BERLIN, Sunday, March 16,—Indications are that the average German is not enthusiastic over the amount of food he is likely to get under the provisioning agreement with the Alies. After his frist feeling of enthusiasm over the signing of the long desired arrangement he immediately began to figure out his share of the provisions under the terms of the document, an extended summary of which was published officially this which was published officially this morning and such comment as it made reflects an undeniable feeling of disappointment at the quantity provided. COPENHAGEN, Mar, 17 -- If the Allies loaded the peace treaty with conditions going beyond President Wilson's fourteen points, the German national assembly would have to refuse its assent to the treaty. Mathias Erz-berger, head of the German armistice commission declared at a Berlin meet-ing in favoring the formation of a ing in favoring the formation of a "real league of nations," according to a Berlin dispatch today. The matter then would be left to a referendum of the German she said. Herr Erzberger disclaimed any obligation upon Germany to give compensation for acts she committed after her first peace offer in December 1916. The speaker declared that the only means of calling a hait on bolshevism was the abandonment of the "mailed first policy of the Allies."

The German people, said Herr Erzberger, had almost unlimited confidence in President Wilson and he hoped that the league of nations cov-

hoped that the league of nations cov-enant as promulgated February 14 would not be finally adopted, as, he declared, it was a compromise of the ideals of President Wilson with the imperialistaic aspirations of some of the Allies. WHY COFFEE IS HIGHER

There are several contributing reasons why coffee is higher. At the beginning of the war in Europe there was a large stock of coffee in Brazil—who produces eighty percent of the coffee of the World. Europe used two thirds of the World's coffee supply and America one third. After war was declared in Europe their markets were closed and America was Brazils only outlet. So notwishstanding higher freight rates and production costs we were enabled to buy coffees at little advance over pre-war costs. After America entered the war the food administration restricted the importation of coffee and we were forced to use up the surplus usually carried here—and now Brazil is giving us just enough for our immediate wants—which together with the fact that Europes Coffee pot was empty and must be replenished—puts Brazil in the saddle. Then the frosts last August so damaged the coffee trees that we are due to have a short crop for at least three years—so there seems no immediate prospect for cheaper coffee—YET COFFEE IS STILL THE CHEAPEST commodity that enters into human consumption-A pound makes thirty cups.
