

PADEREWSKI SOUNDS A NOTE OF WARNING TO ALLIED NATIONS

By Associated Press. WARSAW, March 21.—Germany, although defeated in the west, is not yet beaten in the east and if her aims in that part of Europe are to be frustrated and there is to be peace there must be a strong Poland, Jan Ignace Paderewski, the premier of Poland, declared today.

In outlining the present situation of Poland and its relation to the whole European question, Premier Paderewski said:

"The importance to the peace of Europe of a strong and united Poland can not be exaggerated. Germany made war not for honor and ideals but for markets and raw materials. She was not yet beaten when Germany is ready to acknowledge herself beaten in the west but not in the east."

"The same men who organized the present war count on re-organizing Russia in their own interests. If they do so, they will have an endless supply of labor and raw materials. In addition to wheat they will have cotton from Turkestan, oil and great lumber supplies from the forests of Russia and immense coal and iron deposits, to say nothing of gold, platinum and other minerals. With these advantages Germany would inevitably stamp her domination on the whole world. Think of the effect on the splendid body of America's highly paid labor if Germany trained and directed the cheap labor of Russia and China. No one could compete with such cheap production."

"Germany is at the gates of unorganized Russia and once let her combine with the bolsheviks and reorganize Russia, as she will have the leisure to do in peace time, she will dominate the world. A strong Poland can block this plan."

STEAMSHIP ARRIVES AT NEW YORK PORT WITH U. S. SOLDIERS

CASUALTY LIST IN U. S. AIR SERVICE IS REPORTED AT 554

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Mar. 21.—Casualties in the United States air service personnel serving with the American and Allied armies at the front numbered 554. Of the total 171 men were killed in combat.

The record for months shows the rapid rise in casualties as American fliers began to get into action. GERMANS CLING TO HOPE OF RETAINING SOME OF COLONIES

WAIL GOES UP FROM ZURICH PROFESSOR ON PEACE DELEGATION.

WANTS TERMS MODIFIED

Pretends to Be Astonished at Idea of Prosecuting the Former Emperor for Crimes.

By Associated Press. BERNE, Thursday, March 20.—In an interview printed in the New Gazette of Zurich Professor Walter Scheucking, a member of the German peace delegation, declares that he does not believe that President Wilson's program can be invoked to deprive Germany of all her colonies. Mr. Wilson has promised a broad, generous settlement to peoples like Germans," he says. "Civilization rests on the efforts of all the great nations. The question of indemnity appears to have settled in principle, all that remains being to fix the amount. As to the league of nations, Germany is sincerely desirous of collaborating in the organization and I hope the Paris covenant may be sensibly modified."

Prof. Scheucking says he thinks the Swiss plan might profitably be consulted, as it is in his opinion, quite reasonable on a judicial and political viewpoint. He says the early ratification of the treaty is to "bury imperialistic policies for the benefit of the smaller nations."

"I am astonished that the idea of prosecuting former Emperor William and his generals is seriously entertained," he says. "Under international law there is no court competent to set up a tribunal after the event, to try a ruler or general in contradiction of an essential principle of criminal law—that no member shall be punished without a law authorizing it. I think the question of responsibility for the war is an international one and can only be fully elucidated if all the governments open their archives and an established tribunal examines all interested parties."

PLAN FOR BRITISH SOLDIERS TO DEVELOP THE DOMINIONS

LONDON, March 21 (Via Montreal).—An agreement has been reached for the promotion of an important scheme of immigration to enable British soldiers to settle in the dominions, the Canadian press says. It understands the basis of the plan is free passage to destination, provided by the British government and loans at pre-war rates of interest to the dominion governments acting as agents for the loaned government. The idea is to open up new tracts, build railways and generally finance settlers.

REANEY IS RELEASED ON A \$10,000 BOND

WESTERN SECTION OF COUNTRY IS ISOLATED AS RESULT OF SNOW

By Associated Press. DENVER, COLO., Mar. 21.—The western section of the country is isolated today as the result of a snow and sleet storm that swept western Colorado and Wyoming last night. All wire communication west of Denver has ceased and trans-continental trains are reported to be behind schedule. According to the meager reports obtainable this morning, the storm was most severe between Cheyenne and Rawlins, Wyo. In that section a heavy sleet early this morning took down all wires, and delayed trains. The sleet storm is said to have been accompanied by the heaviest snowfall of the winter. Another storm as severe as the one in Colorado and Wyoming is reported to have occurred in Arizona and New Mexico.

Italians Threaten To Quit Peace Conference

INJUNCTION IS GRANTED GERMANS REFUSE TO OPERATE VESSELS FOR THE ALLIED NATIONS

Judge Bonner in the 30th district court late this afternoon granted a temporary injunction restraining T. R. Boone, W. C. Neisgan, Harvey Harris and others from drilling for oil on any public highway within Wichita county. The defendants promptly gave notice of appeal to the 2nd Supreme Judicial District at Fort Worth, but it is unlikely that a hearing will be obtained and a decision reached in the court in less than seven weeks, the injunction standing in the meantime.

The injunction was granted by Judge Bonner on the grounds that drilling on the public roads was an obstruction of the roads and constituted a nuisance per se under the statutes. Coupled with the injunction went the condition that the plaintiffs, C. H. Clark and 98 others, must give an injunction bond of \$15,000.

GERMANS WANT TO DISCUSS AND MODIFY PEACE CONDITIONS

By Associated Press. KANSAS CITY, MO., March 21.—Secretary of War Baker was accused directly of "aiding and assisting the W. W. International Socialists and Humanitarians" in their program of blocking the construction of the army by Major Dick B. Foster, member of the general court martial, which tried 135 alleged conscientious objectors at Camp Funston in an address before the City Club here today.

This was done, Major Foster declared, "by extending and perverting the acts of congress for the protection, comfort and safety of these objectors."

"In making this accusation," Major Foster continued, "I consider no persons, no suppositions and no guesses, but base it entirely upon my own personal knowledge of the treatment extended these objectors. This knowledge was gained from official war department orders and communications and the personal knowledge of objectors themselves. I gained while acting as one member of the general court martial, and while in the custody before the City Club here today."

"This was done," Major Foster declared, "by extending and perverting the acts of congress for the protection, comfort and safety of these objectors."

"Local draft boards," Major Foster said, "had received instructions to induct into military service and to send to army camps all men between the ages of 21 and 31 ages."

"There was, however, an inner working of the military program. Objectors of all classes found protection awaiting in extensions of the act of congress by secret orders and every man who expressed or showed any disinclination toward military service found a well organized and well promulgated propaganda of the obstructionists waiting to educate him, Bullettins and pamphlets from the National Civil Liberties Bureau of New York City, were semi-secretly promulgated among the drafted men upon their arrival in camp. These bulletins were distributed to the men, and contained detailed instructions as to how the drafted man might avail himself of pacifist protection."

LIVESTOCK BUSINESS BECOMING A FACTOR IN SOUTHERN STATES

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21.—After extensive investigations, experts of the department of agriculture have concluded that the southern farmer can feed steers on cotton seed, meal or cake and corn or sorghum silage with or without other farm grown roughage and produce satisfactory gains at comparatively cheap cost and can market well finished steers for good prices if he is in a tick free section.

Planters who have been changing from cotton growers into cattle feeders have been skeptical about buying pure bred, the department of agriculture says, but "they have developed into such apt pupils, that as a result of their efforts in putting Dick Land on the livestock map, Natchez, Miss., Birmingham, Ala., Moultrie, Ga., and Jacksonville, Fla., are at present operating packing plants."

MANY INCOME TAX "ADVISERS" CHARGED WITH BEING FRAUD

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, March 21.—Fradulent representatives by private income tax advisers in many cities has been reported by revenue officers, it was learned today and investigations are to be made by United States attorneys. Prosecutions are probable in a number of cases.

Private tax advisers reaped a harvest last week, according to the reports, furling the rush of citizens to file their income returns. The advisers opened offices and by advertising drew thousands of persons to them.

Revenue officials charge that many of them were guilty of illegal practices in leading citizens to believe that their offices were branches of the revenue collectors' organizations and in using tax-payers in making out false returns.

GERMANS REFUSE TO OPERATE VESSELS FOR THE ALLIED NATIONS

By Associated Press. BERLIN, March 21. (Via Copenhagen.)—The German steamers Burgermeister Von Meisland and Burgermeister Schroeder, which were scheduled to sail on March 18 in accordance with the agreement reached at Brussels between German and Inter-Allied food commissions, has been prevented from leaving Hamburg owing to a resolution passed by sea-ment refusing to operate ships operated by the belligerent nations.

QUARREL IMMINENT OVER THE MANNER OF KAISER'S ABDICATION

BERLIN, Wednesday, Mar. 19.—In Field Marshal Hindenburg's statement explaining and justifying the flight of former Emperor William there was a sharp criticism of Prince Maximilian of Baden, the then chancellor, for publishing the facts of the emperor's abdication without the latter's assent. It is expected that this will evoke a sharp rejoinder from friends of the ex-emperor who are already pointing out that the emperor left Berlin October 31 without consulting or notifying the chancellor, who vainly attempted at the last moment to induce the emperor to stay in Berlin and later unsuccessfully urged him to return to the capital in order to the extent of the crisis and the advisability of abdicating.

Prince Maximilian had long been coveting the throne of the emperor and the abdication of the emperor and the revolution of the throne by the crown prince," says the Tagblatt.

"It was hoped by this means to save Germany from a complete debacle and revolution. The emperor went to great headquarters to escape such a fate and to seek a more sanguine atmosphere. He dashed his own thought of abdication in the surroundings until too late to save the throne for a possible successor."

Just what has caused the Italian delegation to announce its determination on the Fiume question at this time has not been ascertained at the very moment when it is known, however, that the question of territorial adjustments has been before their conferences of premiers which have taken place during the last few days.

An Associated Press dispatch received last night from Paris regarding a conference held yesterday between President Wilson and Premier Clemenceau at Lausanne, stated that there was every reason to believe that the frontier issues were among the foremost obstacles which the conference were facing.

JUST A YEAR TODAY GERMAN ARMY WAS AT PEAK OF POWER

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, March 21.—One year ago today the German army, at the peak of its power, poured down the Rhine lines in Picardy, bent on winning an overwhelming victory before American troops should reach the front in force.

Today Germany no longer exists as a military power. Her gigantic war machine has collapsed and the Americans she sought to avoid stand astride the Rhine, shoulder to shoulder with the British and French and with a Germany absolutely at their mercy.

SHIPYARD WORKERS AT ORANGE HAVE TROUBLE

PADEREWSKI EXTENDS THANKS TO AMERICA

By Associated Press. PARIS, Thursday, Mar. 20.—Premier Paderewski of Poland has sent to Herbert Hoover, director general of Allied relief, a message of thanks for the food sent Poland which Mr. Hoover had informed him "was the gift of the American people."

By Associated Press. PARIS, Mar. 21.—The Italian delegation to the peace conference has unanimously decided to withdraw from the conference unless Fiume is assigned to Italy contemporaneously with the conclusion of the peace. The decision was reached at a meeting today of the full delegation presided over by Premier Orlando. It was immediately communicated to the powers.

Colonel E. M. House, of the American mission, promised Premier Orlando to present within a few days a project concerning the Italian-Slav frontier which he hopes will satisfactorily settle the dispute.

The decision of the Italian delegation, as reported from Paris, apparently brings to a head the bitter controversy between Italy and the Jugoslav state over the disposition of land along the Adriatic formerly belonging to the Austro-Hungarian empire, which both nationalities claim.

Italy's claims originally included virtually the entire Balkan coast, with Trieste and Fiume, which latter city is the second principal seaport on the eastern side of the Adriatic. Recent reports, however, have indicated an disposition to make important concessions regarding the land along the Balkan coast, provided that the city and harbor of Fiume remained to Italy. The Jugoslavs, however, have been insistent that this port be allotted to them, claiming it to be essentially a Croatian city and necessary to the Jugoslav state as affording the only feasible, suitable sea outlet for her commerce.

No Disposition to Yield. On the other hand, the Italians have no disposition on the part of Italy to yield her point so far as Fiume was concerned. Her attitude was officially stated by Premier Orlando in addressing the Italian chamber of deputies March 1 when he declared that while Italy remained faithful to the spirit of conciliation which inspired it, she would not yield to the appeal reaching her from the Italian town on the Gulf of Quarnero (Fiume) which was exposed to the loss of both its nationality and independence.

"We do not think," added the premier, "that this is possible at the very moment when it is wished that the world may be redeemed from a measure of violence done to the rights of peoples."

Grievance Was Adjusted. "There have been several incidents" at Fiume and other points in the territory claimed by both Italy and Jugoslavia, since the signing of the armistice, and the feud at Fiume grew so bitter that Italy established a blockade and cut off food relief imports for the interior. This matter was adjusted by the supreme council in Paris, however, and the reports of late have indicated that an amicable settlement of the conflicting Italian-Jugoslav claims was possible, at least probably.

MILLION RUSSIANS TO BE TRANSPORTED FROM THIS COUNTRY SOON

NEW YORK, March 21.—The executive committee of the American colonial convention today announced the incorporation of the Svedovka steamship line, the purpose of which is to charter a large surplus of steamships for the transportation of 1,000,000 Russian workers, bolsheviks and others to Russia.

The main reason for the movement, according to the announcement, is the dissatisfaction of the Russian workers with economic conditions here. They say that employment is lacking in this country.

The new steamship line has been incorporated in Delaware.

Prof. Clark Has Agreed That Schools May Be Used as Concentration Points.

School children of Wichita Falls are going to be the important factor in securing clothes for the Armenian and Syrian war sufferers, Wednesday, March 26, having been set as the date when the school children are to

bring bundles of clothes to the schools. The request for clothing for the sufferers has just come to W. E. Duke, publicity chairman, who has been handling practically every detail of the local campaign, and the request made that several hundred pounds of old clothing available for further use be sent to the Committee for Relief in the Near East from Wichita Falls. Similar requests have been sent all over the country. Prof. Lee Clark, the city superintendent of schools, has agreed that the schools be used as concentration points for collecting the clothing. J. M. McFall will collect the clothing, after it is left at the schools, and his show rooms will be turned over to the Armenian and Syrian Relief committee at a downtown concentration point. There are many people, Mr. Duke stated, who have clothing they will be glad to contribute who have no children, and these are requested to bring their packages to the McFall Bros. store, on Indiana. Monday each school will be visited by Mr. Duke and his assistants, who will explain the call to them. Tuesday the mothers are asked to prepare the bundles of clothing, so that there will be no delay in collecting them on Wednesday. The contributions must be brought to the schools Wednesday, as only one day has been set for the collecting of clothes.

Changes and Features In Income Tax Blanks

Fred T. Dillon of the Edward J. Dillon and Co., certified public accountants of Kansas City, who is here on professional business, brought down with him one of the new corporation income blanks. These blanks are very elaborate. It is reported that they will be ready for general distribution within a few days.

Both income and excess profits tax information are combined in one blank instead of being separated into two blanks as they were last year. Some of the principal changes and features of the new blanks follow: Schedule 1—"Net income" and schedule 2, "Invested capital," are practically the same as last year. Schedule 3—"Deductions" this year will consist of two sections, the excess profits section and war profit section.

Schedule 4, "Computation of taxes" This contains two different divisions. The first division is the excess profit tax with 8 per cent of invested capital plus \$3000.00 as a deduction, or brackets one and two of the war excess profit tax.

Schedule 4 also contains a new section this year, an income tax section which shows the net income less the \$2000.00 exemption, and the excess or war tax credits.

Schedule 4 also contains an adjustment of taxes where the corporations have a fiscal year.

Schedule A, "Taxable Net Income" is another new schedule which is a detailed profit and loss account for the year.

Schedule B is another new schedule which is a reconciliation of the net profit per books with a taxable net income.

Schedule C shows a form of balance sheet which the department demands the taxpayer shall make out for the beginning and end of the year in parallel columns.

Schedule D, another new schedule is an analysis of the surplus account for the period.

Schedule E, "Capital surplus and undivided profits," same as last year.

Schedule F and G, "Additions and adjustments of additions and deduc-

tions from invested capital" are practically the same.

Schedule I and J, "changes in invested capital during the taxable war years" are practically the same.

Schedule K is a new schedule and shows the changes between the taxable and pre-war years.

Schedule L is a new section requiring the taxpayer to attach a statement giving the amount of inadmissible assets at the end of the year, and the average during the year with the several different percentages.

The questions are similar to those asked last year except the questions asking corporations what other companies they are affiliated with.

The information asked for by the department this year in the new blanks will give the more complete detailed information than last year.

RESPONSE SHOULD BE LIBERAL

Funds will be solicited next week to make up the deficit in the school treasury so that the teachers may be paid and the school term run the usual length. The Times believes that the majority of the people of Wichita Falls understand why our school revenues are deficient. It is a condition that is likely to result in any growing community. Taxes being levied as to January 1 of one year are not collected until the next year, so that any sudden increase in population is likely to run the scholastics up out of proportion to the revenues. This is what has been happening in Wichita Falls for a number of years. This year the disproportion has been even greater. During the year the population has increased probably fifty per cent but there has been no corresponding increase in school revenues. Living conditions also have greatly increased and it has been necessary to raise the salaries of the teachers in order to enable them to live. All this has exhausted the school revenues and that's where our schools now find themselves. Of course, the schools could be closed and expenses stopped but no one wants this done. The good people of Wichita Falls are ready to dig down into their pockets and bring forth the money necessary to continue our schools for a full term at full efficiency.

COUNCIL TO BE COMMENDED.
 Keeping a tidy and clean town is a matter of vigilance. It isn't much more work or trouble or cost to keep the town clean than to permit it to dirty, for the accumulations of trash and dirt and filth have to be cleaned up sooner or later anyway and it is often actually cheaper to clean up every day or oftener than it is to allow things to go for a week or a month. The city council is to be commended for its action in putting on more teams for sanitary work. The town will look neater and better. It will be cleaner and more sanitary and the fire hazard will be lessened.

FIRE MARSHAL AND CHIEF M'CLURE MAKE INSPECTION OF CITY

BUSINESS MEN GIVEN TO UNDERSTAND THAT THE TRASH MUST GO.

URGENT APPEAL IS MADE

Expected That Drive Next Week Will Result in Thorough Clean-up of Entire City.

Many business men of Wichita Falls, restaurant proprietors and others, received sudden mental awakenings on the clean-up question this morning, when Fire Chief McClure, accompanied by E. W. McKnight, assistant fire marshal, toured the downtown business district, visited scores of business places and laid down the law.

There was no delay anywhere, no time wasted in explanations. The two "Macs" simply told the merchants and others that the trash would have to go, or the state insurance commission would be asked immediately to cancel the insurance of the men refusing. The result was the start of an active clean-up program throughout the business section, with private teams and city teams hauling away trash as fast as it could be piled together.

McKnight stated this morning that the division of fire prevention of the state insurance commission has mapped out a definite program to be followed here next week in co-operation with the clean-up campaign of the Civic League.

"Civic and commercial organizations, school children, the press, women's clubs, Boy Scouts, insurance agents, city officials, and individual citizens all will have to get together in this drive," he said, "and co-operate for results that will be satisfactory, and tend toward permanency. The fire department of Wichita Falls is as good as any in the state in cities of similar size, but no fire department can guarantee protection when trash is permitted to accumulate throughout a city.

School Children to Co-operate. "We expect to assign school children to the duty of making home inspections, removing fire hazards and in furthering a general cleaning up of the residence district; civic and commercial organizations must stand solidly back of the campaign and lend all possible assistance; the press of the city must advertise the good work; women's clubs must oversee the work in the residence district; Boy Scouts must distribute literature, run errands carry messages and do similar work."

PLAN CAMPAIGN TO WELCOME SOLDIERS ON RETURN TO CITY

At a meeting of the men of the Church of the Good Shepherd held last evening at the rectory, it was enthusiastically voted to organize a "Welcome Home Campaign" for the aid of the men of the parish and others to whom they can be of assistance who are now in the various branches of the national service. Walter Macpherson, Provincial Secretary of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, was present and outlined the plan of activity to the men. M. J. Bashara was elected president and Carter McGregor secretary.

Chairman of the various committees were appointed, and the plan of activity discussed. It was also decided to have a dinner at the parish house in the near future when those various committees would be completed and definite activity inaugurated.

This movement is nationwide in its scope. It is planned to have similar organizations in every parish and mission of the Episcopal church throughout the United States in order that the hundreds of thousands army and navy will receive the co-operation of the men of the church while returning to civil life.

History of Movement. The history of the inauguration of the movement is: Through its Young Men's Society, the Episcopal church, St. Andrew, religious and social welfare work has been carried on in every camp in the United States during the war. When the men in charge of this work saw that their usefulness to the soldier still in the service would soon come to an end, and the wonderful opportunities that could be theirs in the assistance of the discharged men, they immediately called a conference of those in charge of the work in the camps, which was held at Atlanta, Ga., a few weeks ago when the present plan of activity was adopted. The secretaries in charge of work in the camps are now being sent into the various parishes throughout the country to organize the men of the church to help solve the problem that now confronts the nation, namely to see to it that the soldier and the sailor who has gone out and offered his services to his country will receive a square deal when he comes back.

NEW YORK, March 21.—The cotton market was nervous and irregular at the opening today with sentiment unsettled by the fall in sterling exchange, which was expected to lead to wider differences between American and foreign markets and possibly re-exports. First prices were 14 to 18 points higher on old style months and 21 points higher to eight points lower on the new with new style May selling off from 24.67 to 24.48 right after the call and October from 21.30 to 20.95 or about four points higher to two points lower. There was considerable Wall street selling and scattered liquidation but Liverpool was a good buyer and the market steadied shortly after the call on firmness in the stock market and reports of a better spot demand.
 The market became firm later in the morning on reports of an improved spot demand in the south, the outlook for calder weather with rain in the southwest and reports that the peace treaty would be ready for signatures before the end of the month. Spot houses were buyers while there was covering by early sellers on the advance which extended to 24.77 for new style May and 21.30 for October, or 25 to 23 points net higher.
 The volume of business tapered off during the early afternoon and there was some scattered realizing, but prices were sustained by the continued reports of the improved spot demand and ruled within a few points of the best around 2 o'clock.
 Cotton closed very steady.



KATY IS GRANTED PERMIT TO BUILD TRACKS ON PECAN

TEMPORARY MEASURE DESIGNED TO RELIEVE CONGESTED CONDITIONS MORE WAGONS FOR CITY

Council Makes Preparations For a Thorough Clean Up in the Business District.

Permission was granted last night by the City Council to the M. K. & T. railroad to lay a team track switch on Pecan street as a temporary measure to assist in relieving freight congestion here. The track will accommodate between 35 and 40 cars, and will be a big aid to the road in its efforts to keep the local yards clear.

The original plans of the railroad regarding the track were modified before the necessary permission was granted. The original plan contemplated the laying of a track on the east side of Pecan street, but the council, after a long session, agreed to construct a "run-around" switch instead of the spur track originally contemplated; this modification resulting from requests made by James Gant, of the Farmers' Cotton Oil Company, and A. F. Wagon, of the Peoples Ice company, who declared that a spur track or a "switch" switch would bring interference with the industries at the west end of the proposed track.

As F. W. Gant, general superintendent of the Katy at this terminal, is out of town and the accepted modification will have to be submitted to him, some doubt was expressed last night by Johnson whether the road will be able to start laying the new switch and track before next week.

Order Tanks Buried.

Acting on a petition signed by officers of the Peoples Ice company, the H. O. Wagon Grocery company and the Bell Mattress company, the council directed Chief McClure, of the fire department, to order Willis & Cobb to bury below the ground surface gas tanks on Harvey street between the railroad tracks and Mississippi street. The petitioners declared that the tanks constituted a menace to their business and that insurance companies have threatened to cancel their insurance unless the tanks are buried.

Chief McClure brought before the "city dads" the visit to Wichita Falls next week of five members of the state fire prevention bureau, and the necessity of a thorough clean-up in the business district in order to avoid an increased insurance rate. Announcements were made that the city chase more teams and hire additional men, and the council agreed to start hauling trash from the business section. Steps also will be taken to prevent automobile owners from parking their cars in downtown alleys, and all owners of property on such alleys will be rigidly required to keep the

allevies free of boxes, papers and other trash in the future.

Want New Fire Plugs.

The fire chief also asked the council to order the installation of new fire plugs at Francis and Elizabeth, Fifteenth and Grace, and Austin and Sixth streets, with the added request that the water company be directed to lay the mains and install plugs already ordered at Polk and Avenue C, and Clark and Elizabeth. The matter was taken under advisement.

H. D. Levy, Dallas contractor, again appeared before the council regarding his company's offer to pave streets in the residential district without cost to the city, but the matter was set over for later action as necessary specifications on the paving have not been received.

Permits were granted to store building materials on the city streets at various points, including Fifth and Ohio, where J. A. Kemp is constructing a plant for the Penick Hardware company of Stamford, Tenn. and Scott, where Self Brothers are building a three story brick garage for W. M. Priddy, and at Tenth and Lamar.

The council voted to have the city books audited for the year from April 1, 1918, to April 1, 1919, and the city closed with the reading of resolutions of respect to the memory of Harry Robertson, former city tax collector.

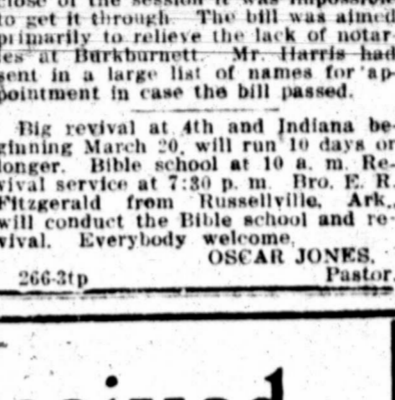

RECEIVE DETAILS OF A BATTLE BETWEEN VILLA AND FEDERALS

FIFTY THREE BANDITS AND SIXTEEN GOVERNMENT TROOPS KILLED WEDNESDAY.

BATTLE LASTS FOR HOURS

Charging Men Were Met by a Burst of Machine Gun Fire Resulting in Rout.

Associated Press. JUAREZ, MEX., March 21.—Details of the battle Wednesday between 500 Villa followers and about the same number of federal troops 15 miles south of the New Mexico border in which 53 of the Villa men and 16 government soldiers were killed, reached here today.

The report of the battle reached Juarez in a military code message from an unnamed point in the Mexican Northwestern Railroad, where it was brought by a runner.

General Zuazua with 500 cavalrymen left Juarez Saturday and traveled by train to Urua Casas Grandes, marching overland from there in the direction of Ojitas and Janos where the ranch foreman "Bunk" Spencer and a number of employees of the Warrent Cattle Co., an American concern, were held prisoners by Martin Lopez and his band.

Battle Lasts Several Hours.

According to General Zuazua the battle lasted several hours before the rebels ran out of ammunition and charged in an attempt to capture the federal mule train carrying Zuazua's ammunition.

The charging men were met by a burst of machine gun fire and fled, leaving their dead on the field.

Martin Lopez has been with Villa since boyhood, and for the last two years has been his personal lieutenant. It was Lopez who first instituted the practice of dynamiting trains and robbing the passengers of everything they possessed, including their clothing and shoes and leaving them nude. Lopez with his brother Pablo participated in the raid on Columbus, N. M., in March, 1917. Pablo was wounded and was later captured and taken to Chihuahua City where he was executed by order of the then governor, Jacinto Trevino.

Ramon Vega is a comparatively new comer among the rebels though he has been implicated in a number of recent attacks on small places in western Chihuahua. On March 4 he raided Pearson, looted the property of the Madera Lumber Co. and killed a Chinese merchant.

SAYS CHAMBERLAIN IS RESPONSIBLE FOR LAW HE CRITICIZES

Secretary Baker, who passed through here last night on his way to El Paso, Texas, issued a statement in which he said Senator Chamberlain, as chairman of the Senate military committee, caused to be enacted the system of court martials which is now attacking Secretary Baker's statement follows:

"I cannot permit myself to be drawn into a newspaper controversy with Senator Chamberlain about officers of the army to whom I hold an official relation and whose conduct I must judge dispassionately and upon all the evidence I can obtain.

"That duty is mine and not Senator Chamberlain's and I shall perform it unbiased and unharmed by abuse or agitation.

"It is important however to note that system of courts martial and of military justice which the senator attacks is one which he himself caused to be enacted in 1916 when it was presented by me as a reform and a moderation and the previously existing irregularities.

"It is also important to note that the amendment which I sent to Senator Chamberlain as chairman of the military affairs committee of the Senate more than a year ago and more than a year before the occasion for the present discussion has so far as I know never been presented by him to

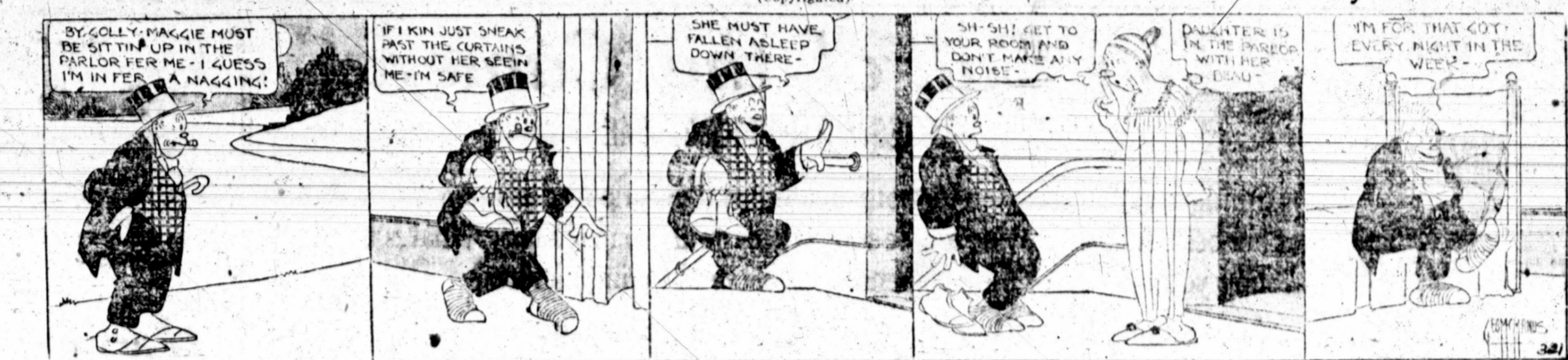

CALL FIELD HAS A UNIQUE STATUS IN MILITARY CIRCLES

Call Field occupies a somewhat unique status in comparison with other flying fields in this section, being neither a permanent field, nor a disbanding one. Major Russell, the new commander, states that "flying school detachment on inactive status" is its correct title. Unlike Barron, Carruthers and Tallaferra Fields of Fort Worth, the local camp has not been ordered completely demobilized and the ships transferred to other points. Flying is still in progress, though no more instruction is given, but the flying officers keep up their required number of hours in the air, so as to remain on flying status. The field is also acting as a relaying point between Post Field and Texas Field, from which the ships are being transferred, as the fields are closed, and planes are flying about this part of the country practically every day.

WHY COFFEE IS HIGHER

There are several contributing reasons why coffee is higher. At the beginning of the war in Europe there was a large stock of coffee in Brazil, who produces eighty percent of the coffee of the World. Europe used two thirds of the World's coffee supply and America one third. After war was declared in Europe their markets were closed and America was Brazil's only outlet. So notwithstanding higher freight rates and production costs we were enabled to buy coffees at little advance over pre-war costs. After America entered the war the food administration restricted the importation of coffee and we were forced to use up the surplus usually carried here—and now Brazil is giving us just enough for our immediate wants—which together with the fact that Europe's Coffee pot was empty and must be replenished—puts Brazil in the saddle. Then the frosts last August so damaged the coffee trees that we are due to have a short crop for at least three years—so there seems no immediate prospect for cheaper coffee—YET COFFEE IS STILL THE CHEAPEST commodity that enters into human consumption—A pound makes thirty cups.
