memphis, Tenn.; Roy A. Douglas, Nashville, Tenn.; Roy G. GERMAN DELEGATES TO PEACE CONGRESS ON EQUAL FOOTING

By Associated Press. WEIMAR, March 14.—All the German delegates to the peace conference will be on equal footing although Count Von Brockdorff-Rantzau, the foreign minister, will be the great power to make final decisions, that being vested in the cabinet. He will be accompanied to the conference by a large staff of assistants and a group of experts, clerks and secretaries. The selection of the peace conference delegates was reached after a Wednesday and lasted far into the evening. True to President Ebert's announcement at the time of his election, Count Von Brockdorff will not be a delegate although there has been great pressure brought to bear to have him named. This was partly frustrated by information received from abroad through Americans here that the cabinet would probably be rejected by the Entente Powers.

APPROXIMATELY 1500 RAILROAD CLERKS AT ATLANTA ON STRIKE

ATLANTA, Ga., March 14.—Approximately 1,500 railroad clerks, employed on all lines entering Atlanta, went out today in a general strike in sympathy with the striking clerks of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis railroad. The strike was called, it was said, on orders issued from Nashville, where representatives of the clerks and the railroads are in conference.

BERLIN OUTBREAK MAY BE CONSIDERED OVER SAYS NOSKE

HAMBURG, Thursday, March 13.—The Berlin insurrection may be considered as suppressed, Gustave Noske, the minister of defense, announced in the national assembly at Weimar today, a German dispatch reports. Only one suburb remained to be cleared of the Spartacans, the minister stated.

PRESIDENT AND PARTY ARRIVES IN PARIS TODAY

Great Crowd Gathers at Station To Welcome Return of Party.

WELCOMED BY PRESS

Journal Says There Is No Doubt of Resolve To Wind Up War Promptly.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Mar. 14.—President Wilson is welcomed with a difference after his trip to the United States, arrived in Paris shortly after noon today. Although the time of the President's arrival had not been made public, a great crowd had gathered at the Invalides station at 11 o'clock. The editorial writers associated with the French press are full of confidence and the twenty-first French regiment was on hand to do military honors to the American president.

By Associated Press. PARIS, March 14.—The return of President Wilson is welcomed by morning newspapers in editorials. The Journal says that it means early and positive results from the peace conference, adding: "There is no doubt the President comes back with the full resolve to wind up the war promptly." The editorial writers also are occupied with the present state of public opinion in America. The Figaro says that the United States, by sharing in the war and by the present role it is playing at the peace conference, has become one of the principal actors in European and world politics. It adds: "That will be the case whether the peace is signed or not. Will it not rather yield and go home for good, leaving old Europe to work out its salvation by itself? The sudden withdrawal of the United States would have regrettable consequences because there are several problems, which the British, Italians and French, would settle in quite a different way than if America was a factor."

"Making all allowances for internal political quarrels in America it may be said that President Wilson's policy in its main lines is approved by a majority of the people of this country and his policies from reaching the European press or the sending to the United States any news the correspondent saw fit to transmit.

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INTERVENTION ALONE WILL SAVE SIBERIA SAYS GENERAL PARIS

HONOLULU, Mar. 13.—General Robert Paris of the French army returning from Siberia where he assisted with the Czech-Slovak command, said today through his aide, that unless the Allies intervened immediately with sufficient force the bolshevik would gain an unshakable grip on Russia. He said the Czechs, having lost half their strength and being worn out and without support, were withdrawing, leaving Siberia helpless. Conditions were growing worse steadily. Ten divisions, he said, could reach Moscow through Siberia and re-establish order in Russia.

First Report States American Marines Raid Consulate and Wound Consul.

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, March 14.—A clash between American troops, a Japanese policeman and some civilians at Tientsin was reported to the state department today by Minister Reisch at Peking. The minister said he had sent First Secretary Spencer to Tientsin to investigate and report.

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, March 14.—Government officials were greatly disturbed today by the news from Peking that American marines raided the Japanese consulate at Tien-Tsin and seriously injured the consul. No official information had been received either by the state department or the Japanese embassy, but inquiries were not sent as it was assumed that reports already were on the cables.

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Commercial travelers receiving allowances for expenses may deduct actual cost of meals and lodging in computing their income tax, according to a ruling given today by Commissioner Roper. Any excess of allowances above money expended must be included in taxable income. Travelers working on straight commission without expense allowance may not deduct their expenses.

Wilson who was recently appointed United States district judge from the northern district of Texas.

MRS. ANDREW ROSE DIES AT TEXARKANA HOME

By Associated Press. TEXARKANA, ARK., March 14.—Mrs. Andrew Rose, twice state regent in Texas of the Daughters of the American Revolution, died at her home here last night of paralysis. She had been ill for ten days. The funeral will be held tomorrow.

MANY VICTIMS OF RECENT SPARTACAN TROUBLE IN BERLIN

By Associated Press. COPENHAGEN, March 14.—The number of victims of the latest Spartacan disturbance in Berlin, according to the Zeitung Am Mittag of that place, is so great that it is difficult to find accommodations for the bodies in the Berlin morgues. The paper reports that there are 194 bodies in the morgue in Hanoverstrasse of which forty-two have not been identified. The capacity of the morgue is exhausted. The newspaper says there is almost as many dead in the garrison hospital while there are 115 bodies at the Friedrichshain hospital, in eastern Berlin. There are thirty dead at the Urban hospital in southeastern Berlin.

CLASH BETWEEN U. S. SOLDIERS AND JAP POLICE

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TO REQUIRE GERMANY TO RELINQUISH HER HOLD ON TSING-TAO

By Associated Press. PARIS, March 14.—The supreme council of the peace conference has virtually decided to include in the preliminary treaty of peace a requirement that Germany shall relinquish her leasehold of Tsing-Tao and all properties and concessions on the Shantung peninsula. No attempt will be made at the present to render a decision as to the ultimate possession unless an extraordinary concession is now the subject of a controversy between the Japanese and Chinese delegation in Paris. The former holds that Japan acquired the leasehold by right of conquest over the German forces there, although she is willing to permit the ultimate status of the Shantung peninsula to be determined by the peace conference. China contends the lease was automatically cancelled by the expulsion of the Germans, who originally acquired it by force and public wefare interest to China. It is expected that the final adjustment will be made in the final peace treaty or by the league of nations unless in the interim the principals to the controversy reach a mutually satisfactory agreement.

DENSMORE URGES THAT BUREAU BE KEPT ACTIVE

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, March 14.—Director General Densmore of the United States employment service today issued a statement requesting business, labor and public wefare interests to keep the soldiers and war workers' employment activities in operation after March 22 when the force of the unemployment service is to be reduced 20 per cent.

AMERICANS MUST DEPRIVE THEMSELVES TO AID RUSSIANS

By Associated Press. ARCHANGEL, Thursday, March 13.—Information secured by the Allied food committee in North Russia and from reports reaching Archangel from the interior indicates that the American people must deprive themselves of breadstuffs until the Russian question is settled and the country is restored to peace. "As long as the Russian people are suffering from the shortage of seed grain, which because of the famine has been used for food, Russia will be comparatively without crops in 1919 and this condition will extend into 1920, even if the country is restored to normal. It will grow worse from year to year."

By Associated Press. ARCHANGEL, Thursday, March 13.—The Allied casualties in the fighting along the Vega river since February 28 have been extremely light. It is estimated that the bolsheviks lost at least five hundred killed. The American casualties from February 28 to March 9 inclusive were five killed. One American soldier is missing and two officers and thirty men were wounded. The total American casualties to date in North Russia follows: Killed in action: officers 4, men 71. Died of wounds: officers 1, men 18. Missing: men 36. Died of disease: officers 2, men 67. Wounded: officers 11, men 241.

DENY THAT CUBA WAS A HOTBED OF HUN PROPAGANDA

HAVANA, Thursday, March 13.—Denial that a German submarine base was maintained on the coast of Cuba and that Cuba was a hotbed of Hun propaganda was made tonight by Juan Montalvo, secretary of the interior, in a statement in answer to a declaration made in a speech in New York recently by Maximilian Toch, a canoanifer employed by the American government.

PLEDGE THEMSELVES TO GET DEBS OUT OR ALL GET IN JAIL

RAILROAD ASKS FOR PERMIT TO BUILD ADDITIONAL TRACKS

IMPROVEMENT PLANNED TO RELIEVE CONGESTED CONDITIONS IN THE YARDS.

WOULD PROTECT MERCHANTS

Ordinance Proposed Fixing Heavy License For Sale of Goods by Non-Resident Firms.

Efforts on the part of the M. K. & T. railroad to do everything possible to relieve the congestion caused by the freight embargo on Wichita Falls were promised Thursday night when F. W. Grace, general superintendent of the road here, appeared before the city council requesting permission to construct a team track on Pecan street near the new compress.

The proposed track will be 125 feet in length, and should be of material aid in providing a means of unloading a large number of freight cars daily. The council, after discussing the proposition at length, voted to defer action until today when members of the body will investigate the location and go into the matter with property owners and residents along the trackage route.

To Protect Merchants.

An ordinance was introduced at last night's meeting aimed to protect local merchants from harm done to their business by transient merchants from outside cities who bring goods here, to display them temporarily and after "closing up" immediately depart—having paid no taxes, owned no property and with no obligations of any kind to Wichita Falls. The proposed ordinance would force merchants not permanently located here to buy a permit before doing business here, and while the cost of the permit was left to the judgment of the council it was suggested that such a permit should be obtainable at a figure of \$200 a day. A penalty was provided in the ordinance not to exceed a fine of \$200 for each day that an itinerant merchant does business in this city without such a permit.

Legal Issue Involved. As such an ordinance involves many fine legal distinctions, including interpretation of the question of the interstate commerce laws, the council

READY CUT HOUSES WILL BE ERECTED AS AN EXPERIMENT

Two ready-cut houses, bought from the Alexander Lumber Company of Chicago by the Wichita Falls Housing Corporation as an experiment, have arrived in the city and are now in the local freight yards. As soon as possible they will be unloaded and put on lots owned by the corporation, and will be for sale under the plan adopted.

According to B. F. Johnson, of the housing corporation, these houses were bought as an experiment in the hope of solving one phase of the building problem brought about by the freight embargo which made it impossible for the lumber companies to get adequate supplies of lumber. The Alexander Lumber Co. has furnished many houses for the government when speed in construction was necessary, and also claim that their houses can be constructed at a saving of at least 50 per cent over the ordinary cost of houses built in the usual way.

From the time the material is put on the ground only two days is required for the construction of the house, according to the claim of the lumber company. One of the houses, which are to be built here in a short time is four rooms, the second five rooms, Mr. Johnson states.

WHY COFFEE IS HIGHER There are several contributing reasons why coffee is higher. At the beginning of the war in Europe there was a large stock of coffee in Brazil—who produces eighty percent of the coffee of the World. Europe used two thirds of the World's coffee supply and America one third. After war was declared in Europe their markets were closed and America was Brazil's only outlet. So notwithstanding higher freight rates and production costs we were enabled to buy coffees at little advance over pre-war costs. After America entered the war the food administration restricted the importation of coffee and we were forced to use up the surplus usually carried here—and now Brazil is giving us just enough for our immediate wants—which together with the fact that Europe's Coffee pot was empty and must be replenished—puts Brazil in the saddle. Then the frosts last August so damaged the coffee trees that we are due to have a short crop for at least three years—so there seems no immediate prospect for cheaper coffee—YET COFFEE IS STILL THE CHEAPEST commodity that enters into human consumption—A pound makes thirty cups.
